Funeral Services Held Monday For M. B. Nichols

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Presbyterian Church for M. B. Nichols who died at his home at Alexander, Erath county Sunday morning at 3:25. Services were conducted by Rev. Joe R. Mayes of Abilene, former pastor of the First Baptist Church of Baird, assisted by Rev. Royce Gilliland, local Baptist Minister. Burial was made in Ross cemetery under direction of Wylie Funeral home.

Pall bearers were: Bob Norrell, Ace Hickman, Brice Jones, Lloyd Hughes, L. L. Blackburn and Clyde White. Mr. Nichols was born Aug. 2, 1872 at Grapevine, Tarrant county. He was left an orphan at the age of 5 years living with relatives until he was 12 years old when he went out to fend for himself. He worked on ranches in West Texas for some years. He was married to Mary Ann Bean in Grayson county in 1896.

The family moved to Coleman county in 1900 where Mr. Nichols was engaged in farming and stockraising until 1917 when he moved to Callahan county buying the old Wylie Lambert farm south of Clear Creek. He later moved to Baird for the benefit of our schools and later built a home southwest of Baird.

Mr. Nichols made a splendid success in farming and stock raising, and owns considerable real estate in Callahan county, also in Erath county. Mr. Nichols pet hobby was whittling and he was a familiar figure standing on the street talking to a group of his many friends whittling on a red cedar stick.

Mr. Nichols had enjoyed good health until six months ago, when his health failed, and he was confined to his bed for several weeks. They had planned to move back to Baird, but his conditions became so grave they could not move him.

Mr. Nichols is survived by his wife and eleven children, six sons and five daughters. The sons are: Cecil, Bernice, Archie and Roland of Callahan county; Floyd, of Santa Monica, Calif. M. G. of Vermont; and George in officers training school at Ft. Sill, Okla.

The daughters are: Mrs. Floyd Jamerson, Coleman; Mrs. J. L. Jackson, St. Louis, Mo.; Miss Ola Faye, Portland, Oregon; and Katie Maye, at home. He is also survived by twelve grand children and one great-grandchild.

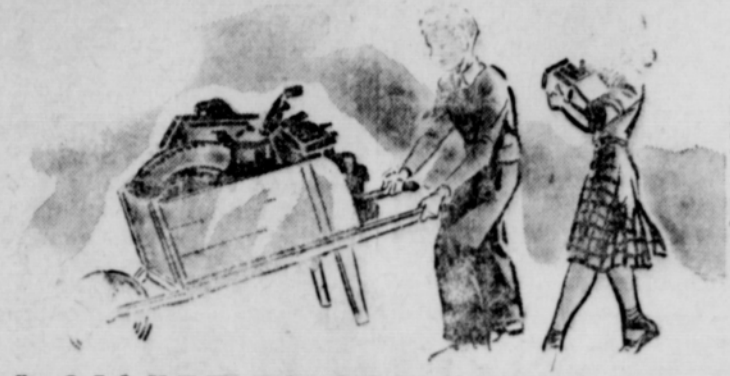

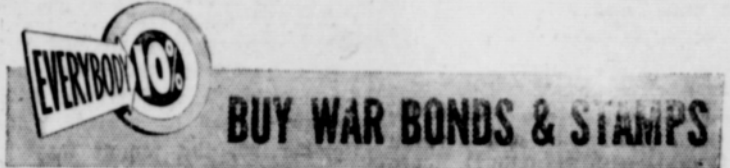

Vets of World War 1 Meet In Uvalde

Veterans of World War 1 from many parts of the State will gather at Uvalde, Texas on Sunday, Nov. 1st to select sites for Homesteads on a 3,000-acre irrigated colonization project, sponsored by the War Veterans Relief Association.

The Tract has been divided into ten-acre plots which are sufficient for the average family to become self sustaining, since the entire tract is in the Winter Garden Vegetable Growing Area and is now under irrigation. Food For Victory is the Basis of the entire program in which eventually 600 Ex-service Men and their families will settle on the tract and raise food for the Army.

More than twenty of these tracts were sold when the first contingent of Veterans visited the site on Oct. 18th for the program of Dedication. As was the case when the first contingent visited the site, Veterans who visit the place on Nov. 1st will be tendered a real South Texas Barbecue Dinner.

Christmas Mail For Soldiers Lost At Sea

Washington, D. C. Oct. 24—The Army Postal Service said Saturday that 4986 sacks of United States mail bound for the American Armed forces in the British Isles had been lost in the sinking of a United Nations cargo ship.

Much of the shipment was parcel post and represented one of the first shipments of Christmas mail.

The War Department said that the lost mail was deposited in the United States during the latter part of Sept. Mails reaching the New York port of debarkation Army post office later than Oct. 3rd were not included in this particular shipment.

The War Department said announcement of the lost mail should enable persons who mailed Christmas gifts and other classes of mail to Great Britain during the approximate period indicated to be guided accordingly. Previous announcements said gifts for men overseas should be mailed before Nov. 1st.

Gas Rationing Starts Nov. 9th At School Houses

With gasoline-mileage rationing to start November 22, 1942, interest of Southwestern motorists centers in plans for registration.

The period of registering every passenger car actually starts next week when the County War Price and Rationing Board will make available at centrally located places the application forms that every car owner will have to fill out to obtain his ration book. The filled in application forms will be turned in beginning November 9th at school houses and other designated registration places.

Between now and registration Nov. 9th, everyone has the opportunity to learn the part he is called on to play to reduce the nation's use of rubber and how to qualify for a mileage rationing book.

The first requirement to obtain a ration book will be to dispose of all tires in excess of five for each passenger car. This can be done by taking the surplus tires to the nearest Railway Express office, or in cities where there is an express pickup service the express company will call for tires if notified by telephone or mail. The tires may be contributed or sold to the Government. When they are turned over to the express company, receipts will be given and in the case of sale, the government will mail a check to the owner.

The serial number of each tire will have to be given on the ration application for each car.

Between now and the start of rationing persons driving their cars to and from work should get a ride swap ping club in operation as such ride sharing will be a necessary requirement to obtain supplemental gasoline for excessive mileage.

Above all, each driver should stay under 35 miles an hour.

In addition to preparations for registration of passenger cars by the Office of Price Administration, the Office of Defense Transportation was proceeding rapidly to supply owners of trucks and commercial vehicles with certificates of war necessity on which they will obtain gasoline, tires and replacement parts beginning Nov. 15. Mailing of application blanks has just about been completed by the ODT and machinery has been setup to issue the certificates from Detroit as rapidly as the applications are returned there.

The ODT urges care in the filling out of the forms, and where help is needed on the forms, the ODT advises truck owners to seek the assistance of the County War Board.

Truck owners will not have to register for gasoline rationing since they will obtain their ration books by presenting their certificates of war necessity to the ration board.

Mont Somes Died At Pecos

Mont Somes of Pecos, one of the best known printers in Texas, died at his home there yesterday morning at 10:30 following an illness of several years. Funeral service will be held at 10:30 this morning and burial made in Pecos cemetery.

As a young man Mont Somes worked on The Star for several years beginning back in 1889. He later moved to Waco where he worked for several years, being one of the first old-time printers to take up linotype work. He later moved to Pecos where he was engaged in the printing business for several years, later in Waco his old home.

He then went to New York where he worked on several metropolitan papers until his health failed some years ago, when he returned to his home at Pecos where he has since resided. He is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Tatum Moore, Balmorhea; Mrs. Hardin Ross, Mentone; Mrs. Dorothy Cross, of Waco; and Evelyn Somes, of New York City. His wife died some years ago.

During the time "Somes" as he was called by W. E. Gilliland, editor of The Star worked on The Star, a strong friendship was formed between the editor and "Somes". Lee Estes, who was also working on The Star, and Grant Bowlius, who was around the office much of the time.

Editor Gilliland was "Boss" to the young men. This friendship lasted throughout the years; "30" was written first for the "Boss", later for Lee Estes and a few months ago for Grant Bowlius and now for "Somes" the last surviving member of the group.

These requirements are contained in an amendment to the Hotel and Rooming House Regulations governing the Abilene Defense Rental Area comprising the counties of Taylor, Jones and Callahan.

All records showing the rent for each period of occupancy and number of occupants during the 30-day period, or the date, which was used to determine the maximum rent, must be preserved and made available to the area rent director. This 30-day period includes the designated date of the maximum rent regulations and the preceding 29 days.

The other requirement of the amendment stipulates that now every landlord of an establishment containing more than 20 rooms must keep and make available for examination records as to the rent and number of occupants of each room, and the name and permanent address of each occupant. For establishments containing less than 20 rooms, landlords are to keep such record as they have in the past, and preserve them and make them available for examination by the area rent director.

Eviction of tenants from houses in areas where federal rent control is in effect by the sale of houses is now under rigid control of three additional amendments to the rent regulations governing the Abilene Defense-Rental Area, according to Russell S. Stephens, area rent director.

Two requirements must be met before the purchaser can obtain the right to occupy property which is now rented--(1) payment of one-third of the purchase price must be made before a certificate authorizing eviction will be issued by the Area Rent Director, and (2) three months must pass after the issuance of the certificate before the present tenant can be forced to vacate. Money received to make this one-third payment will not be considered as satisfying this requirement.

This amendment changes the eviction section of the Maximum Rent Regulations which governs this defense-rental area and tightens the control of the Office of Price Administration over unwarranted sales. Heretofore, eviction actions could be brought without application to the area rent director if the owner wanted to recover possessions for use by himself, his family or dependents." The amendment limits this right of recovery to use by the owner alone striking out "his family or dependents." When an eviction is sought on this ground, the owner must report to the Area Rent Director if he rents the house within six months after the eviction.

By another amendment to the rent regulations now effective, the Area Rent Office will have knowledge of every eviction action started regardless of the grounds. In the past landlords were required to notify the OPA Rent Office of all eviction actions except an action started on the grounds of non-payment of the legal rent. Under this made even when the action is on that ground.

A third amendment covering the situation where a tenant had entered into a lease with the option to buy the housing accommodations. If such agreement had been made prior to October 20, the tenant may make application to the Area Rent Director in excess of the maximum rent. If the tenant does not apply for such authorization, the payments can not exceed the maximum rent even though the lease-option agreement calls for higher payments. A lease with option to buy entered into after October 25 can not call for payments in excess of maximum rents.

Study of the problem of evictions resulting from sales of rental housing has been under way by the Office of Price Administration for some time. From all over the Nation, reports have been received that the war program was being seriously hindered by such evictions. Labor leaders, war plant owners

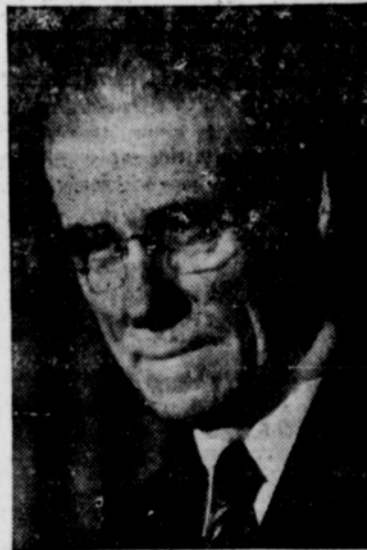
