## Two Important Elections Face Local Voters Next Tuesday

Two important elections face local voters Tuesday, April 2, and a large vote is expected to be cast at the Hico polling place.

Most local voters are primarily interested in the city council race and the fact that both the council election and United States Senate election will be held the same day, prospects for a large turnout at the polls are good.

Four candidates are listed on the official city ballot, seeking two posts. D. E. Bulloch is the only candidate seeking re-election. The other incumbent, Weldon Pierce, filed his name with the city secretary for a place on the ballot, but later withdrew, giving pressing business obligations as his reason.

Other names which will appear on the ballot are W. H. Greenslit, Paul W. Hamilton, and Wayne Rutledge. Greenslit served as mayor for four years, while Rutledge and Hamilton are seeking their first council positions. Rutledge recently resigned from the Hico School Board.

Mayor T. A. Randalls and hold-over council members Jim Jameson, G. M. Bullard, and W. C. Howard have another year to serve on their first two-year term of office.

**Senate Race Interesting.**  
In the anything-goes Senate race,

22 candidates will be listed on the ballot. Foremost of these are

thrice-defeated governor candidate Ralph Yarborough, Congressman Martin Dies, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, and the Republican candidate, Thad Hutcheson. Others prominently mentioned in the race are Searcy Bracewell, former state senator of Houston, and James P. Hart, former Supreme Court Justice from Austin.

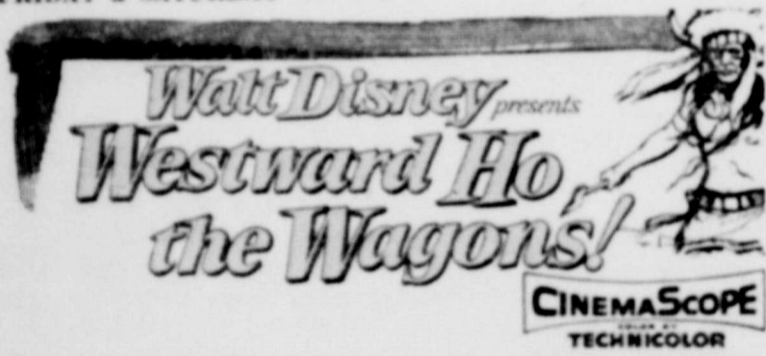

## FLOWER BOXES ARE GAINING INTEREST

For a thousand years flowers have been grown in boxes and displayed at windows, outside terraces, patios, and balconies. There is unlimited plant materials, so come along with us, having fun and using your imagination.

Growing plants do not require too much skill. It's said with authority, the best all-around box dimensions are 3 or 4 feet long, 8 in. deep, and 8 or 10 inches wide. For best results lumber should be three-quarter inch thick, as thin boards might in time warp. It is good to paint inside and out with any quick drying paint. Using a wood preservation might kill plants.

Have a row of one-half inch holes in the bottom of the box, then place in coarse gravel, broken flower pots, or charcoal for drainage. A mixture of sand and loose rich soil of garden loam, a small quantity of sheep manure, and peat moss is a good soil for plants, which should be set about 6 inches apart. Try to let one color of foliage and flowers predominate.

Give your yards new beauty and you will have lasting satisfaction.

## On the Home Range

### GIVE YOUR CHILD A NICKEL— BUT TEACH HIM ITS VALUE

When you give your child a nickel, you can give him something of enduring value at no extra cost. You wouldn't give him a bicycle without showing him how to ride it, but do you give him money without teaching him its value?

The lessons you teach your child in money management will be something he can use throughout life. As an adult he must compete with those whose training in money matters started early. To be successful, he must learn how to earn, spend, and save money. As soon as a child is old enough to ask for a nickel for ice cream, he is old enough to learn a little about its value—what a nickel will buy and what it takes to earn a nickel. Show him how two nickels saved will buy more.

As soon as the children are old enough, let them help plan with the family how to get the things the family wants.

If you don't teach him money management, he may spend half his life learning by hard knocks and financial setbacks. Would you like a copy of the bulletin—"Money—Family Style"?

### CHARGE IT, PLEASE

Consumer credit is one way to mortgage tomorrow's income for today. That seems rather unwise when the product may be worn out before it is paid for. It may be smart at times to purchase a commodity and pay for it as you use it. That is especially true when a fine, durable product is almost as "good as new" after the last payment has been made.

About half the families in this country use installment credit. About 8 of 100 put as much as 20 per cent of their income into installment payments. Farm families are least likely to use this type of credit while 60 per cent of the skilled workers use it. Approximately half of the families whose incomes are from \$4,000 to \$7,000 use credit to buy, and about one-third of those with incomes beyond \$10,000 per year use it.

Credit used wisely can help families in management problems, but if used carelessly can cause real grief and even discord in families. Many people do not bother to find the cost of credit. A thoughtful buyer should be sure that he knows the dollar cost of credit and the condition of payment. A more careful buyer will know even the interest rate being charged. He will explore the resources for credit and know when he buys that all conditions are favorable and agreeable with all parties involved.

### GOOD RECORDS CAN SAVE DOLLARS AT TAX TIME

It is usually the small-expense items, especially those paid for in cash, which are overlooked at income tax reporting time. Most people could save additional tax dollars by learning which of these items are tax deductible and by keeping accurate records of all expenses and receipts regardless of their size. Most people have little trouble keeping records of major transactions for most are paid by check and the cancelled check then becomes a part of the record. Don't overlook the small items, for they can amount to a lot of money over a period of a year. They may include such items as interest payments, membership dues in farm organizations, subscriptions to farm magazines or small fees for services required in connection with farm business, overnight business trips and losses on house-

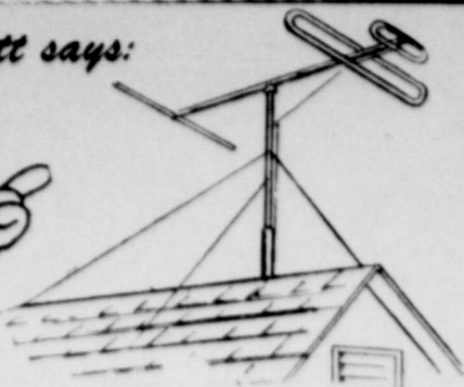
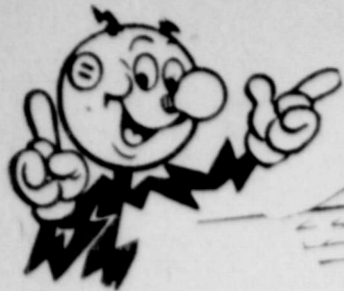

#### ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING PORTIONS OF A FIRE PREVENTION CODE PRESCRIBING REGULATIONS GOVERNING CONDITIONS HAZARDOUS TO LIFE AND PROPERTY FROM FIRE OR EXPLOSION, AND ESTABLISHING THE OFFICE OF FIRE MARSHALL AND DEFINING THE DUTIES AND POWERS OF SAID OFFICE.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hico.

Section 1. Adoption of Fire Prevention Code.

There is hereby adopted by the City Council of the City of Hico for the purpose of prescribing regulations governing conditions hazardous to life and property from fire or explosion the following sections of that certain code known as the Fire Prevention Code recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, being particularly the 1953 edition thereof, which said code in its entirety with the portions thereof applicable hereto have been and is now filed in the office of the secretary of the City of Hico, and the same is hereby adopted and incorporated as fully as if set out at length herein, and from the date on which this ordinance shall take effect, the provisions thereof shall be controlling within the limits of the City of Hico. The portions of said code hereby adopted are as follows:

Article No. III, regarding automobile wrecking yards, junk yards, and waste material handling plants.

Article No. VIII, regarding dry cleaning and dry dyeing plants.

Article No. XI, regarding explosives and ammunition.

Article No. XII, regarding fireworks.

Article No. XIII, regarding fire protection equipment.

Article No. XV, regarding flammable liquids.

Article No. XVIII, regarding gas piping and appliances.

Article No. XXI, regarding lumber yards and woodworking plants.

Article No. XXV, regarding places of assembly.

Article No. XXVI, regarding general precautions against fire.

Section 2. Establishment and Duties of Fire Marshall.

(a) The sections of the Fire Prevention Code shall be enforced by the Fire Marshall of the City of Hico which is hereby established and which shall operate under the supervision of the City Council of the City of Hico.

(b) A Fire Marshall of the City of Hico shall be appointed by the City Council of the City of Hico. His appointment shall continue during good behavior and satisfactory service.

(c) The Fire Marshall of the City of Hico, after first obtaining permission from the City Council, shall appoint such inspectors as may be necessary.

Section 3. Definitions.

Whenever the word "Municipality" is used in the Fire Prevention Code above referred to, it shall be held to mean the City of Hico. Wherever the words "Chief of the Bureau of Fire Prevention" are used in the Fire Prevention Code they shall be held to mean the Fire Marshall.

Section 4. Establishment of Limits of Districts in which Storage of Flammable Liquids in Outside Aboveground Tanks is to be Prohibited.

(a) The limits referred to in section 15.201 of the Fire Prevention Code in which storage of flammable liquids in outside aboveground tanks is prohibited, are hereby established as follows: The Commercial district located as follows:

Bounded by Walnut and Cedar Streets on the East and West and by the Katy Railroad and Third Street on the North and South.

(b) The limits referred to in section 15.401 of the Fire Prevention Code, in which new bulk plants for flammable liquids are prohibited, are hereby established as follows:

New bulk plants for flammable liquids are prohibited in the City Limits of Hico, Texas, with the exception of the following location:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Block 26 Division 1 following Elm Street to the Bosque River, then East to the City Limit line, then North to the Railroad and then West to the beginning point of Block 26.

Section 5. Modifications.

The Fire Marshall shall have the power to modify any provisions of the Code upon application in writing by the owner or lessee, or his duly authorized agent, when there are practical difficulties in the way of carrying out the strict letter of the code, provided that the spirit of the code shall be observed, public safety secured, and substantial justice done. The particulars of such modification when granted or allowed and the decision of the Fire Marshall thereon shall be entered upon the records of the City of Hico and a signed

copy shall be furnished to the applicant.

Section 6. Appeals.

Whenever the Fire Marshall shall disapprove an application or refuse to grant a license or permit applied for, or when it is claimed that the provisions of the code do not apply or that the true intent and meaning of the code have been misconstrued or wrongly interpreted, the applicant may appeal from the decision of the Fire Marshall to the City Council within 30 days from the date of such appeal.

Section 7. Penalties.

(a) Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the code hereby adopted or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate or permit issued thereunder, and from which no appeal has been taken, or who shall fail to comply with such an order as affirmed or modified by the City Council or by a court of competent jurisdiction, within the time fixed herein, shall severally for each and every such violation and noncompliance respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00. The imposition of one penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

(b) The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

Section 8. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances.

All former ordinances or parts thereof conflicting with or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance or of the code hereby adopted are hereby repealed.

Section 9. Validity.

The City Council of the City of Hico hereby declares that should any section, paragraph, sentence, or word of this ordinance or of the part of the code hereby adopted be declared for any reason to be invalid, it is the intent of the City Council of the City of Hico that it would have passed all other portions of this ordinance independent of the elimination herefrom of any such portion as may be declared invalid.

Section 10. Date of Effect.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval as required by law.

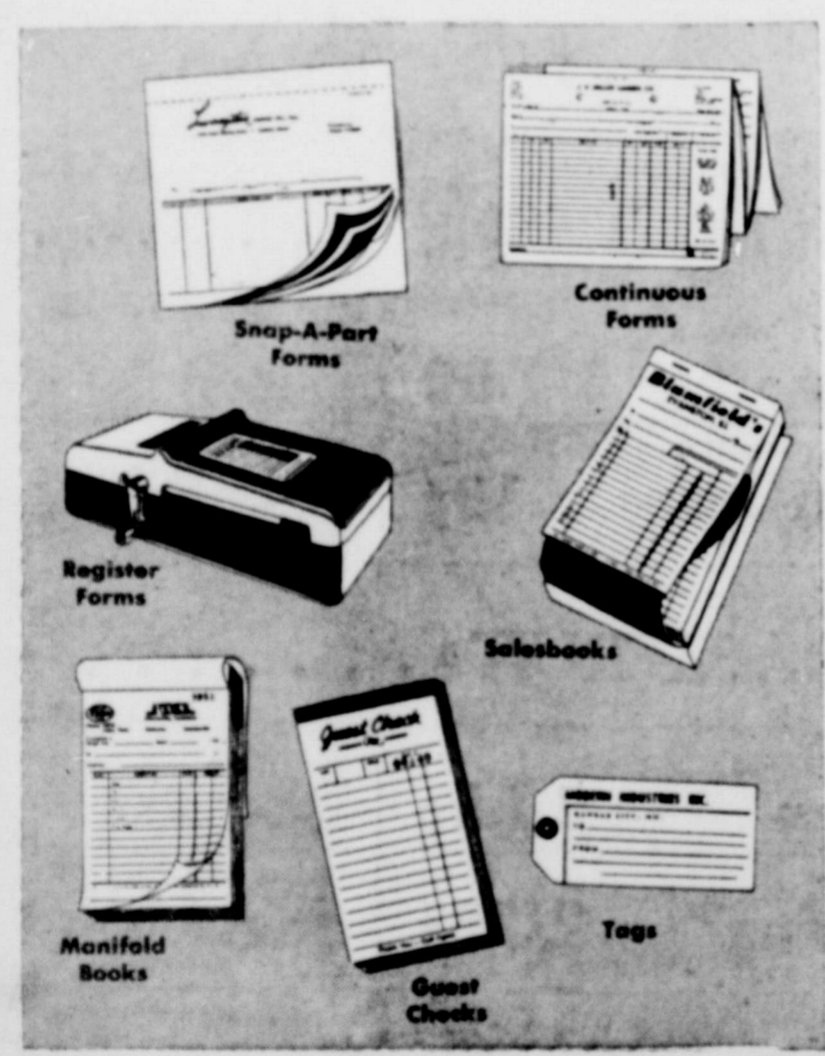

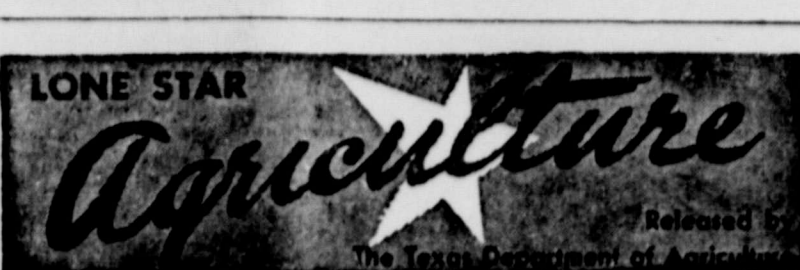

## It Happened Here or Near

It was August in the early nineteen twenties, and unusually rainy for that month. The pastor at Bush Flat had asked me weeks before to help him in his summer revival. At the appointed time I showed up and we started. The community was not a large one, but about a hundred people attended the evening services. If the rains did not come too heavy and at the wrong hour I felt something of tension in the first service and it was not long until the pastor told me what it was all about.

Bick Leeson was a pretty wild young fellow, but he liked to attend the church services not for any spiritual reasons but because there he saw the girls and the other boys. It was a social desire on his part that moved him to attend any church at any time. He liked to talk, and he did not cease talk just because he got into a church. He talked during the services and once in awhile would burst out in a loud laugh at something a boy or girl whispered to him. It was really annoying to the pastor and he determined to put a stop to it.

He tried publicly rebuking the boy for his misbehavior. The boy grinned and kept right on. The pastor grew more bitter in his rebukes, but it did not improve matters any. He resolved to resort to severe methods, seeing that his of native ability. He never learned the matter over with certain of his brethren and some of them went to the sheriff of the county and persuaded that worthy to appoint the pastor as a deputy sheriff. Whereupon the pastor proceeded to arrest the boy and drag

him to the county seat. The boy's family though, it a rather clever thing the boy was doing, and bail was furnished the young sprout. He took it in stride and after the service I went straight back to him and got acquainted with him and slapped him on the back and joked a bit with him. He never missed a service from that time to the closing service of the meeting and when the pastor took a collection for me the boy made a contribution. After after that I saw him on the streets of the town where I lived and he was always friendly and wanted to talk with me.

All this has been told to make some observations. After more than half a century of close relationships with preachers I suspect I know them pretty well. This young pastor at Bush Flat was a

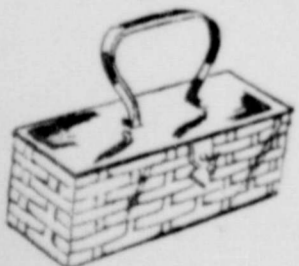

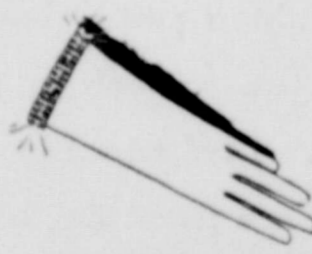
