The sky momentarily lights with the brilliance of a hundred suns, and then, within seconds. eturns to the more subdued nues of a tropical dawn.

AS THE PYROTECHNICS die way, there begins the real work of checking instruments, analyzing data, comparing Cherokee with former tests. 


