# Veteran Carrier, Barto Gamble, Retires

Saturday, August 30, marked the end of a colorful career for Hico's oldest mail carrier, Barto Gamble. This was the last day for the veteran public servant to carry the mail on his 80-mile route. Officially, his retirement became effective Monday, Sept. 1.

Mr. Gamble received the appointment as mail carrier January 1, 1920, and has served continually ever since. However his first service as a carrier started in 1914, when he served as substitute for Lee Hukel, an old-timer whom many local residents still remember.

In October, 1919, Mr. Gamble, along with five other applicants, took the examination for the post which he now holds, and he was top man of the group. When questioned about the examination, Mr. Gamble stated that the test in those days was even more complicated than the ones given today, and that his grade IQ revealed that he was eligible for a second grade teacher's certificate.

Prior to receiving his appointment, Mr. Gamble was employed by Wieser's Roller Mill.

Mr. Gamble estimates that he has driven more than 957,000 miles during the 38 years, and has worn out more than 20 automobiles. His first mode of

transportation was a 1919 Model T Ford. Up until World War II, he would purchase a new car every year, but when the war came on and automobile manufacturers went into defense production, he kind of got out of the habit of driving a new car, and has changed every few years since then.

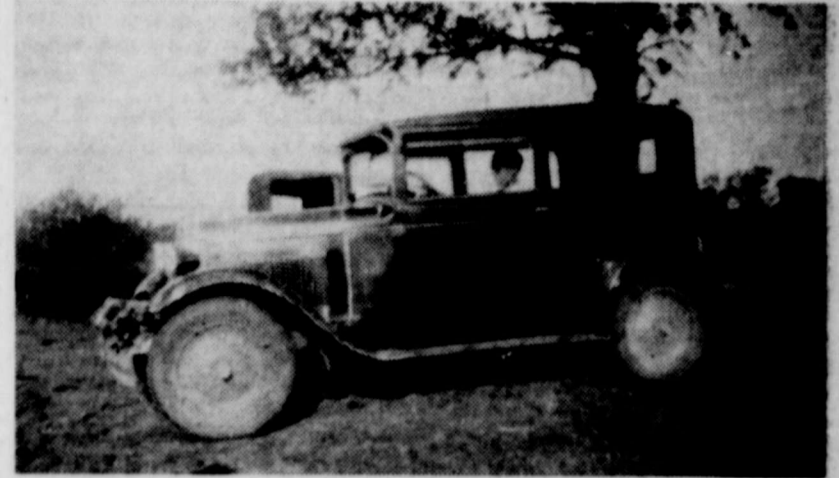
Unusual experiences have been many during the 38 years, and Mr. Gamble said he would hesitate in naming any one of them as the most unusual. However, he said that once he received 500 baby chickens to deliver to a patron during a cold, rainy winter. Coming to the mail box, the person for whom the chickens were intended failed to meet him so he drove the two miles to his house, where he found the man of the house away from home and the lady sick in bed. The patron was expecting the chickens, however, and had the brooder house warm, so all he had to do was place the chickens in the house.

Service such as this was commonplace with the veteran carrier. He will probably be remembered most by his patrons for the unexcelled service rendered. He said he carried everything from tobacco to flour to people along his route, and many times his errands included delivering medicine, and other necessities when there was no other means by which the people could receive them. People became accustomed to this fine service, and often would ask him to bring out such items that couldn't legally be mailed, although he knew that if an inspector had checked him it would have meant a strong reprimand from his superiors.

Hico having no railway express service, any time Mr. Gamble was in Stephenville, the nearest express office, he would always go by the office and ask if there was any parcels for Route 3, Hico, patrons. If there were, he would pay the charges on the items, and deliver them the next day and collect the bill.

Mr. Gamble was always quick to help those patrons who might be hospitalized or ill, delivering mail daily to patients in the local hospital. Being very popular with children, he always had candy or other treats for them on his daily route. So kind was he that several of the children have promised to spend a week or two with him!

Five persons still reside on Route 3 who lived there when Barto first took over the duties. Those are Mrs. R. O. Segrest, Mr. M. D. Booth, Mrs.

J. R. Rainwater, H. H. Wolfe, and Mrs. Emma Ogle.

During his 38 years, he has had only four substitute carriers, these being his wife, Mrs. Gamble, J. E. Russell (now of Dallas), Tyrus King, and Willard Leach.

Postmasters whom he has served under include M. O. Gleason, J. P. Rodgers, Sr., Ada Ridenhower, John Lackey, Mrs. R. L. Holford, and the present postmaster, Robert Jackson.

Mr. Gamble was eligible for retirement five years ago, but declined then, and the retirement now is mandatory. An error in a census form almost forced his retirement last year, but after intensive research he came up with proof of his age, and was allowed to carry on for another year.

When asked if he had any regrets about retiring, he said that he had had the past year to grow accustomed to the fact that he would have to retire this August, and has been anxiously looking forward to the day when he would be relieved of the duties.

What are his plans for the future? Nothing foremost, but he said he was going to rest, travel a little, visit, do a great deal of "piddling," but mostly just do nothing in general. Mr. Gamble is an active

member of the First Methodist Church, takes an active interest in the Masonic Lodge, and is active in other community projects.

On his route Saturday, his last day, people were waiting all along to greet him, and many of them left gifts for the carrier.

Saturday night Hico postal employees honored Mr. Gamble with a surprise dinner at the school cafeteria. Approximately 60 local people and postal employees from neighboring towns attended the party where William D. Barney of Dallas, assistant postal installations manager, was speaker for the occasion. Mr. Barney presented Mr. Gamble with a citation from the Postal Department for his 38 years of outstanding service.

Robert Jackson, postmaster, acted as master of ceremonies for the occasion. Postal employee guests were present from Hamilton, Fairy and Carlton, besides local employees who served as hosts for the occasion.

Both of the Gamble's children were here, these being Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Swor, Donald and Paula from Houston, and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Gamble and Marilyn Kaye of Fort Worth.

## HERE IN HICO

This fellow, George Dolan, who writes a daily column for the Morning Star-Telegram, is always writing off a good one about various people, and it's no wonder that we read with a chuckle his column in Wednesday morning's issue.

He was discussing some of the problems of the small-town editors and one of the instances seemed to fit pretty good with some of our own experiences.

Most of the threats received are mild and in the form of a letter, but one memorable occasion, a certain person who resided here threatened to take the tar out of "that young art aleck running the newspaper." However, incidents such as these are far and few in between and thus far we've had nothing more than our feelings hurt.

We're reprinting Dolan's column, just in case you didn't read it.

Small town editors, who are in lesser touch with the people than their big city counterparts, are treated more often with physical violence when they write something that gets someone's under up.

They discuss such things, possibly at their press conventions and are, generally, that their best defense is to put up a bold front. One, for instance, told me once about a fellow's telephoning him from a service station and informing the editor that he would be at the newspaper office in five minutes to pound him to a pulp.

The editor did some quick thinking. "If this fellow beats me up," he reasoned, "then half the able-bodied men in town will follow suit." So he jumped in his car, raced over to the filling station, jumped out and snarled bravely: "Where's the guy who wants a piece of me? I decided to come over here instead of waiting for fear he'd change his mind."

The fellow in question was last seen running as fast as his legs could carry him across a vacant lot.

The editor drove back to his office, let out a weak sigh and mopped a moist brow. He was convinced that, had it not been for his bold strategy, the fellow would have barged into his office and hit him to a pulp, as advertised.

The third accident was recorded about 11 o'clock Saturday night, when a car driven by Alec Kilcrease was in a collision with one driven by Elton Hayes. Both drivers are from Hico. The accident occurred near the hospital on Highway 281.

Hayes received a broken left thumb, and injuries to his left leg. Kilcrease received head cuts which required several stitches to close.

The fourth accident occurred Monday afternoon during a fire call in the city limits. A Dallas man hit the pickup which was driven by Roy French, and damaged a rear fender.

He said Jesse James was the bravest man he had ever known; he had no acquaintance with fear and did not know the meaning of the word afraid. To his friends, he was loyal.

In their cause he held his life as nothing. The bravest boldest deeds of his life were performed for friendship's sake. He was the first to lead into danger and the last to leave. He was a white man and never went back on his friends. I believe this is something for us to all think about.

Mr. Younger said, "To Jesse James' foes he was Satan himself. Fair means or foul, he arrived at his revenge. No danger was too great, no hardship too severe, no place too sacred. For days, months or years he would follow the trail, bide his time and when he struck he killed."

The boys who made up his gang him. He inspired; the blindest would lay down their lives for fealty. He could shoot and ride better than any man in his command. He loved his family and idolized his mother. Many times he had ridden over a hundred miles through enemy lines, surrounded on all sides by enemy troops, just to have a short visit with his mother.

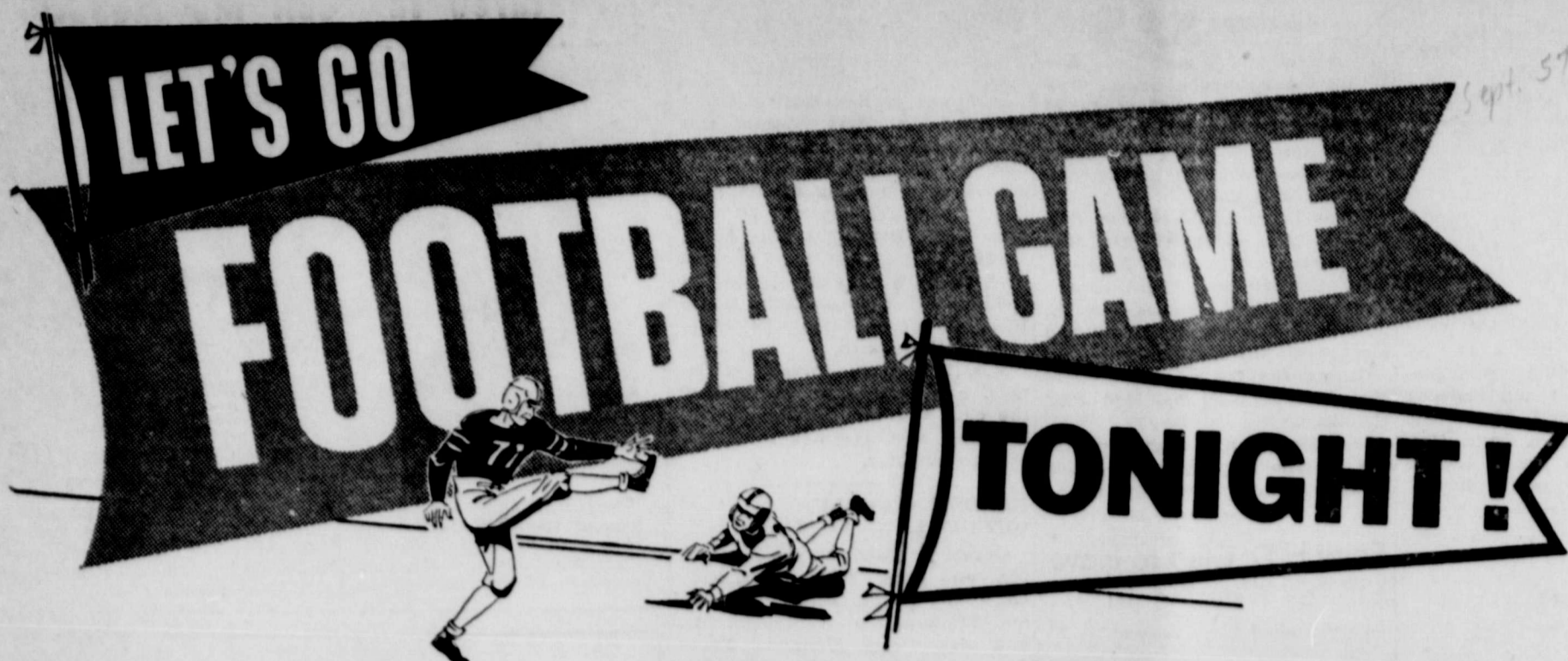

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Some 67 4-H Club boys, girls and local leaders attended the 4-H Summer Camp last Friday week at the Ann Whitney School in Hamilton. The day's program was in charge of 4-H boys and girls who lead groups in crafts, indoor and outdoor games and contests.

I believe the highlight of the day's program was when all went swimming about 3:30 that afternoon.

As far as can be found out, no one in the county is doing it, but for safety's sake don't use liquid petroleum gasses in tractor tires, or for paint guns.

Butane and other LP gasses are highly explosive, and under certain conditions, extremely dangerous.

W. L. Ulich, Extension Agricultural Engineer, says that one gallon of butane can be as powerful as one hundred sticks of dynamite. Ulich warns especially about using LP gas to inflate tractor tires or in paint guns. It is sometimes done, he says, because it is the only gas under pressure on the farm.

If there are tractor tires filled with one of these gasses on your place, be careful with them and get rid of the gasses as soon as possible.

possible. Take proper precautions when handling these fuels and use them only for what they were intended.

The Hamilton Chamber of Commerce again this year sponsored a rat program in the county and by this time there should be several thousand less rats on farms.

Some 300 places were treated from the amount of bait that was distributed. About 2,000 pounds were handled during the week's campaign. This does not take into account the number of packages of material to be used in water for rat control.

The water material is gaining in popularity in the county and many would rather use it than the bait material. Water soluble material can be purchased at several places and it is as good as the half material. But like the bait, the water has to be drunk for a period of four or five days before it begins to kill rats. The liquid is placed in chick fountains and placed around barns and feed bins where rats will be sure to drink it.

Another good way to get rid of rats is to get rid of places where they are watering. If possible, lowering the water level in troughs about six or seven inches so rats cannot get to it to drink will cause them to leave a place. Rats have to have water and feed or they will not stay around.

If you didn't get a chance to purchase the bait material, why not try some of the water soluble stuff? Follow the directions on the container.

Cooling laying houses with evaporative cooler systems not only cools the laying hens but will cool freshly laid eggs. This is an ad-

vantage to the producer as it is an aid in the production of quality eggs.

Over the state more egg producers are going to the evaporative type cooling system each year. These systems are nothing more than large pads that are placed in one end of the laying house, water run through them, and large exhaust fans at the other end of the house to pull the cooled air through. Temperatures in laying houses can be lowered as much as 20 to 25 degrees, but the humidity is raised. The high humidity could cause some trouble in a cage operation as the droppings might not "cone" properly for drying out.

# Meridian Picked to Retain Title In District 23-B Football Chase

District 23-B champion Meridian is a slight choice to repeat in 1956, but Valley Mills presents a man-sized stumbling block in Meridian's plans.

Victor Richardson replaced former coach Lowrance at Meridian and faces the task of attempting to continue Lowrance's record of three consecutive district titles.

The outlook for District 23-B by teams:

**MERIDIAN**—Fourteen lettermen return to the Yellow Jackets nest, including six regulars, three in the line and three in the backfield.

Backfield regulars from last season include quarterback Rex Cofelt (150), and halfbacks Ray Mize and John Sivadoa (190). Danny Markman (150) completes the backfield at fullback. Mize and Markman scored six and five touchdowns, respectively, last season and will comprise the main scoring threat again this season.

The strong spot in the line is at tackle where senior three-year lettermen Harry Arthur and Roger Kemp, both 170, return.

Other regulars from 1955 in the line is left end Butch Belcher (185). The other end will be Kenneth Radde (140). Guards will be manned by Byron Hayes (130) and Don Cosper (145), while Charlie Nichols (190) is at center.

Richardson points out guards as the weak spot in the line and says the team speed is only fair but with its experienced backfield, Meridian should go all the way again this season. **FORECAST**, First.

**VALLEY MILLS**—Not convinced that the Yellow Jackets should

nailed down their fourth title in a row are the Valley Mills Eagles, who count 12 returning lettermen this season.

Valley Mills is also bolstered by a strong backfield with three regulars from last season returning. Keith Sockwell, probably the most outstanding back in the district, returns to his left halfback post. Sockwell (150) scored nine touchdowns last season as the Eagles posted a 5-5 record.

Other backs are quarterback David Schmidt (160) and halfback Charles Faubion (125). Benny Powers (170), a tackle last year, has moved into the fullback position.

With lettermen at every position the line looks like this: Harlan Lane (150) and Jack Hinton (165) ends; Joe Bone (110) and Steve Pickens (155) guards; David Walsleben (170) and Van Crosley (160) tackles; and Dean Cox (150) center.

The Eagles have a little better reserve strength than last season but depth is still a question. **FORECAST**—Second.

**HICO**—The Tigers hope to use the two-year, all-district running of Buddy Ables to improve 1955's 1-7 record.

Ables (150) will team with Neil Ellis (170) at halfbacks, with Gary Duncan (145) at quarterback and Bobby Boone (175), a starter last year at fullback. Duncan broke

his foot last season and saw only limited action, will be Coach Jack Barnett's No. 1 man-under this season.

Ends will be Shelly Hooper (155) and Billy Booth (145); tackles, Rosy Vinson (160) and Robert

Chandler (240), an all-district player in 1955; guards Ronnie Hathcock (150) and James Jordan (180); and center Wayland Wooton (190).

With 15 lettermen returning and a heavy line included in the group, the Tigers are almost certain to come up in the District 23-B football world in 1956. **FORECAST**—Third.

**CRANFILLS GAP** — Cranfills Gap may be hard pressed to maintain the 4-4-1 record it posted last season.

The Lions have a new Coach, Edward Bryn, formerly of Lometa, and will be seeking at least a district win this season, after being shut-out, 0-3 by district foes in 1955.

Nine regulars return to Cranfills Gap with the backfield definitely the strong point.

Joe Marshall (150) will quarterback the team; M. J. Johnson (145) will be at fullback; and John Henderson (135), Jimmy Oglesby (145) or Thomas Hickok (135) at the halfback posts.

In the line the Lions have Herbert Meissner (160) and Joe Dietrich (145) at ends; Troy Sorenson (170) and Vernon Amundson (170) at tackles; Carrol Stanford (150) and Jerry Jackson (135) at guards, and Merrill Anderson (145) at center.

**FORECAST**—Fourth.

**EVANT**—The Evant Elks enter the district for the first time and will find their surroundings a little tougher than usual. Last year, Evant posted a 4-5 record but can count on only five lettermen returning this season.

As is the case with the rest of

the district, the backfield is the Elks' stronghold. Lettermen are at every position including quarterback Dave Bryan (145); fullback C. A. Adams (170); and halfbacks Ernie Goerch (150) and Billy Armstock (141).

The Elk line consists of ends Roy Conner (124) and Bob Lovelace (135) Bill Farr (186) and Jimmy Anderson (186) tackles; David Jones (145) and David Winters (145) guards, and Jackie Faubion (145) center. **FORECAST**—Fifth.
