# Game Warden Reports

Well it looks like I have a lot of catching up to do, being that I have just finished a nice vacation and really feel rested. While lots of people in the city look forward to coming to the lakes and streams to rest and fish, this warden and his wife spent an enjoyable week in Fort Worth visiting his parents and spending a lot of time doing nothing but just plain resting.

Now that I have returned I find that we have had several good rains and just enough to stir the Bosque River to cause the yellow-cat to start biting. Also this being the month of June, the black bass should be going to town on top-water baits of all kinds and I do know that the sand bass and crappie fishing has improved considerably with most of them being caught at night.

I also note that Lake Whitney has claimed another victim, which brings the total near 27, and this should be a constant reminder for us to use all of our common sense while we are boating and fishing, and not to mar our holidays and vacations by acts of carelessness and tragedy.

I am not a sailor, but somewhere I have seen a list of rules, "Boating Ethics" and who wrote them I do not know. They went like this:

1. Keep right when meeting another craft.
2. The boat ahead has the right of way.
3. Give way to any dangerous maneuvers.
4. Sail boats have right of way over power boats.
5. Fishing boats have right of way over other boats in open water, but are not allowed to operate in navigation channels.
6. Boats leaving the pier have no right of way until clear.
7. Pass left of red light, leaving red light on your right.
8. One short blast to turn right; two short blasts to turn left; three short blasts for reverse; flashing light means proceed with caution.

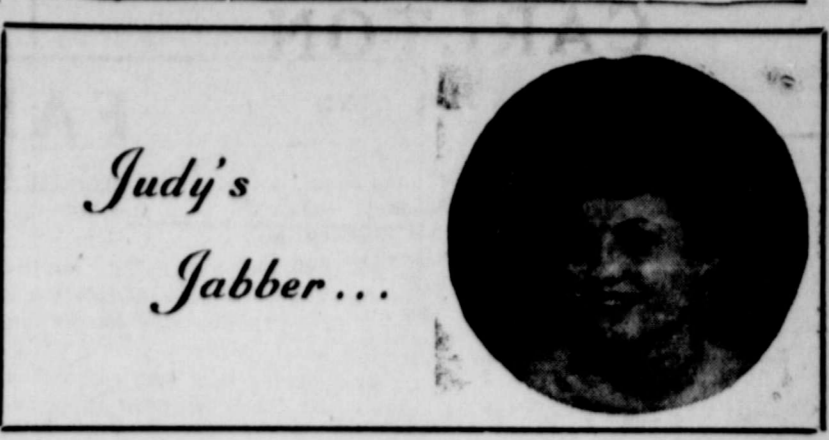
Mrs. Johnson was chosen to be a delegate to the State Convention at Galveston next September.

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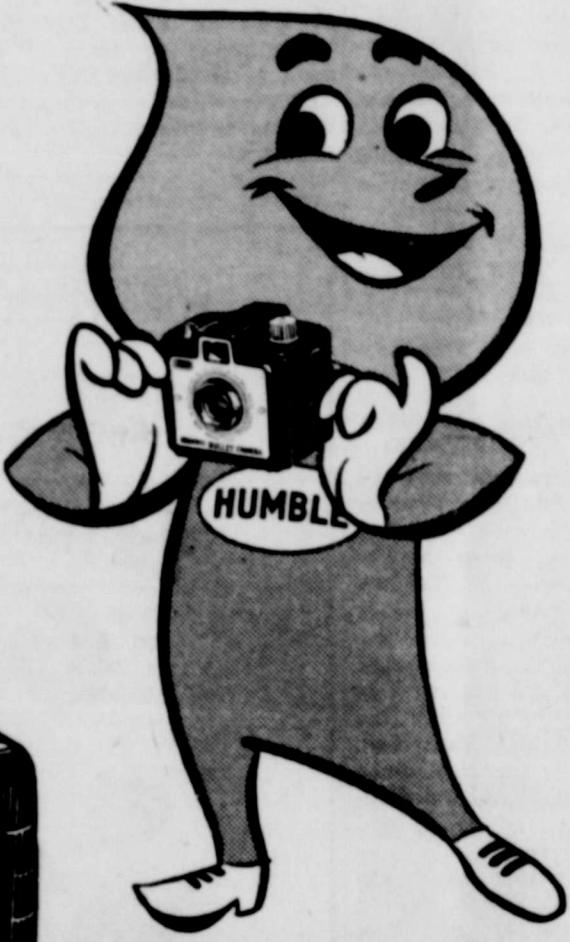

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. B. LAWRENCE

There is an increased use each year of growth-regulator herbicides such as 2,4-D, 2,4,5-T and similar chemicals. There are three kinds of formulations of these chemicals. They are volatile, high volatile and amine. Of these three the College recommends the use of the low volatile or the amine form.

The low volatile and amine do not drift as far as does the high volatile. The amine form is made with a salt base and does not vaporize readily and is safer to use around susceptible crops, and the amine forms are safer than the esters.

The high volatile esters volatilize readily even at low temperatures. The vapors will drift from the sprayed areas for several days.

Here are the names of the high volatile esters and I hope you will write them down and not forget them: methyl, ethyl, isopropyl and butyl. Look on the container when you make your purchase and if it has one of these names on it the material is what is called a high volatile one. And remember that the high volatile is much more dangerous to use around susceptible crops, in fact, it should not be used.

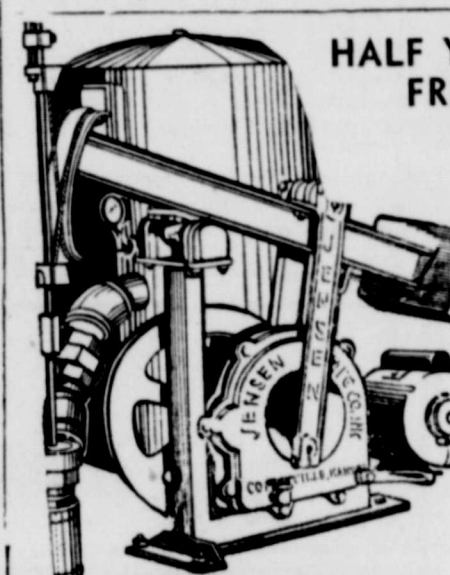
Not many of the tractor companies are letting the automobile get ahead of them.

Shortly after power steering came out on cars, tractors had it. Now the tractors are one ahead of the cars. They have developed an automatic pilot for the tractor. The automatic control is intended for use in conjunction with power steering hook-ups which are on many modern tractors. Light-weight feelers, capable of sensing the position of the crop row in relation to the tractor's front tires, are used in the automatic pilot to close switches when the tractor moves too close or too far from the row. This is all pretty good but I believe what people around here would like to see is something like water that could be used for fuel.

I'd like to caution all of you again about the danger of many of the new insecticides when they are not used according to the precautions on the containers. With gardens in production like most are now, I would be most careful as to what I used on vegetables for insect control. Grasshoppers are causing more damage each week and for their control I'd suggest that the insecticide be placed in that area between the growing garden and the fence. Try to get the hoppers here.

On your lawn, if you have just a few scattered weeds that you'd like to kill with 2,4-D why not apply the solution to the weeds with a water pistol. One squirt per weed should do the trick. Suggest that you don't let Junior have the pistol though as he might squirt something you don't want killed, like shrubs, or pot plants, etc.



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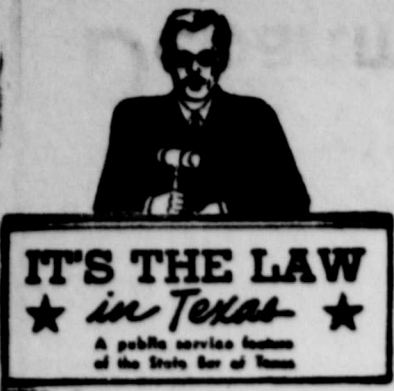

**YOUR CHILD AND THE DOCTOR**

It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or a camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. But the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parents' consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid—but only for emergency treatment where a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter generally cannot consent for a child's treatment.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Children cannot do this.

By going to your doctor you show your willingness and consent to accept his treatment. Your consent is assumed also when you ask for a house call by the doctor, or if as a result of an accident you come to a hospital for emergency treatment. If you are unconscious, the doctor may well give you emergency care, yet later

he should get your consent to further treatment. Minors cannot consent to medical treatment, and except in dire emergencies their parents or guardians must give it for them. The consent should not be broadly or loosely phrased, but should be as specific as circumstances permit.

The principal reason for having the consent in writing is to avoid later misunderstandings. It is a protection both to the patient and physician. (This column, prepared by the State Bar of Texas, is written to inform—not to advise.
