## Basketball Teams Complete Season With Good Records

Hico High School basketball teams have recently completed a very successful season. The boys' team won the District Championship by defeating Kopperl 62-42 and a play-off for the title. They lost their bi-district tilt to Mills by a 66-47 score. The girls' team was placed on the county team, and also made an all-state team as recently announced by the Waco News-Tribune.

The boys' team had an 18-6 record for the season with two of those coming by one point. Seniors on the team were Kirk, Budague, Charles Stipe, Andy Roy Lindsey, and Jerry Kirk. Other members of the team were Robert Chandler, Don Gary Duncan, Winford and LaVon Pierce. The team was coached by Ray who did a fine job in leading the team to a very successful season.

Hico girls had a very respectable 15-9 won-lost record for the season and finished second to Iredell in district competition. The Hico girls took the tourney sportsmanship award for the second year in a row, as Bonnie Johnson Dowdy won the award held by Jean Clark last year. Regina Ellis and Jerre Dunklin made the all-tourney team. This was the second time for Jerre to win that honor. Jerre averaged 21 points per game for the second season in a row to become the first Hico girl to average more than 20 points for more than one season. Phyllis Jones holds the high scoring record of 689 for a single season, and averaged 23 points per game, set in 1954-55.

## Local F.F.A. Chapter Members Win Top Awards At Annual Houston Stock Show

Members of Hico's FFA Chapter entered the Houston Fat Stock Show last week literally away with almost every trophy offered in every event they entered.

Chapter Advisor Harold Walker, the boys who were in Houston, returned to Hico Sunday night loaded down with valuable awards.

Among their awards were two heifer calves, certificates for each with which to purchase two more calves, a trophy, banner, hand-made boots, ribbons, approximately \$300 in prize money, and untold amounts of

publicity for the Chapter and the town of Hico. Even the Advisor, Mr. Walker, got in on the act by being awarded a blue ribbon and \$25 in money for being supervisor of the champion scramble calf.

John Ryan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Ryan, was the foremost winner of the group. John had returned the calf which he had won last year at the Houston Show, to enter in the special competition. The Hereford heifer was purchased last April from W. E. Rogers of Iredell, and had had the necessary grooming to be crowned Champion Scramble heifer. The calf was also first place winner in the Summer

Heifer Calf Junior Breeding Show.

John was presented a registered Hereford heifer by the South Texas Hereford Breeders Association for his efforts. This was the same honors won by another Hico FFA member, Buddy Teague, at last year's show. Teague received a \$2,000 scholarship last year. The heifer which Ryan won is valued at several hundred dollars. An unusual aspect of these two awards is the fact that the boys live directly across the road from each other, each had entered the calf scramble event, and each won the top award for two consecutive years.

Geoffrey Holladay entered two young Holstein dairy cows in the Junior Dairy Show, and each cow took a red ribbon. The red ribbons have a classification of Good Plus. Geoffrey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Holladay. His money winnings totaled \$44. Due to illness Geoffrey was unable to accompany the group to Houston to show his animals, so other members of the chapter carried them for him.

Mike Lackey was one of ten boys from over the state who were awarded a Charbray Heifer, valued at \$1,000, in special competition. Mike had written a theme on why he would like to own a Charbray, and was selected for an interview at the show along with 14 other boys. His entry in the show, a Hereford Heifer, placed 13th in its division. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Lackey.

The Livestock Judging Team, composed of John Ryan, Wayne Warren and Gail Christian, won first place in the beef cattle judging contest scoring 563 points out of a possible 600. They received a large banner to go in the chapter hall.

The Hereford Judging Team, made up of the same group of boys, also won first place in that division, and received the Texas Hereford Breeders Association Trophy. They had 291 out of a possible 300 points. The award is a rotating trophy, and this is the second consecutive year that the local chapter has won the award. It becomes permanent possession if the chapter wins it again next year. Two hundred teams were entered in the competition this year, which makes the feat even a greater honor.

Results of the dairy judging team were not final. Members of this team are Aron Naul, Eldon Lindsey and Jimmy Drake.

The grass judging team was awarded \$10 for their entry. Members of this team were Mike and Pat Lackey, and Roland Sherrard.

Other than the awards mentioned above, two chapter members, Gail Christian and Royce Samford caught calves in the calf scramble last Sunday night, and each received a certificate for \$125 with which to purchase a calf to feed for next year's show.

The Chapter and their Advisor are to be congratulated for their fine showing at Houston.

## 'Julie' Is Dramatic Feature Next Week at Hico Theatre

Doris Day plays the most tautly dramatic role of her career in "Julie," which plays Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at the Hico Theatre, with a big cast co-starring Louis Jourdan, Barry Sullivan and Frank Lovejoy.

The picture is a spine-tingling shocker, telling the story of a woman fleeing from the insanely jealous husband who has threatened to murder her.

In the role of the tormented wife, Miss Day has an even more taxing part than those of her two previous dramatic hits, "The Man Who Knew Too Much" and "Love Me or Leave Me," which first catapulted the celebrated star into a new career as a dramatic actress.

Filming of this sequence required the use of camera crews working from a speeding car, two helicopters and a speed launch, in addition to a special tower from the top of which the camera was able to follow the two cars racing around a winding horseshoe turn.

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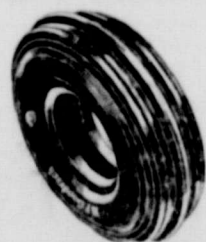

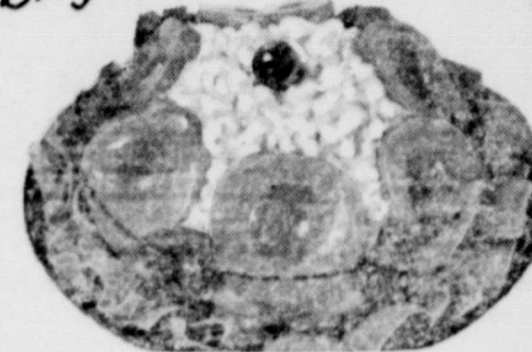

### ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING PORTIONS OF A FIRE PREVENTION CODE PRESCRIBING REGULATIONS GOVERNING CONDITIONS HAZARDOUS TO LIFE AND PROPERTY FROM FIRE OR EXPLOSION, AND ESTABLISHING THE OFFICE OF FIRE MARSHALL AND DEFINING THE DUTIES AND POWERS OF SAID OFFICE.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hico.

Section 1. Adoption of Fire Prevention Code.

There is hereby adopted by the City Council of the City of Hico for the purpose of prescribing regulations governing conditions hazardous to life and property from fire or explosion the following sections of that certain code known as the Fire Prevention Code recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, being particularly the 1953 edition thereof, which said code in its entirety with the portions thereof applicable hereto have been and is now filed in the office of the secretary of the City of Hico, and the same is hereby adopted and incorporated as fully as if set out at length herein, and from the date on which

this ordinance shall take effect, the provisions thereof shall be controlling within the limits of the City of Hico. The portions of said code hereby adopted are as follows:

Article No. III, regarding automobile wrecking yards, junk yards, and waste material handling plants.

Article No. VIII, regarding dry cleaning and dry dyeing plants.

Article No. XI, regarding explosives and ammunition.

Article No. XII, regarding fireworks.

Article No. XIII, regarding fire protection equipment.

Article No. XV, regarding flammable liquids.

Article No. XVIII, regarding gas piping and appliances.

Article No. XXI, regarding lumber yards and woodworking plants.

Article No. XXV, regarding places of assembly.

Article No. XXVI, regarding general precautions against fire.

Section 2. Establishment and Duties of Fire Marshall.

(a) The sections of the Fire Prevention Code shall be enforced by the Fire Marshall of the City of Hico which is hereby established and which shall operate under the supervision of the City Council of the City of Hico.

(b) A Fire Marshall of the City of Hico shall be appointed by the City Council of the City of Hico. His appointment shall continue during good behavior and satisfactory service.

(c) The Fire Marshall of the City of Hico, after first obtaining permission from the City Council, shall appoint such inspectors as may be necessary.

Section 3. Definitions.

Whenever the word "Municipality" is used in the Fire Prevention Code above referred to, it shall be held to mean the City of Hico.

Wherever the words "Chief of the Bureau of Fire Prevention" are used in the Fire Prevention Code they shall be held to mean the Fire Marshall.

Section 4. Establishment of Limits of Districts in which Storage of Flammable Liquids in Outside Aboveground Tanks is to be Prohibited.

(a) The limits referred to in section 15.201 of the Fire Prevention Code in which storage of flammable liquids in outside aboveground tanks is prohibited, are hereby established as follows:

The Commercial district located as follows: Bounded by Walnut and Cedar Streets on the East and West and by the Katy Railroad and Third

## SCHOOL CENSUS SHOWS LOSS IN HAMILTON COUNTY

Hamilton County lost 25 children of school age during the past year, according to first reports in the annual school census.

The census is complete except for two districts, Hamilton and Fairy. There may be revisions in the figures for those two, County Supt. W. B. McPherson stated.

In the 1956 census 1,550 youngsters of school age were reported. Only 1,525 were counted this year.

(b) The limits referred to in section 15.401 of the Fire Prevention Code, in which new bulk plants for flammable liquids are prohibited, are hereby established as follows:

New bulk plants for flammable liquids are prohibited in the City Limits of Hico, Texas, with the exception of the following location:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Block 26 Division 1 following Elm Street to the Bosque River, then East to the City Limit line, then North to the Railroad and then West to the beginning point of Block 26.

Section 5. Modifications.

The Fire Marshall shall have the power to modify any provisions of the Code upon application in writing by the owner or lessee, or his duly authorized agent, when there are practical difficulties in the way of carrying out the strict letter of the code, provided that the spirit of the code shall be observed, public safety secured, and substantial justice done. The particulars of such modification when granted or allowed and the decision of the Fire Marshall thereon shall be entered upon the records of the City of Hico and a signed copy shall be furnished to the applicant.

Section 6. Appeals.

Whenever the Fire Marshall shall disapprove an application or refuse to grant a license or permit applied for, or when it is claimed that the provisions of the code do not apply or that the true intent and meaning of the code have been misconstrued or wrongly interpreted, the applicant may appeal from the decision of the Fire Marshall to the City Council within 30 days from the date of such appeal.

Section 7. Penalties.

(a) Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the code hereby adopted or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate or permit issued thereunder, and from which no appeal has been taken, or who shall fail to comply with such an order as affirmed or modified by the City Council or by a court of competent jurisdiction, within the time fixed herein, shall severally for each and every such violation and noncompliance respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00. The imposition of one penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

(b) The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

Section 8. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances.

All former ordinances or parts thereof conflicting with or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance or of the code herein adopted are hereby repealed.

Section 9. Validity.

The City Council of the City of Hico hereby declares that should any section, paragraph, sentence, or word of this ordinance or of the part of the code hereby adopted be declared for any reason to be invalid, it is the intent of the City Council of the City of Hico that it would have passed all other portions of this ordinance independent of the elimination herefrom of any such portion as may be declared invalid.

Section 10. Date of Effect.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval as required by law.

### STEPS TO BETTER FAMILY HEALTH

Every family can take steps to insure better physical and mental health in the coming years. It will mean financial savings as well as happier living.

There are seven important factors to check: 1. Good nutrition; 2. Sanitation; 3. Regular health examinations; 4. Immunization; 5. Exercise, rest and recreation; 6. An adequate home health center; 7. and a means of achieving the state of radiant health which is the result of complete physical, social and mental well being.

An accepted guide for good nutrition is the Texas Food Standard. Family attitudes toward food and pleasant meal-time atmosphere are as important as kind and amount of food eaten.

Sanitation includes a healthful water supply, safe sewage and garbage disposal, cleanliness around the barn and home, as well as clean milk free from bacteria.

Regular health examinations for mother and father as well as the children are one of the most important steps in improving family health.

The family physician can advise about immunization against contagious and infectious diseases.

Exercise, rest and recreation is a fifth step. The important thing, is to build toward a family attitude which considers rest and recreation as essential to good health and not a waste of time or evidence of laziness.

The sixth step is the maintenance of an adequate home health center. Every family should have supplies, equipment and medicine for the minor illnesses and emergencies that must be cared for at home.

Many physical and mental ailments are rooted in worry, fear and concern. The seventh step toward achieving a state of radiant health involved "talking out" problems as a family to give assurance and a sense of security to each family member.

### HOME DRY CLEANING IS DANGEROUS

Send garments that must be dry-cleaned to a commercial firm. But if you find it necessary to spot-clean at home, remember to use the right materials and follow directions carefully.

Carbon tetrachloride, a dry-cleaning solution that is commonly used around the home, is non-flammable. However, it is dangerous to use this solution in a closed room.

Short periods of exposure to high concentrations of carbon tetrachloride vapor may cause acute poisoning, anesthesia, or death. It is possible to use this fluid with no ill effects but extreme care is necessary.

Just remember the first rule in using poisonous materials: READ THE LABEL BEFORE USING! In spot-cleaning a garment, open windows and keep your face away from the work area. Never use the cleaning fluid from open pails or cans.

### HELPFUL HINT

To remove the shine from garbards, serge or other hard-surface woollens, try this. Go over the shiny places with a damp sponge or cloth, then stroke the dampened fabric gently with extra fine steel wool.

search for the gospel. He looks at the imperfect people who seek to follow Christ rather than looking to Christ. No wise Christian, either preacher or laymen, says, "I am the way." Only Jesus Christ could say that. The message of the minister of the gospel is the same as the message of the preacher Paul who said, "we preach not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, with ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake." The power of the gospel to meet every need in your life is available if you look to Christ and trust Him.

We do not lose heart because God declares to us there are things even more valuable to us than material prosperity, physical health, and success. In the long run the most important things are those things that are not readily seen by the casual observer. Thinking of this Paul writes, "So we do not lose heart. Though our outer nature is being renewed every day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, because we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen; for the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal." (II Cor. 4:16-18).

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Rains have given the county a pretty good underground season, in fact about the best we have had in many years. Conditions look very favorable for spring planting. Too, they look good for early season growth.

With growing conditions it is generally the practice to take good care of growing crops by insect control to try to make the maximum production from them. With good moisture and good growing conditions we have good insect growing conditions. Now, I would again like to caution all who are planning to do any insect control work on their places. The new insecticides we have been using for a number of years are fairly safe to use if they are used according to the manufacturers' recommendations, and if the precautions recommended are followed. There are new materials coming into use each season and I urge everyone to read the labels on the containers and follow the recommendations.

With some insects we are having to use some of the phosphorous compounds such as parathion, methyl parathion, TEPP, demeton, diazinon, Phosdrin, Thimet and Guthion. All these insecticides are very poisonous and must be handled with care at all times. These insecticides are much poisonous to warm-blooded animals than most other chemicals used for insect control and the manufacturers' directions must be strictly followed at all times. Repeated exposure to these may cause trouble.

In handling any insecticide the concentrate form is the more dangerous. If any of it is allowed to spill on the skin, time out should be taken immediately and all the material washed off with soap and water. If any of it is spilled on the clothing, go change clothes immediately. Be careful about rubbing the eyes when some of the concentrate is on the hands. Some of the symptoms of phosphorous insecticide poisoning are: headache, pinpoint pupils, blurred vision, weakness, nausea, abdominal

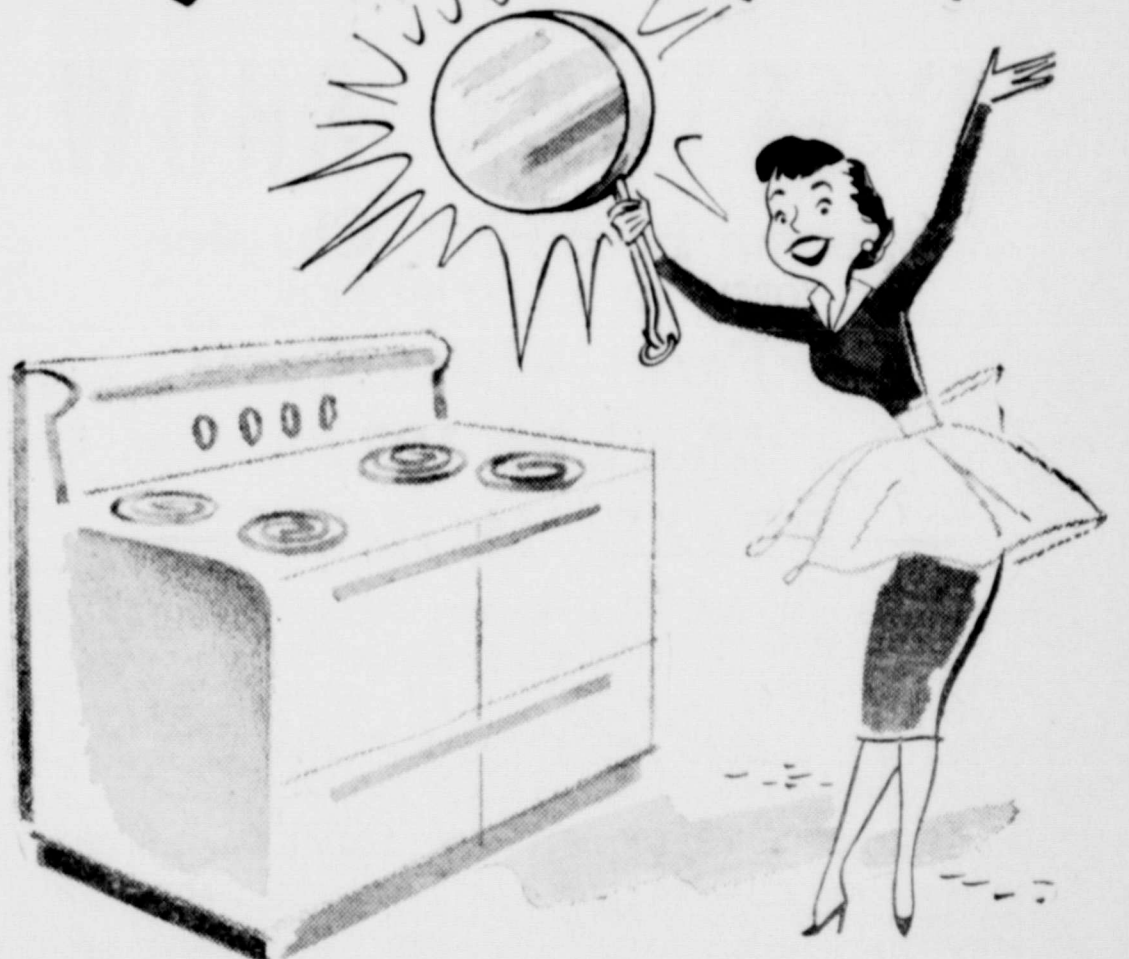

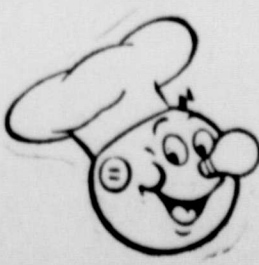
