about half completed this week and reports indicate that all oats will be combined by the end of next week if the weather holds Thus far farmers have had perfect weather for combining, and oats have been threashing good.

The yield this year is rather spotty, with some fields producing as much as 60 bushels an acre while others are in the 20-bushel category. The best oats reported thus far have been combined on the Ramage Farms in Black Stump Valley. On one ten-acre plot, the grain was running 50 bushels. However, the overall crop will probably average between 30 and 40 bushels, according to Jimmie Ramage.

Quality of the oats is only fair. but is better than first expected. Some of the oats have tested as much as 37 pounds, which is considered good quality.

Volunteer oats this year are averaging as good or better than oats which were sown. Old-timers in the area say that they are the best crop of volunteer oats ever made in this section.

Regardless of quality and yield. this is the best crop made in this area in several years.



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

FARM LAND PRICES HOLDING STEADY

The price of farm land in Texas and elsewhere is more than farm? An eight-page booklet is holding its own. Apparently, the available telling how to find a business recession has not had an effect on land prices any more than the recent seven-year drouth. According to a recent nationwide survey, good farm land will

continue to be a scarce commodity. During the 12-month survey period, only 31 of every 1,000 farms were voluntarily put up for sale. This compares with 57 ten years ago. As recently as 1952, more than 55 per cent of all land sales were made by active farmers; now only 50 per cent are.

There is a possibility that social security may result in some slight easing of the tight land situation, however. The acreage offered for sale by retiring farmers. is increasing.

But competition to buy land is becoming stiffer. Bulk of the demand is by farmers wanting more acres for expansion. The survey all farm real estate purchases were made by active farmers for farm enlargement. And this percentage is increasing.

Other findings showed the average value of farm real estate increased 6 per cent from the spring of 1957 through the spring of this year. 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

WITH ALL MY WORLDLY GOODS .

June is traditionally the month for weddings, and many couples will be taking marriage vows For Representative, 62nd District within the next few weeks. A certain symbolic transfer of "worldly goods" is often associated with the wedding ceremony, but under Texas law the act of marrying another does not give you the right to take control of his propery.

Generally speaking, each spouse has the right to control and disnose of his or her own separate property. The separate property of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired by either after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is

clearly proved. separate right. While the husband may have similar assets, the law accords them no particular distinction from ordinary community

Although the history of the matter is somewhat confusing, it appears that under present day law the husband has control of ordicontrol of the wife's special community property is reserved to

Certain restrictions are imposed upon both husband and wife in exercising such control. For instance, the husband cannot legally dispose of community property in such a way as to defraud the wife, nor can he sell the home

All of these distinctions emphasize the advisability of keeping proper records. By doing so the various classes of community and separet property owned by a married couple will always be easily distinguishable. Each category will then receive the special protection afforded to it by our laws.

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
