## Pageant Friday and Saturday Will Conclude Centennial

### Miss Rhoda Crist, 77, Longtime Area Resident, Buried Here Monday

Miss Rhoda Ann Crist, 77, passed away at 1:04 p.m. last Saturday at the home of her brother, Roy T. Crist, at Waco.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Monday at Hico First Baptist Church, with Rev. Dwight Lusk officiating. Burial was made in Hico Cemetery, under the direction of Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Home.

Miss Crist was a retired school teacher. She was born in Bosque County October 16, 1860, and had lived in and near Hico all of her life.

She had taught school in Bosque County, Brownwood, Hamilton and Jones County. She was a member of the Baptist Church.

Surviving are three brothers, Roy Crist of Waco, Zeb Crist of Hillsboro and Edd Crist of Hico; one sister, Mrs. R. E. Warren of Fort Worth.

The first night of the Centennial Pageant will be unreeled at 8 o'clock Friday at Kookan Field. The celebration will be climaxed Saturday night with the final performance of the pageant.

Large crowds have been attending the various phases of entertainment, and a record crowd is expected for the Friday parade and barbecue.

Goat raisers will have an opportunity to learn and see what is needed to select good replacement nannies for their breeding flock, Monday, July 7, at a meeting to be held on the J. W. (Buster) Adams ranch. Adams' place is located three miles south of Snive.

Jim Gray, Extension Animal Husbandman of A & M College, will discuss and demonstrate the selection of goats, while Dr. C. M. Patterson, Extension Veterinarian, will discuss and demonstrate the control of external parasites of goats.

Dr. Patterson will also discuss internal parasites.

The meeting will begin about 1:45 p.m. Monday, July 7.

### Firemen Ask Cooperation of People in Preventing Fires

Members of Hico Volunteer Fire Department this week issued an appeal to local and area citizens regarding the rash of fires the past two weeks. The local company has been called out ten times in the past two weeks to fight fires, which for the most part were caused due to carelessness.

In making the appeal to local residents, firemen listed the following safety precautions to be used in burning trash:

1. Don't burn trash in the open. Always use a covered barrel or incinerator.

2. Don't leave trash burning. Stay until the fire has burned down.

3. Always have a container of water handy, or a garden hose in case of emergency.

4. Never burn trash on a windy day unless a watch is stationed to take care of flying sparks.

These are only a few common rules which should always be practiced, and more especially at this time of the year when grass and weeds are so dry.

Firemen were called out twice Monday within a period of one hour. The first call was a grass fire near the Fred Jaggars farm. While the rural truck was handling this fire, members were called to the home of H. D. Hamrick to extinguish a grass fire started by burning trash.

Cooperation on the part of local people will be justly appreciated by members of the Fire Department.

### Little Leaguers Cop 4 Wins in Week's Action

Little League action last week produced four wins for the two local teams, with Hico No. 1 defeating VFW of Hamilton last Friday night in one of the best games of the season. It was VFW's first loss of the season.

Hico No. 2 pinned a 9-8 loss on Kiwanis, also last Friday night, at the local stadium.

In Monday night games Hico No. 1 again defeated VFW at Hico in a one-sided game by a score of 20-9. No. 2 defeated Kiwanis at Hamilton 16-10.

In the Friday night game, Scott Johnson went the distance for No. 1 in a game as thrilling as the score indicates. One of the key plays in the game came in the fourth inning with the score tied 1-1. Larry Crews picked up a well-hit ball to deep right field and pegged to third for an out, which probably killed a Hamilton rally.

In the Monday game by No. 1, Scott Patterson went the distance

on the hill as Hico rolled to the 20-9 victory. Two triples by Scott Johnson with the bases loaded accounted for six of the twenty runs. Bill Rutledge hit a triple which scored two runs.

No details were available on the No. 2 team.

The next game will be played Monday night at the local stadium when No. 1 and No. 2 tangle. The final game of the regular season will be played Friday night, July 11, when VFW comes to Hico for a game with No. 1, and No. 2 plays Kiwanis at Hamilton.

### Gustine Man Named Superintendent of Iredell Schools

Joe Sartor, formerly superintendent of Sidney and Gustine public schools, is the new superintendent of the Iredell school system.

Mr. Sartor has been head of the Gustine school system for the past four years, and previously was superintendent at Sidney for four years.

### Bill Blakley Brings Senate Campaign to Hico Saturday

William A. Blakley, candidate for the U. S. Senate, visited Hico last Saturday afternoon as he

brought his campaign for office to Central Texas.

The trip marked the opening of Blakley's third month of intensive campaigning. Since he announced his candidacy early in April, he has traveled over 7,000 miles from border to border, north, south, east and west, visiting in 176 towns and cities.

As he has done in hundreds of other Texas cities and towns, Blakley spent most of his time talking to local citizens on the streets, in stores, shops and business places. The conversations started with the now-familiar self-introduction of "Hello, I'm Bill Blakley," and then turned to topics of the day and whatever was on the minds of those he met.

When discussions got around to Blakley's candidacy, the lean West Texas rancher and Dallas lawyer generally answered:

"I have talked with a number of persons throughout the state, and I have become convinced that most people are concerned with constitutional government, sovereignty of the state and with the fact that their individual liberties are slipping away."

Blakley was appointed to serve a four-month interim term in the U. S. Senate prior to the special election last year.

He has never before run for public office, and up to the time of his farewell address in the Senate, had never made a public speech.

Blakley's respect for the Constitution is deeply imbedded. He claims the three governmental functions—executive, legislative and judicial—should be kept separate, and he says that the authority of the states has been usurped.

"The time has come," he said, "when the people and their truly dedicated representatives must regain control of the functions of government."

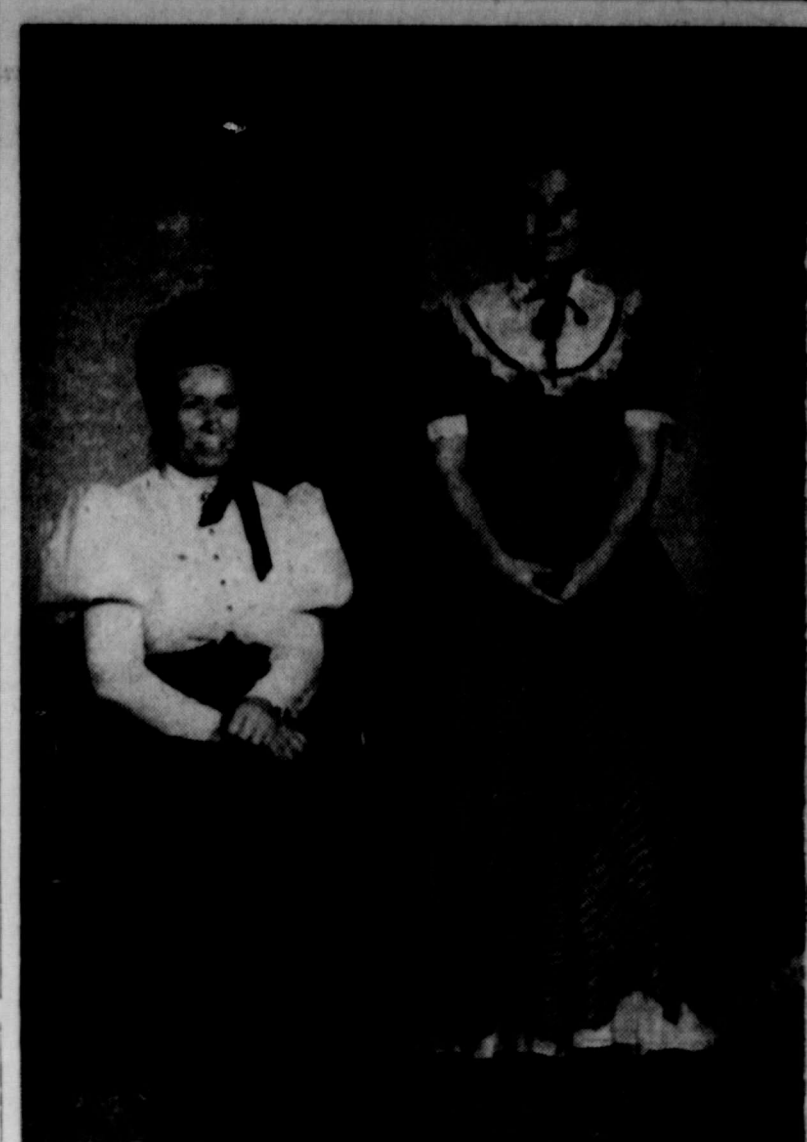

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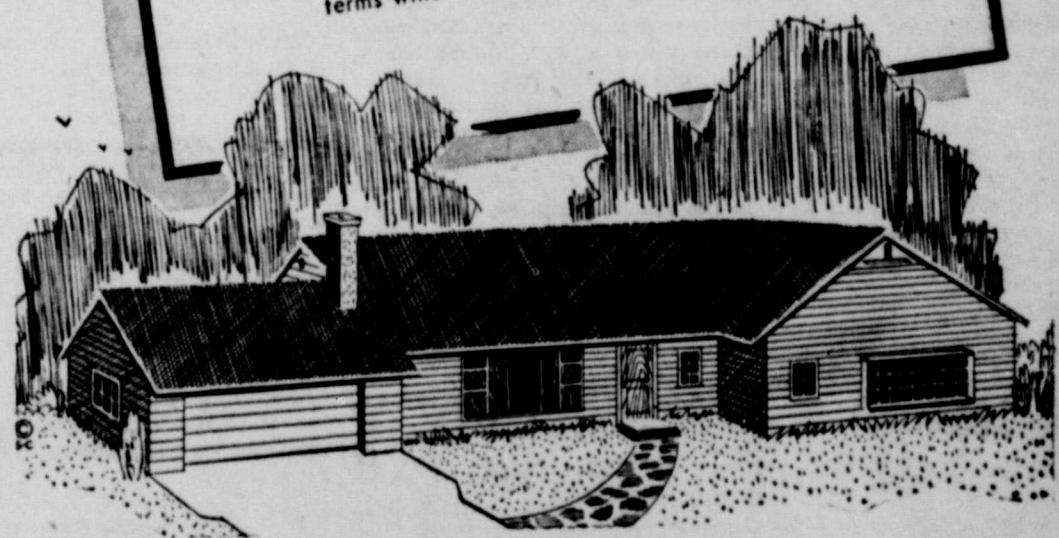

HAPPY CENTENNIAL

It is well for us to pause and look back and then pay tribute to those who came before us. Our ways change slowly sometime and sometime as swiftly as the wind. I have on my desk a copy of a book that I refer to fairly often. I believe that you will be interested in its contents and it seems rather fitting to call attention to it during our Centennial Year.

The title of the book is "The Housekeeper's Guide and Indian Doctor," containing the very best directions for making all kinds of ice cream, preserves, jellies, perfumery, and essences, fancy and plain soaps, and an excellent system on the treatment of the hair, cleaning brass, marble, mahogany, cutlery, carpets, etc. Also a complete system of genuine "Indian Doctoring." To which is added directions for letter writing, under various circumstances. The book closes with the celebrated chemical washing recipe.

This is the description on the cover page. This book was published in 1852 and is the guide that our ancestors were using when this county was settled. I am going to include here some of the directions and instructions from the book.

Directions for Sweetenings, Etc., Jellies and Preserves, Etc.

The sugar used for the nicest sweetmeats should be the best double refined; but if the pure, amber colored, sugar-house sirup, from the West Indies can be gotten, it is far preferable. It never ferments. The trouble is very much lessened by having ready made sirup, in which it is only necessary to boil the fruit till clear. All delicate fruit should be done gently, and not allowed to remain over half an hour after it begins to simmer, before it is laid on dishes

to cool. It must be put in the sirup again another half hour. Continue so to do till it is sufficiently transparent. The preserves are less liable to boil to pieces than if done by one continued boiling.

Keep your sweetmeats cool and dry, in glass, China or store jars. Delicate preserves should be kept in small glasses or pots that will not hold more than one or two pounds. Glass is best.

Cover the top, after sprinkling it over with sugar, with white paper dipped in hot, clarified sugar. It is far better than rum or brandy. Over the whole confine a cover so close as to entirely exclude the air.

Cautions Relative to the Use of Brass and Copper Cooking Utensils:

Cleanliness has been aptly styled the cardinal virtue of cooks. Food is more healthy, as well as palatable, cooked in cleanly manner. Many lives have been lost in consequence of carelessness in using brass, copper, and glazed earthen cooking utensils. The two first should be thoroughly cleansed with salt and hot vinegar before cooking in them, and no oily or acid substance, after being cooked, should be allowed to cook or remain in any of them.

Practical Indian Recipes

Rattlesnake Bite—Take green hoarhound tops and pound them fine; press out the juice, and let the patient drink a tablespoon three times a day, before breakfast, dinner, and just on going to bed, and apply the pounded herb to the bite as a poultice twice daily. This remedy seldom fails to cure the most deadly bites, and is the standing remedy among the Indians.

Times have changed some! Now mind you—I haven't tried any of these—Use at your own risk!

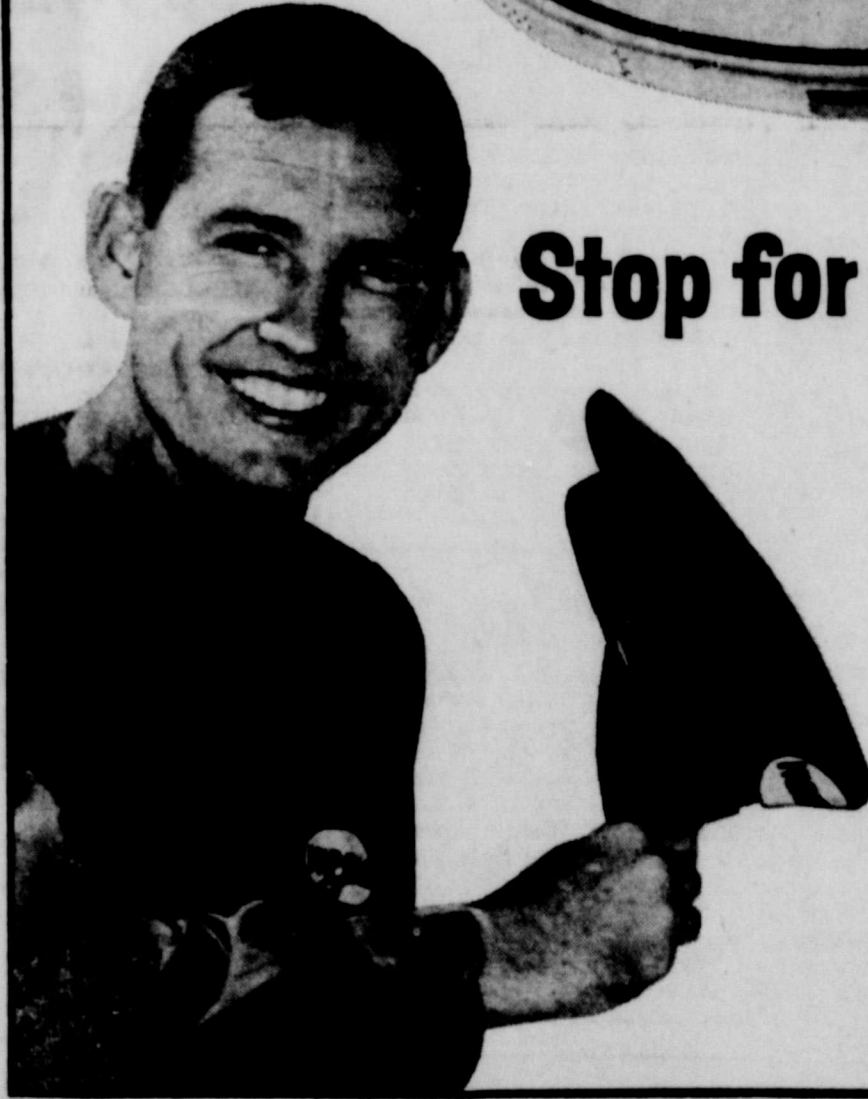

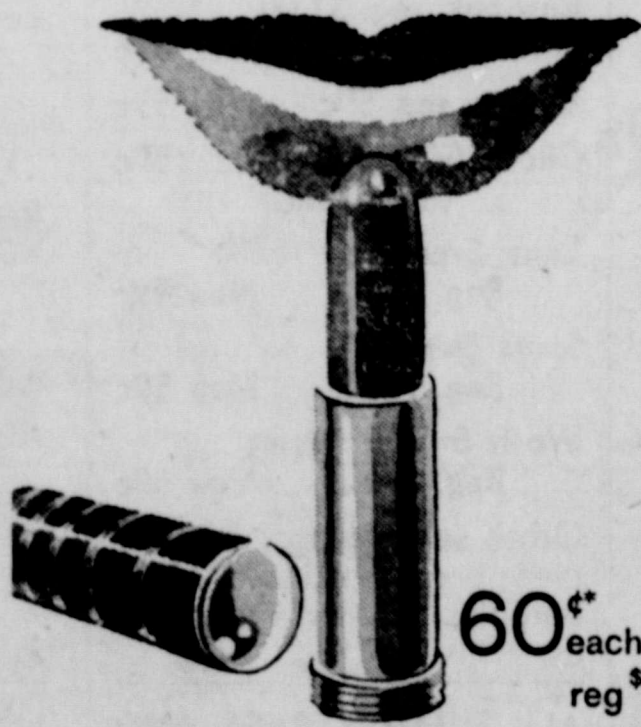

TEXAS—TOPS IN SOUTHERN FARM PROTECTION

In the few years since 1951, Texas has moved from seventh to first place among 12 southern states in the amount and enforcement of protective farm legislation.

Our state is no longer regarded as an agricultural dumping ground. Today, Texas has come into its own both as a producer and consumer of high-quality farm products.

We have asked for and received from the Texas Legislature the necessary weapons to clean up many of our farm problems. Ten years ago, we were a convenient inviting garbage pail for the nation, serving as a wide-open disposal point for bad seed, unhealthy nursery plants, poor quality eggs and a host of other inferior products.

Until the necessary laws were passed and put into effect, the old saying was "If you can't sell it here, send it to Texas." Now this picture has changed. We can put more trust in our own production and know, too, that farm goods shipped into the state must meet certain standards of quality.

The clean-up of the grain scandals through the Texas Grain Warehouse Law is a case in point. Texas was one of the first states to strengthen grain legislation after the national scandals of 1952, and no major outbreak of public fraud has occurred since that time.

Through the Texas Seed Act, seed buyers have learned that testing and inspection protects them from defraud and deceit which earlier ran rampant.

Our nursery industry was offered greater protection by the revamping of the Texas Nursery Law in 1953. Strict inspections and impartial enforcement have prevented any major outbreaks of

# Water Safety Rules

Since the writing of this last column fishing has been brought to a standstill. Due to the hot weather I think most of the fish have gone on a sit-down strike or something like that. But it is still possible to catch a few if one will work hard at it. I know that the majority of bait casters don't believe in trolling only for the last resort, but I believe if you want to catch fish, now is the time to troll and I would recommend trolling along those moss banks, and believe it or not a good bait for this time of year is a Lucky 13 but this bait should be trolled fast and not slow as is the custom in most trolling trips.

The reason I missed writing the past week or so was because of the double drownings over at the lake two weeks ago. I think now is a good time to discuss boat safety and swimming while one is visiting around the lakes and waters of Texas this summer.

Texas' first Boating and Firearms Safety Conference was held May 5 at Austin. Gov. Price Daniel in his opening address commented on the great need in Texas for a definite boating and firearms safety program, and pledged his wholehearted support of a positive program.

In 1957, 169 Texans were victims of firearm accidents and 293 drowned. Governor Daniel said in his opening address that the greatest resource of this nation is its people. Fatal accidents involving guns, boats, and swimming do not approach the magnitude of traffic fatalities, but their rate of increase is alarming, and they constitute a serious problem that has long been too long overlooked.

Since the beginning of Lake Whitney we have had to date 23 drownings which is an alarming figure. But when you figure how large the lake is and how many people visit lakes each year and this is over a period of about eight years, then the per cent is not so alarming. However we shouldn't have had this many because most of the drownings have been due to carelessness and not due to weather conditions.

Below I am going to list a few

safety rules for both boating and swimming.

### SWIMMING SAFETY

1. Use the "buddy system" when in swimming. Don't go by yourself. Have someone along—just in case.
2. Wait at least an hour after meals before going swimming.
3. Do not swim out farther than you can safely return—with plenty of energy to spare.
4. Unless you are a good swimmer, wear a life preserver and remain in shallow water—no more than waist deep.
5. Do not wade into deep water if there are high waves or strong undertow.
6. In a strange area, investigate for rocks, sticks, glass or rubbish before swimming or diving. Wear clothing or apply sunburn ointment to prevent sunburn.
7. Do not attempt to swim while wearing heavy clothes or heavy shoes.
8. While wading at the beach, wear light-weight, low-quarter tennis shoes to protect your feet from cuts from rocks, glass, shells, and debris.

### BOATING SAFETY

1. Each person should wear a life preserver at all times while aboard a boat regardless of ability to swim.
2. Do not overload the boat.
3. Keep the load balanced. If using a motor, put articles in bow for counter-balance.
4. Boats should be handled with the same courtesy as handling an auto on the highway.
5. Boats should not be used in areas where people are swimming.
6. Do not attempt to refill the gasoline tank while the engine is hot.
7. Hang onto the boat, if it overturns, until help arrives.
9. Don't stand up in boat to start engine. (And don't start engine in gear.)
10. Don't drink while boating.
11. Don't block a channel or dock.
12. Don't be a hot rod.
13. Look out for stumps, rocks, fishermen, and other boats.
14. Lower anchor, don't throw it.
15. Watch the weather.
16. If swimming from a boat or barge be sure they are anchored so they won't float away while swimming.

I hope that a few of these rules might help you to enjoy your week ends and vacations, and remember the old saying, "The life you save might be your own."

So until next week good fishing and have a safe vacation.

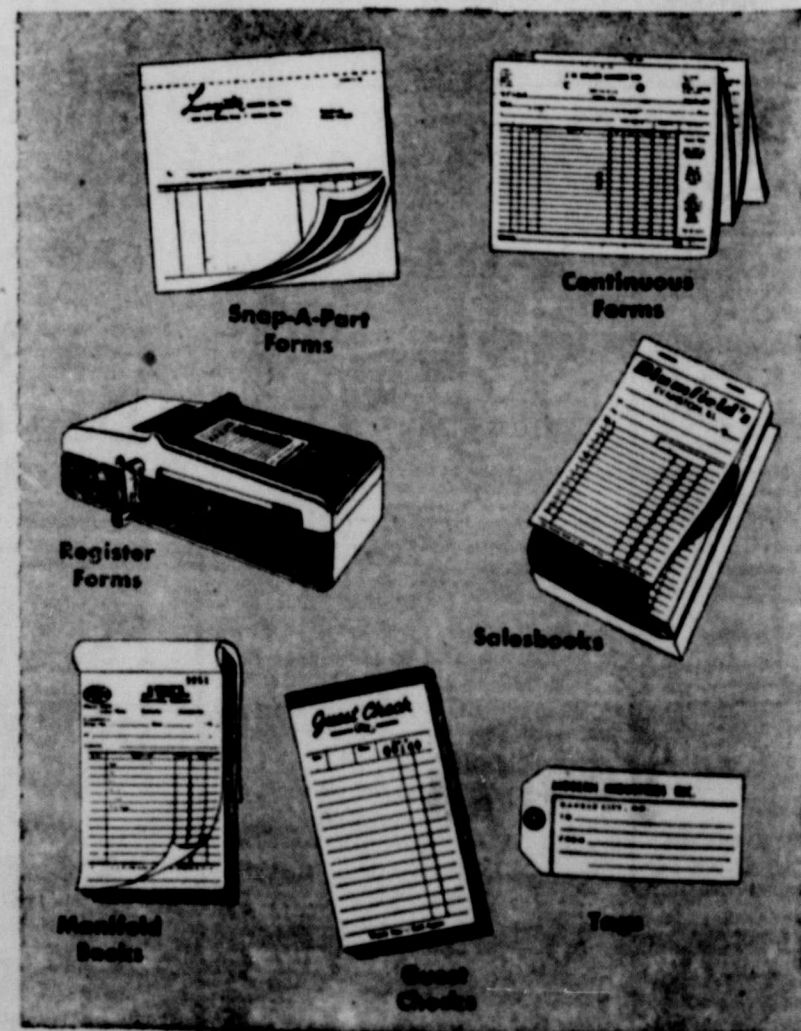
