## Odis Petsick Named Chairman Of Independent Businesses

Announcement of the appointment of Odis Petsick of Hico as Chairman of the Hico Chapter of the National Federation of Independent Business, was made this week by Al Sperling, District Manager of the Federation in this area.

This tabulation is sent, with the signed ballots, directly to the desk of Congressman Omar Burleson in Washington. Inasmuch as all this action takes place before Congressman Burleson and other members of Congress are required to vote on these debatable legislative issues that are proposed to become law, it is the only manner in which it is possible for Congressman Burleson to know the personal opinions of his independent business constituents in an organized manner.

The National Federation of Independent Business is a non-profit organization that has the largest individual membership of any business organization in the United States and independent and professional men of every vocation participate with voting memberships, regardless of the other civic or trade affiliations.

## Drowning Averted by Quick Action of Local Man

Quick thinking and the coolness of Jimmie Herrington, probably saved the life of Charles Tolliver last Sunday in a boating mishap at Lake Whitney.

The near-tragedy occurred Sunday afternoon while the two were on a boat trip from Lakeside Village, near Kopperl, to the dam.

Herrington was at the controls of the boat, which they had rented at the fishing camp, and Tolliver was sitting on the bow when a large wave created by another boat in the area threw Tolliver into the water, knocking him unconscious.

The other boat, apparently not seeing the accident, did not stop. Herrington said that he cut off the motor on his boat when he saw Tolliver hit the water, and dove in after him. The boat drifted beyond reach, and Herrington managed to pull Tolliver to a nearby tree where they clung approximately three hours.

After more than two hours, Tolliver was still unconscious. Herrington said that a rope was hanging in a fork on the tree which they were clinging to, and he managed to secure Tolliver to the tree while he swam to the boat.

He managed to get Tolliver into the boat and made it back to Lakeside Village, which was approximately seven miles from the scene of the accident. Upon arriving there Herrington drove to Hico where Tolliver was hospitalized until Wednesday morning of this week.

Herrington was uninjured except for painful sunburns as the result of the long stay in the water.

# Kittens Have Dawson Household in 'Dither'

Some bit ago a story was heard over radio and then read in the newspapers of a certain well-known writer of children's books having just issued one entitled "Three Little Kittens," well illustrated with pictures of the antics of the three little felines. The book arrived at an Alabama city library and was soon on the children's shelf in that institution. The librarian refused to throw the book out, but did take it off the children's shelf and restrict its issuance to adults. The objectors even wanted the state to ban the book as objectionable.

Then shortly after that flare up, another book was reported to have come to light, of recent issue, entitled "The Three Little Pigs," put out by publishers of books for very young readers.

This time the outcry against the book was more vociferous than in the case of "Three Little Kittens." The objectors shouted to high heaven that the little volume was an attempt to brain-wash children as to the race question. For in this latter book the three little piggies were white and black and spotted. I have not seen either book and have no opinion about them. Though I do have an opinion about the emotional folks who raised the rumpus.

Now here's where my trouble arises. You see we have an elderly lady feline who has been supplying our place through the last two presidential terms with kittens about twice a year. Some weeks ago Kitty Mamma ran true to form and gave us two little fellows, one white, the other black, except that Blackie's toes are white and a white streak runs up his nose and fades out around his ears. So here we are with a white and a black kitten.

Nothing might ever come of just that, but you Miss Deborah Kay Williams spends a lot of time at our house, and she plays with the kittens constantly, holding them in close embrace, putting them to sleep in a pie pan, and a thousand other such things just as all little girls do with kittens.

Now from this fact stems my anxiety and banishes sleep from my tired old eyes. I know it could happen nearly any day now that a committee of fellow citizens might come to our home and after an introductory speech present

a demand that we get rid of the black kitten. The chairman of the self-appointed committee might say something like this: "Now Buster, you are committing a crime against this small great-granddaughter, obscuring her sense of right and wrong in the matter of race relations. We do not propose to stand by and see an innocent child sinned against so violently. So we demand that you forthwith take the black kitten and drown him in the Bosque River. If you fail to heed this demand you will suffer severe penalty for your failure in such an important matter."

Then the committee might turn on its heels and knock fire out of the rocks as it heads away.

I am in a dither as a result of the possibility of such a committee's visit, and I thus cogitate: I can't drown Little Blackie in the Bosque for there ain't enough water in it now to drown anything. Shall I head for Whitney Lake, or Buchanan Dam, or Possum Kingdom and dispose of the little fellow there? No. For if I did I would get arrested for polluting the waters of the state. Maybe I could get one of these bomb makers to do the job, that are forever making home-made bombs and putting the in public places to explode.

But that would be too hazardous. So here I am up to my eyebrows in anxiety and no solution of the problem offers itself. Maybe we had better move to Australia and try to be a neighbor to Mr. Yankus.

## FARM TIPS—

### Hot Weather Hazards to Egg Production Listed

College Station, June 17.—Maintaining a high rate of egg production and liveability during summer weather is a major problem for every poultryman, said Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman.

At temperatures up to 90 degrees, the hen can maintain its normal body temperatures and a good rate of egg lay. As the temperature goes above 90 degrees the hen tries to control its body temperature by drinking additional amounts of water, he said.

Studies reported by the USDA show that when the air temperature was 65 degrees, about 2 pounds of water was consumed for each pound of feed, and at 85 degrees, 7 pounds of water was consumed for each pound of feed, said Wormeli. This indicates a need for a generous supply of clean cool water readily available for hens during the summer.

During periods of extreme heat stress, the body temperature of

the hen will rise and if the hen's temperature reaches 112 to 114 degrees, the hen will die from heat prostration, the specialist said.

Poultrymen have learned to construct the poultry house to provide shade and air movement for the

hens' comfort. Grass planted around the poultry house will absorb much of the sun's heat and prevent it from being radiated into the laying house. This grass should be kept mowed, said Wormeli, so that it does not obstruct free air movement through the floor line ventilators of the house. A continuous ridge roll ventilator, at least a foot and a half wide, provides an outlet through which the bank of hot air under the roof can escape.

A fogging system can be used to cool the hens and in emergency

periods the hens may be sprayed with a garden hose, using a spray nozzle. The use of the pad and fan cooling method has been tried, but more information is needed before general recommendations can be made.

In hot weather each poultryman must take advantage of good management practices in his control. It is necessary to provide maximum comfort for laying hens to keep mortality at a minimum and maintain a high rate of egg production, added Wormeli.

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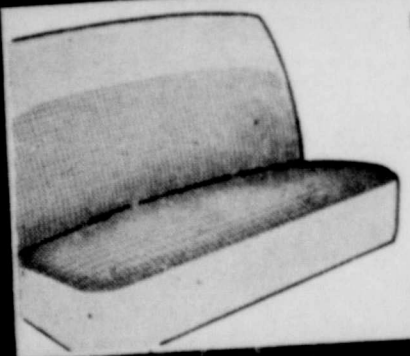


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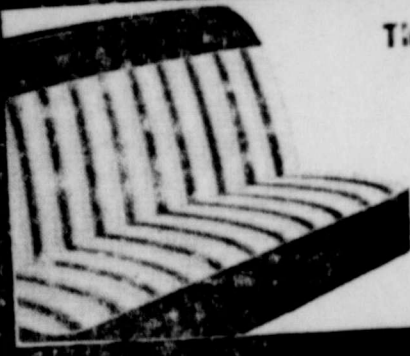

### FARM TIPS—

## Dairymen Advised on Herd Replacement Heifers

College Station, June 17.—"It will pay Texas dairymen to raise their own replacements," says A. M. Meekma, extension dairy husbandman. This, he said, is one of the most important undertakings in a herd improvement program. However, because many Texas dairymen have followed a policy of buying rather than raising their replacements, the supply of young dairy females in the state is often short of demand.

The first three or four weeks of the calf's life is the critical period, said Meekma, and regardless of the feeding schedule followed, the fundamentals of a successful calf-raising program are the same during this period.

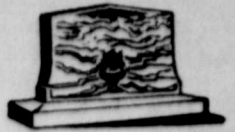
For the first four or five days of the mother cow's colostrum milk should be fed the calf—one pound of colostrum per day for each eight to ten pounds of body weight. Thereafter, the calf may be shifted to limited full milk feeding or to a milk replacer, said Meekma. If limited whole milk is fed, it should not exceed one pound of milk to each eight to ten pounds of body weight, and milk from low-testing cows (3 to 4 per cent fat) should be used, not to exceed seven pounds for the small dairy breeds and nine for the large.

At two weeks of age, begin feeding a top-quality hay (legume preferred) and a good calf starter containing 20 to 24 per cent pro-

tein and not more than 10 per cent fiber. At 60 to 90 days of age, the milk or milk replacer can be gradually discontinued as the calves will be consuming sufficient hay and starter for proper growth and development, the husbandman said.

Hay should be fed free-choice at all times, but starter should be limited to five pounds daily. Keep clean, fresh water and a mineral mixture containing equal parts of steamed bonemeal and salt before the calves at all times. Caution should be taken to prevent over-feeding of the starter.

It is also advisable to feed some grain (two to five pounds) between the ages of six to ten months. The regular dairy herd grain mix is usually satisfactory, Meekma said.

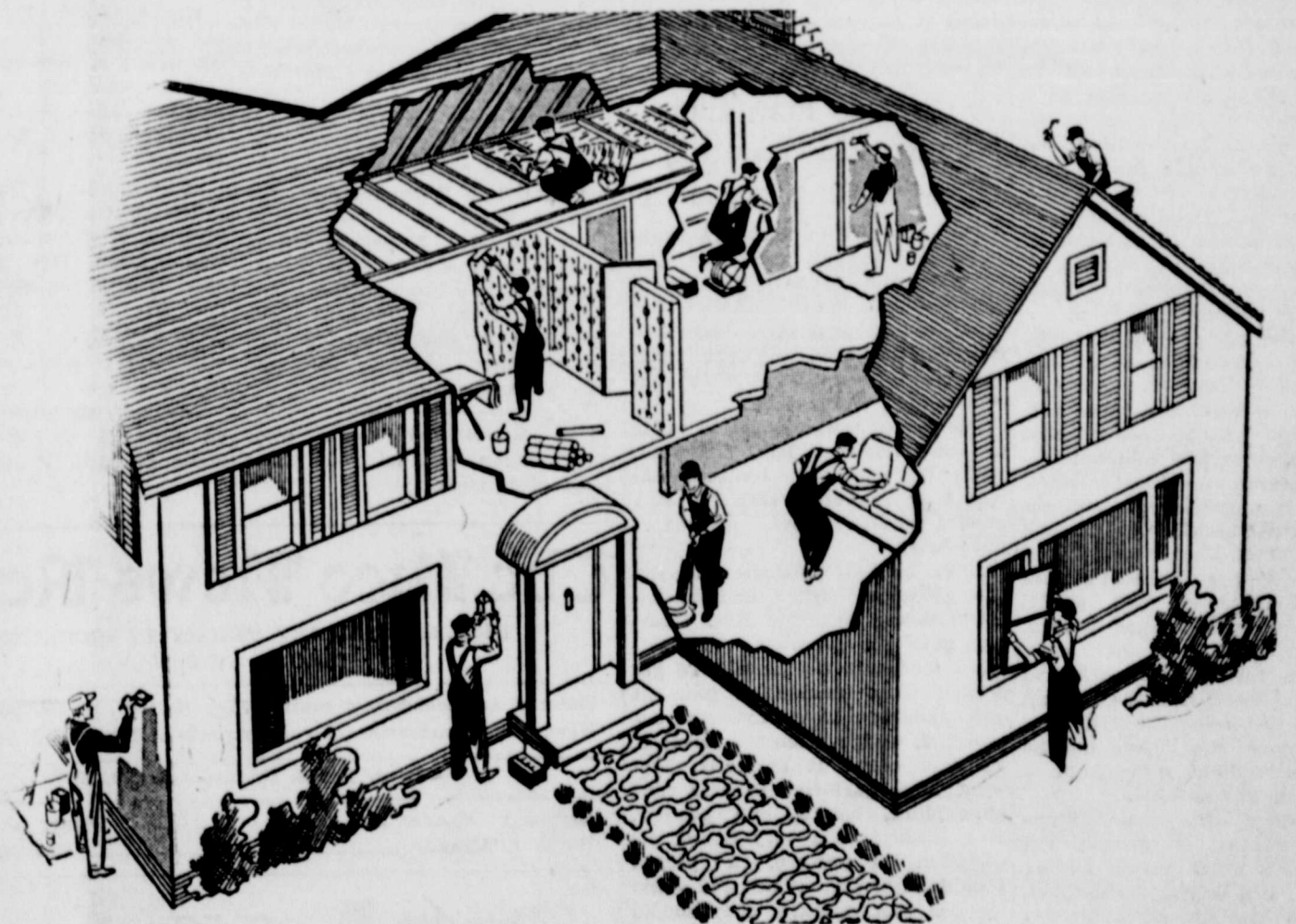

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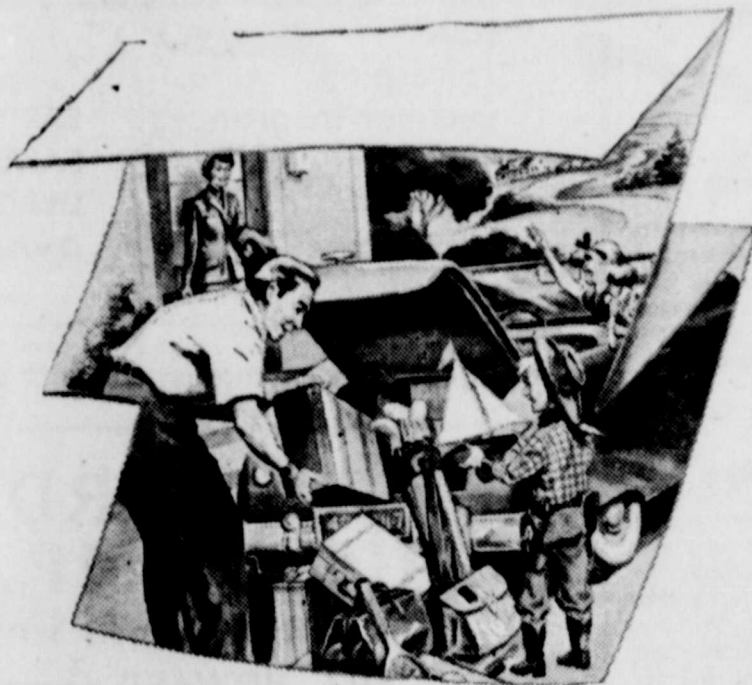

## On the Home Range

### WASHING AND STORING ELECTRIC BED COVERINGS

Right now a great many people are faced with the problem of washing and storing electric bed coverings. More and more people have this problem. Your label will give you some information on this problem. Automatic electric blankets and bedsheets should be washed, not dry-cleaned. Dry cleaning fluids may injure the wiring system.

Before washing be sure to disconnect all controls from the electric blanket or sheet. If there are spots or stains, wash these first gently with solution of soap or detergent and water. Use lukewarm water for washing—about 100 degrees F. Wash one blanket at a time. Remember, agitation of the bedcovering in the washing machine for too long a period may break the electric wiring.

Below are suggested methods for washing in either an agitator or tumbling-type automatic washer.

#### Agitator-Type Automatic Washer

Fill the washer with warm water. Add one cup of mild synthetic detergent, and agitate until dissolved. Stop washer. Immerse blanket in washer, and close cover. Do not agitate. Let blanket soak 10 minutes and spin out water for two minutes. Fill for rinse. Agitate for 1 minute. Spin out water for two minutes. Remove blanket. For line drying, hang lengthwise over two parallel clothes lines, preferable in the shade. When an automatic dryer is used, preheat 5 to 10 minutes using large bath towels to absorb and equalize the heat. Add the blanket and allow to tumble about 15 minutes. Complete the drying on the line. Press bindings with steam or dry iron set at low heat.

#### Tumble-Type Automatic Washer

Place blanket in washer. Fill washer with warm water, adding half cup low-sudsing detergent. Then stop washer. Soak blanket for 5 minutes; then tumble it 1 minute. Advance dial so water drains out. Then advance dial a second time, and let washer fill for deep rinse; run for one minute. Finally, turn dial to give final drain, for 2 minutes, or until drain hose stops. Remove blanket; dry as directed for agitator-type washer.

Store blankets in airtight boxes or plastic bags. Do not place moth-proofing chemicals in the electric blanket storage box or bag, as the chemicals may damage the insulated wiring.

### DID YOU KNOW?

1. Water softener is not effective if added to soap or synthetic detergent. The water must be softened before the detergent is added.

2. The more turnover of frozen foods in your home freezer, the

more economical its operation will be. Certain fixed costs of freezer operation are large compared with other costs involved in freezing. Therefore, the more food used and replaced, the less the cost of storing.

3. Need a low-calorie salad dressing for your green salads?

Mix one-half cup tomato juice, 2 tablespoons lemon juice or vinegar, one teaspoon salt, half teaspoon dry mustard, one teaspoon grated onion and half teaspoon Worcestershire sauce. Store, covered, in refrigerator. Shake well before using. One clove may be added if desired. The entire recipe contains 25 calories.

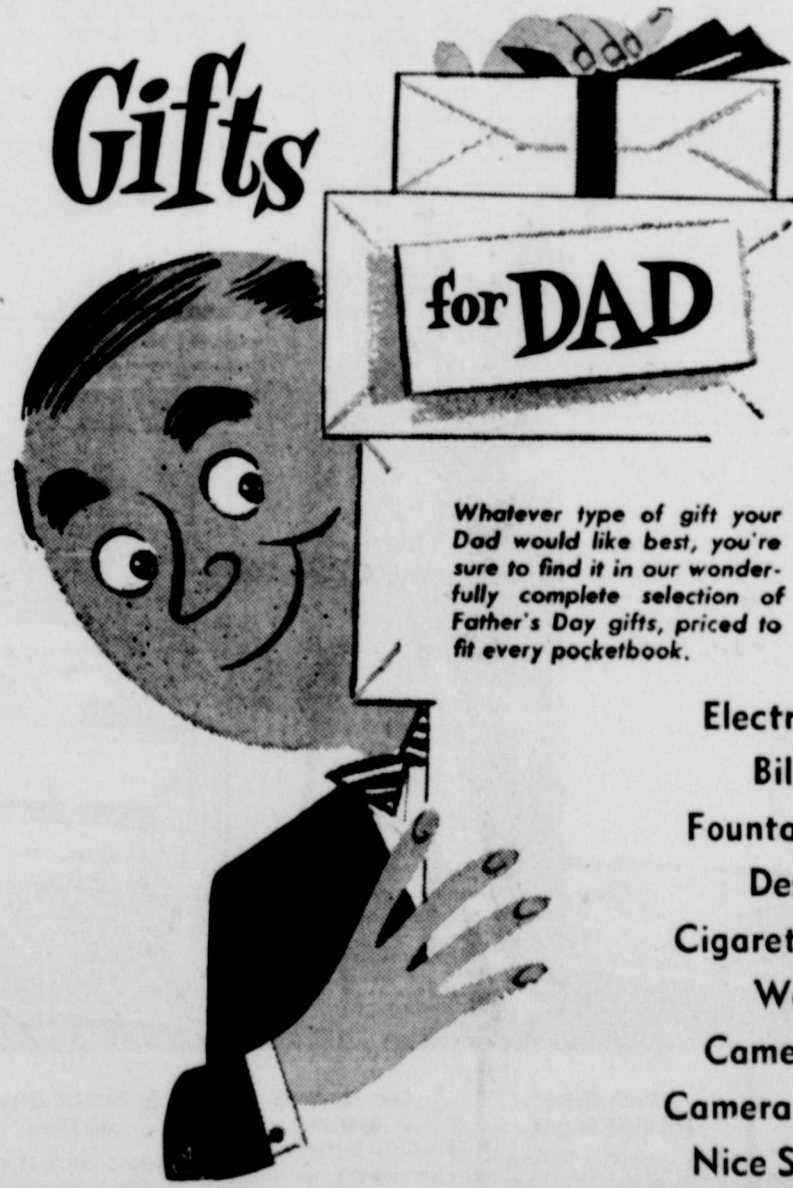

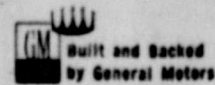

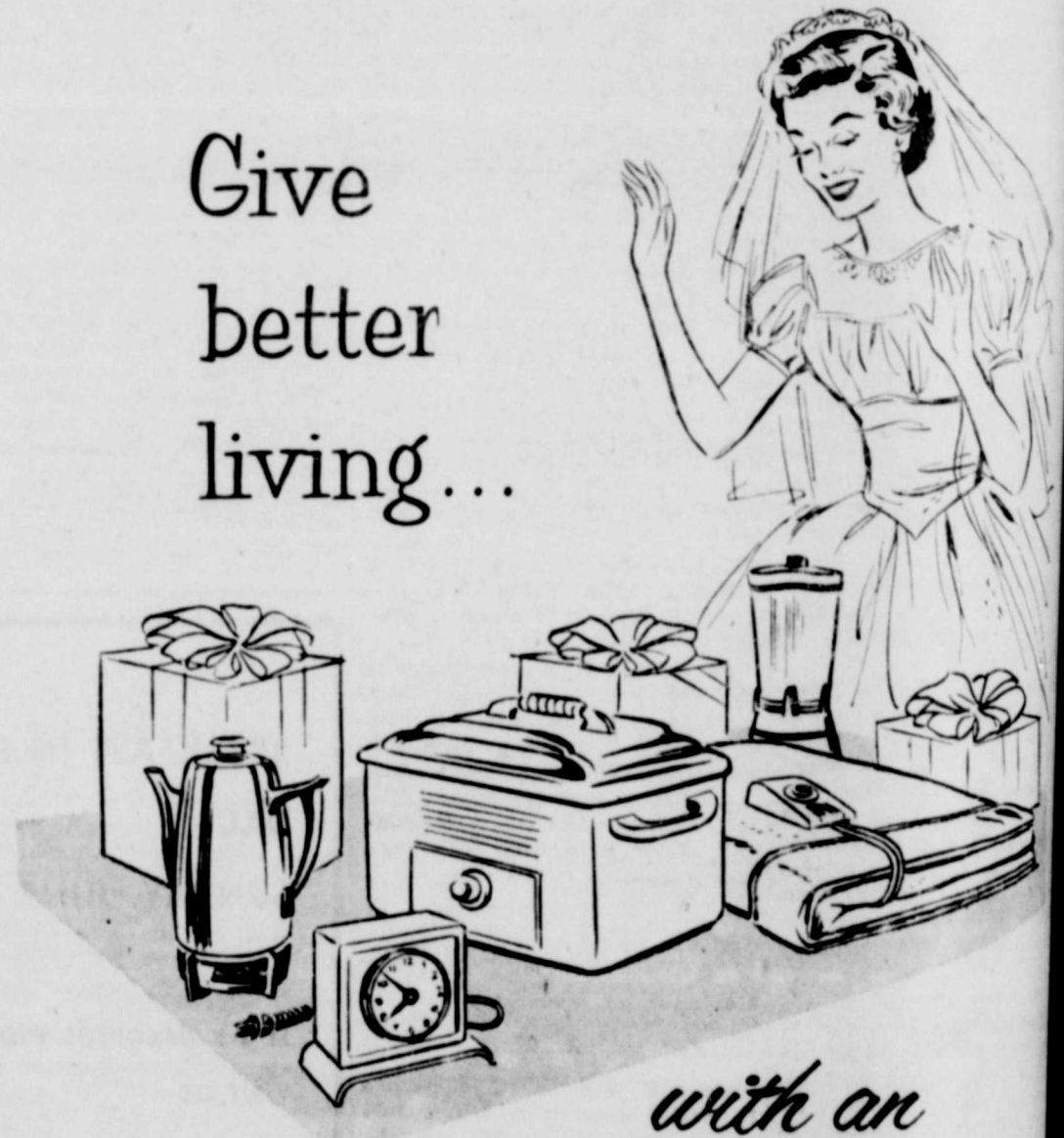

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. B. LAWRENCE

Frank and Moody Courtney will make the final weighing Monday morning of their calves which they have been feeding that were implanted with stilbestrol.

As you remember, some of the calves were implanted and wintered on pasture, some of these calves were implanted again and placed on feed. Some of the calves have not received any implant, but have been fed right along with those implanted.

The calves will be weighed Monday morning at the Courtney ranch at 9 o'clock. Everyone interested in steer feeding is invited to see the weighing and checking of results of the demonstration. The ranch is about three or four miles north of Jonesboro in the Pleasant Valley community. Or about five miles south of Lanham.

Monday morning Bill Stearman of near Hico weighed his calves according to the Performance Testing Program which he is following.

The calves were each weighed

and as they came from the scales each calf was given a grade by two people. Grades were Fancy, Choice Plus, Choice, Choice Minus and Good. Each calf's weight was adjusted to 205 days of age. This gave a true picture of what each calf had gained or how it had grown in 205 days.

With the grade and growth information Bill will be able to determine which heifer calves he will want to hold back for replacements in his breeding herd. With all calves in one pen and their mothers in another, those present at the demonstration were asked to match cows and calves, but none were able to do it.

Bill Boyd of Hico is seeing more deer on his place now, and also he says he has a few wild turkey. Bill is hopeful they will continue to increase. Nope, Bill doesn't permit shooting on his place.

Frank Bonner, Fairly, is finishing up his new pens, chutes and gates on his place. Good stock working equipment saves much labor and with labor priced as it is, it looks pretty economical to have well-made, well-located and well-planned livestock working facilities.

Amandus Stregger has a fine looking maize crop on a part of the John Melde farm at Aleman. R. A. Hoak, behind Shive, also has a fine crop. Hoak used some commercial fertilizer on his crop

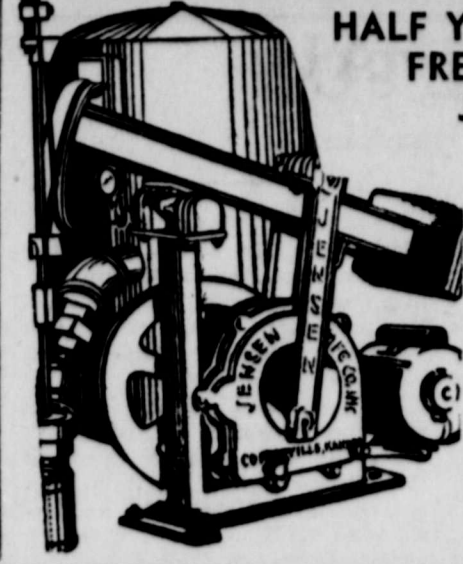

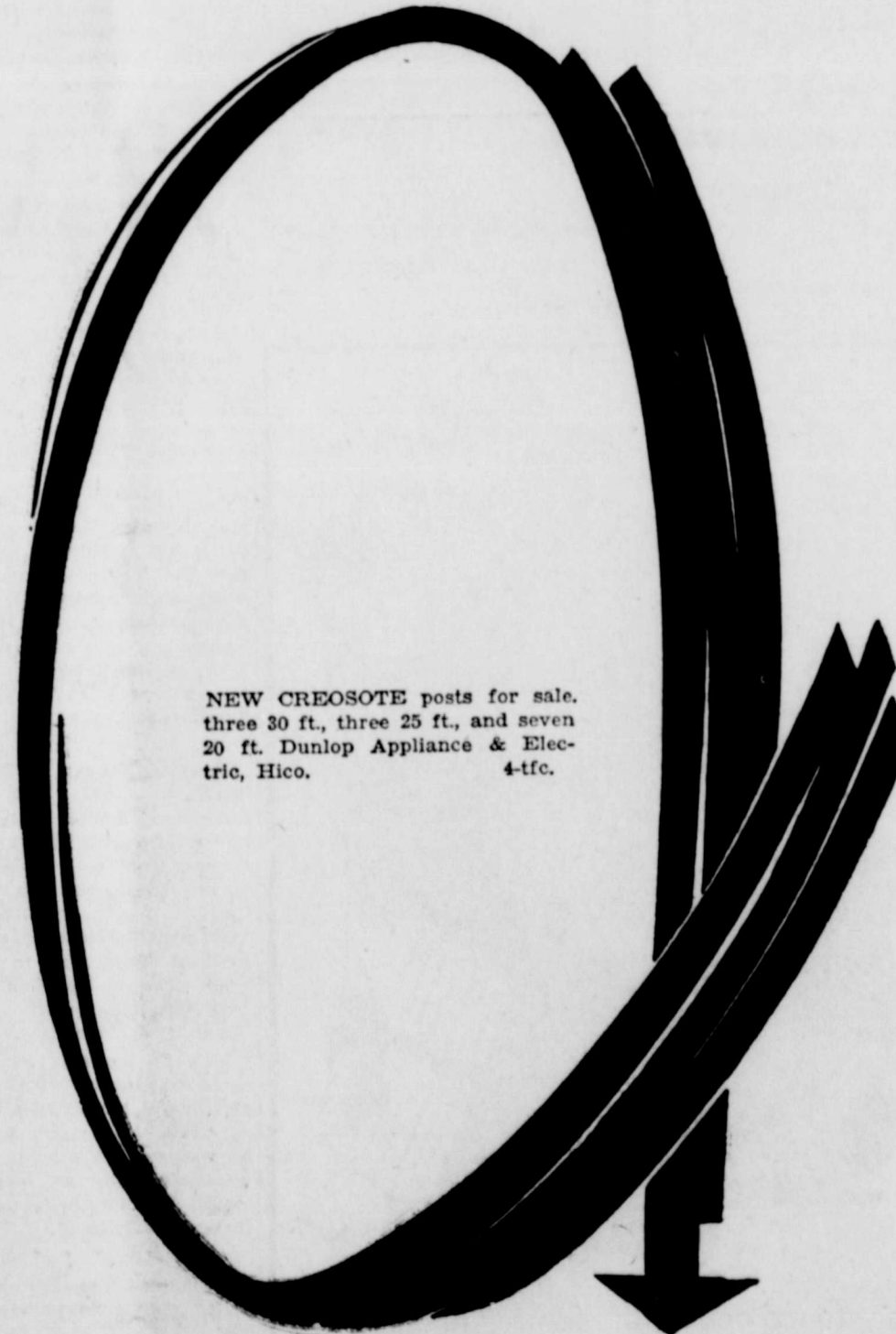

## Congress Reports

Washington, D. C.—Since 1903, 17 States have repealed their so-called "Fair Trade" laws or had them rendered unconstitutional by the courts.

There is now pending in the Congress a Federal Fair Trade Measure. It has been approved by the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, but not yet clear for action by the Congress.

Congressional backers of the bill, particularly Senator Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota, say that a Federal law would provide consumer safeguards by curbing unfair pricing practices. Supporters also contend that unregulated competition leads to monopoly and higher prices.

Opponents say that such a law would hinder competition and result in higher prices to the consumer because of price-fixing restraint.

The fact remains that this is seemingly a fairly good illustration of State's rights. Many who have felt this was a matter to be determined by the State now are persuaded that a Federal law is needed.

One of the most objectionable end results, should such a law be passed, would be an invitation for the Federal Government to bring all retailers under the Minimum Wage Laws. If minimum wages are increased to \$1.25 per hour, it would be argued that retailers should be brought under it because they operate under a so-called national "Fair Trade" law.

Certainly, should a Federal Fair Trade, price-fixing law be enacted, merchants would operate under more rigid regulations and would be less free to exercise initiative essential to business promotion that it would take many more and growth. Another certainty is Federal employees to administer such a law, and particularly should retailers be brought under the Wage and Hour Law.

This is the sort of thing that can't be fooled with on an experimental basis. Once it is enacted, probably the only way it could be removed in case it worked as unsatisfactorily as many predict, would be for the courts to hold it unconstitutional.

Big questions are looming up as to our trade policies with Soviet Russia. The British have an-

nounced a five-year trade agreement with the Soviets, while at the same time the United States is vetoing practically all requests of U. S. firms for shipment of goods behind the Iron Curtain.

Many people are wondering how realistic we are to forbid United States goods to go to the Communists while the British can sell complete plants to produce chemicals, synthetics and a variety of other goods which compete with our own.

The British are not the only nation having considerable trade relations with the Russians. Some nations have shipped to Russia exactly the same articles which we, in turn, have sent to them. It is pretty ridiculous situation.
