



**Sunday & Monday—**

In keeping with the trend toward taking cameras overseas for on-the-spot realism and scenic beauty, Twentieth Century-Fox has scored another "first" with "Boy on a Dolphin" which plays Saturday midnight, Sunday and Monday at Hico Theatre.

The romantic adventure, starring Alan Ladd, Clifton Webb and Sophia Loren, revolves around a voluptuous Greek island girl who dives for sponges and stumbles upon the famous lost statue of a boy astride a dolphin in an ancient sunken ship.

There is an exciting feud and romance between Ladd, an American archeologist, and Loren, a tempestuous peasant spitfire who wants to sell the statue to Webb. Aqua-diving sequences and underwater photography are handled with sensitivity and imagination. The story has solid pace, lots of comedy supplied by Webb, and many breathtaking beautiful glimpses of classic architecture triumphantly settled in modern-day Greece.

Conflict arises when Webb offers the Greek girl a fortune for the statue. Ladd is determined to turn it over to its rightful owners, the Greek people. To mislead the architect, Sophia takes him aqua-diving in areas away from the sunken treasure. She then resorts to a dance to keep Ladd in a tavern while Webb recovers the sunken statue.

This is a subtle role for he-man Ladd who plays a straight-laced earnest archeologist caught between his duty to the Greeks and the physical attraction of the disarmingly naive Miss Loren.

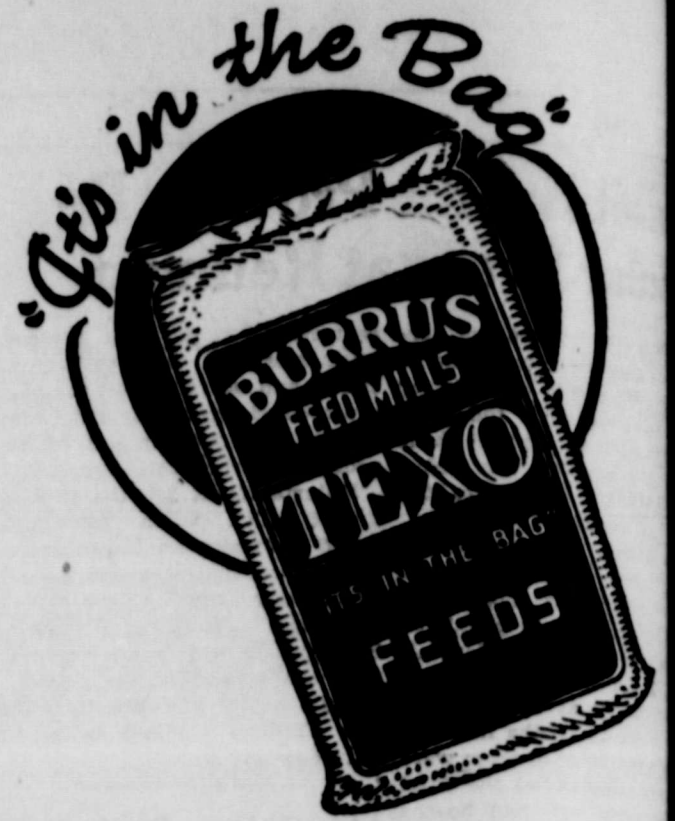

Keypoints notify, in turn some 3,500 "sub-keypoints" which set off sirens and call out civil defense personnel.

FAITH SAVED HIM FROM SUICIDE Bobby R. was born in the hills of Kentucky on a mountain farm. He attended a two-room school house as a barefoot boy. While going to school he met a girl with brown eyes and black hair. He married her on Easter Sunday two years later. One year later he moved to Ohio and began a grocery business with his brother. The first year they lost \$600 but then the business began to grow. He opened a dry goods store, then a used car lot and began to sell semi-trailers; after that a furniture and appliance store. The last of August he called in his brothers and told them his plight but they could not help him. Desperately he sought an answer—he searched for one ray of hope. Where was "the way out?" . . . the way out . . . THE WAY OUT! . . . kept drumming through his mind. Suddenly it flashed upon him—suicide—"that's the way out!" But on that day someone put on his desk a little book: God's Formula For Success and Happiness. It is the story of ten men—one, whose name was Clifford Ford, had reached the same depths that Bob was in, but he had discovered the way back to success through faith in God. Bob read it. It inspired him. Maybe there was some hope after all. Then he said, "I knelt before God and prayed this prayer: 'Lord I've come to the end of the road. I have nothing left. You are my only hope—please help me!'" "Suddenly," he said, "I seemed to get this message from God. 'Do not doubt or fear, simply believe.' 'At that moment,' Bob said, 'I knew what I wanted. WEED KILLING OPERATIONS THREATEN CROPS

Hormone-type herbicides such as 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T are among the most effective weed and brush killers available—but their very effectiveness calls for extreme caution. These powerful and useful chemicals can damage crops through careless handling just as easily as they can destroy plant pests. This fact is especially evident this year. Damage to cotton by herbicides has increased alarmingly in unregulated areas of Texas this season. As many as 9,000 acres in four West Texas counties suffered slight to severe effects from herbicides sprayed in adjacent areas during periods when wind drift was excessive. In contrast, not a single report of damage has been received from counties where the Texas Department of Agriculture regulates the sale and use of herbicides. Some 125 counties are regulated by the Texas Herbicide Law. Permits must be obtained for applying herbicide chemicals in these counties and a Department of Agriculture inspector must supervise spraying operations. The remaining 129 counties are exempt from the law and it is in these counties where crop damage has occurred. Inspectors make certain that spraying is not practiced within certain distances of susceptible crops—in relation to wind velocity. It is also important that clean equipment is maintained. Much damage has been done by poisoning cotton with equipment which has been used in making applications of herbicides. Although the Texas Department of Agriculture does not have official jurisdiction in unregulated counties, farmers are urged to use extreme caution in applying weed and brush killing chemicals. Department inspectors or county agents should be contacted for further information on proper safeguards during spraying operations. Copies of the Herbicide Law, listing regulated counties and materials relating to proper usage, may be obtained by writing John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, Austin, Texas.
