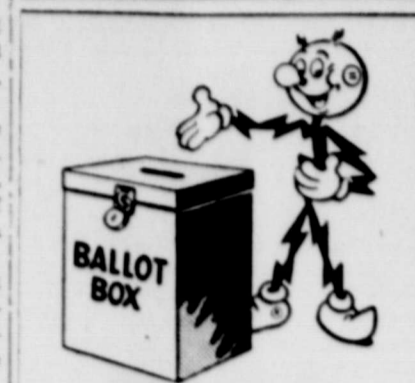

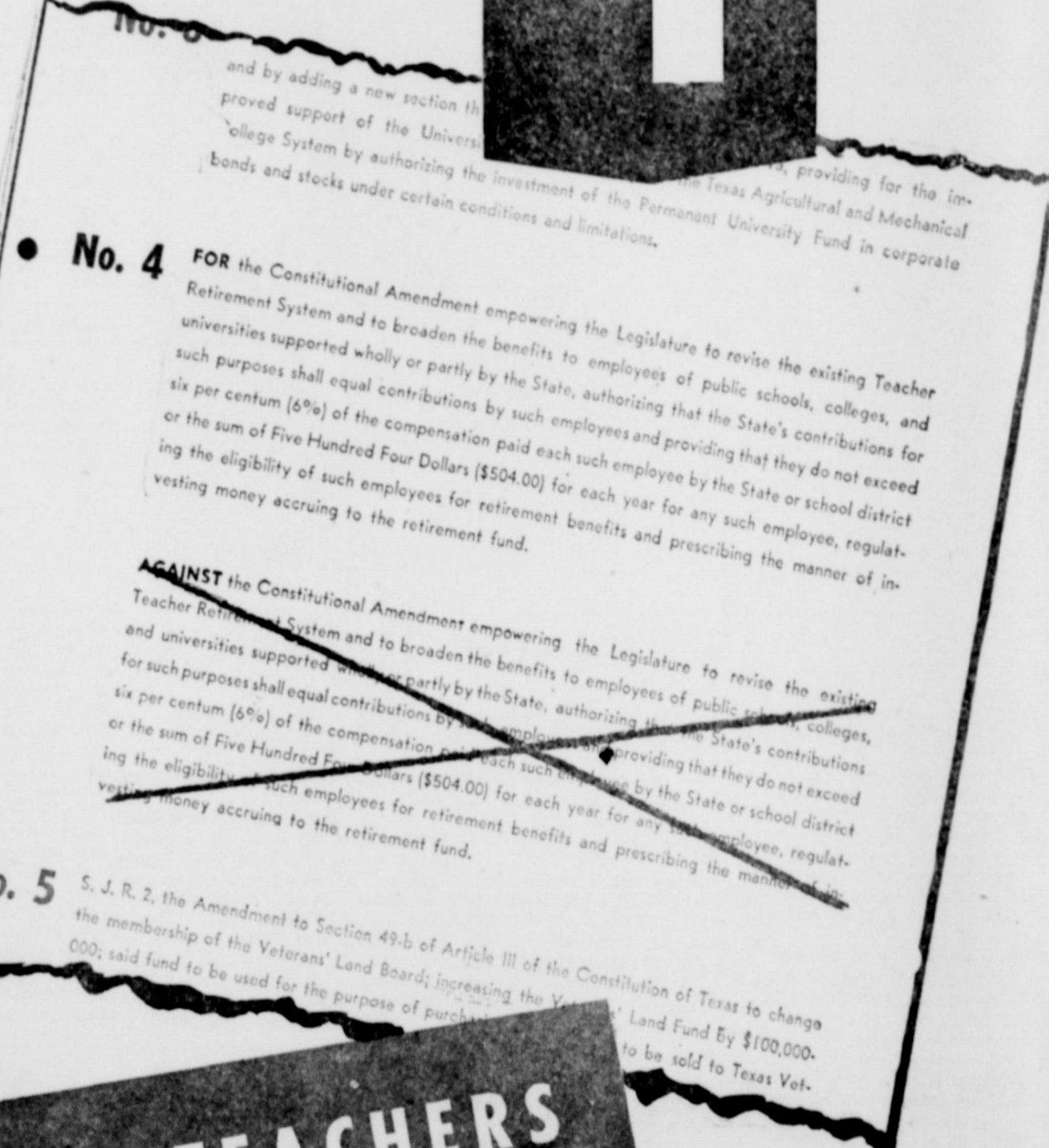

As a newspaperman, I hate to admit it—but facts are facts. The Windys of this world aren't only quicker news spreaders

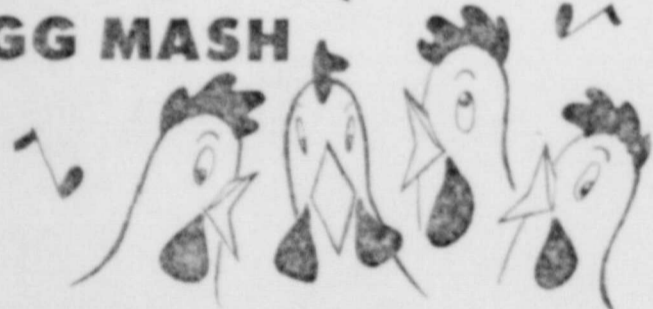
than our paper... they've even got better circulation.

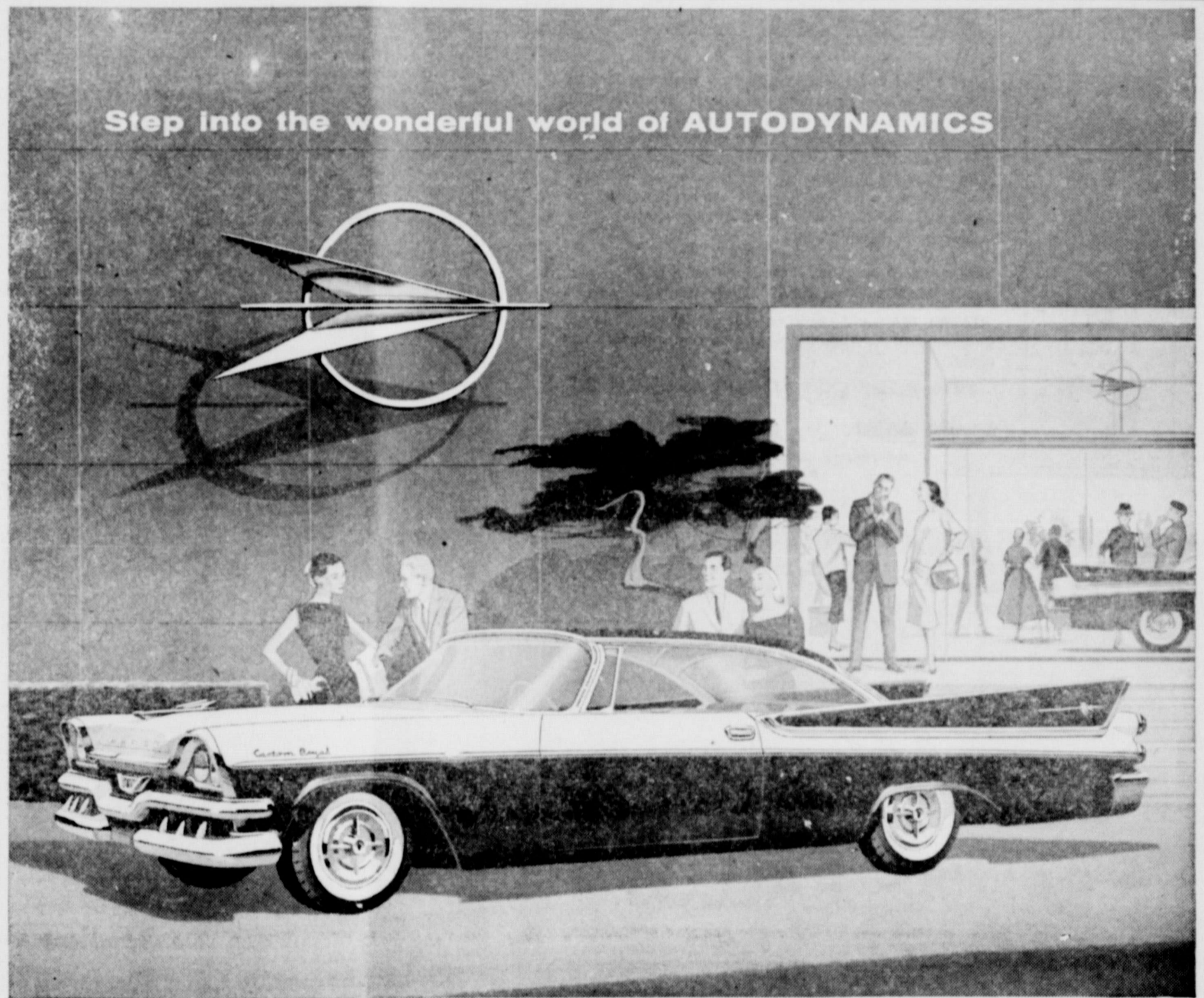

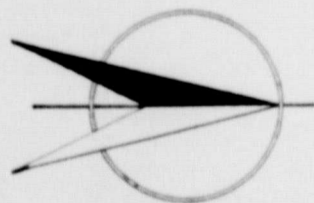

HERE IN HICO—

Money contributed by employees and matching money from the State in the Teacher Retirement Fund can now be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties and cities of this State, or in bonds issued by an agency of the United States Government when payment of principal and interest is guaranteed by the United States. Under

this proposed amendment investment could be made also in "other evidences of indebtedness" of the above governmental units or agencies and also in bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of school districts or any other municipal corporation or district of this State. Investment would be further authorized in such other investments as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent

University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State. Senate Bill 290, substantially rewriting law controlling the Teacher Retirement System, would become effective and operative immediately upon adoption of this proposed amendment. If the amendment is rejected, the present law will continue in effect. This bill sets a minimum retirement benefit of \$1200 per year for a teacher member who has com-

pleted twenty or more years of creditable service and retires after attaining sixty years of age. Teaching service includes professional or business administration, supervision and instruction. It would guarantee at least \$900 per year to a teacher who has completed more than ten years but less than twenty years of creditable service and retires after attaining sixty-five years of age. The above are the highlights of Amendment No. 4, and it is regrettable that space and time prohibits complete publication of all the proposed amendments. However a breakdown on the eight to be voted on Tuesday can be found in another story in this issue of the NR.

H. J. R. No. 9 This proposed amendment, if adopted, would provide that a judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person accused of a felony less than capital if he has been convicted of two previous felonies.

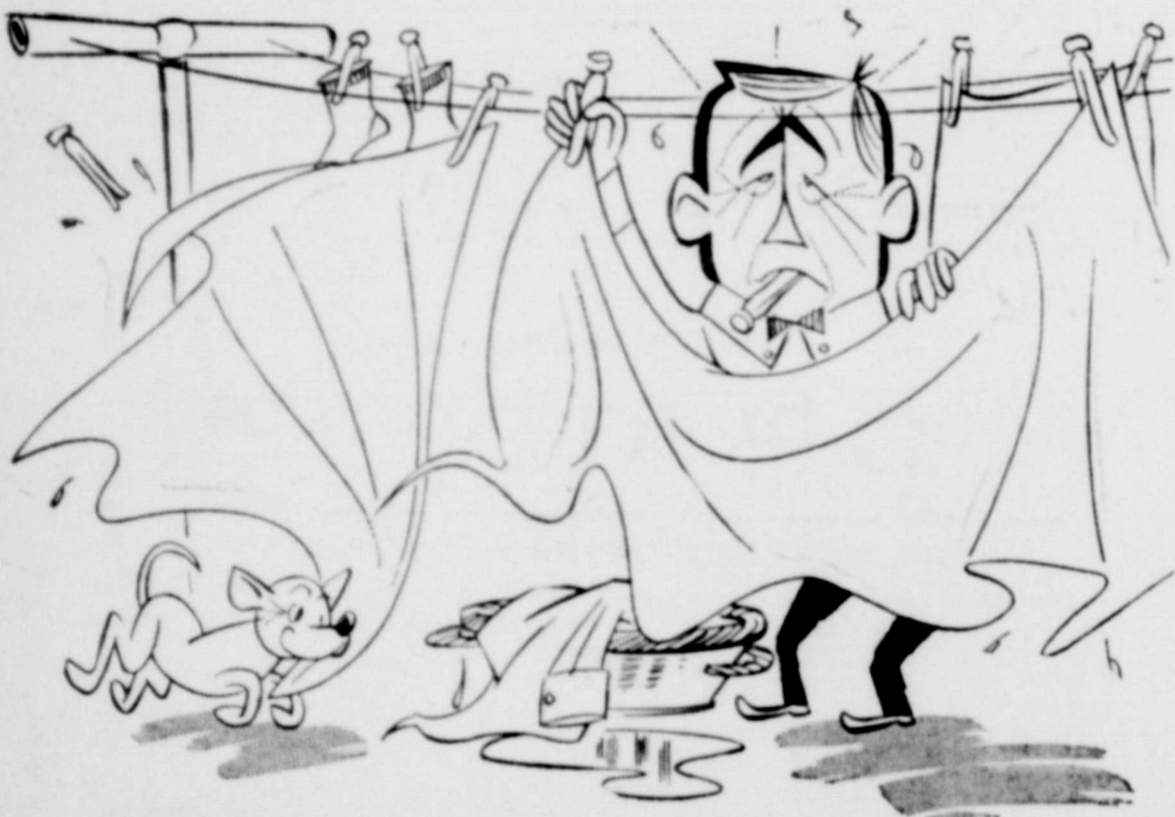
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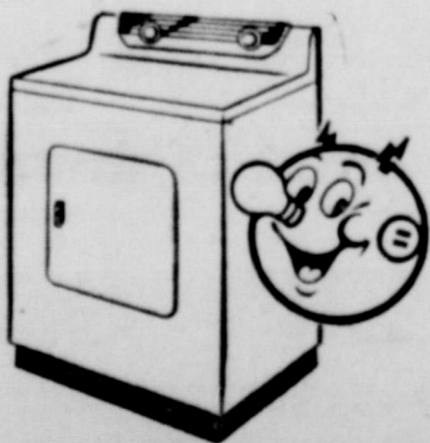
