Carlton Schools to Open 1958-59 Term September 1st

In the July meeting of the Carlton Board of Education the following schedule was adopted subject to modification made necessary by unforeseen events: First day of school, September 1, to be dismissed at 2:30; regular school day to begin at 8:30; and dismissed at 3:30; Thanksgiving holidays, November 27 and 28; Christmas Holidays begin on December 20 and end on December 28.

The school bus route will be the same as last year with whatever modification necessary to be of greatest service to the children. Mack Taylor, Fern Jordan, and Lewis Cox will drive. Once the schedule is established the bus should arrive at each stop within a minute or two of the same time each day. In some districts it has been found that if the driver honked the horn a short distance before each stop, it helped everyone to be on time. Patrons are urged to let the board know how the school can be of greater service to them.

Mrs. Fay Thetford will work in the lunch room again this year. She has served several years in the lunch room, and the school is fortunate in having her experience again. Mrs. Wayne Cozby will work with Mrs. Thetford. Mrs. Cozby has experience in the Midland School lunch program. The children will be looking forward to the noon break.

The Carlton faculty is complete. Members this year are: Mrs. Parrish, first and second grade; Mrs. Sills, third and fourth; Mrs. Burnett, fifth and sixth. Junior and Senior High School Teachers are: Mr. Traweck, Vocational agriculture; Mr. Latham, Elementary Principal, Coach and Social Studies; Mrs. Latham, English and speech; Mrs. Wayne Jordan, High School Principal, Commercial Work, and Bookkeeper; Mrs. Barron, Homemaking; and Supt. A. J. Barron, Mathematics and Science.

A general faculty meeting has been scheduled at the school on August 29 at 8 a. m. The board also appointed Mr. W. F. Mewbourn as custodian for the coming year.

The Carlton school budget was adopted as presented. The school budget is a carefully prepared estimate of anticipated expenditures and receipts for the school year. Mr. Sam Butler has been employed to audit the fiscal accounts for the 1957-58 school year. The fifty-first Legislature enacted a new statute which requires all public school accounts to be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant.

Local Man Chosen For Specialized Field With U. S. Navy

Windall R. Knight, TDCA, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Knight of Hico, is included in the initial group of one hundred-two Navy and forty Marine Corps men to be selected for the Navy Enlisted Scientific Education Program.

This new program, announced by the Secretary of the Navy in December 1957, to begin with the 1958-59 school year, has for its purpose the provision of highly qualified enlisted personnel with mathematics, scientific, and engineering education for scientific and engineering duties in naval activities.

Knight was chosen by a selection process which involved the writing of a competitive examination, selection by an official board of officers and civilian advisors on the basis of all available records, both service and civilian.

The program provides nine weeks of preparatory schooling for refresher purposes, which Knight completed recently, followed by not more than four consecutive years of college education leading to a baccalaureate degree in engineering and other scientific fields. These four years include campus summer sessions and officer indoctrination and training. Each selectee obligates himself for one year of service for each year of education received.

During the period of instruction he retains his enlisted status but may advance in accordance with the regularly established procedures. Upon completion of the baccalaureate degree requirements, and if otherwise qualified, he will be offered a commission. All tuition, fees, books, and other related instructional expenses are paid and each selectee receives his full pay and allowances during the entire four years.

The initial group, of which Knight was among, were selected from more than six thousand applicants.

Knight will attend the University of Texas for the next four years.

Shannon and Leaverton Vie In Second Primary Saturday

P-TA Programs Planned For Approaching Year

The theme of this year's programs for the Hico Parent-Teacher Association is "Education Is Life in the Making," which is also the State theme.

The program committee of the local organization met Tuesday night in the home of Mrs. Wayne Rutledge, chairman. Also serving on the committee are Mrs. S. E. Blair Jr., Mrs. Clarence Watson and Robert Jackson, who were all present. Supt. O. C. Cook and Mrs. Bill Howard, president of the P-TA, also attended the meeting. Mrs. Rutledge said the programs for the coming year have been planned and guest speakers have been contacted.

The first meeting of the local P-TA is scheduled Monday, Sept. 8, at 8 p. m. in the High School Auditorium.

Only four names will appear on the ballot for Saturday's Second Primary election, and election officials are expecting a small vote that day.

About the only interest in the election for local people is in the District Representative race, where Bill Shannon of Stephenville and H. A. Leaverton of Evant are vying for the post now held by Shannon.

The other race which will appear on the ballot is for a place on the Supreme Court, where Bob Hamilton and J. Edwin Smith are the candidates. Hamilton polled a large majority in the local box in the first primary.

In the representative race, Leaverton polled a majority of votes in the first primary locally, with Shannon leading Kal Segrest by one vote. Leaverton polled 111, while Shannon and Segrest were receiving 63 and 62 respectively.

A. A. Brown will serve as judge for the Saturday election.

Price Hobgood Named Head Of A. & M. Ag Engineering

College Station (Spl.)—Price Hobgood has been named to head the Texas A & M College System's department of agriculture engineering, effective September 1. He is the son of Mr. W. H. Hobgood of Hico.

He succeeds Fred R. Jones, who will retire after 38 years of service.

Hobgood joined the department in 1939 as an instructor and became a full professor in 1950. He left the department from 1942-46 when he served in the Army Air Force from which he was discharged a captain.

In addition to teaching Hobgood is widely known for his specialty of farm electrification. He has been a full time project director for the Texas Farm Electrification

Committee for several years, and was appointed by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson as a member of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Farm and Home and Structures Research Advisory Committee and now is chairman.

Also he has been active in agricultural research as a member of the Southern Rural Housing Technical Committee.

A native of Erath County, Hobgood graduated from Stephenville High School in 1929, and after one year at John Tarleton Agricultural College attended Texas A & M where he received his BS degree in 1938 and his MS degree in 1940.

Mr. and Mrs. Hobgood and daughter live in Bryan.

IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

The Case of the Unwanted

In last Sunday's Star-Telegram, Pastor Gaston Foote of the First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, had his usual column on the Editorial page, and it was entitled "Not Wanted." It is so good and furnishes so much good solid meat for thought it will stand a lot of reprinting. So we are giving to here just as it appeared.

Some things in it are worthy of special notice. He speaks of parents that have a bright child setting that child up as such a paragon of excellence that the other children of the family get a feeling that they don't amount to anything, so why try to be anything? That is so true, and this writer has seen it. And at the same time that bright child is being exalted, it is working a tremendous harm to him. He will grow up to be an overbearing dictator of the other children and will be of dictatorial disposition toward everybody he contacts. He is never normal and works a lot of injury to others while he is seeking to be the king bee in every realm he touches. He is anything but lovable, too.

NOT WANTED.

The saddest person in the world is the one who feels that he or she is not wanted. Many people have been made to feel that they are not needed, not appreciated, not loved—the boy whose older

brother is more brilliant and whose parents make him feel he is not wanted, the unattractive girl who has no real friends and whose older sister is the life of the party, the unloved housewife whose family takes for granted she is only the cleaning woman and the cook.

Dig deeply into the background of those, young and old, who run afoul of the law and in the majority of instances you find that they were not wanted, not loved by the father, the mother, brother or sister, or the people with whom they were forced to associate.

When boys and girls, men and women find themselves unwanted and unloved by those "good" people who were supposed to love them, they usually establish fellowship with the "bad" people who welcome them. Sometimes this is the tough gang on the street corner; most of the hoodlum gangs of our cities are nothing more or less than asylums for unwanted kids. The chronically drunk teen-agers at the neighborhood bar are usually unwanted escapers from the feuding homes of resentful parents.

In case one finds oneself unwanted, what is the sensible course of action? The way out is never the way down. To join the toughs and the drunks where you are welcome is to aggravate and not alleviate the situation.

First, remember that the feeling of being unwanted is, at one time or another, the experience of all men. To be sure, in most instances our parents loved us, but we have all been "kicked in the teeth" a few times. Thomas A. Edison got fired as a mail clerk because he spent too much time in his experiments. Phillips Brooks, great New England preacher, was practically kicked out of his first job as a school teacher because of the rebellion of his pupils. George Washington Carver, Negro scientist, found the "not wanted" sign hanging over several school doors before he found one that would let him in. Shut doors are the common fate of all people.

Next, ask yourself if the trouble is with you. Many a person has found that he was unwanted because he was thoroughly disagreeable. I saw a sign in an office some time ago which read: "Why be obnoxious? With a little more effort you could make yourself absolutely impossible." A lot of people put forth the effort—they make it impossible for others to get along with them.

Finally, remember that, if God is creator of the world, every man born into it is wanted of God. All of us are planned children of His love. He has a worthy purpose for us. Find it! Fulfill it! If God did not want us He would not have created us. No man is unwanted, unloved—by God.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. SJR #6—Number Two on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, authorizing each county to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to the voters qualified to vote thereon, and providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows: "(b) Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for the appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been authorized by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county. "All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, shall be received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States of America, or in any other investment approved by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of amounts likely to become due each year out of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said fund; and provided that the recipient of benefits from said fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1958, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct." "AGAINST the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct." "Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment in counties in which the subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against the proposed amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment." The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HJR #31—Number Four on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to provide that all county officials for whom four-year terms of office were authorized in 1954 must resign such office prior to announcing for a different office when more than one (1) year remains unexpired of the term for which they were elected, and providing for the filling of such vacancies in the manner now provided by law thereon. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 65 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 65. STAGGERING TERMS OF OFFICE.—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full terms provided in this Constitution: (a) County Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Judges of County Courts at Law, County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace. "Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution to the contrary, any officer elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two (2) years: (a) Sheriff; (b) Assessor and Collector of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. At subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected for the full terms provided in this Constitution. "In any district, county or precinct where any of the aforementioned offices is of such nature that two (2) or more persons hold such office, with the result that candidates file for 'Place No. 1,' 'Place No. 2,' etc., the officers

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HJR #36—Number Eight on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 45 proposing an amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-1; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance on behalf of persons who are blind, aged, dependent, or totally disabled, and for persons eligible for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided in Article III, Section 51-b of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such payments; providing that the payments for such medical care shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients; providing that the amounts paid out of State funds shall never exceed the payments out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the amounts so expended out of Federal funds; and "AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the amounts so expended out of Federal funds." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the amounts so expended out of Federal funds." PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 45 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by charter or ordinance a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters of the city an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for the issuance of a proclamation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 11 of Article XI and to read as follows: "Section 11. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or ordinance a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or ordinance a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby." "Provided, however, if any of such officers, elective or appointive, shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate, for a longer term of office than that for which they were elected, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such office are filled." Congress Reports

Washington, D. C.—It is often my feeling that the success of the Congress may be measured by some of the things it does not do, as well as some of the things it does.

Someone suggested a few days ago that the last action of the Congress before adjourning should be a bill repealing all laws passed during the last two weeks of a session.

Legislation is being ground out in the closing days until it is virtually impossible to give proper study to every measure.

However, the Congress has just passed a bill which is highly justified. Some may recall that in this column a few weeks ago was discussed the virtual impossibility of deporting aliens who are found to be undesirable, as long as the alien had money and could hire a lawyer to keep his case in the Courts. Many of these cases have been in Court for ten years or more, and the undesirable alien is still here.

The bill passed provides for one appeal from a deportation order direct to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, and if the Circuit Court and the Supreme Court uphold the order, the only other action available would be to seek release on a writ of habeas corpus on an issue that could not have been raised at previous hearings.

This measure should prevent the legal merry-go-round by which subversives and criminals with money can bring endless court actions and stave of deportations for years.

On August 6, the Game and Fish Commission sprayed Possum Kingdom with synergized rotenone to control the gizzard and threadfin shad population, which turned out very successful with a preliminary count of approximately 40 million shad killed in the first treatment. By ridding the lake of this many shad the game fish food supply has been reduced, making for better fishing over the whole lake. Proof of this began showing up as early as Friday morning after the Wednesday spraying when fishermen brought in full strings of large crappie and bass.

Dove season for this year will run from Sept. 1 through October 20 for the North Zone and October 1 through November 19 for the South Zone, except in counties having a White-Winged Dove season or special regulations. The North Zone borders on and includes Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Milam, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Cherokee, Nacogdoches, and Shelby Counties. Shooting hours will be from 12 noon to sunset.

There will be a 75-day hunting season for ducks and geese in Texas for all species except Canadas and white-fronts.

The duck and goose season will open in Texas Nov. 1 and continue through Jan. 14, both days inclusive. Shooting will be permitted from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset.

The open season on Canadas and white-fronts will be from Nov. 16 to Jan. 14, inclusive. This reduction of 15 days is the result of a decreased population of the birds, according to the biologists.

Hunters may take five ducks and-or five geese a day. The possession limit on ducks is 10, while the possession on geese is limited to one day's kill. On geese, only two Canadas or their sub-species may be taken, or one Canada and one white-front. On snows and blues five of either or in the aggregate may be taken.

Rail and gallinule season has been set for Sept. 1 through Nov. 9, with a bag possession of 15.

The coot season is the same as the duck season, with a bag and possession limit of 10. Wilson Snipe and Jacksnipe may be taken from Dec. 16 through

Jan. 14 with a bag and possession limit of eight.

The Woodcock season is Dec. 8 through Jan. 16 with four for the day or eight in possession.

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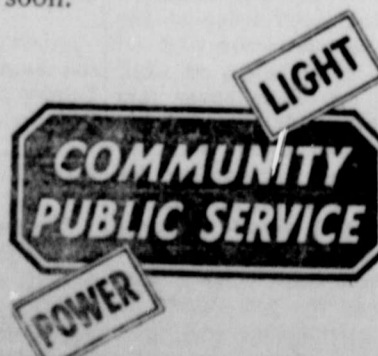

A YEAR OF GROWTH FOR THE TEXAS EGG LAW

The Texas Egg Law—a milestone in Texas agricultural legislation—is a year old this month. And the year that has passed has been a year of growth—complete with growing pains—for the law and for the industry it serves.

When the law requiring accurate labelling of eggs offered for sale in Texas became official in August of 1957, it had already suffered pre-natal pains of growth. Heat complaints were heard that, once in operation, the law would ruin the industry. This was somewhat like cussing the cook before the soup was poured. And, fortunately, once the soup was poured, the complaints began to subside and the law continued to develop.

One of the biggest factors in this successful development was the foresight of legislators and industry men who helped to design the law in providing extra months to prepare the industry for actual enforcement. In this respect, provision was made that, although the law was effective in August, those people concerned with licensing under the law were given until late October to do so, and actual enforcement of all the law's provisions was delayed until February 17th of this year.

It was this period of preparation that made possible the ordered development which we can now review. The time was utilized to print licenses and related forms which would be needed in enforcement and to formulate rules and regulations provided by the law.

In addition, a far-reaching educational program was launched to inform interested people as to how the egg law would affect them and an intense egg grading training program was set up.

Even with these months of preparatory work, however, results of first inspections during the first days of the law's enforcement in late February showed a high percentage of violations—and hinted of growth pains to come.

But the industry responded keenly to the problem and steady improvement was noted. Whereas February inspections turned up an alarming 35.5 per cent of total violations, in July of this year—one of our hottest months—violations were 7.8 per cent, an encouraging change, and an indication that everything will work out well with Texas and the Texas Egg Law.
