## Residents Urged to Vote In Sat. Election

A. A. Brown will be in charge of the special election Saturday, May 17, when voters of Hico and Duffau will put their stamp of approval on the bond assumption and tax equalization proposal. The action follows the consolidation election held last month when Duffau voters expressed their desire to come to the Hico schools.

This election must be held before tax assessors in the affected counties can levy taxes for the year.

Notices of the election have been posted the past two weeks at First National Bank, the Duffau Store, and at Hico City Hall. Only one voting box will be available, that

being in the City Hall at Hico. Only qualified resident voters of the district are eligible to vote in the election. These include any person or persons who own taxable property in the district and who have rendered same for taxation.

The election means that Hico and Duffau patrons will assume the indebtedness of both districts, on an equal basis, and that the Hico district will be allowed to collect a \$1.40 tax rate from the entire area. Duffau has been on a \$1.00 rate, while Hico citizens have paid the higher rate for many years. School officials are urging each and every voter in the entire district to vote in this election.

Horace Griffiths Awarded Student Congress Scholarship

Fort Worth, May 14.—Horace Griffiths, Texas Christian University junior from Hico, was honored at the annual Student Association Awards Banquet held Friday, May 9, in the ballroom of the TCU Student Center.

He was awarded a \$250 Student Congress scholarship, given annually to an outstanding student on campus. He also received a gold key for his work as chairman of the special events committee of the Student Activities Council.

TCU's "outstanding professor of the year," chosen by the student group, was also named; he is Dr. Paul G. Wassenich, associate professor of undergraduate religion.

This is the first such presentation to be made by the student organization to a TCU faculty member. Dr. Wassenich was selected on the basis of outstanding contribution to university life.

He joined the TCU faculty in September 1957; he was formerly director of the Disciples Bible Chair at the University of Texas.

Other outstanding student leaders were also honored at the banquet.

Griffiths, a business education major, holds a special Chicago Corp. scholarship at TCU. He was publicity chairman of TCU's "Howdy Week," an activity held each fall to welcome new students to the university; and is a member of the Future Teachers of America and the Baptist Student Union.

All of us were shapen in iniquity and born of sin, so if you dig deep enough you could find some real pay-dirt. Some editors would jump at the chance to print that stuff and let us sweat. I praise you for what you have NEVER printed.

One editor scooped a story of a kidnapping, even though police and most editors were trying to keep it quiet. As a result, a little girl lost her life.

One reporter in Korea was told by military to "kill" a story. He cabled the story, anyway, along with the comment that he had been told not to get it in print. His editor got a permit from Washington to print the story, and an entire regiment was wiped out.

One editor got hold of a story about a girl who had been brutally attacked and almost killed. Instead of holding the culprits up to public scorn, he published all the intimate details about the girl's things that should have been aired only in court and only after the public had been excluded. The girl phoned the desk but she was so hysterical she was incoherent. A little while later, she took her own life.

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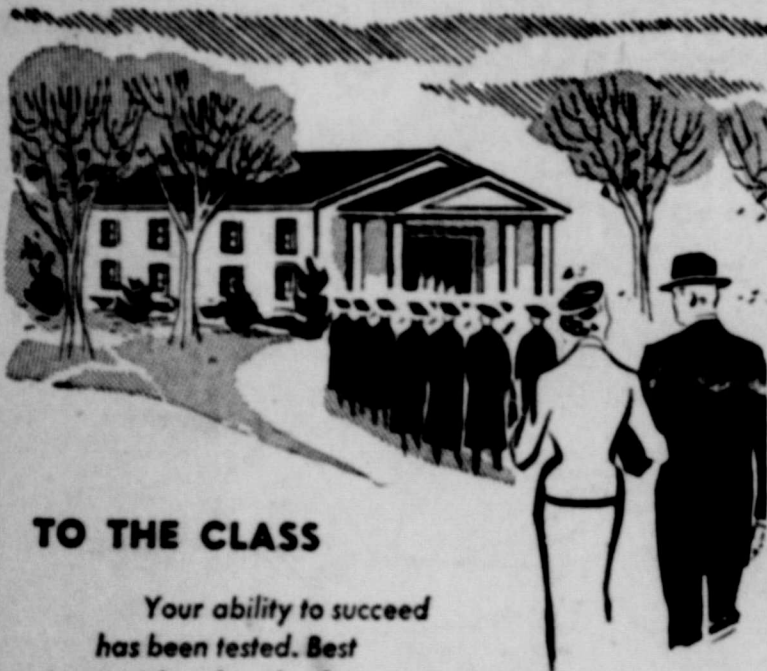
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
