Spicy Pumpkin Pie Is Holiday Treat



The family will really cheer when you serve this delicious-tast-The family will really cheer when you serve this delicious-tasting, spicy pumpkin pie that's easy-as-pie to prepare this new way. Start by rolling the pastry dough out on a square of the new, quilted aluminum foil that's available now in rolls 14 inches wide. Kaiser broiler foil is a stronger, heavier foil that's more resistant to tearing so it lends itself to more household tasks. You'll want a square about 14 inches in size. No need to flour the foil, just roll out so pastry round is roughly 1½ inches wider than the pie pan. Trim with dull table knife. Then simply lift the foil with the dough and center it in the pie pan with the foil next to the pan. Next, make a silvery stand-up collar to keep the edge from over-browning and to prevent boilovers

SPICY PUMPKIN PIE

Pastry for 9-inch pie 2 cups canned or mashed cooked pumpkin ½ tsp. salt

3/4 cup brown sugar 2 tbsps. white sugar 11/4 tsps. cinnamon 1/2 tsp. ginger 14 tsp. nutmeg

2 large eggs 1% cups milk 1/4 tsp. ground cloves Line pan with pastry rolled out on quilted foil. Flute edge of crust and trim off corners of foil to make upturned collar. Combine ingredients for filling and beat well. Pour filling mixture into foil and pastry lined pan. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 45 to 55 mins. or until done. Test by inserting silver knife into pie 2 inches from edge. When knife comes out clean, pie is done. Center will be soft but will set as pie cools. Serve warm or cool, topped with whipped cream.



Crockett has a numbering system and a record book through which he knows what and approximately how much is in each pond. The easternmost ponds are numbered E1 through E5, and the stock ponds are numbered S1 through S7. The old original ponds in the center are numbered plain one through six, starting at the north, and the westernmost ponds are numbered W1 through W5.

The minnow farm has basically two crops-tuffy minnows, known in other parts as blackheads or fatheads, and goldfish. Now they are introducing a third specie, Golden Shiner, which is becoming more popular than either of the two older and more established

The minnow farm, like any regular farm, runs pretty seasonal. At this time of year the operators have to look for something to keep busy. But in the spring spawning season they don't have hands to be in enoug

Once the minnows are grown and ready for market, where do they go? "Minnows with wiggles in their tails" go all over Texas Fishing camp operators buy them direct, and some men serve as jobto fishing concessionaires. Since the minnow farm business is one where you talk in terms of thousands and tens of thousands, 10,000 has been established as the breaking point between retail and wholesale; anything under 10,000 goes at retail price, or 35 cents per dozen, and anything over 10,-000 goes at about one cent each.

Minnows are graded for sale by size in small boxes with wire clats. But for "eyeball" grading Crockett uses two terms, crappie-size or bass-size. And if some fishermen has his sights set on the granddaddy of them all, Crockett can supply him with a big bass

Different species have different life expectancies. The tuffy minnow, for example, has a maximum life of about two years, but goldfish have been known to live 25

Incidentally, all goldfish are not gold. When young they have a bronze color, and the dull bronze gradually turns to red and gold. And occasionally the M. and N. Minnow Farm raises some bowl fish, freaks like the "pop-eyed"

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
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
