# Every Texas County Represented In Big Farm Show At State Fair

Folks nostalgic for the country fairs of yesteryear with their mass displays of cotton, grain, vegetables, fruits and other farm produce will find much to cheer reminiscence at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas, October 5-20. For the State Fair, to live up to its name, must represent all Texas, and that means every one of the state's 254 counties.

That's a pretty large order, even for an exposition as big as the State Fair. To fill it properly, the State Fair would have to give all its 187 acres to the Agriculture Show alone. So the Fair has settled for mass displays of the major crops of the state's twelve Agricultural Extension Service Districts, those departments under which the county farm and home demonstration agents serve. In this way, every Texas county will be represented.

And the cotton, grain, vegetables and fruit will be there in abundance. Just as if the Fair had tilted Nature's cornucopia and let the green and golden harvest pour into the exhibits. The exhibits will reveal the amazing bounty of Texas' good earth.

Shown from the Panhandle will

be wheat, grain sorghums, cotton, sugar beets, alfalfa, Irish potatoes, fruits and vegetables; from the South Plains, cotton, grain sorghums, alfalfa and commercial vegetables; from the Rolling Plains, cotton, beef cattle, wheat and grain sorghums; and from North Texas, dairy products, swine, cotton, small grain, grain sorghums, corn and peanuts.

Major crops of Northeast Texas on display will be livestock, fruits and vegetables; of the Big Bend, cattle, sheep and wool, goats and mohair, alfalfa, vegetables and long staple cotton; of the Edwards Plateau, goats and mohair, sheep, beef cattle, grain sorghums, small grains and poultry; and of the Heart of Texas, cotton, cattle, peanuts, corn, grain sorghums, vegetables, peaches and pecans.

Other districts will include the Piney Woods with its forest products, broilers, beef and dairy cattle, vegetables and swine; South Texas with its flax, broom corn, poultry and beef cattle; the Gulf Coast with its rice, cattle, fruits and vegetables; and the Big Grande Plains with their citrus fruit, vegetables, grain sorghums and cotton.

### HOUSEWARES GET GLAMOUR TREATMENT

A stick to stir foods, a bundle of twigs to sweep the floor—that's all it took to keep the pre-historic household going.

Today, there are more than 100,000 gadgets and appliances, from potato peelers to electric fry pans, to make homemaking easier and more colorful.

The most important trend is one of design and color; an attempt to give even the lowly gadgets more eye appeal.

Featured colors this year include soft yellows, turquoise and pink (in about that order). Red, white and copper also are popular colors.

### CARING FOR LEATHER UPHOLSTERY

Use pure castile soap or saddle soap to clean leather upholstery or leather surfaces on tables.

Dip a cloth or sponge in warm

water. Squeeze out excess water and rub the warm, damp cloth or sponge over the bar of saddle soap or saddle soap. Rub leather briskly with the soapy sponge. Follow immediately with another moist cloth or sponge dipped in clear water. Rub dry with a clean soft cloth. Any gloss which disappears will be restored by friction of the last rubbing.

Avoid using furniture polishes, oils and varnishes on leather. These materials frequently contain solvents which cause leather to become sticky.

If leather appears to be drying out, apply a small amount of a leather dressing with the fingertips and palm of the hand.

The dressing recommended by specialists is 60 per cent pure meat's-foot oil and 40 per cent pure anhydrous lanolin, obtainable at a drug store.

Warm the lanolin gently in a double boiler until melted. Add neat's-foot oil and stir until uniformly blended. Apply only a small amount and rub into the leather until it is completely absorbed.

### HAVE YOU TRIED THIS?

Celery stuffed with peanut butter is good on a relish tray. Combine one-fourth cup peanut butter, 1 tablespoon mayonnaise, one-fourth teaspoon Worcestershire sauce and 2 teaspoons minced sweet pickles. Pile lightly on crisp celery cut in serving pieces. Chill before serving.

2. For variety, try serving home grown green beans in a tasty bean salad—with two end one-half cups cooked beans combine one-half teaspoon minced parsley, dash each of oregano, rosemary, basil, and marjoram, 2 tablespoons olive oil and 3 tablespoons vinegar. Chill and serve in lettuce cups.

3. If you want to use your empty perfume atomizer for a new fragrance make certain all the old scent is removed. To do this, fill the emptied container with rubbing alcohol and let it stand for an hour. Then fill it with hot soap or detergent suds.

After soaking, rinse thoroughly, not forgetting to wash the cap. When little is dry, pour in the new fragrance with no worry about contamination.





With the egg law going into effect, it is likely that more graded eggs will be appearing on the shelves of stores. To the housewife, knowing grades will help save on the food bill. Grade A and AA eggs should be bought for frying and poaching, where a high firm yolk and thick white are desired. These grades too would be wanted for soft boiling. In other uses like scrambled, omelettes, custards, puddings, ice cream, cakes and sauces, grade B eggs can be used with success and at a lower cost. So when buying eggs, this knowing the grades can save money.

A new hog wormer will be on the market in the near future. It is an antibiotic and is called hygroscopicin. It is good for the control of the large round worms, whipworms and nodular worms, according to the manufacturer. The material is added to the feed and fed pigs as soon as they began eating and kept in the ration until they reach a weight of from 80 to 100 pounds.

Tranquilizing drugs to keep hens cooler during the hot summer months may be the next thing we'll be adding to poultry feeds.

They said tranquilizers may bring birds through a hot weather siege without a drastic dropoff in production: lower death losses when summer temperatures soar; calm flighty, jittery birds which normally raise the roof every time the hen house door rattles. 
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NEWS REVIEW WANT ADS FOR REGULATED

This is the month that separates the outdoorsmen. Some are hunters, some fishermen, some both. How does a "both" man decide where to go—field or stream?

I'll guess with you. He goes dove hunting, if in reach of the North Zone; his mind's ear hears the shotgun blast, and his mind's eye sees the birds fall. But some of our outdoorsmen

will stick to their fishing. They'll figure that now September's here the fish will be a little bit more cooperative, maybe. Also, shrewdly, they'll think the best fishing spots may be less crowded, what with the hunters gone to the sunflower patch.

Let's talk about both of those guys—the fisherman first.

He is concerned about the black bass, and that fish has been suffering his usual case of the summer sulks.

He has been playing it cozy, down deep where the water is cool, moving around very little, using up not much energy and requiring a minimum of food. But he can be had.

Old time anglers are getting bass, these hot days, by fishing deep with minnows or plugs. Deep trolling also pays off.

The Hellbender has been a productive lure at Lakes Whitney, Texhoma, Possum Kingdom, and the Highland Lakes of Central Texas. Work it deep and slow.

The big bass are down deep as they can get to keep cool, but they have to stay above the "dead" water where the oxygen content is too low.

That may be 20 to 30 feet down, but you'll have to experiment to find the right depth in your favorite fishing hole. All depends on the water temperature and the oxygen content of the water.

If the first norther of autumn hits before this gets into print—change signals. (Which it did this week).

When that happens, your lake or stream will "turn over". That means when the surface is colder than the bottom, the top, cold water will sink and the bottom, warmer water will rise to the top.

Look for that day! When it comes, get out your top water lures and be confident of getting bass if you are fishing in good waters and using your bait adroitly.

Meanwhile, the bass will hit sur-

face lures, even in hot weather. Try them early in the morning or in late afternoon. Or at night.

**Now About Whites.**

That's black bass we've been talking about. Now, what about the white bass?

All summer, these fish have been congregating in the swift water below dams, eating their fill of shad that abound in such waters.

Many fishermen have caught limit strings of white bass all through the summer, fishing in the fast water. But now, the kind of fishing has dropped off. What's the trouble?

Well, the spring-born shad are now getting a little too big for the whites to handle. So the fish are drifting downstream, looking for other food.

They will be moving around a lot. But if your minnow or spoon is there—in the right place at the right time—you will be in business in a big way.

Work your bait deep, where the water is cool, using the same technique as for blacks.

**Work Lures Slowly.**

I suspect that most anglers work their lures too fast.

Fish like action, but they like it slow. To give an example, my fishing partner and I catch good strings of bass in the Highland Lakes, using minnows, either free swimming or with a light split shot.

This is the procedure: toss the minnow out there in bass water and let him swim. Put the rod down and pour a cup of coffee out of the thermos. Maybe you get a strike, maybe not.

But pick up that rod and begin to reel in—very, very slowly. Pretty soon, here comes a little tug. Don't get excited. Wait.

Reel in some more—very slowly. Another tug, maybe harder this time. Don't strike yet, wait him out. You can feel when he is on. Then strike, hard. Result: bass.

**Trotline Technique.**

Well, about catfishing: how often do you run your trotline?

The experts are at odds on this point. Some of them give the line a test every hour or two—others allow much more time for the catfish to get themselves hooked.

One experienced trotliner of my acquaintance belongs to the long-wait school of thought.

He reasons that a big, heavy, lazy catfish will take his own sweet time with a bream or other bait. He nibbles at it, nudges it around, contemplates it, and takes it (maybe) when the notion strikes him.

I am inclined to go along with this easy-does-it kind of catfishing.

Fishing is not much of a hurry-up proposition, anyhow. You've got to relax to catch fish. And learning to relax is maybe the best thing about this sport.

**Dove Shooters Prosper.**

—reports coming in here say the Turning to the hunting situation North Zone shooters are doing pretty well, and there are plenty of birds, though some are small.

Scattered rains around the state have not been heavy enough to change the birds' watering habits. One complaint of the dove hunters is that their birds fall in the dense sunflower patches and can't be found.

Whitewing hunters will be numerous in the Valley about now; the season being Sept. 13-15-17.
