Dangers of Grass Fires Cited By Ranch Safety Council

The increased danger of grass and woodland fires during the hot summer months poses a real threat to the cheapest source of livestock feed.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council points out that most grass fires are caused by carelessness and the failure of people to observe safety rules. Grass and other plants along the highways, in parks, woodlands, pastures and ranges are all dry enough to burn and motorists are especially urged to make sure that matches, cigarettes, cigars and pipe ashes are dead before they are thrown onto combustible material.

Good pasture is very important to livestock producers. They must depend on grasslands—especially with the present prices of livestock—to keep down production costs. A charred range resulting from one careless act could be the final blow that would put a producer or producers out of business.

Ranges and pastures should be protected with fire guards. Hazards that might cause fires should be eliminated. Glass bottles may start fires. They act as a magnifying glass and when the sun's rays reach the proper angle, almost any bottle may concentrate the heat from the sun enough to ignite dry grass.

Trash should be burned in a closed incinerator and no fire should be started that cannot be controlled. Everyone should be on the lookout for fires and report them if found. A small fire can usually be put out before it has a chance to spread but if unchecked, it may soon be out of control.

The Council urges community and county groups to organize for the specific purpose of fighting grass fires. They believe the local neighborhood groups should be coordinated on a community and county basis so that if necessary, an effective fighting force could be gotten together in the shortest possible time in case of a major fire. All equipment should be inventoried so no time would be lost in getting the right equipment to the fire.

The old adage, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," is certainly applicable. Make fire prevention your business, urges the Council.

Civic Club Members Vote to Take Over Reunion Assn.

Members of Hico Civic Club voted this week to take over the affairs of the Hico Reunion Association, and continue its operation in the future. The action followed a decision by the Club's directors in a meeting last week to present the plan to members for consideration.

In the past the Reunion has been promoted by the association under the direction of the City Council. This plan for the Civic Club to

take over the destinies of the Reunion follows the decision of Weldon Pierce to resign as manager of the Association. Pierce took over as manager several years ago, and has managed to get the association out of debt and actually make a small amount of money the past few years. The Association owed approximately \$300 when Pierce took over.

Plans of the club are to appoint a committee of three men to work out details of taking over the annual affair, and later to hire a manager to oversee the project. Aims of the club are to promote the affair into one of the largest celebrations of its type in this entire area, and tentative plans call for extensive entertainment program to be sponsored next year.

Iredell Schools to Commence Tuesday, September 3rd

The Iredell Schools will begin the 1957-1958 school year at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, September 3rd, according to an announcement this week by Carlos Carter, superintendent.

Many improvements in school facilities are being made for the coming year. Grades 1-4 have been completely refurnished with new modern desks. Much of the high school and elementary buildings have been repainted. Floors in many rooms have been sanded and refinished, and new bookshelves have been built in most classrooms. Tile is being laid on the hall floors in high school, and a large evaporative cooler has been installed in the cafeteria.

Complete sets of new wall maps have been ordered for grades 5-12, and a one and a half ton truck has been purchased for the use of the Vocational Agriculture Department. The school also has a new 36-passenger school bus.

Biology and Driver Education have been added to the high curriculum. Class periods have been lengthened to 55 minutes each, and provision has been made in the daily schedule so girls' basketball will not have to wait until the close of football to begin as in the past.

So at the next session of the court he read off his list of the men whom he had empaneled, pausing in each case after the Christian names of the jurors so as to make the surnames more emphatic. 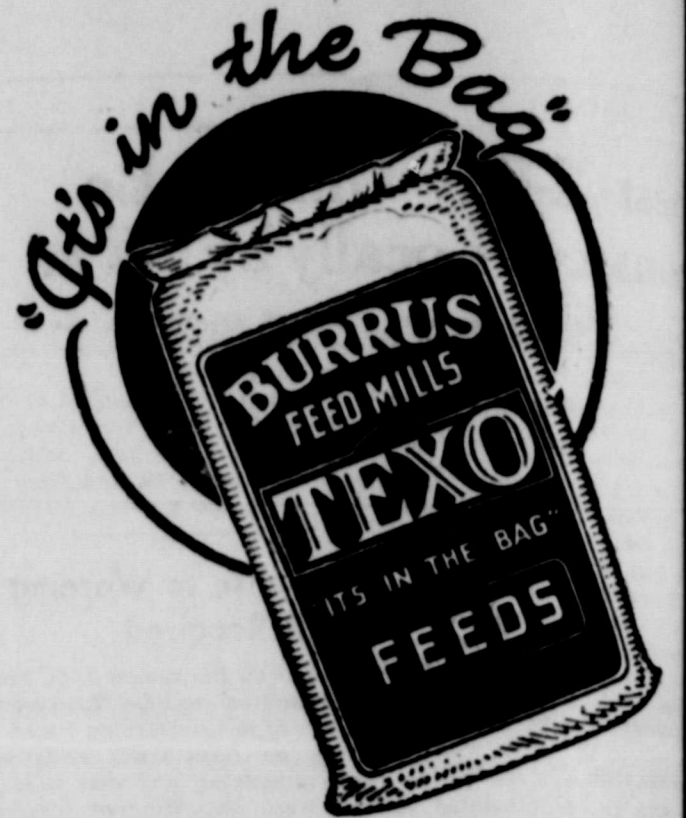

CLOTHING WORK SHOP FOR 4-H LEADERS

This week we are having a clothing workshop for the women who will work with the 4-H Club girls during the coming year. Our attendance is good and you may well be proud of the very expert assistance that your girls will get from them. CAUSES FOR FAILURE IN JELLY MAKING

Homemakers are sometimes puzzled over causes for improper jellin, sugar crystallization, "weeping" and cloudiness in homemade jellies.

Here are some of the causes of such problems.

Sugar crystallization may be caused by an excess of sugar, insufficient acid, over-cooking or delay in sealing.

"Weeping" results when the juice used is too high in acid content.

Cloudiness may be caused by imperfect straining, or by starch in

underripe fruit, often found in apple and crabapple jelly.

Failure to form jelly is due to an improper balance of pectin, sugar and acid. This improper balance may be caused by overcooking or undercooking the jelly, by undercooking the fruit in extracting the juice, using too much water in extracting the juice or using fruit which is too ripe.

Mold or fermentation of jelly may be caused by storage in warm or damp places, failure to sterilize glasses, imperfect sealing with paraffin, or not enough sugar.

"Sweets for the Family Table" is an extension bulletin you might like to have for directions and recipes for a variety of jellies, jams, preserves, conserves, marmalades and fruit butters.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance; One Hundred, Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000) for Aid to the Blind; and Five Hundred, Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly distributions, and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clauses:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

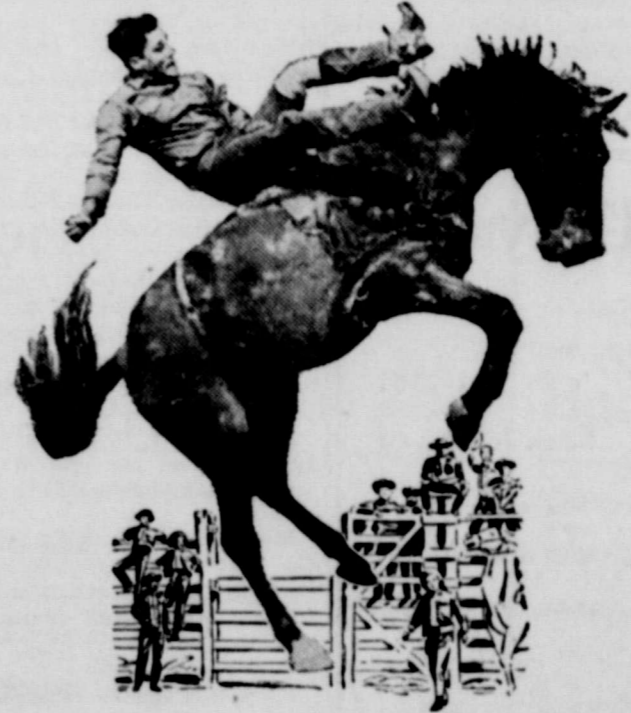

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Our cotton crop has certainly gone hay-wire the last two weeks because of the cotton leaf-worm. This worm is easy to kill if he is poisoned early and if a sufficient amount of poison is applied. In checking many fields through the week, I have found some who have had good results and some who have not. In some cases I've found not enough insecticide was applied. There are several poisons that the college recommends for the control of the worm—toxaphene, parathion, and toxaphene-DDT. This last name is good to use if there are some boll worms present also in the

field, otherwise, it can be left out and just straight toxaphene used. Two quarts of the poison should be applied to the acre for good control.

The speed that the tractor is driven is the key to the control of the worm, also the size of nozzles on the spray machine. If you will drive your tractor at four miles per hour (which is about as fast as a man can walk briskly) use three nozzles, size 3x to the row, you will apply seven gallons of liquid to the acre. This means that two quarts of the poison should be in the seven gallons. In a 55 gallon drum, which most use, 4 gallons of the poison should be added and then the barrel should be finished up filling with water. This amount of spray, 55 gallons, will cover about 8 acres. If one is using three nozzles size 3x to each row, it matters not how many rows are sprayed at one time the sprayer will still apply 7 gallons to the acre. above, more or less poison will have to be used. If traveling at 3 miles per hour, add three gallons poison. If traveling at 5 miles per hour add 5 gallons per drum. Twenty-four to thirty-six hours will be required to kill worms.

We might be overlooking a grass that will give pretty good summer grazing through rather dry years. This grass is KR Bluestem. Fay Theford of Carlton has about six acres of the grass in an old retired field that has been giving quite a bit of grazing these last six dry years.

James Youngblood, south of Hico on the Carlton road, also has a pretty good start of KR that has given his cattle lots of grazing these dry years. James is scattering seed each year over bare spots in one of his pastures in order to get more of the grass.

Might not be a bad idea to give your grain sorghum fields a good close inspection, cause the boll worm sure does like the grain. Walk through the field and look along the base of the stalks in the row and if there is some saw dust like material, worm droppings, along the row, chances are worms are in the heads. If not controlled, or the grain harvested as soon as possible, they will damage it severely.

The new egg law does not affect the producer who is selling his eggs to individual customers unless the producer is claiming some kind of a grade. This means that those producers who are selling eggs to a number of customers, delivering themselves, and does not claim any kind of a grade, can go right ahead selling eggs as they have always done. But if one wishes to claim a grade, then their eggs must meet the standards specified by the law.

A new early-matured hybrid corn which produces good yields under conditions of low moisture and high temperatures has been developed in the corn improvement program of the Agricultural Experiment Station. It is Texas 38. More on this later.

THE SOUTHERN DIET

Nutritionally speaking, Texans and other southerners are eating better these days than they were twenty years ago.

Comparing the hang-over depression days of the thirties with present-day living conditions, people will not find this information too surprising. Still, foods need not be expensive to be nutritious, and the trend of southern families toward better balanced diets as evidenced by a recent survey is most encouraging.

To illustrate, a study by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in 1936 showed about 40 per cent of southern diets to be "poor." Judging from the same standards used in that study, a similar survey conducted in 1955 indicates only about 20 per cent of southern family diets to be nutritionally deficient now.

This is not to say, however, that 20 per cent of southern families are actually undernourished since the levels of nutrients recommended provide for a safety margin over average needs.

The most common fault among diets studied was a shortage of vitamin C, calcium, vitamin A, and riboflavin, in that order. About 80 per cent of southern families were getting two-thirds of the vitamin C recommended, 90 per cent had diets providing two-thirds of calcium and vitamin A recommendations, and other nutrients studied were being consumed at an even higher degree.

The most discouraging aspect of the study was the finding that southern diets, while greatly improved, are still below those of the United States as a whole, and that there is a more direct relationship between southern income level and nutritional quality of diets than in other regions of the country.

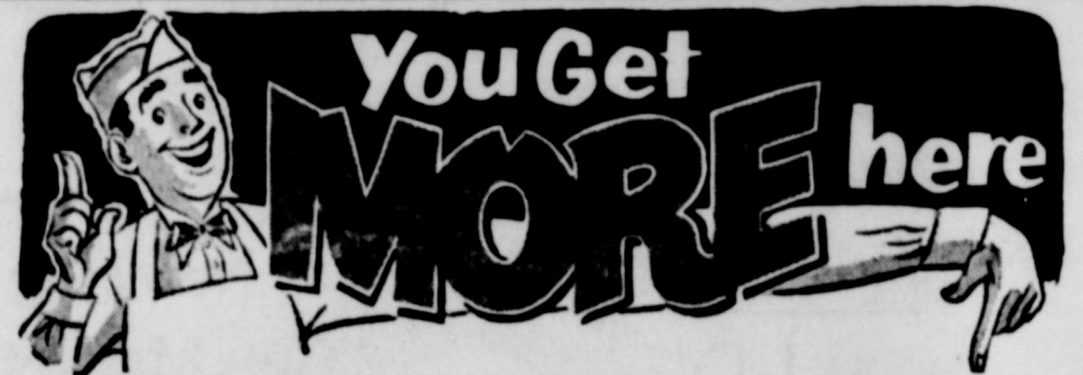
