Frontier Days Are Depicted In Week-End Movie at Local Theatre

The Texas of 1866, seething under the ruthless pillaging of a Provisional Government, is the background for the story of a strange triangle in Paramount's brilliantly cast outdoor drama "Three Violent People," playing Friday and Saturday at the Hico Theatre. A tale of the rancher-carpetbagger wars, the large-scale pictures stars Charlton Heston, Anne Baxter and Gilbert Roland.

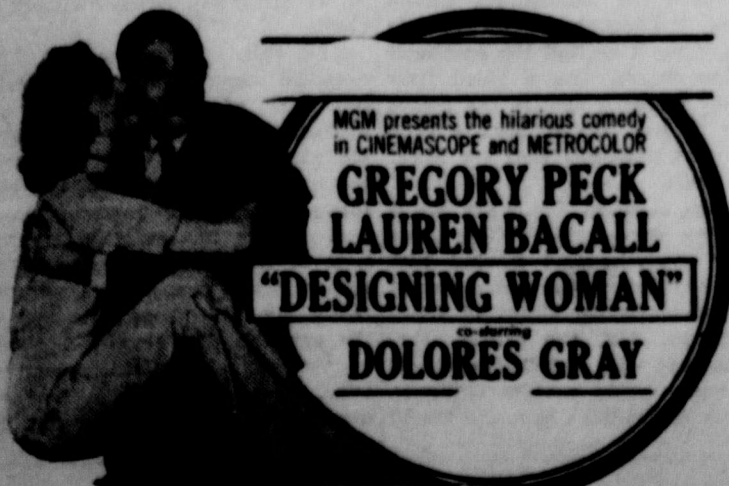

On the Home Range

Summer is really here now and after such a wet cool spring it hurts. Below I have suggested some things that might make summer living a little easier — as the song says.

TO FRESHEN FIBER RUGS
Awning paint is recommended for summer fiber rugs. This water-proof paint wears well, sinks into the fibers without giving them a "painted look" and dries with a dull surface. Many housewives also report that paint helps fiber rugs wear longer.
Some stores stock a special paint for fiber rugs.
Applying the paint is easy. Place several layers of newspapers underneath the rug to protect the floor. Select a stiff brush, fill with paint, then wipe off excess on the inside lip of the can. Brush the paint over the rug — covering about a foot at a time. Brush well into all the crevices and holes of the fiber and allow rug to dry thoroughly before using.

Orange Fluff. Put half pint of vanilla ice cream into a large bowl and let soften a little. Add to the ice cream 1 can frozen concentrated orange juice and 2 cups of cold water. Beat with rotary egg beater or electric mixer until fluffy. Pour at once into tall, cold glasses and top with the remaining half pint of ice cream. For party refreshments, add a half slice of orange and sprig of mint. Makes six servings.
Thick milkshakes can be quickly made with your electric mixer or a rotary egg beater. Just put slightly softened ice cream, milk and flavoring into mixing bowl and beat until fluffy.

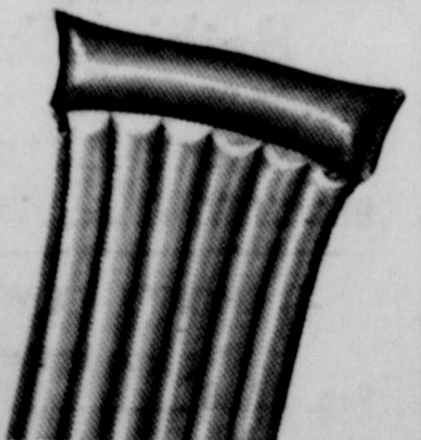

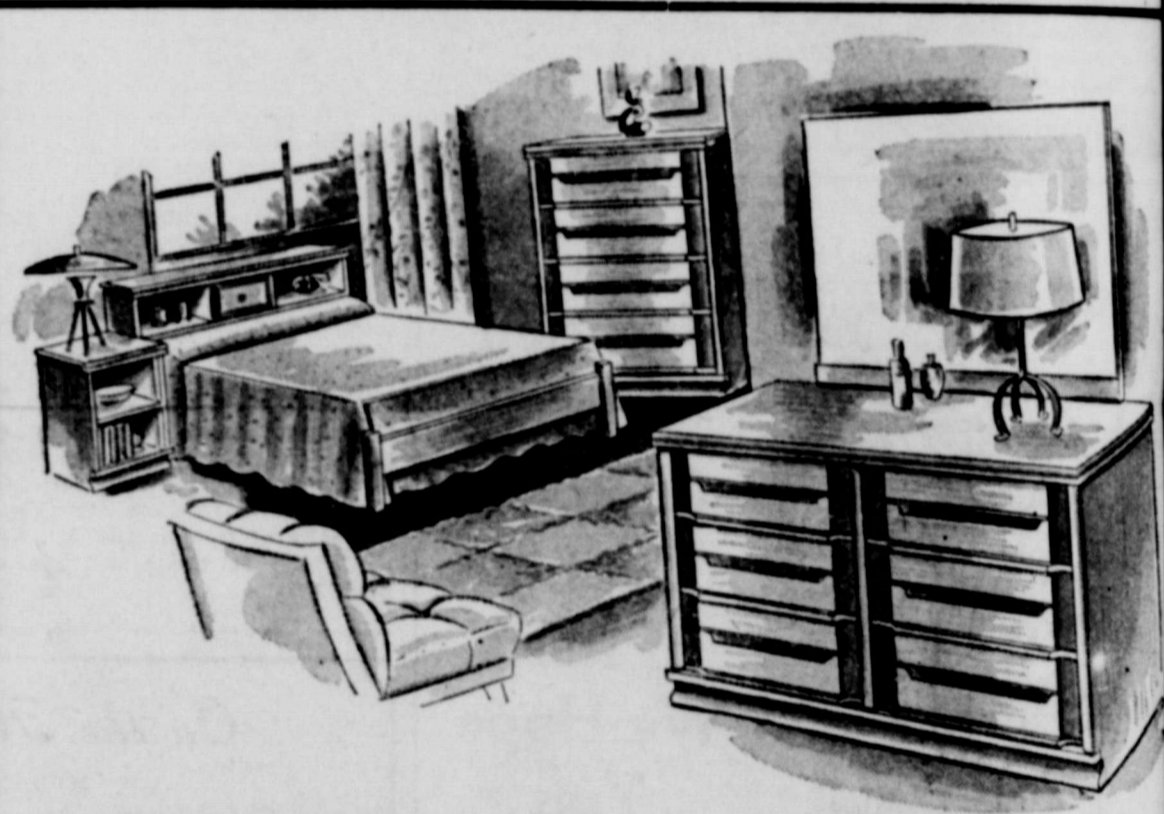

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Egg producers over the county are still adding new equipment in order to get a better quality egg on the market.

There is to be a meeting Friday, July 19, at Temple in the Agriculture Building at the Fair Grounds for an explanation and interpretation of the new egg law that has just been passed by the Legislature.

With the hot weather we are having now and are apt to have from here on through the remainder of the summer, it is a good idea to be prepared to cool laying hens.

Screw worms are about the most bothersome this year they have ever been. Might suggest that in connection with watching your livestock closely for worms, that you also watch your dogs and other pets.

Jumbo grasshoppers are causing damage on some places and a poison bran mash is a good control for them if you do not want to spray your crops.

One eighth of a pound of aldrin, 100 pounds of bran and about 10 gallons of water will make up a good mash.

Chlordane at the rate of one-half pound mixed with bran and water as above will also do the job. It is important that the bran mash

be broadcast over the area where the hoppers are feeding rather than placed in piles. The best time to put out the bait is early of a morning when the temperature is from 70 to 80 degrees.

Farm accidents resulted in 14,000 deaths last year, putting farming third in major industries in the number of accidental deaths. A fatigued machine, the tractor, has replaced the horse and mule on the farm.

Time out about the middle of the afternoon, eat a small lunch, drink a cool glass of milk or some other beverage and see how much easier it is to make out the day?

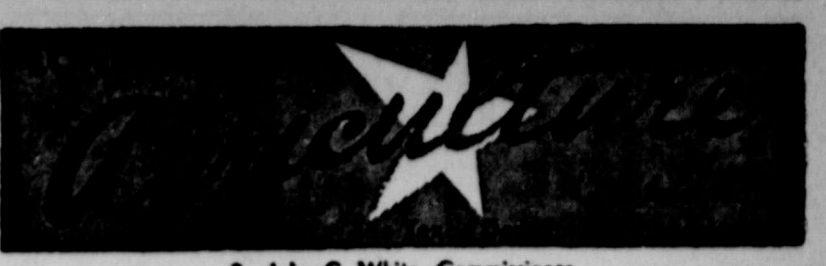

IMPACT OF TEXAS' NEW EGG LAW

The Texas Egg Law, which becomes effective in a few weeks, will have probably a more far-reaching impact on the citizens of Texas as a whole than any agricultural legislation of recent times.

Although regulations will extend only to certain areas of the egg industry itself, the effect of the law will be felt not only by producers and other industry men, but by consumers as well. And the effect felt will be a good one.

What the law actually does is to stop misrepresentation of inferior eggs as quality merchandise and to place emphasis on accurate product labeling of quality eggs and a better product for consumers.

This is accomplished through a system of egg grading which requires all eggs offered for sale to

SMALL PRODUCERS ARE PROTECTED

Heretofore, labeling of eggs as to grade and condition was a free and open affair with no recourse available in the most flagrant violations. The new standards require that no egg below actual "A" quality be sold or advertised as fresh, selected, infertile, cage, or any word of similar import.

Producers of eggs who sell only the production of their own flocks are exempt from provisions of the act unless they claim some kind of grade. If producers choose to claim a grade, their eggs must conform completely with provisions of the law.

The act becomes effective August 22. Deadline for obtaining licenses (by retailers, dealers, wholesalers, and processors) is October 20. Actual enforcement of violations, which carry fines up to \$1,000, will start after February 17, 1958.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that there are openings for 50 men in the Driver License Division of the Department.

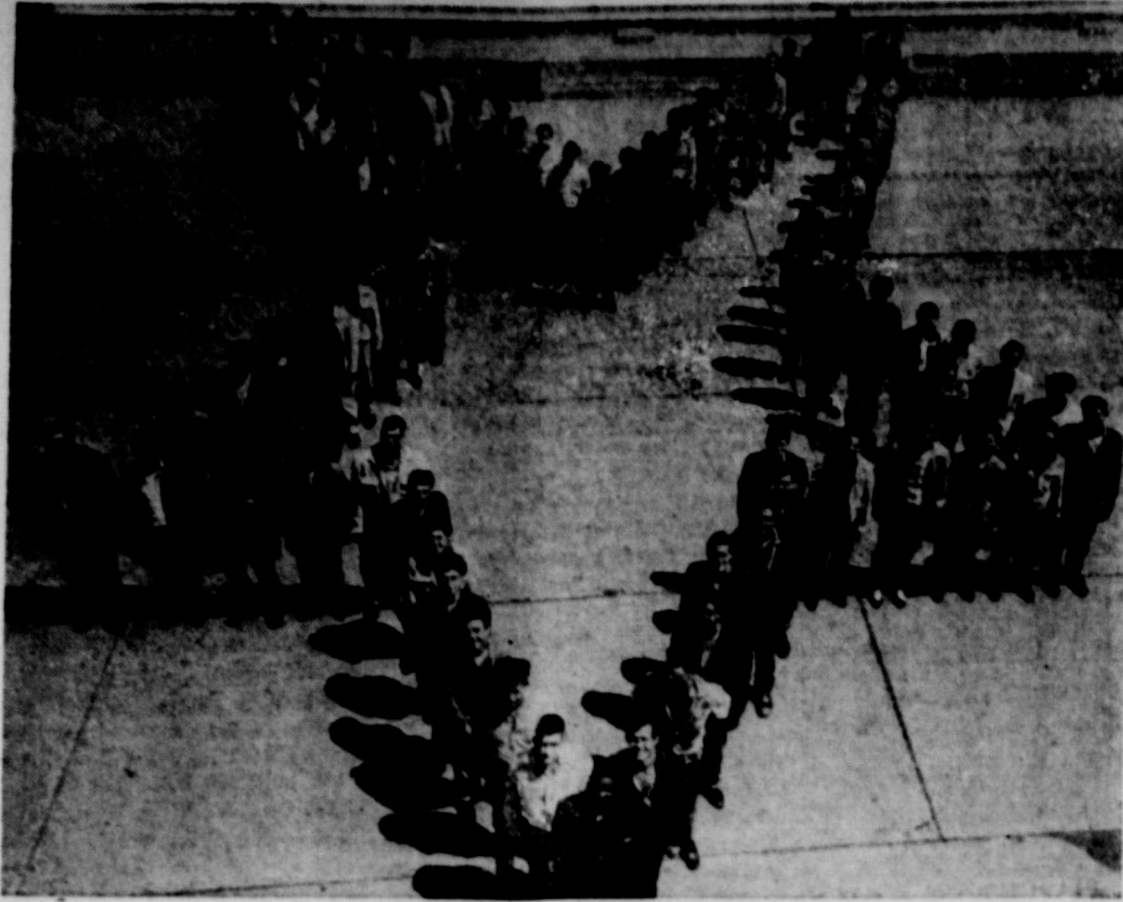
The positions are that of Driver License Examiner. Applications will be accepted through July at the department in Austin or by DL Examiners throughout the state. Those persons selected will be paid during the six weeks training period that starts in early September.

Col. Garrison pointed out that examiners are thoroughly trained in all phases of traffic laws, highway law, driver license law and other subjects pertaining to the job before being assigned their stations.

He said applications mailed to Austin should be addressed to A. F. Temple, chief of the Drivers License Division.

Applicants applying for the position of DL Examiner must be between the ages of 21 and 35, be a graduate of high school, physically fit and of good moral character and weigh not less than two pounds or more than three pounds per inch of height.

For benefits and advantages of the law enforcement position Col. Garrison suggested that persons interested either write to the division in Austin or contact a DL Examiner locally.

BUILDING YOUR HOME

When you are ready to build, you will find that the law helps in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and the amount you want to spend? If so, then let's go into details!

1. Your lot: Junior's school or your church may be nearby, but find out—

(a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any improvements for which you can be assessed.

(b) What "covenants" or restric-

tions run with the land? To protect residents, the plats or basic deeds of some neighborhoods call on you to build a certain size or type of house. Do you want to and can you afford to?

(c) Easements: Either you or your neighbors may need to run pipes, or string wires over each other's land or to share a driveway. Have the abstract checked carefully to disclose any easements.

2. Zoning Ordinances: For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example, for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores or manufacturing, etc.

Unless the local governing body changes its zoning ordinances, no filling station, for instance, can go up next to you in a residential area. Neither could you turn your home into a store. In any case, you should find out what your neighborhood zoning rules are.

3. Building Codes: Be certain that the plans and construction will meet the requirements of the local building code as to size, location and structure. Municipal ordinances usually impose strict standards for the building, the plumbing and the electrical wiring. In many cases only licensed building tradesmen are permitted to make the installations.

4. Financing: Financing contracts protect both you and the lender. Unless you pay cash, you will use credit to pay for your house, most likely a deed of trust or a land contract. Your installments often include principal, interest, insurance and taxes. Under a land contract the lender holds title to your house until you pay for it. If

you fall behind, the holder can take the house back. With a deed of trust, the lender has a lien which he can foreclose if you default. You may get some of your money back on the principal; but you may also have to make up any loss: the lender makes in reselling the house.

Well worked-out contracts can help you make your dream house come true. A construction contract or a so-called "earnest-money" agreement or receipt is no job for an amateur. Too many legal details are involved. Your lawyer is trained by education and experience to protect your best interests in contracting and closing real estate deals.

You know what you want. You should be careful to get what you want through careful planning and a properly prepared and executed contract.
