Maude Dickerson Strawn, widow of the late L. G. Strawn of Hondo was born in Hamilton in a log cabin on the site of the present court house, on October 11, 1875. She was one of the eight children of the late Mr. and Mrs. John E. C. Dickerson. She lived on a farm near Fairy in Hamilton County until her marriage in April of 1906 to Loyd Strawn.

She moved with her family to Hondo in 1913 and lived here until increasing invalidism forced her to go to the home of a daughter two years ago. She died in a San Antonio hospital at noon on Sunday, August 3, at 82 years of age.

Her husband preceded her in death in 1945, and one of her eight children died in infancy.

Funeral services were held from the Horger Funeral Home Monday afternoon, August 4, with interment in the family lot in Oakwood Cemetery. Bro. Luther Norman of Hondo Church of Christ officiated.

Pallbearers were Emmett Kollman, Jerry Smith, Jack Fusselman Jr., Fred Bader, Loyd Bader and Robert Schulte.

Mrs. Strawn did practical nursing before her marriage and had stayed in the Dr. Young and J. O. Richardson Sr. homes and many others in this and surrounding communities. Our deepest sympathy is extended to the bereaved family and other relatives in her passing.

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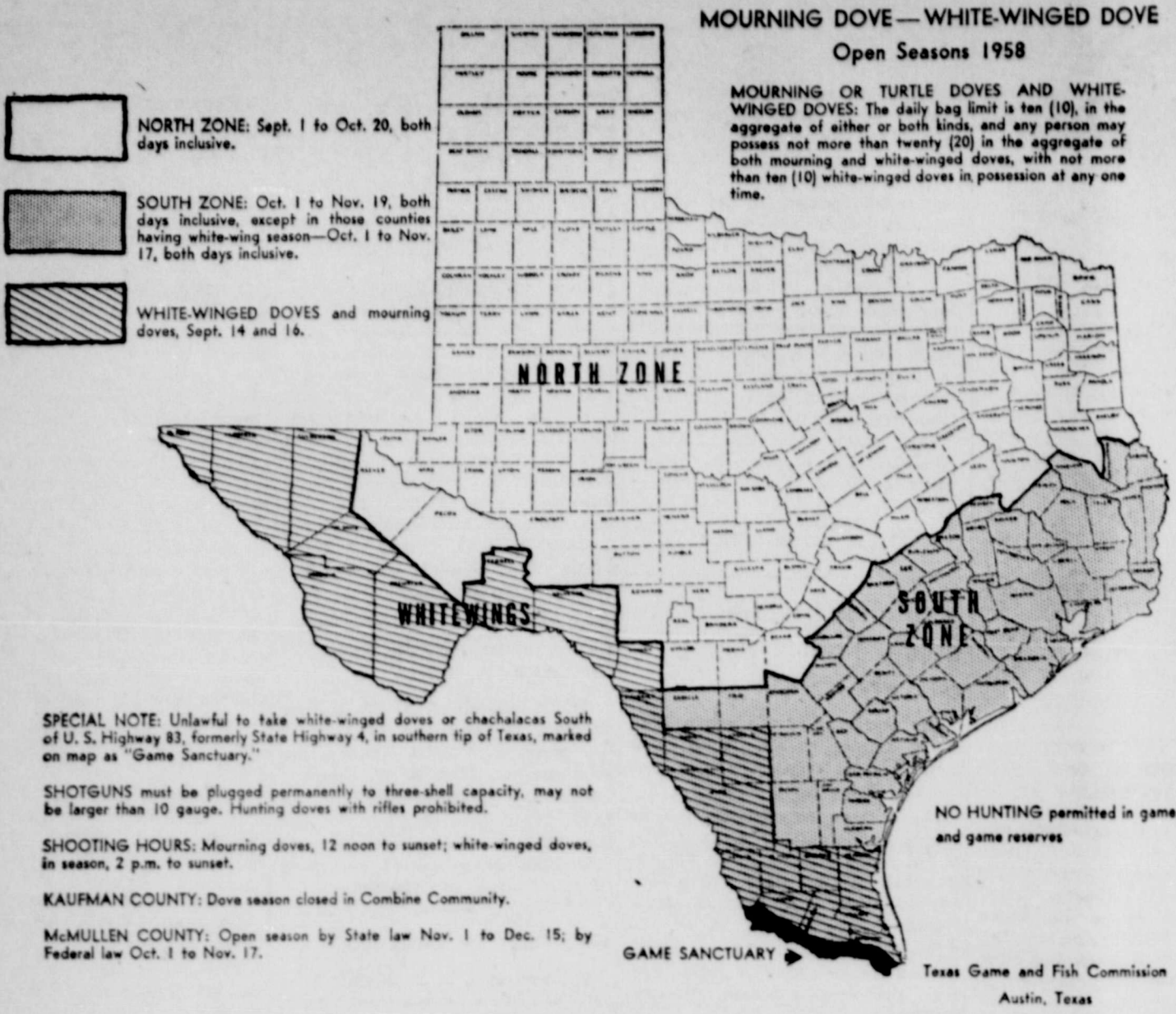

Game Warden Reports

Fishing is still at a standstill but with hopes of improvement due to the fact that the shad are starting their annual rises and this should start all the fish to feeding and schooling.

With dove season just about a week away I think maybe this would be a good time to discuss the dove and tell you a few facts about this most interesting game bird.

First of all I think we should again discuss the season for taking the Mourning (or Turtle) Dove which he is sometimes called. The

season will run from Sept. 1 to Oct. 20, both days inclusive. The bag-limit is 10 birds a day with a possession limit of 20 birds, provided he doesn't have them on his person or in a manner to indicate they were killed on the same day. The shooting hours will be from 12 noon to sunset and this will be regulated by the official sunset found in most any daily newspaper.

The Mourning Dove comes under the order of Columbi-formes, which means pigeon-like. There are found in Texas, about five different types of doves. These are the Mourning Dove, White-Winged, White Fronted, Inca and the Mexican Ground dove.

Two races of mourning doves occur in Texas. The western mourning dove, which occurs throughout most of Texas, but is more abundant in the west, while the eastern mourning dove is common in the easternmost section of the state. The mourning or "turtle" doves are remarkably similar and cannot be distinguished except by close examination by an expert.

Characters of doves are as follows: short legs and small feet, can't walk too much. The wings are well developed. All are strong flyers. The beak is always flexi-

ble and sort of fleshy structure. The crop has a group of cells which enables both male and female alike to produce what is called pigeon milk. The food is digested and then regurgitated back up into the young's mouth in the form of milk.

The dove is classed as a migratory bird meaning he follows the sun's movement. The birds nest early in Texas generally starting in the month of February and lasting up into October. The dove is not a very good nest builder and maybe the reason why is that the female does most of the nest building with only the male bringing a few sticks. The female lays generally only two eggs, the color being white. On rare occasions you will find three eggs but not very often. The incubation period for the dove is about 21 days with the babies being altricial at birth, meaning they are born with their eyes closed and are helpless. In about fourteen days the little dove are ready to leave their nests. If luck is with the dove she will some times raise three or four times during the season. About 43 per cent nest in coniferous trees (evergreens), 51 per cent daceduous trees and about 6 per cent on the ground.

The mourning dove is not colonial bird, while the white-winged dove is. Doves can put up with the drought but must have water and will travel as far as 15 to 20 miles a day to obtain it.

Food for the dove run about 98 per cent vegetable matter and 2 per cent insects. In an examination of 237 stomachs they found 32 per cent had eaten grain, 67 per cent weed seed, and one per cent containing mineral. Their choice of food is Croton weed, called dove or goat weed, wild sunflowers, legumes, vetches, and partridge peas.

The dove hasn't too many enemies but these are the Blue Jay, Cooper Hawk, Crows, and Squirrels.

I hope that this short run-down on the dove will cause you to look up a little more interesting facts on this fine little game bird.

So until next week, good hunting and fishing, and please be careful when you take to the fields and streams next week.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Ballots for the election of local committeemen of the ASC program have been mailed out to the farm operators of the county. The ballots can be returned to the local office in a self-addressed envelope that does not require any postage.

Ballots are to be in the ASC office not later than September 8. Voting is one of the things the people of this nation still have that few others have. So why not mark your ballot and mail it in now.

Jim Gilbreath, local office manager for ASC, advises that you have from now until September 26 to apply for payment rate on the 1959 Soil Bank program.

Remember, this is a payment rate application, and from what I gather it is a little complicated to work out. So I feel that the sooner you make application for this payment rate, the sooner you will be able to determine whether you wish to place your land in the Soil Bank.

January 31 is the last date for making application for loans on those crops that qualify for a loan. The loan rate is as follows: grain sorghums, \$1.89; barley, 96c; oats

67c; wheat \$1.89; corn \$1.09; cotton, .3223c.

Raymond Kinsey has a waterway that he constructed along about 1955 which is 100 feet wide and 1,320 feet long. The waterway comes down through one of his fields and carries water through it that runs on it from farms above.

He sowed K.R. Bluestem, side-oats grama and bermuda grass in it and today he has one that is well covered with grass. A waterway is something that takes time to get set well to a good grass cover, the same as getting a piece of cultivated land back to grass. This spring Raymond sowed about 15 acres of a field to K.R., Indian grass, and side oats grama about the first of April. These grasses were sowed in a field of volunteer oats and the oats were grazed until about April 15 with sheep. They were taken off and turned back onto the field about August 9. Some of the field was too wet to seed with a machine so Raymond sowed those spots by hand.

As a result of his work, Raymond has a good stand of K. R. and side oats grama and some Indian grass. The Indian grass is not as well established as the others.

With another good seasonable year Raymond should have the sowed area well set to these grasses. The K. R. and side oats are seeding well this summer.

The local ASC office assisted him in planning his waterway and also assisted him with seeding the grasses. The grasses was sowed with the grass seeding machine owned by the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District.

If hogs are fed beyond the top

That's one point to keep in mind. Another thing we know is that every year we have problems with water for our crops—usually in June, July and August. Frequently moisture at the right time would save us thousands of dollars. That's point number two. Of course we know about flood control. The volume of water that comes down the Bosque with heavy rains is such that it leaves thousands of dollars of damage in its wake. But flood control also helps to build soil. That's point No. three—and a good one. We better be thinking about something of this nature. If there is any way we can finance it we better get started. The proposition is going to be investigated.

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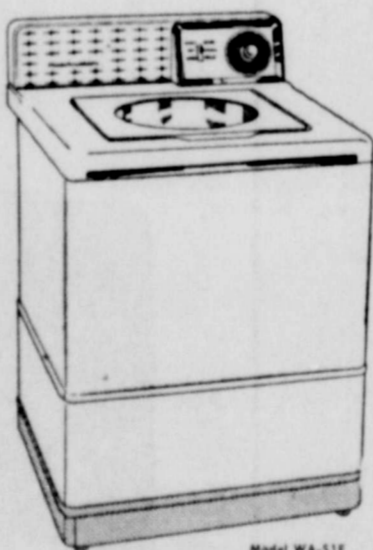
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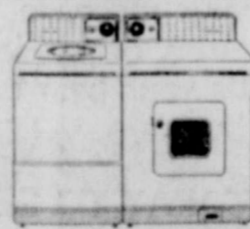
