RUMORS ARE FLYING concerning the election next Saturday to formulate a special water control district for the purpose of flood control.

First rumor heard by this department was to the effect that all of the proposed flood detention dams would be located above Stephenville.

This rumor is far from truth. To put all the dams above Stephenville would be defeating the purpose of the project. Readers can rest assured that, if and when the program is carried, the area around Hico will receive a fair share of the 40 to 45 structures built.

None of the structures are due to be built on either of the Duffau Creeks, but Honey Creek, Falls Creek, and Gilmore Creek are on the planning table to be included in the project.

The other rumor has it that a bond issue will have to be voted on and passed to pay the local area's share of construction costs. This, too, is an untruth. Under the new bill introduced and passed in the last session of Congress, the Government will pay 100 per cent of the cost of construction.

FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulat-


