Looking through some old recipes the other day, I ran across one that used to be my favorite summer meal when I was a kid.

On hot summer days when no one felt like eating a thing, mom would cook up a big bowl of cherry soup and dumplings in the afternoon — chill it — and serve it cold for dinner.

Just the thought of the delicious wine red soup and tender dumplings soaked in cherry broth was enough to tantalize my taste buds.

And since my own family has a "sweet tooth" I decided to try out cherry soup on them — And did it ever make a hit!

Here's the recipe, copied from grandma's own file:

1 qt. box fresh sour cherries (not pitted)
1 1/2 qts. cold water
1/2 cup sugar
Pinch of salt
Bring to a boil and let boil until skins break. Turn flame low and add dumplings.

Dumplings: Beat 1 egg lightly, adding a pinch of salt and butter the size of a hickory nut; then add 1 tablespoon milk, 1/2 teaspoon sugar. Stir in 1/4 teaspoon baking powder and enough flour to make a soft batter.

Chilled soups, salads, fruit juices, cold meats and seafood are regular summer meals at our house. I've learned to add an elegant touch by serving cold foods surrounded by ice.

A regular set of glassware "icers" comes in handy for chilled consommé or seafood cocktails but I have lots of fun making up my own ice servers, too.

To make an attractive relish tray, I line my favorite roll basket with heavy aluminum foil. Then fill it with finely crushed ice and arrange carrot curls, olives, celery hearts, green onions, radishes, green pepper rings, cucumber slices and small hot peppers — paying particular attention to color contrasts.

Ordinary glass baking dishes make fine ice servers, too. Fill the dish with crushed ice and then place glasses of fruit juice in the ice and serve on a buffet table.

I was inspired to use a lot of ice because of the automatic ice server in my new LP-Gas refrigerator. It's actually a miniature ice making machine built right in the freezing compartment.

My husband and I have always been intrigued by the silent operation of gas refrigeration and when we planned to use LP-Gas for heating and cooking we decided to hitch up our refrigerator to our back yard "gas well" too.

As a bonus we developed a new "yen" for all sorts of iced drinks and chilled foods.

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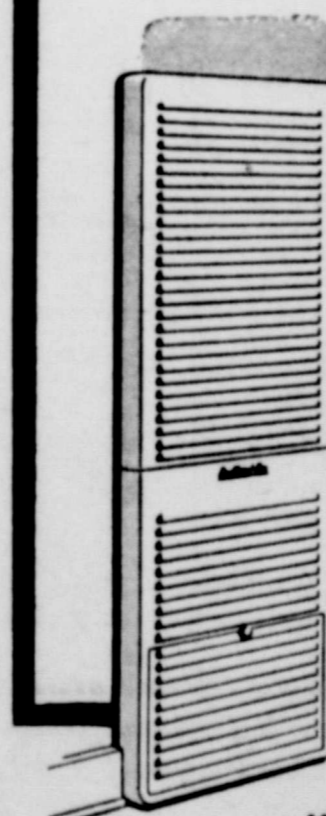

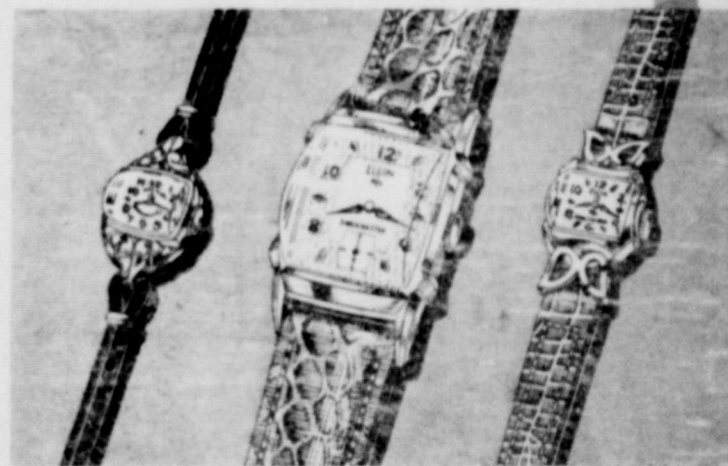

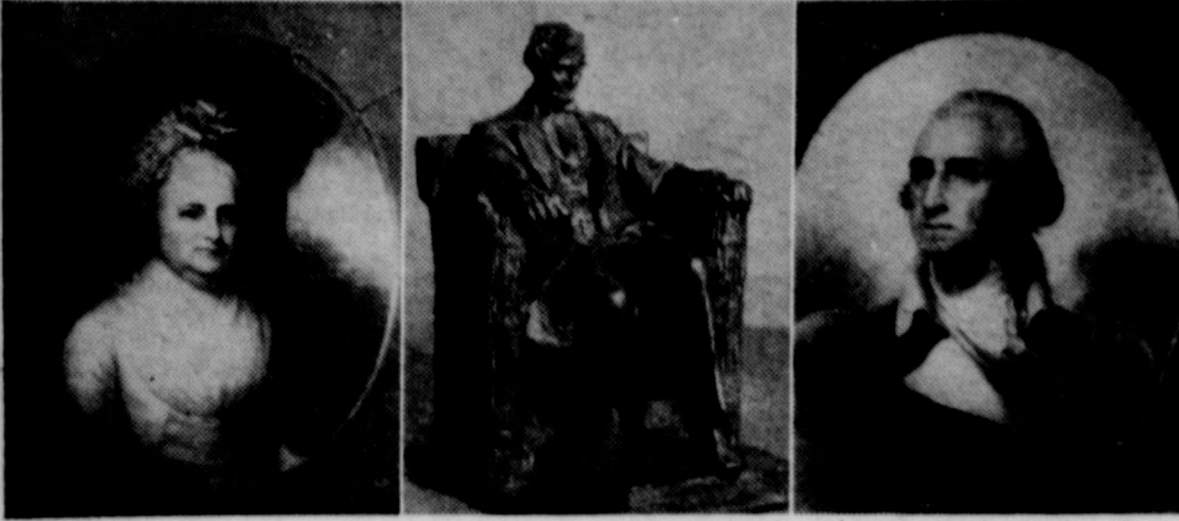

### It Happened Here or Near

By E. E. DAWSON

Here is a three-page letter from a retired minister, recently retired at the age of seventy-two, in keeping with the law of his church which allows a man to retire at sixty-five and makes it obligatory at 72. He is a member of one of the largest evangelical groups of the United States, a thoroughly good and reliable man, who at one time saw service in this area.

I quote from his letter: "But I wonder if the young pastors are afraid of us older preachers, or are they jealous? Why do they not use us more? The pastor here seems to want to keep me crowded out, as though he thought I might take some of the honor that might be rightfully his."

Stories of retired ministers of various faiths have come to this writer of the treatment they have received from fellow-ministers of the churches where they have joined after retirement. There is a dreadful sameness in the things related. It is of the evident jealousy of the pastor and of the coldness he manifests toward his retired ministerial brother. One man put it pretty bluntly when he said, "They treat you as if you were a piece of worn out furniture, good for nothing but to be kicked about; just so much junk that is unworthy of any attention or consideration." Another one when asked if he ever visited his former parish after his retirement said, "No, I dare not go. My successor would be too offended." Another asserted, "I am person non grata with the pastor, although our best friends of earth are in

the church." One man is reported to have attempted suicide because of the heartbreak he suffered in the church he had served many years and retired by reason of age. One pastor continues long after the normal age of retirement because he says that he has seen so much of the inhuman treatment suffered by retired ministers. He has resolved to continue until death retires him.

The above statement is of facts. It makes one wonder. A pastor makes impassioned pleas for his parishioners to manifest the spirit of Jesus, and then he treats his fellow-minister who is in retirement in a brutal fashion as if he were nothing worth and had lived a life of revolting crime. We wonder if some of them can sleep at night, or suffer stomach ulcers due to bad conscience—or do they have a conscience?

Please do not get the idea that all pastors are of that sort with respect to the old minister. Many one can say, surely most of them, do have a different spirit and show their interest in and fellowship for the older man by fraternizing with him and utilizing his aid and undertaking to make his final days glorious and full of joy.

One old minister put it this way: "I am of the opinion after some experience and a lot of observation that a man when he retires had best place his membership in a large church at some distance from where he lives, even if it necessitates his absence from the services except on rare occasions, so that he may be lost in the multitude, and there may be no chance for his ill treatment at the hands of these younger men who have

so much to learn, though too often they assume that they know everything."

Within the year, at a small city church, a retired minister and his wife came forward for membership in the church. Afterward another member of the church, curious about the man's leaving his community miles away, said to the old minister, "Tell me the story." Reluctantly the retired minister told essentially this story: "I held membership in a church that I had served as pastor for over a decade, and retired because of age. The church invited several prospects to preach with a view to a call. One man came who was especially complimentary of me and expressed much affection for me. The people seemed to think how happy it would be for the church to have a minister who was so friendly toward the former pastor. That man was called. In a little while he began to show that he did not want me around. By his conduct he made it plain to me that he counted me an impediment to his ministry. Seeing we were not wanted by the pastor, wife and I came here with sad hearts, for we live within a stone's throw of the church, and have to pass its front door as we come here. But there was nothing else for us to do."

### Gleam In Hico Banker's Eye For Rare and Unusual Money

The gleam in Cashier Ellis H. Randals' eye is always a little brighter than the glimmer of the coins continuously passing through his hands at First National Bank.

It is a collector's gleam, for he is always on the watch for the unusual currency that may turn up. His made-to-order hobby of collecting rare coins and bills has resulted in an impressive accumulation of hundreds of old and odd pieces.

Randals has no idea of the exact worth of his collection, but he wouldn't sell it for less than five or six thousand dollars.

The collection was begun about 50 years ago by his father, the late E. H. Randals, who was associated with the bank for many years before he retired in 1949.

**1804 Half-Cent.**  
It is an expensive hobby, Randals says, and the value of many coins depends upon whether you are buying or selling, but you can't hardly lose.

His oldest coin is an 1804 half-cent. Probably the most valuable is a tiny 1861 Denver Migt dollar, now worth more than \$100 and for which he has refused \$150.

In the collection are two complete sets of shinglasters, or fractional currency, issued in the 1860's, and still considered legal tender. Shinglasters, which few people nowadays have encountered, are small paper bills valued at 3, 5, 10, 15, 25, and 50 cents.

Randals has gold pieces valued at from one to 20 dollars; many half-cents, half-dimes, two- and three-cent coins minted in the early 1800's, and a number of un-circulated Buffalo nickels; a Trade dollar, made for foreign trade with a high percentage of silver—400 grains, 900 fine; a stack of Confederate money, issued in various Southern states, including a \$500 bill.

**One Individual Issue.**  
One three dollar bill issued not by a government but by an individual—one T. L. Philico of Rusk—in 1862; numerous old bills issued by Central Texas banks, including those in Hico and Waco; one \$20 note issued Sept. 8, 1894, by the First National Bank of Waco, signed by its officials, and secured by U. S. bonds; another issued by his own bank in 1890.

A number of freak coins, either paper-thin or with misplaced imprint, which slipped in the mint and went into circulation undetected.

Randals also has a pouch filled with Indian Head pennies and a purse bulging with foreign-made money.

The collection contains many duplications, some of which Randals could be persuaded to trade if he happened to find another coin enthusiast who also had duplicates he would swap.
