## Soaking Rains Drench Area, Over Five Inches Recorded

Soaking rains of more than five inches have fallen in the Hico area since last Thursday, with the largest amount in any one day being 2.43 inches, which fell after midnight last Thursday night. Some rain has been recorded each day since then, bringing the total rainfall, officially, to more than thirteen inches for the year.

Local weather observer W. R. Hampton stated this week that normal for this time of year was approximately 10 inches.

Where other places throughout the state have experienced flood conditions the past week, Hico's rains have fallen in such a way that the highest, the Bosque River

has risen was about half bank full. Most of the rain has soaked into the ground with little run-off.

Stock tanks are full and running around the dams for the first time in possibly two years, and small streams and branches are running good. The heavy growth of weeds and grass which has covered the county this spring has prevented the water from running off and causing flood conditions which the town has experienced the past several years.

The general outlook for crop prospects is one of the brightest in several years.

## Pecan Field Trip Held at Hooks On Ramage Farm

Seventy-five pecan growers of the Four States Area attended the morning session of the pecan school at the Miller County courthouse recently.

Sixty persons went on the afternoon field trip to the Ramage Farm near Hooks.

Experts in various phases of the pecan industry discussed the outlook for the industry, soil management, new techniques in budding and grafting, spraying programs, and how to cut costs with harvesting equipment.

The farm is operated by Jewel Ramage, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Ramage. Jewel formerly lived here and was co-operator of their farm at Black Stump Valley with his brother, Jimmie Ramage.

# Names--And Their Origin

What does your surname mean? Did you ever wonder about it, and try to find out just how it originated and what it means? If you have not done either, you are a rather unusual person. Most of us have wondered a lot about these questions.

Our soldier boy sent a book home the other day on the origin and meanings of surnames and given names, and that is about all that I have read for a week. It is that interesting. Do you know how that term "Surname" came to be and what it means? Once there were no surnames, but in Ireland, which came under British domination about A. D. 1000, the British government ordained that every person should have a surname that would identify him with the tribe, or clan, to which he belonged, so every individual could be accounted for. So first a given, or Christian name, would be written and then the surname, or tribal name, would be written over the given name. And that top name was called the "super nomine," from which surname is derived. "Super nomine" is Latin and means "above the name."

Later England passed a law that every Englishman, Scot and Welshman should also have a surname, and that's when the fun began. A man could adopt as his surname a color, or a month of the year, or an animal, or something characteristic of his body or of the neighborhood where he lived, or the heavenly bodies, or take an official name, such as king or prince.

The largest number of names

adopted were from the localities of their residence; a town or river crossing, or from a hill, or the moor, or the downs near him. The next largest source of names was related to the ancestors of a man, as when a man's father was named John, he would name himself Johnson.

In trying to get at the origin of my name I supposed it was after a man named Daw, or from the bird called Jack Daw. But I find it is from the French d'Osse, a place in France. Another authority gives it as being from David, contracted to Daw plus son. At any rate I am named Dawson, which ever may have been its source.

The third largest class of names is entitled Official. Here we find King, Prince, Duke, Lord, Earl, Knight, Pope, Monk, Marshal, Bailey and Chamberlin, and many another. The author of the book I referred to above said that in a single year at the time he wrote the book, 1857, nine hundred Kings had been born in England. I suspect one would be safe in saying that one thousand Kings are born in a single year here in this democracy where we do not have Kings as rulers.

Personal characteristics account for a lot of surnames. A man had some bodily peculiarity and his neighbors nicknamed him something that referred to the peculiarity, and that became his surname. For example, the name Crookshanks, meaning bow-legged, or deformed legs. And many got their surnames because of their qualities of character. For example, Good, Goodman, Goodfellow, Wise, Meek, Joy, Gay and Sage. But maybe it was another sort of char-

acter that moved the neighbors to nickname him, and his descendants are now called Moody, Giddy, and Wiley.

A man's physique may have given him a nickname that became a surname, as Little, Long, Short, Strong, Stringfellow, Hardy, Ironside, Armstrong, Turnbull.

Some men thought of themselves as being like some of the animals that they admired. So one man named himself Wolf, another Byrion which means bear, or Wilbur which means wild boar, or Lovel meaning little Wolf, or Todd meaning fox. In the different dialects and European languages Boar became a popular name. Here is a list of the names that are still to be found that meant in some languages or dialects: Boar; Eber, Eber, Ebers, Everard, Evered, Everett, Everingham, Everly and Everton. King Richard the Third was nicknamed the Boar and was proud of the title, but when a poet used Hog instead of boar in a couplet it cost him his life, for the King did not like to be called a hog. Here is the couplet:

"The Cat, the Rat, and Lovel  
the Dog  
Rule all England under the  
Hog"

I've been thinking about Editor Buck's name, Meador. How come? Well, in Old English "Mead" means meadow. Now add "or" or "er" to the name and it means One Who Lives in a Meadow, or cares for it. Then try to imagine Buck in a meadow with a scythe cutting hay—if you can. But now Buck pushes a lawn mower—if Bette can get him to.

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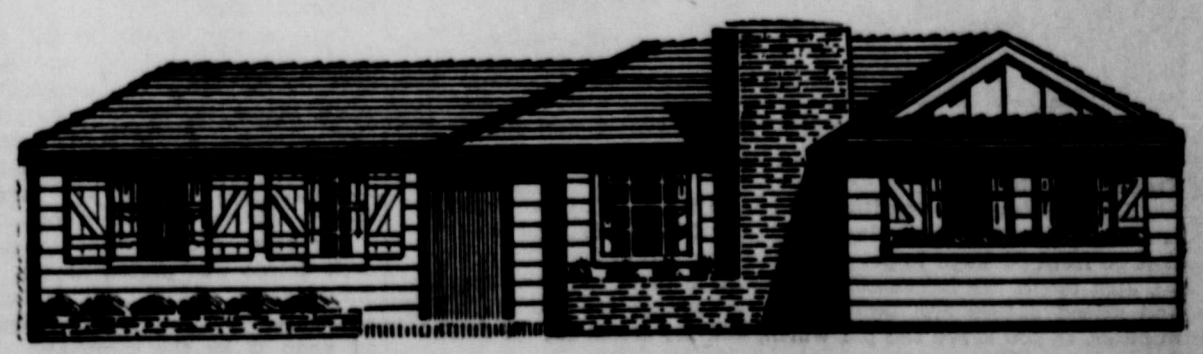

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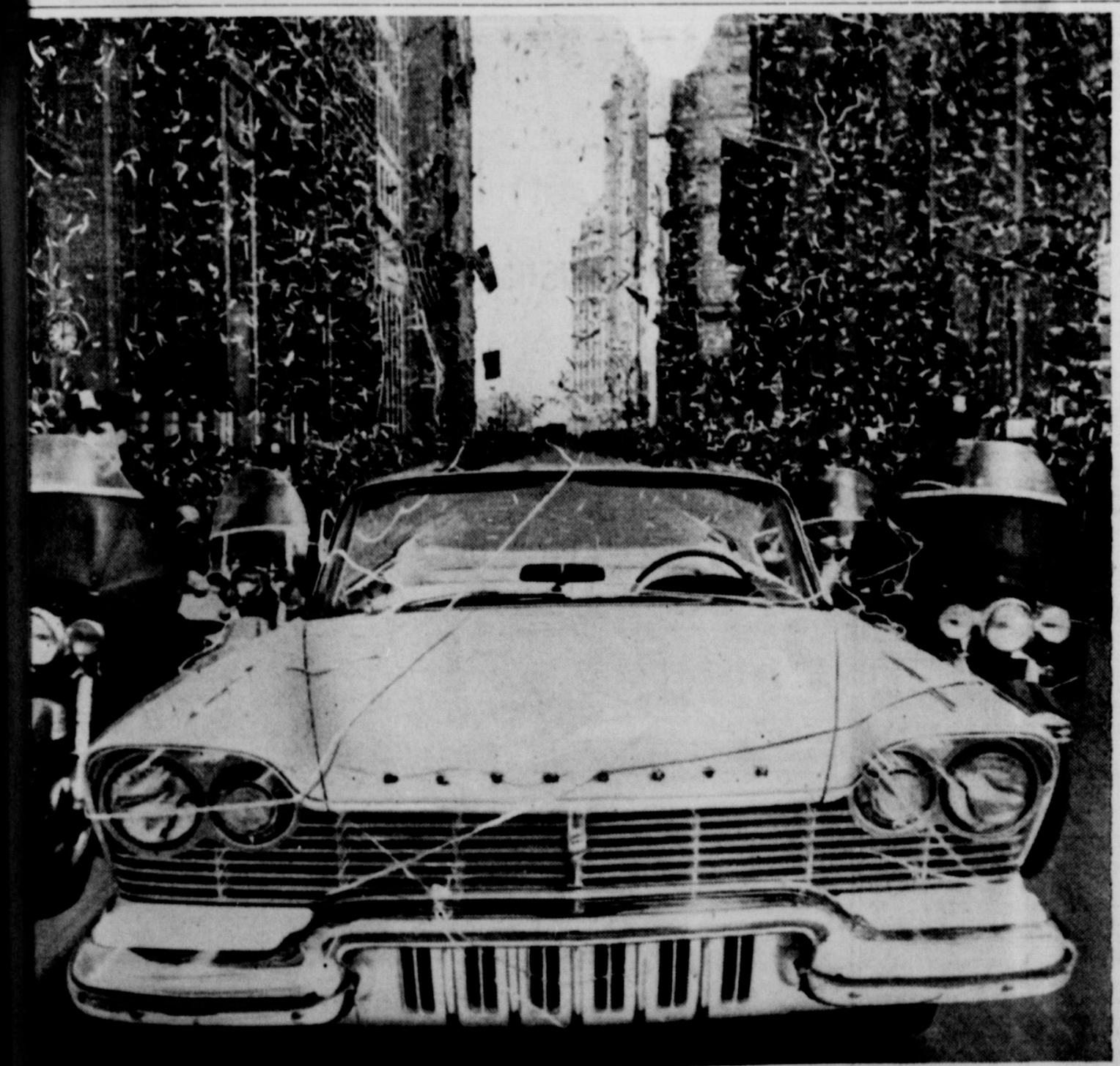

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Each family is entitled to claim one piece of real property as their homestead. The claim must be established by an affidavit filed with the county tax assessor on or before April 30, each and every year. This affidavit must be filed by the owner himself. A lending agency cannot do so, even though it may actually pay the annual taxes thereon from a fund created by the owner's monthly installments. When the homestead affidavit is properly filed, the owner becomes entitled to an exemption of State taxes up to the value of \$3,000 or 200-acres in the case of farm lands. This is an exemption from payment, not a complete exemption from rendition and assessment. There is no similar exemption with reference to county or city taxes. The homestead claimed for tax purposes need not be the property which is actually occupied by the owner as his residence. When the homestead affidavit is not filed by April 30, the taxpayer loses his right to the \$3,000 or 200 acre exemption, and consequently becomes liable for more taxes than he would otherwise be required to pay. Property taxes are assessed against the person who is the record owner of each piece of real and personal property on the first day of January of each year. Individuals purchasing property during the year should make sure that the taxes for all previous years have been paid. Otherwise, the purchaser may be forced to pay hundreds of dollars in delinquent taxes to protect his property. Unpaid taxes create a lien against the property which can be enforced regardless of change of ownership. One should also keep in mind to make some arrangement for the previous owner to pay his pro-rata share of taxes for the current year. Otherwise, the buyer may find it necessary to pay the entire taxes for that year. When taxes are not paid by the deadline prescribed for the particular taxing unit (city, county, state, or district), monetary penalties and interest are added from month to month. In addition, the property becomes subject to seizure and sale to satisfy the tax lien. This lien applies to all property, whether homestead or not.

### VEGETABLE SALADS

Vegetable salads taste good and are easy to make. They will help you look and feel your best by giving you many of the vitamins and minerals you need each day. Remember these salad secrets that spell success:

1. Have all leafy vegetables fresh, clean, crisp, cold and dry.
2. Rub salad bowl with a cut clove of garlic for a hint of garlic flavor.
3. For crisper salads, tear greens into bit-size pieces. Cutting makes them wilt sooner.
4. Cut other vegetables into large enough pieces so that you can tell what they are.
5. Toss salad when mixing—do not stir.
6. Combine or arrange salads just before serving for a fresh, crisp appearance.
7. Add dressing to fresh vegetable salads just before serving, or pass it separately at the table.
8. Make salads colorful.

Do you always get that serving of green or yellow vegetable every day? Try this salad as a different way of getting it:

- Spinach Salad
- 6 slices bacon
  - 4 cups raw spinach (or 2 cups raw spinach and 2 cups leaf lettuce)
  - 2 sliced green onions
  - 3 tablespoons bacon fat
  - 4 tablespoons lemon juice or vinegar
  - Three-fourth teaspoon salt
  - 3 hard-cooked eggs
- Paprika  
Cut bacon into one and a half-

2. Shredded cabbage, unpeeled apples, peanuts. Mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing.
3. Cucumber, tomatoes, onion, green pepper. Tomato soup dressing.

Try this quick, easy, delicious dressing:

- Tomato Soup Salad Dressing
- 1 can condensed tomato soup
  - One-third cup sugar
  - One-half cup vinegar
  - 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1 teaspoon paprika
  - 1 grated onion
  - 1 cup salad oil
- Combine all ingredients in a fruit jar and shake well. Store in the refrigerator. Shake well each time before using.

### MORE FOR CALORIE WATCHERS

Last week I included a recipe for a dressing that was low in calories. Here is another low-calorie dressing of a different type.

- Cooked Salad Dressing:
- Three-fourth teaspoon salt
  - 2 tablespoons flour
  - 1 teaspoon dry mustard
  - Few grains cayenne pepper
  - 1 and a half tablespoons sugar
  - 2 egg yolks or 1 whole egg slightly beaten
  - Three-fourth cup milk
  - One-fourth cup vinegar
  - 2 tablespoons fat
- Mix dry ingredients. Add to egg, mixing well. Add milk gradually, then vinegar very slowly. Cook over hot water, stirring until mixture thickens; add fat. Cool.

# COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

The country side over the county is the most beautiful I have ever seen. If you have not made a drive around the country yet, do it before the Spring flowers seed and die off. You'll see whole areas of yellow, blue and purple and in some pastures combinations of these colors. Then along the highways, the bluebonnets are out in all their splendor. Not only this, but look at the many wonderful crops of grain waiving their heads in the gentle breezes.

And talking about these weeds, I'll admit they are really pretty but we need to get as much grass back on pastures as quickly as possible. One way to do this, that is those of you whose pastures will permit

it, is to mow off all the weeds and give the grasses a chance to come through and make their start before hot weather sets in. Not too many pastures can be mowed but parts of many can and mowing off the weeds lessens the competition of the grass seedlings, moisture, plant food, etc.

Another thing you might want to consider in managing your pastures is rotation grazing. Rotation grazing makes it possible to concentrate a group of animals in a small area. It also permits faster recovery of the grazed area when livestock are rotated to another pasture.

Creep feeding lambs is paying off for some sheep raisers. There are several advantages to creep feeding with a few disadvantages. The lambs gain weight more readily and often go to market a few days earlier to reduce feed costs. Then there is less shrinkage at weaning time and when lambs are shipped directly to market. They are more uniform in size and finish. It's a good way to market home grown feed. On the other hand, creep feeding lambs calls for extra labor and equipment. Also, the spread in price may not be enough to pay for the extra cost and labor, particularly where ewes and lambs are on good lush pastures like oats, wheat and etc. like we have at this time. But, there are many sheep raisers who find that it pays under their conditions.

It's here again—the time to be looking out for grasshoppers. Hoppers are hatching out now and in some places they can be found in their beds. While they are in beds is one of the best times to apply control measures. One might look along the turn rows, fence borders, ditches and ditch banks and idle land joining crop land. If hoppers are found in beds in these areas, they can be pretty easily killed and save much more work

later in the spring and early summer. I'd like to caution you though to stay out of pastures with the new insecticides.

The latest thing in all-purpose insect repellents is diethyl toluamide. (Got this name down and remember it because it will probably be in some commercial products this spring). Test repellents containing this chemical display twice as much resistance to normal "wear-off action" as do other types. The new repellent can be applied safely to the skin or clothing and will successfully protect the wearer against mosquitoes, chiggers, ticks, fleas, and biting flies. It offers better protection against mosquitoes generally than any other single chemical or combination of chemicals. Its high resistance to rubbing means long-lasting protection. It is the best repellent so far for ticks. In addition, a pleasant lotion "feel" makes it ideal for picnickers and those working in your yards and gardens.
