Telephone Company Installers Begin Assembling Equipment

The second phase of work on Hico's new dial system got underway last week when Fred Weaver and Billy McHamm, Gulf States Telephone Company's installers out of Tyler arrived to begin the task of putting together the thousands of wires, relays, switches and all other associated equipment in the new central office building.

This equipment built especially for Hico by the Stromberg-Carlson Company of Rochester, New York, has all been received, and installation will proceed at a rapid pace.

To insure that the amount of equipment will be fully adequate, an additional one hundred lines has been added to the original order, making it possible to connect seven hundred telephones at the time of changeover. More lines can be added as required.

The name of the new exchange will be SYcamore, and all numbers will begin with SY 6, followed by four additional numbers. The Hico system will be connected with the nationwide toll dial network, whereby operators from points all over the United States, Canada and Hawaii can, in a matter of seconds, dial local numbers direct. On either a party-line or a single line, it will never be necessary to change a number when moving from one location to another in the Hico area. Should a subscriber dial a number that has

IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

Letter to 'Solomon Wiseguy' Expresses Writer's Opinion

My dear Brother Preacher:
Your letter came in due time, arriving today. I hasten to reply, as the State Primary Election is so near, being but a week and a day off. I really feel that I ought to reimburse you for your outlay of postage, but fear that it might embarrass you if I did.

I observe that your letter is about one of your parishioners, Mr. Christopher Columbus Mugwump, who desires to have an office in the state capitol in Austin. I am not calling in question the gentleman's character or his ability to perform the duties of the office he seeks, but it is not certain at all that I will cast a ballot for him.

The fact that he belongs to the same religious group that I do does not affect me in anywise. I know several men belonging to my group that would like to have a high office who have never manifested any fitness at all for any office.

The fact that they belong to my religious brotherhood does not of itself entitle them to anybody's vote. Any person offering himself for a public office—any public office—ought to have something

more equal to appeal to a voter than his membership in the voter's church.

Every two years when a primary election draws near some brother like you writes me and admonishes me to vote for his fellow church member. I never read such letters beyond the introduction, just as I never read your letter, and do not expect to read any others of like character. Brother Solomon Wiseguy, you may be all that your name suggests, but who are you to tell me how to cast my ballot? Perhaps your name should be changed to Smartalec, for in my humble opinion any minister who undertakes to instruct folks how to cast their ballots, is simply an all-time smartalec, or maybe a moron.

I am not saying that I never vote for a candidate of my faith. I certainly do cast my vote for some of them, but other considerations move me to give a vote to a man than membership in my brotherhood. A man offering himself for public office ought to have character and ability and to be actuated by a patriotic motive, and abstain from mud-slinging and ungentlemanly charges against an opponent. There is

quite a number of us citizens who refrain from supporting any man who resorts to such low tactics in his campaigning.

Now may I give you a bit of friendly counsel, Brother Preacher. If your church and community are normal, there is a sufficiency of things needful to be done there to keep you busy. You are wasting your time and effort writing other ministers to vote for some man of your acquaintance, and you are down-grading yourself in the eyes of your fellow ministers by entering the political field to advise preachers how to cast their votes. Stick to your job and let the politicians carry on in the political realm. You are a spiritual leader and the field is large enough to take all your time and strength and mental acumen.

Another word ought to be said. The candidate who would go to one of his brethren or his minister and try to get them to appeal to others for their votes would not get my vote in a thousand years. Let him stand on his own two legs and not try to sneak into a public office on somebody else's influence.

And them's my sentiments!

Funeral Services Conducted Monday for Mrs. Cooper

Funeral services for Mrs. Maude Hall Cooper were conducted Monday morning at 10 o'clock at the Dublin Funeral home, with Rev. D. L. Barnes, pastor of First Methodist Church, Hico, officiating. Rev. Barnes was assisted by Rev. Roy Davis, pastor of First Methodist Church, Dublin. Burial was in the family plot at Hico Cemetery.

Mrs. Cooper, long-time resident of Dublin, died Saturday afternoon in a Wichita Falls hospital following a heart attack. She had been in failing health for four years and spent most of the time in hospitals at Galveston, Big Spring, Dublin and Wichita Falls.

The daughter of George W. Hall, pioneer Hico merchant, and Mrs. Ella Hall, Mrs. Cooper was born August 30, 1889 on a farm near Carlton. The family established residence in Hico while she was an infant and resided there until 1913, when they moved to Dublin. Mr. Hall died at his Dublin residence soon after the family moved there, and Mrs. Hall passed away in 1947.

Mrs. Cooper grew to womanhood in Hico and was graduated from the Hico High School. She later attended CIA, Denton, where she obtained her degree and for a few years taught in the public schools of Brown and Comanche Counties. During World War I she organized and successfully taught a business school in Dublin.

In 1925 she accepted a position as office manager for Prall-Huff, Fort Worth wholesale distributors and was on this job ten years, resigning in 1935 to take the position as cashier at the Dallas Athletic Club. She resigned this post in 1937 and returned to Dublin and entered politics. She was elected city Tax Assessor-Collector in the municipal elections of that year and was retained by voters in that office until September 1945, when she resigned to become the bride of W. S. Cooper. Following her marriage to Mr. Cooper they moved to Corpus Christi, where he had accepted a job with the Texas Employment Commission.

From that date until October 1945, when Cooper was retired, they lived in Tyler, Denton and Fort Worth. They returned to Dublin to live in December, 1954.

Mrs. Cooper had been an active member of First Methodist Church over a period of years, maintaining an active part in affairs of the church. She taught a Sunday School class for young people for a number of years.

Mrs. Cooper is survived by her husband, W. S. Cooper of Dublin; two sisters, Mrs. Lucy Chris-

topher of Hamilton and Bessie Sowell of Denton; and three brothers, H. D. Hall of Denver, Colorado, George W. Hall of Odessa, and Byron Hall of Midland.

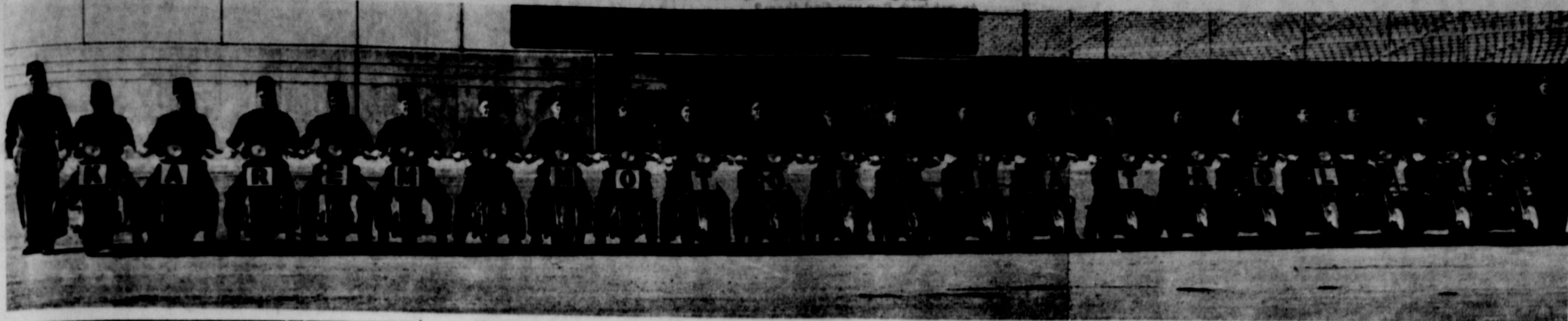

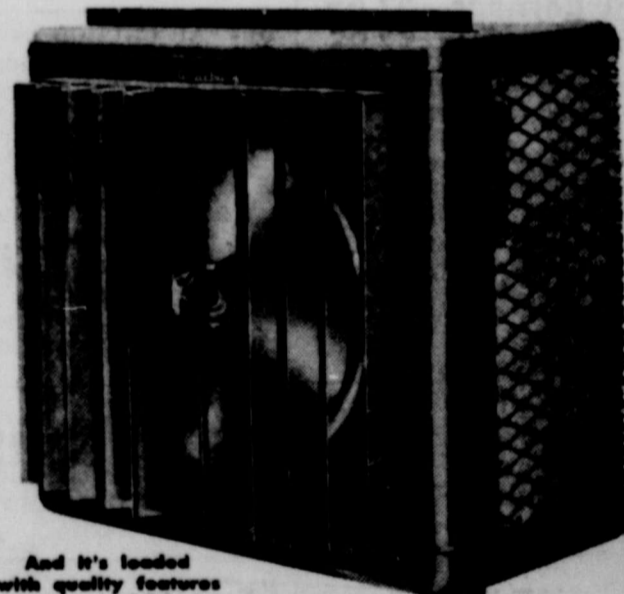

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. B. LAWRENCE

Care should be taken in spraying for weeds with machines that have had 2, 4-D used in them for weed control. This applies although one is not using 2, 4-D now.

Some cotton has been damaged from drift of the chemical when atlatide was sprayed in it for weed control. Atlatide will not drift and damage cotton, but if 2, 4-D has been used in the machine, damage can be done.

There are some machines in the county that are used only for weed control with 2, 4-D. I understand some have been using these machines to spray weeds with other materials but the 2, 4-D retained in the machine has drifted over and caused some cotton damage.

Grasshoppers are still doing some damage to various crops, gardens, orchards and field crops. I would not recommend the use of poisons at this time in gardens or orchards. And in fields, chlordane, aldrin or dieldrin will give good control when applied in proper amounts.

If livestock are not grazing pastures, then these materials can be applied as a border around field field crops in the pasture. Cattle should not be allowed to graze pastures where any of these poisons have been put out.

The Shive Grange has a good program Thursday night on farm safety and it is one that each member should attend. Then on Tuesday night, July 22, the Indian Gap Grange will also have a good program on the same subject.

young. The way you use your muscles may make the difference between that "all in" feeling and the ability to finish a big day's work and still have energy for some family fun.

Normal exercise is necessary to good health. Your body is your best household too. Use it wisely to avoid unnecessary fatigue. Here are some suggestions for good posture.

WHEN YOU STAND, stand erect and tall with feet pointed straight ahead. Adjust heights of working surface to fit you and keep things within easy reach.

WHEN YOU LIFT from the floor levels (picking up baby, weeding, looking in oven) stand close to object to be lifted and bend at knees—not at hip—keep back straight and lift with leg muscles instead of back.

WHEN YOU CARRY, try to keep your shoulders level and your back straight. Carry something in each hand to help keep body balance and permit free movement for "short hauls." If you must carry a heavy load on your arm, place it as near the elbow joint as possible.

WHEN YOU PUSH OR PULL, use your whole body instead of only your arms. Bend at hips instead of sagging your shoulders, use whole body at center of weight to be moved.

WHEN YOU SIT, use a comfortable chair or stool and sit with back straight. Work at a height so you don't have to reach or stoop over. Good posture combined with use of correct tools, comfortable clothing and positive attitude will help you have more

pep and enthusiasm for everyday living.

FOOD HINTS

1. Bacon and tomatoes are a beautiful topping for canned green beans. Simmer these tender-crisp beans with a sprig of fresh thyme—use dry if yours is not producing—then season with a little of the bacon drippings. Slice the tomatoes over the beans without heating.

2. Add instant minced onion and diced raw apple or thinly-sliced water chestnuts to chicken salad. Serve on crisp chow mein noodles and garnish with a few mandarin orange segments.

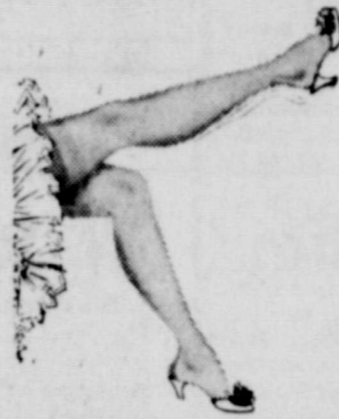

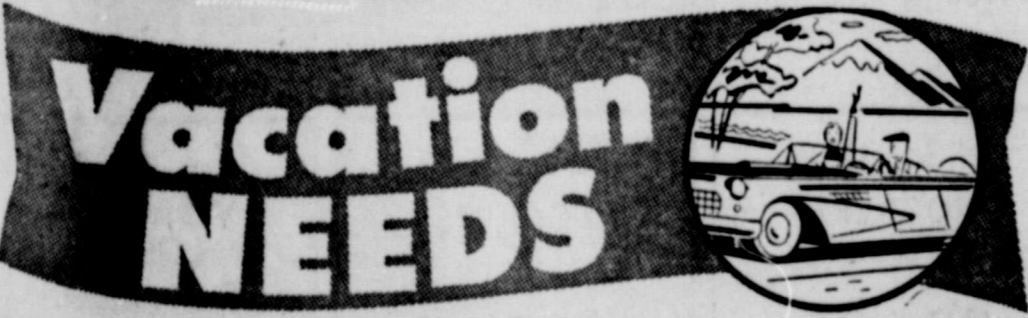
