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



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

If the seller violates the law on a large scale he can make tremendous profits. The only recourse the law has is to fine him for each illegal sale-a lengthy and expen-Dead, crippled or Worthless Stock Sive proposition, even if it can be proved.

The end result is that small fines serve as a nuisance to legitimate Hamilton, Texas 41-tfc businesmen who accidentally violate the law and only slap the hand of schemers who operate on the

A goal of the Texas Department of Agriculture is to correct this inequality in the next session of the Legislature. For first offenders, the penalty will remain about the same. But for repeated violations, the dealer should have the book thrown at him.
