"Kronos," a science-fiction feature is the second offering of the double feature program.

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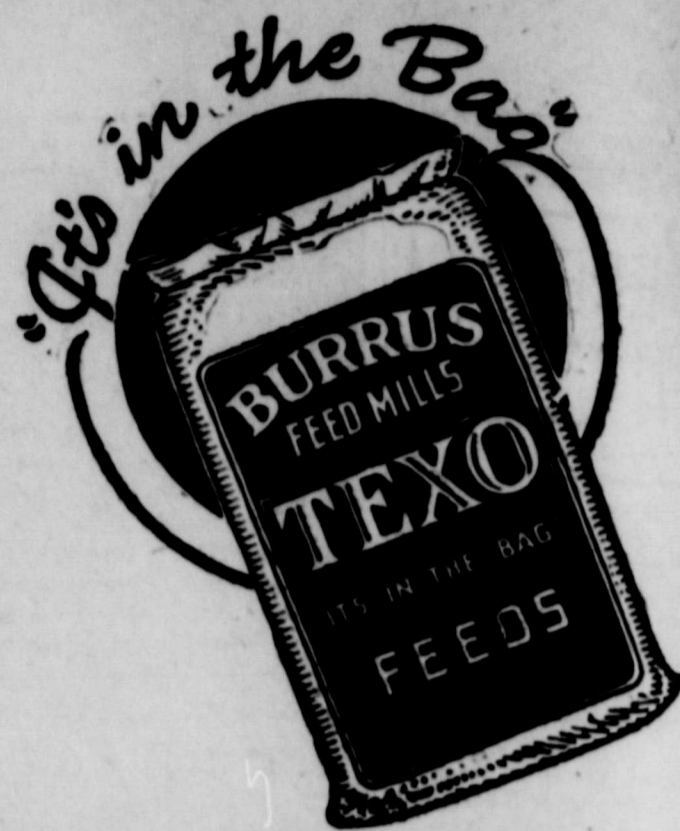

**FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR CLAIRETTE RANCHER**

Funeral services for Chanceford Kirk Sterling, 48, were held Tuesday at 4 p. m. at the First Methodist Church in Hico, with Rev. Edwin Tims, pastor of the Clairrette Methodist Church, officiating. Chanceford K. Sterling was born January 31, 1909, at San Angelo. He was united in marriage to Miss Frances Elliott, in September, 1935.

He was a member of the Methodist Church since an early age. At the time of his death he was a member of the Hico church.

Mr. Sterling was a Lt. Colonel in the U. S. Army Reserve. He served 4 years during World War I, two years of which was overseas duty.

He met with sudden death when he was struck by lightning about 11:15 a. m. May 13 when he went to empty his rain gauge. He was struck in the open about half way between his home and the barn.

The entire community was shocked and saddened. Our community has lost an outstanding citizen, one who will always be remembered with appreciation for the things he did and what he stood for.

He and Mrs. Sterling came to Clairrette 3 years ago from San Angelo where he was a postal employee. They built a nice ranch home about 2 miles west of Clairrette two years ago.

He is survived by his wife, his father, Rufus Sterling of San Antonio.

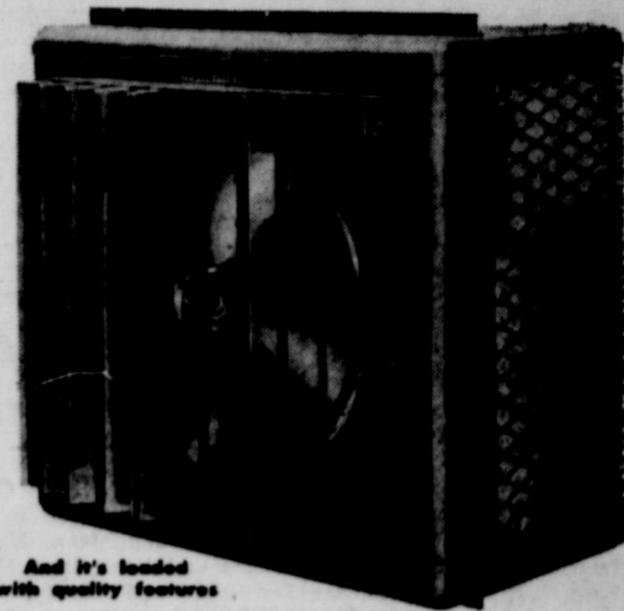

# Madisonville Sidewalk Assn. Searching For 'Dry Rancher'

Madisonville, Texas. — Members of the Madisonville Sidewalk Cattlemen's Association, just emerging from the worst drouth in the history of Texas, looked out over their green ranges this week where cattle grazed in knee-deep grass and felt sorry for fellow-ranchers in other areas of the United States still plagued by drouth.

"What we ought to do," they decided, "is share this beautiful sight with some drouth-ridden rancher still swallowing dust."

As a result, they came up with a plan to find the driest rancher in the United States, Canada, or Mexico and fly him to Madisonville as the honor guest at the annual Sidewalk Cattlemen's barbecue June 6.

The Madisonville Sidewalk Cattlemen's Association, you recall, is the celebrated outfit that throws a big barbecue each spring and attracts international attention by the type of honor guest it selects.

"This year," they said, "we're forgetting about Miss America, who once was guest, little girls who can't buy cowboy boots in Boston, ex-soldiers who hate Texas, International good neighbors from South America, etc., and taking off our hats to the driest rancher in North and South America."

The cattlemen know what a drouth is, as they've just emerged from a seven-year dry spell termed by historians as the worst in 300 years, but now rains have returned and the ranges are lush, the cattle fat and sleek.

"What we want," they said, "is to find the driest rancher, the one who has gone the longest with the least amount of rain, but is still ranching. Anybody who has quit, he's not eligible. Anybody with some oil wells, he's not eligible. Or with a job in town, or with a wife who teaches school. What we want is a genuine, drouth-stricken rancher who has stuck it out and

is still staring at the sky every morning and seeing nothing but the sun, except when it's bearded by dust. We want to fly him to Texas and into Madison County, and let him see that it can still rain, let him chew on a stalk of green grass and see if he can still remember what it tastes like."

All you have to do to win the free trip is write a letter to the Madisonville Sidewalk Cattlemen's Association, Madisonville, Texas, where mail is now delivered on Saturday the same as any other day, and tell how long you've been ranching and how little rain you've had for how long. The winner of the "driest rancher" title will be flown to Madisonville as honor guest for the annual barbecue June 6.

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**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**

### FUTURE TENSE LAW

You can tell a lot about people by the way they regard time.

Do they put stock mostly in the past—their record; the present—their direct joy in work or play; or the future—their plans? Why not use all three dimensions of time? Past experience to guide the present for zest, and the future to realize dreams.

Lawyers report a sharp shift in the way people regard time and the law: Of old they thought of law in terms of past facts like failures to meet legal duties, misdeeds, etc.—facts useful chiefly in lawsuits.

You still have to think of the record, since you may have to go to trial some time. So keep good records of your affairs.

But more and more people now also think of the law in the future tense—in terms of built-in safeguards for plans which they want to go through without legal hitches.

Our heavy income and death taxes have made people plan ahead legally, rather than wait for the axe to fall.

Any time you buy or sell a home or a business or make an investment, you have choices of how you may do it—some wise, some not, in view of your circumstances.

Should you do business as a sole proprietor, a partnership, or corporation? Do your contracts set out ways of meeting unexpected events? How best may you serve your estate (and also carry out your wishes)—by a will or a trust, or by direct gifts?

While all of these things point forward, the past in the form of court records can serve you by showing where trouble may come from.

As more and more people know the symptoms of legal trouble—where to look for legal hitches in plans before big trouble starts, there will be fewer law suits and better human relations.

And where does trouble sometimes start? Most often where you lack a clear grasp of your relationship, your rights and duties, and your own and the other fellow's resources—in transactions involving large personal or financial stakes.

### TEXAS' NEW EGG LAW

The next few months marks a period of preparation for one of Texas' most important agricultural advances in recent years—the enforcement of an egg grading and standards law.

Recent passage of the Texas Egg Law brings the state into line with all other states which already have active egg programs, making possible the protection of Texas egg producers and consumers alike from misrepresented and mislabeled eggs.

The law became effective immediately upon its passage although it will not become operative in full for a six-months prescribed period. This period presumably is to allow for preparation of persons and firms for compliance with the law in full.

With a few minor exceptions, the new egg law provides that eggs sold for human consumption must be graded according to consumer grades and weight classes set up by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The new law also makes it illegal to sell or advertise shell eggs below the quality of grade A as "fresh," "yard," "selected," "henery," "newlaid," "cage," or other words which represent such eggs to be fresh. This does not include the sale of eggs from a producer's own flocks. The labeling provisions are among those which will not become effective until 180 days following the law's effective date, or in about six months.

Another provision involves licensing of certain dealers and processors of eggs, with fees set according to the volume of eggs handled. The proceeds of these fees will help to defray the cost of administration and enforcement of this act.

Texas Mother of the Year Is Grandmother of Mrs. Chaney

A 70-year-old housewife who was married in a buggy, reared 14 children and sent nine of them to college was named last week as the 1937 Texas Baptist Mother of the year.

She is Mrs. Annie Laura Hale, a member of the First Baptist Church at Goldthwaite, a Sunday school teacher for the past 56 years, and an energetic church worker for more than half a century.

Mrs. Hale is the grandmother of Mrs. Rolline Chaney of Hico. Rev. Chaney is at present a student at the Southwestern Baptist Seminary at Fort Worth, and is pastor of the Clairette Baptist Church.

Baptist leaders said Mrs. Hale was chosen for the honor "because of the dedicated motherhood she has exemplified in her home and the consistent service she has rendered as a Christian workman through the years."

Sponsors of the mother of the year project are the Standard and the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Born in Washington County, Mrs. Hale grew up on a farm, married a neighborhood boy (John Harvey Hale) and for years kept her young ones, children under a tree while she worked with her husband in the fields.

The couple started out with just one horse, one cow, a buggy (the same one they were married in) and \$10. They have never had any great amount of money, but they reared 14 children of their own and three left by a sister when she died, sent all of them to high school and nine of them to college.

Not one of Mr. and Mrs. Hale's children has ever been arrested or fined. One of them is a Baptist pastor and the others are all active Christian workers. Of the Hale's 20 grandchildren, all who are old enough to decide religious matters for themselves are Christians.

Home religion has long been a tradition with the Hale family. There were no nurseries where

Mr. and Mrs. Hale lived, but they took the children to church anyway, laid them on a pallet or a bench and gave them a bottle or a bite to eat. Bible stories and family prayer were also part of the children's training. After the small church they attended was disbanded, the parents held Sunday school classes in their own home for their children and any others who wanted to attend.

"What does it mean to be a Christian mother?" Mrs. Hale was asked.

"I wouldn't take a million dollars apiece for my children," she said. "There is a lot of pleasure in raising a big bunch, but there is also a lot of heartache and worry, too. It's worth it though."

"I wouldn't change my life for anyone's. And the greatest thrill of all is knowing that my children are Christians."

"If you are a Christian mother, you can always depend on the Lord to help you when you need him and the going gets rough. I couldn't have made it without him."

Mr. and Mrs. Hale met at a rural high school in Coryell County, eloped and were married at a minister's house while still sitting in a buggy at the front gate.

Mrs. Hale has taught the women's Bible class at the First Baptist Church in Goldthwaite for several years but is now an assistant teacher, after she got an infected foot. She is also prayer chairman for the Woman's Missionary Union, and has been church clerk, a Training Union director, WMU community missions chairman and a member of the baptismal committee. Mr. Hale is the church custodian.

The couple's children are the Rev. Earl Hale of Fort Worth; Oren, an employee of Convoir at Fort Worth; Orville, a teacher in the Brownfield High School; Mrs. Pearl Long, a registered nurse at the San Saba Memorial Hospital; Mrs. Vera Ware, a beautician at

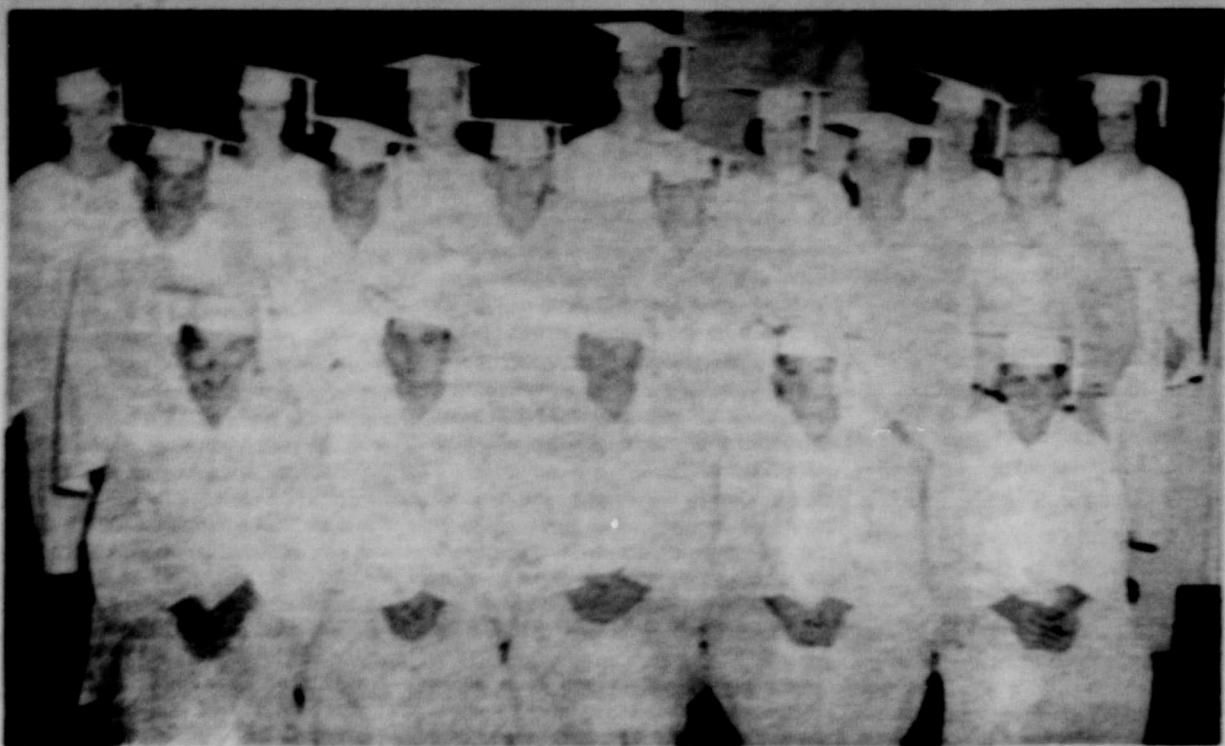
Tompkins is sponsoring the event as a benefit performance to pay indebtedness on Dublin's recreation building, constructed last year.

### COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. B. LAWRENCE

Kinds believe it is time to start getting about the amount of rain we are all getting now. They still, there'll be a time before the year is out when we'll be wanting some more.

Talking with Hugh Parrish the other morning about the damage done and being done over the county. Hugh came back with a pretty good answer. He said it was true that it was hurting him some now, but he sure did feel good about what all the moisture would mean to him, and others, later on in the season, and how much good it would do him.

O. H. Brummett started last week doing a good job on some of his pastures. Where it is dry enough, Ovie is mowing off the weeds. This gives the young grass a better chance to get started. Mowing is one of the good pasture management practices that generally pay if it is possible to do mowing.

A few months back, Bill Lawson laid an underground drainage line in his field at the bridge on highway 22. This drains out the excess

water that accumulates after rains like we have been having. It has been working well too and has taken off the water without damaging the field. Now if some of you happen by when the river is little more than half-bank full, don't become alarmed about seeing something like an artesian well springing up out of the middle of the field. This thing has been working in reverse the last few days and it does look like a fine well.

Might call your attention that as of now, our cotton planting date deadline is May 31. Some have mentioned that they heard it was the 25th. This is for counties farther east of us. So, don't forget that our last day for planting is May 31, which is next Friday.

Might remember, too, that getting in a field to cultivate when the soil is too wet is a good way to set up a hard-pan underneath. These hard-pans are difficult to get rid of sometimes.

Ted Eisen, Aleman, says his egg cleaner is one of the best pieces of machinery he has invested in in a long time. He saves about an hour or more a day cleaning his eggs. Cleaning eggs always was one of the drawbacks to the egg business.

Albert Grater, Pleasant Valley, has just completed his large new laying house. This makes two for him and he'll have better than 2,000 layers.

Roland Sherrard, 16, of Hico has been awarded a junior membership in the American Angus Association at St. Joseph, Missouri, according to Frank Richards, secretary.

At present Roland owns one registered Aberdeen-Angus. At that time he will be eligible to convert to a lifetime membership in the Association.
