



# Thrilling Experience Marks Trail of 'Stagecoach to Fury'

Seven adventurers meet in the greatest challenge of their lives when they are held hostage by a gold-seeking, ruthless group of Mexican bandits in the production "Stagecoach to Fury," which plays at the Hico Theatre Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Forrest Tucker, as an ex-cavalry officer riding shotgun on a stagecoach, and Mari Blanchard, as a beautiful schemer who arranged her husband's death so she could abscond with his money, are starred in this western drama, with Wallace Ford, Rudolfo Hoyos, Paul Fix, Rico Alaniz, Wright King and Margia Dean.

All except Hoyos, who is the leader of the Mexican outlaws,

are passengers on the stagecoach when it is held up. The bandits seek a shipment of government gold but when they find it is not aboard the stage, they hold all passengers as hostages until it arrives on another coach. This dramatic situation gives the passengers time for reflection and a chance to re-examine their true selves. Wallace Ford portrays a cowardly judge; Wright King, a professional gunslinger; Rico Alaniz, a vicious killer; and Margia Dean, Tucker's fiancée. How these people cope with this suspenseful predicament after reviewing their past actions provides a fast-action surprise conclusion to the unusual plot of the film.

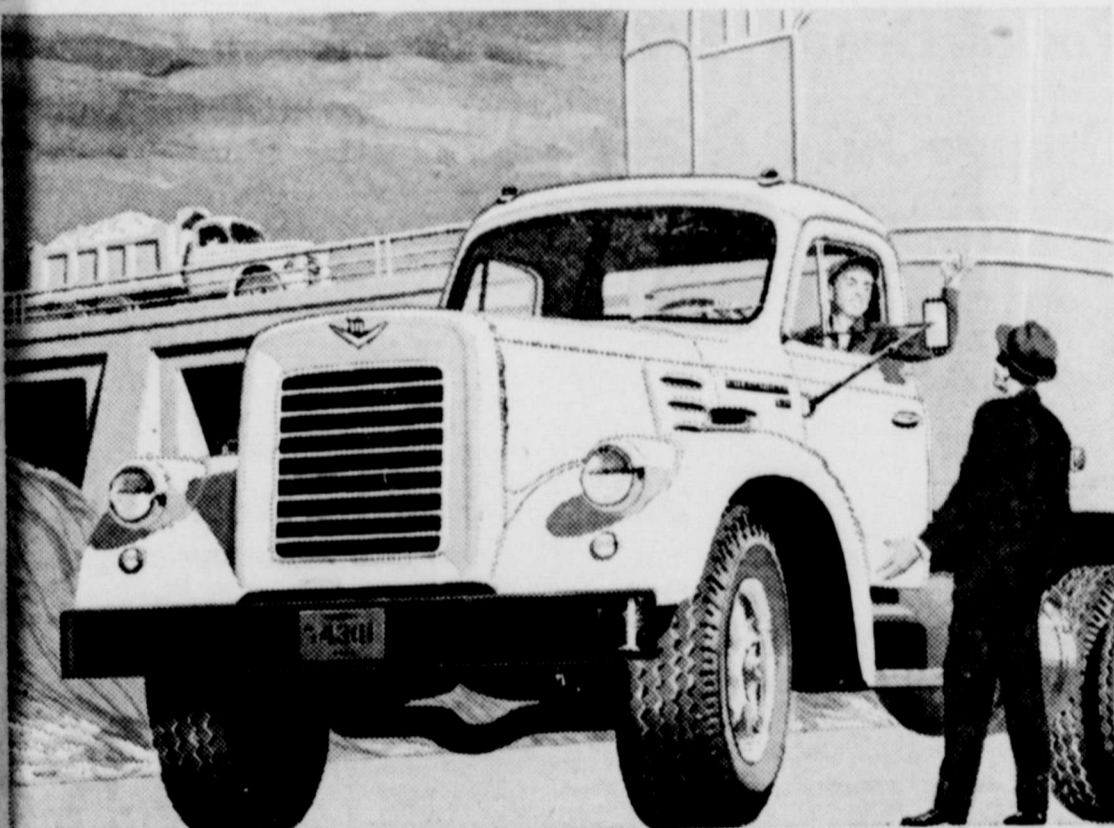

On the Home Range

TRY MACHINE STARCHING

Do you use your washing machine for starching? All of us are interested in saving time and energy and that is one good way to do it. This method works particularly well for large, bulky pieces or for a collection of smaller ones. The starch will be worked in evenly and the excess removed far better than by hand squeezing and wringing. Here are the directions for machine starching:

1. Wash and rinse as usual. In an automatic, complete the entire cycle. In a non-automatic, put the pieces through the wringer, then separate those you want to starch from the rest of the load.

2. Fill a top-opening machine about half full of warm water and add the starch. For a front-opening automatic, turn control to final deep rinse after pieces to be starched are in machine. Fill to desired level before adding to starch solution.

3. With a top-loading automatic, put the articles in the starch solution and set the dial to tumble or agitate for two or three minutes. Then set on spin. When the machine stops, the articles are ready for drying. In a non-automatic, turn on the machine and agitate the same time—two or three minutes. Put the starched pieces through the wringer.

The manufacturer's booklet usually gives detailed directions on starching in your particular machine. Also you will need to follow directions on the container for amount and method of preparing the starch. Some starches require boiling. Others call for an addition of boiling water, or a cold water starch can be used.

RUG PAD IS A GOOD INVESTMENT

A good rug pad is not "added" cost because it lengthens the life of either an inexpensive or an expensive carpet or rug. An inexpensive rug over a good pad will

give a luxurious feeling to your floor covering.

A rubber, latex pad is on the market now. This is usually more expensive than other types but is very easy to clean and care for. Simply wipe the surface of the pad with a damp, not wet, cloth and let it dry thoroughly before replacing it on the floor.

The more widely used fiber pad needs gentle handling and cleaning. Use the floor cleaning tool, not the rug cleaning attachment, for this pad. Be sure it is flat on the floor and take long, slow strokes for thorough cleaning.

EGGS ARE A GOOD B-Y

There will be eggs and more eggs in February. So give the family a treat and cook these good egg dishes that you have been putting off cooking—like sponge cakes, meringue pies and souffles. Try this quickie lunch dish: Mix 8 slightly beaten eggs with 1 can of cream of celery soup undiluted. Melt 2 tablespoons of butter in a saucepan and put in the mixture. Cook over low heat. Stir occasionally with a fork until set but moist. Season with one-fourth teaspoon pepper. Serve with crisp bacon.

Eggs contain high quality protein and valuable minerals and vitamins needed every day for good health. Make the most of eggs while they are plentiful.

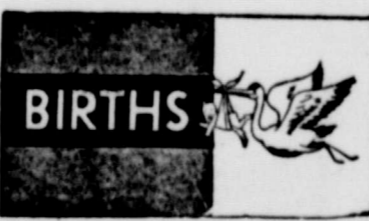

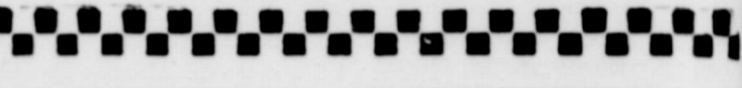

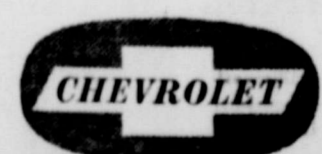

FILLING UNDERGROUND LAKES

A large group of Southwest Texans are really taking the drought to heart—and trying to do something to ease its harmful effects.

Their pet project, called the Edwards Underground Water District, is aimed at filling much depleted great natural underground reservoirs which lie southwest and in the vicinity of San Antonio.

These reservoirs, in normal times fed by the flow of the Nueces, Frio, Sabinal and other streams from the Edwards Plateau over the line of the Balcones Fault, have been falling steadily in recent years from over-use and lack of replacement water.

The new water district has devised a plan which they hope will refill these lakes through partial containment of flood waters which build up easily with even spotted rains on the upper plateau.

Capacity of the reservoirs is not known, although it is much greater than that of man-made surface reserves. If the Edwards Underground Water District plan is successful, it is certain to benefit water conservation efforts everywhere.

Success depends largely on the current session of the Texas Legislature whose responsibility it is to provide legal and financial means for keeping this worthwhile project in operation.

SEED CATALOG

No flower is so pretty as in the

seed catalog. Yet the catalog is an institution and rightly so.

Therein we can dream of borders and hedges and posies that would hardly grow in a hothouse in our climate, let alone in the yard. And even those sluggards who never even turn a clod in a flower bed probably sneak off in secrecy with the seed catalog to walk about in their very own Kodachrome garden.

Traditional as the order-book is, though, it has started to take on a new look by a sort of fashion nomenclature. Take zinnias, for instance. They're not just zinnias anymore, or "old maids" as some people call them. Late reports are that the hottest numbers this season are "Ortho Polka", "Peppermint Stick", "Cherry Sundae" and—a real newcomer—"Crackerjack."

And they're all zinnias. It would be much better if they dispensed with the naming and gave out with some of their planting secrets. They must have some secrets, because nobody can grow anything as pretty as it looks in the seed catalog.
