## Two From Hico Placed on All-District 23-B First Team

District 23-B Champion Meridian and runner-up Valley Mills each placed four men on the 1957 All-District team, Hico placed two, and Cranfills Gap placed one in the poll made last week by the coaches of the district.

The Meridian team captured three of the four individual honors. Meridian's David Herring, all-district center, was voted the best lineman; Carey Von Tidwell of Meridian was named the best back; and Meridian coach Jim Lowrance was selected Coach of the Year.

Buddy Ables, Hico's versatile back, who was an all-district end last year, was named the district's Most Valuable Player.

Hico dominated the second team selections, placing six men on the 12-man team.

The first team was listed as follows:

Ends: Henkleman, Valley Mills, and Dittrich, Cranfills Gap.

Tackles: Robert Chandler of Hico, and Saunders of Meridian.

Guards: Churchman, Valley Mills and Gaskey, Meridian.

## Four Additional Long Distance Circuits Completed Nov. 18

Art Anderson, District Manager for Gulf States Telephone Company has announced that four additional long distance circuits between the Hico and Stephenville exchanges were completed November 18, making a total of five circuits now in operation with provision being made for additional circuits as required in the future.

Prior to this date, Dublin was the long distance outlet for Hico with all incoming and outgoing calls handled through that exchange. With addition of the new circuits, all through toll traffic is now handled by the Stephenville operators.

Upon conversion to dial operation during 1958 Hico will become a part of the Nationwide toll dial network with automatic connections through the Stephenville exchange on all incoming calls. Stephenville operators will handle all of Hico's outgoing calls.

Stephenville has had intertoll dialing through Fort Worth and Dallas since April 1, 1953, when it was first converted to dial operation.

## IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

## Book Reveals Interesting Facts About Bird Habits

A real service done to another person by anyone well-disposed toward his fellowman is to recommend a good book. In order to be able to commend a book one must read it and digest it and consider its message. One of the good services that this writer believes he has done to fellow mortals is the lending and gift of books to others. Now I am about to recommend such a volume to you gentle reader.

"Autumn Across America" is the title, and Edwin Way Teale is the author. Some years ago Mr. Teale wrote a most interesting volume entitled "North With the Spring." In that book of years ago, he told how he and his wife, Nellie, went for the southern tip of Florida and in a many-thousand-mile journey followed the movement of spring north to the Canadian border in the state of New Hampshire. They moved east, west, and north, at sea level and to the tops of the mountain ranges to observe spring's movement by watching the migration of migratory birds and insects, the appearance of spring's effects on trees and flowers and all sorts of vegetation. The author did a real service to Americans in writing the volume.

This new volume tells how autumn appeared from east to west in the United States as he and Nellie made the journey from Monterey at the tip of Cape Cop to Salinas, California, from first of September until winter came creeping in. They did not move in a straight line across the many miles of our

nation, but dipped south of a direct line, and then north, to see special effects of autumn in some localities famous for their marvelous displays in the vegetable realm and likewise in the avian and insect realms.

Of special interest to me is the story of the great flyways from north to south that birds and insects follow. There are four of these flyways: 1. The Atlantic, following the east coast from Maine to Key West, Florida; 2. The Mississippi flyway that extends from Minnesota to the Gulf right down the Father of Waters, additions being made to it by many birds flying down the Missouri to its junction from the Mississippi; 3. The Central Flyway which starts, in so far as the United States is concerned, in northeast Montana and sweeps down through the states and Texas to the southern tip of Texas. And this is one of the heaviest flyways of the four as it comes on toward the Texas Panhandle and right by Hico and Iredell; 4. The Pacific Flyway which follows the Pacific Coast line from Puget Sound to the Gulf of Lower California. The author describes the winds and of various kinds and how these winds blow the hundreds of birds and insects returning to certain places and areas all the way across the country. Some birds fly and make their winter homes,

while others linger in northern latitudes until the cold drives them hurriedly toward the equator. And the same may be said of the insects. As a boy, I watched the flight of geese particularly. Some of the flocks would delay their start, and then as a November cold snap would come driving from Canada to the Gulf, these late starters would come flying low and honking loudly and moving with all possible speed in an effort to outrun the frigid air. They would fly even through the night and could be heard at midnight honking as they passed. Then I would cover my head and shiver!

The author takes note of many other happenings of autumn as he and Nellie investigated some special matter. For example, what causes animals and birds and insects to hibernate and take that six-month long nap, their heart actions almost ceasing, their breathing reduced some eighty per cent, all functions of the body ceasing, such as feeding, drinking, bowel action and kidney movements. Insects likewise hibernate in buildings, hollow trees, holes in rock bluffs, and deep in the earth. His description of the harvest ants that they stopped to study in Montana is very interesting, passing on reports of the investigations of scientists, a veritable compendium of information. The harvest ant is the common red ant found right here in our community.

Wish I could give each reader of this column a copy of the book as a Christmas gift. Only reason I don't is—financial!

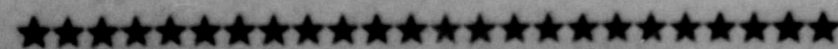

It has been the custom of many, when visiting family plots, if a grave is in need of added soil, it is dug up near the lot. We hope this can be avoided in the future as it leaves an ugly place that will have to be filled before a mower can go over the ground and we will appreciate it very much if parties needing to make a fill will get the soil at some other place. There are a number of places where curbs have been made and some gravel or sifting was left which needs to be leveled again, and this may be used for fill. We spent an hour there Saturday filling some of these places. We have about one-fourth of the old cemetery mowed and hope to get back this week and finish up the west half of that portion. Since some cotton is still being pulled, we are still unable to get help except for some school boys occasionally. We have more raking and hauling off to do before completing the work. We will

appreciate all who can, working their lots, and we still have some ten or fifteen on our list to work who have paid in during this year.

Any cash donations will also be appreciated. Our thanks to Mrs. Stella Wilson for \$1.00 handed us at the cemetery last Saturday week. Mrs. Wilson is a regular contributor and is also good to look after their family plot. Any help with either hand or power mowers will be appreciated. We expect to continue with the work until all is completed, even though the weather and Christmas holidays may prolong the operation. We are sorry that the wheelbarrow and tools cannot be kept at the cemetery, but since we have lost one new wheelbarrow and some shovels by leaving them there we have discontinued this practice. They are at my home and anyone needing them may come and get them at any time for use at the cemetery.

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## On the Home Range

Fruit cakes need time to age . . . to develop mellow, spicy flavor and good texture. Don't delay—make your fruit cakes right away if you have not already. Why not plan to do it over two days. The first day collect all materials and do the chopping, then the next day combine and bake. This might fit a busy schedule better than doing it all at one time. I have had any number of requests for a simple fruit cake recipe that didn't have "just everything" in it. I will pass along to you an old favorite of mine that fits that description. It has stood the test of three generations and I'd like to share it with you.

### DATE AND NUT LOAF (Loaf Fruit Cake)

1 lb. dates  
1 lb. pecans (3 cups)  
One-half t. salt  
1 cup sugar  
Fourth pound candied cherries  
2 rings candied pineapple  
1 cup flour  
One and a half teaspoons baking powder  
4 eggs beaten separately  
Vanilla  
Mix salt and baking powder with flour. Add to dates, pecans, etc., which have been chopped. Add sugar and mix thoroughly. Add egg yolks—mix. Then fold in whites and add vanilla.  
Pack in a loaf tin lined with greased paper and bake in slow oven one hour.

### "MANAGING" CHRISTMAS DINNER

Are you having all the relatives at your house for Christmas dinner this year? It isn't too early to start planning now if you would set yourself free to enjoy your guests. Make written plans. Begin with the menu. Check it for interesting color, appetite appeal, texture variety, harmonious flavor, ease of service, and possibility for advance preparation.

Then think through the steps necessary for preparing the dinner. Write out a work plan or schedule as you plan. Include the grocery order, time for shopping, table decoration and arrangement, equipment needed for cooking and baking, ad surface units and oven space needed for preparation. Consider refrigerator space needed. If there are several babies visiting, refrigeration for individual bottles may be necessary. Schedule time for working on foods which can be prepared ahead of time. List foods and details that must wait until the last minute.

A good plan will keep last minute preparation to a minimum. It will help you "come out even" at mealtime.

If it's a family affair, let your guests help with the final preparation and serving of the meal as well as with the dishes. They will feel more at home and a part of the celebration if they have contributed in some way.

Suggested menus for Christmas Day:

White Christmas Breakfast  
Scramble Eggs, Hot Cranberry Muffins, Frosted Grapes, Grits, Link Sausage, Butter or Margarine, and coffee.

Yuletide Dinner  
Shrimp Cocktail, Roast Turkey, Cornbread Dressing, Giblet Gravy, Candied Yams, Buttered Broccoli, Ruby-red grapefruit and Avocado salad with French dressing, Ripe and green olives, Cranberry sauce, Celery curls, hot rolls, butter, fruit cake, old-fashioned boiled custard, coffee.

### HOLIDAY RECIPES Frosted Grapes

2 egg whites  
2 teaspoons water  
2 bunches grapes  
Loaf sugar, crushed  
Beat egg whites and water together until frothy. Dip grapes into mixture, coating each one well. Drain slightly, then sprinkle with crushed sugar. Let stand overnight in a cool dry place.

Here is a make-ahead dessert you might like to try during the holidays.

Marshmallow Refrigerator Roll  
32 marshmallows (half lb.)  
Half cup sweetened condensed milk

Fourth cup water  
Half cup chopped nut meats  
Half cup finely chopped dates

Two and a half cups graham cracker crumbs (30).  
Cut marshmallows in quarters and put in mixing bowl. Add water. Add sweetened condensed milk, nut meats and dates. Blend well. Add cracker crumbs and blend well. Form into roll about 6 inches long and 3 inches in diameter. Cover with waxed paper. Chill in refrigerator 12 hours or longer. Cut in slices. Garnish with whipped cream, and top with a cherry. Makes 10 servings.

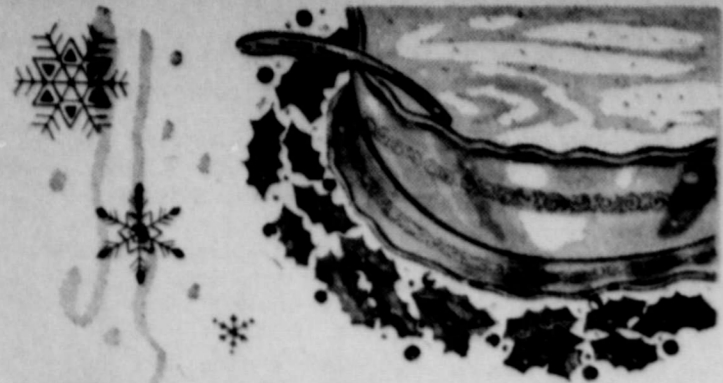

**\$100 MILLION COTTON LOSS**

The long awaited rains came to Texas this year—and came again, and again, and again.

Now that blessing has become a kind of curse in many cotton areas of Texas. Ill-timed fall rain on the unharvested cotton has caused a crop quality loss conservatively estimated as over \$100 million.

Cotton farmers in the rain-soaked areas are suffering economically now almost as much as they did during the drought—particularly in Central and East Texas. Many of them made their first cotton crop in several years, only to see it slowly ruin in the fields.

In early November, an estimated one and a fourth to one and a half million bales remained unpicked in Texas fields. The pickers could not get in the muddy rows to gather the cotton.

These unpicked bales represented a current value of somewhere between \$150 to \$250 million, depending on its grade. But the fiber quality and value dropped more each day as the rains continued.

In some areas, the farmers had to begin thinking in terms of "salvaging" his cotton, rather than harvesting it. This is a real blow to the growers who had early prospects of the best cotton crop in many years.

On the brighter side, prospects for winter grains were considerably increased by the fall moisture. But this is poor consolation to a vast number of farmers whose main cash crop is still cotton.

Most of the cotton still unpicked will eventually be harvested, even though the grade is poor. In this respect, Texas joins Mississippi this year where rains also damaged one of the best crops of a decade.

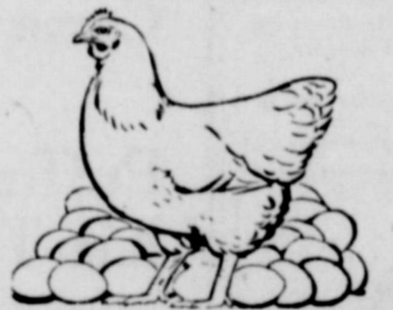
