Funeral services were scheduled Friday afternoon at 2:30 for Vernon Wayne Chew, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Chew of Hico. He passed away Monday in Norfolk, Virginia, where he was stationed with the U. S. Navy. He had been in the service for two and a half years.

Rev. Rance Forson, pastor of Hico Congregational Methodist Church, was to conduct the services at Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel. Interment will be in Hico Cemetery.

The remains of young Chew were to arrive in Morgan early Friday morning, escorted by Boatswain Mate Oscar W. Jones.

Native of Hico, Guy Eakins, 66, Buried Here Tuesday

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, July 22, for Guy O. Eakins, 66, who died Monday in Hico Hospital following a long illness. Rev. D. L. Barnes conducted the services that were held in Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel. Burial was made in Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Eakins was born February 18, 1892 in Hico and had lived here most of his life. He was a retired bank cashier of Hico First National Bank.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Iris Eakins; one daughter, Mrs. Kenneth P. Thomas of McAllen; one son, Don Otis Eakins, who is in the Air Force and stationed at Watertown, N. Cooperative Program Pays for Local Farmer

A young farmer stepped into the Hamilton office of Farmers Home Administration recently, pulled up a chair and balancing his wide-brimmed hat on his knee, began talking to County Supervisor A. J. Spence.

A short time later both the young farmer and Spence left the office and headed down the street to headquarters of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District.

Here, Spence and George H. Veteto, who heads the Hamilton office of the Soil Conservation Service, talked over the young farmer's problems.

The farmer in point was John Pitts, who today operates a prospering 31-head dairy farm three miles southeast of Hico on Farm Road 1620.

The same episode has been repeated several times in the Central Texas town in the past few months thanks to the teamwork and cooperation of the two farm agencies.

County to Benefit. The whole of Hamilton County

stands to harvest benefit from their joint effort.

It's customary these days for Spence, before setting up a land or equipment loan, to recommend that the potential borrower join the soil district and obtain a conservation plan on the place.

"Spence and one of our technicians visit the farm and estimate the cost of each conservation practice needed," Veteto explained. "The cost is then figured into the loan and money set aside and labeled for each practice—terraces, cover cropping, pond construction, or other conservation work."

Officials of the two agencies are enthusiastic with results of their first eight loan-conservation agreements.

Spence knows that a farmer with a conservation plan is a worthy risk and is more willing to bank on him.

Veteto and his conservationists are placing special emphasis and putting the "rush" stamp on FHA-SCS farm plans.

This new type agreement is distinguished from FHA's soil and water plan which already requires SCS or Extension Service approval.

Spence also is pushing conservation planning to other Hamilton County farmers who are FHA financed. He knows they can't go wrong.

Actual dollar and cent cost of completing a program as laid out by the SCS in the majority of cases, is surprisingly small.

CROPS 144 ACRES.

Take Pitts for example. He holds a livestock loan of \$1,500 on his 31 head of Holstein cows and a \$2,000 equipment loan on his four-stall milking barn. Among other equipment, the barn houses a 500-gallon stainless steel bulk milk tank.

Pitts crops 144 acres and grazes another 146. The soil district recommended six practices for his bottomland farm. Four of the practices are being done either at no added expense or by adapting existing equipment to the job. These include contour farming, crop residue utilization, enlarging existing terraces and using range grasses properly.

Cover crops and deferred grazing call for a nominal outlay. The

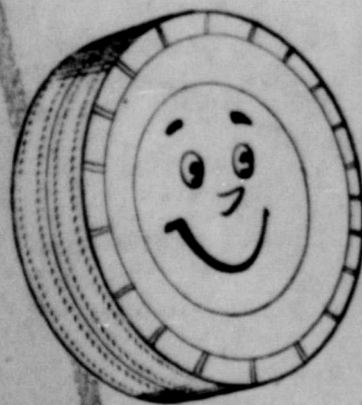

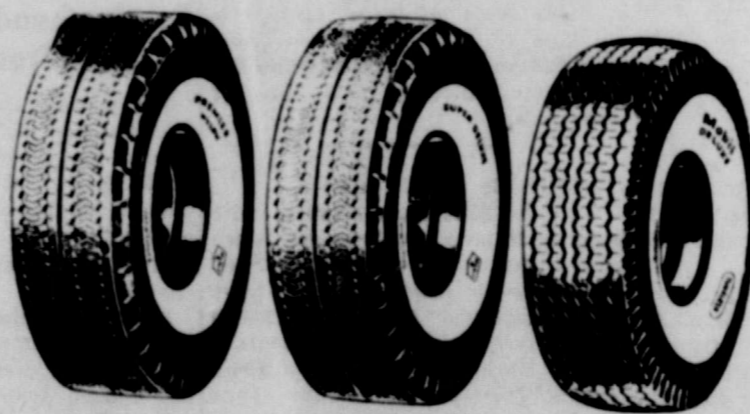

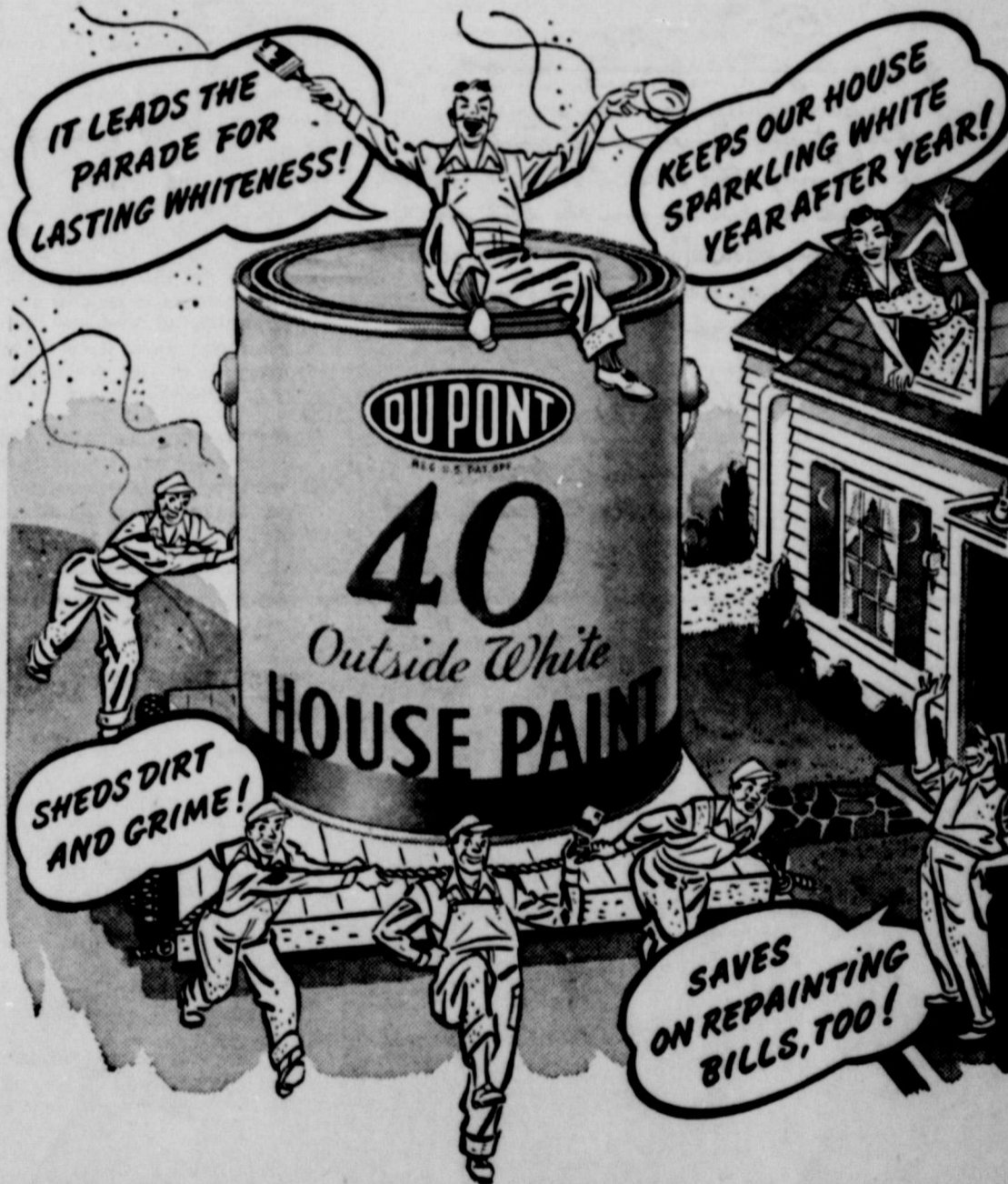

WHAT IS DOT? The Question Mark In Texas Politics Today

By ROSS WOODALL Huntsville Item

The hottest fight in Texas politics this summer may be the attempt of a few leaders of minority blocs associated together under the name DOT to win control of the precinct, county and state conventions.

What is the DOT? What is its purpose? Who are its organizers and leaders?

These are the questions now being asked, and the answers reveal the State's strongest organized effort on behalf of ultra-liberals, the NAACP, and some labor leaders to control the Democratic Party and politics of the State.

DOT is the abbreviation for the name assumed by those present at its birth—"Democrats of Texas." It has no official standing and has not been recognized by either National or State Party leaders. In fact, the group has openly worked against the Democratic leadership.

The official State Democratic Executive Committee, Governor Price Daniel and National Committeeman Byron Skelton have condemned the DOT as a "splinter group" and have accused it of unlawfully usurping the name of the Democratic Party of Texas.

Skelton has charged that DOT was "open defiance" to Majority Leader Senator Lyndon Johnson and Speaker Sam Rayburn.

The DOT state officers include the following: President: Mrs. R. D. Randolph of Houston, ultra-liberal ally of top labor officials and NAACP leaders in Harris County. She is majority stockholder (99 per cent owner) in the Texas Observer, liberal weekly edited by Ronnie Dugger. She opened DOT headquarters in the Houston Labor Council Building on Crawford Street in Houston. Mrs. Randolph was elected Democratic National Committeewoman over the protest of Senator Lyndon B. Johnson at the 1956 May convention in Dallas.

Vice-President: Alex Dickie Jr., of Denton, president of the Texas Farmers Union. This is the farm group whose State and National leaders work closely with union labor leaders and is in competition with the larger Texas Farm Bureau, whose leaders oppose the DOT.

Secretary: Creekmore Fath, Austin labor lawyer and ultra-liberal leader since his Washington service with Harold Ickes. Original directors at large included Jerry Holleman, state president of the AFL-CIO; Fred A. Schmidt, secretary-treasurer of the AFL-CIO; and W. J. Durham of Dallas, state attorney for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Three other "at large" executives were Bob Sanchez, McAllen, labor attorney, prominent in the GI Forum, a politically-powerful Latin-American organization of war veterans; and two prominent Liberal Democrats, Minnie Fisher Cunningham of New Waverly and Mrs. Lillian (Jud) Collier of Mumford.

The purpose of the DOT was declared by Mrs. Randolph "to wrest control of the Democratic Party away from Governor Price Daniel and Chairman Jim Lindsey."

DOT leadership and spokesmen are advocates of: 1. Integration. 2. Union (closed) shops, as opposed to the "Right to Work" law. 3. A State income tax.

A big question today is whether these union labor leaders will be able to keep their members in line for DOT in view of its close alignment with the NAACP. The bulk of the union labor is concentrated in Harris, Dallas, Tarrant and Jefferson Counties. Impartial

observers and union leaders agree that many union members and their families of both races are opposed to forced integration as advocated by NAACP. This is one of the main reasons given for DOT's failure to endorse candidates in the top State races. They figure it would hurt DOT to endorse State Senator Henry Gonzales for Governor because of his outspoken stand for integration. Gonzales received the NAACP "Man-of-the-Year" award in Dallas November 4, 1957.

DOT could not endorse other favorites without Gonzales, so it made no endorsements at all at its state convention in Austin May 31, 1958. However, Senator Yarbrough, Gonzalez and Supreme Court candidates J. Edwin Smith and Sarah T. Hughes spoke at the DOT convention and received ovations. Senator Gonzalez, in an interview reported in Mrs. Randolph's Texas Observer, May 16, 1958, page 5, was quoted as follows: "He said Mrs. R. D. Randolph had urged him to run. He went to Houston to see Mrs. Randolph and Bob Eckhardt. They were disturbed about DOT endorsing him, he said; he has written Mrs. Randolph a letter saying he will forego endorsement if it means disension."

SECRETARY - TREASURER - Creekmore Fath, Austin attorney long associated with dissenting Texas liberals, is secretary-treasurer of DOT. Headquarters of DOT is in Fath's law office. First DOT headquarters, established by Mrs. Randolph, was in a Houston building occupied by a local of the Electrical Workers Union.

AFL-CIO PRESIDENT - Jerry Holleman, state president of AFL-CIO, is one of the DOT's executive officers chosen "at large" of state senatorial districts.

BOARD MEMBER - W. J. Durham, Dallas, negro attorney NAACP, was a member of DOT executive board. He was "at large" member originally of the executive board of 31 members, four of seven "at large" executives of DOT represented DOT and NAACP.

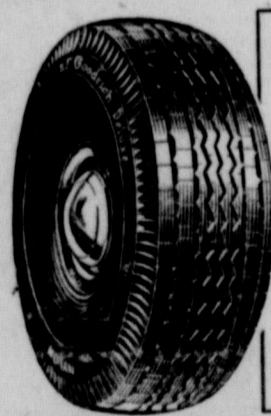

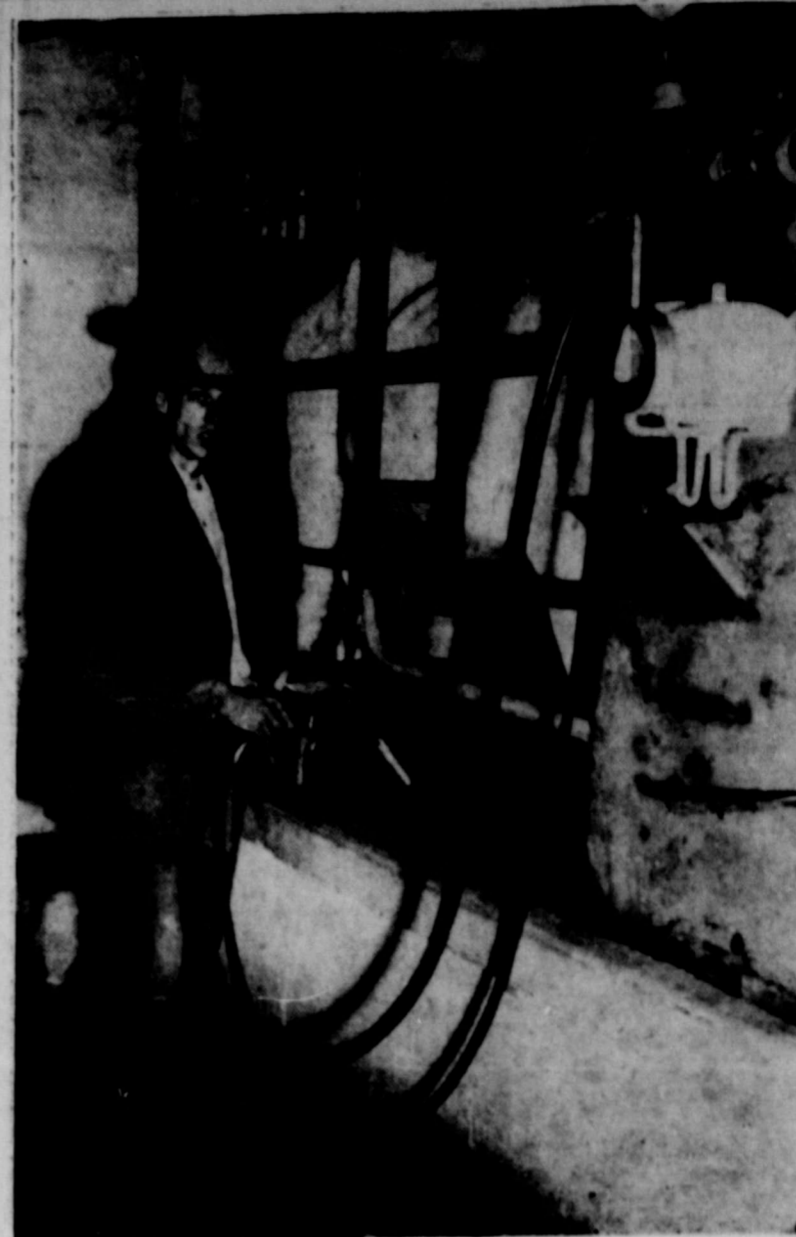

cost of seeding 25 per cent of cropland to a Hubam clover or vetch-oats combination cost \$2.25 an acre, or a total of \$225 annually.

To help whittle this cost, dairyman may use the outdoor cover for grazing.

"The cost of deferring grazing land is difficult to put a dollar value on," Pitts said. He uses a range and various types of temporary pastures to allow deferral of one or more pastures.

Two to three hundred dollars a year will adequately cover the cost, not to mention the benefit. The additional expense of conservation—added to the initial loan—will rapidly pile up profits for the farmer before the loan is completed, and Veteto maintain.

YOUNG FARMERS.

Dairymen and general farmers alike are becoming FHA cooperators. Most are young farmers.

Other area dairy farmers like Pitts who have the special loan agreement include Robert Parker, Turman C. Pearson and Edwin A. Black.

Nearly everyone agrees these days the hardest part of farming is getting started. In Hamilton County they're making it easier for a young man to turn the sod.
