William A. Blakley, candidate brought his campaign for office

The trip marked the opening of Blakley's third month of intensive campaigning. Since he announced his candidacy early in April, he has traveled over 7,000 miles from border to border, north, south, east and west, visiting in 176 towns and cities.

As he has done in hundreds of other Texas cities and towns, Blakley spent most of his time talking to local citizens on the streets, in stores, shops and business places. The conversations started with the now-familiar selfintroduction of "Hello, I'm Bill Blakley," and then turned to topics of the day and whatever was on the minds of those he met.




