## Record Crowd Winds Up Annual Reunion

A crowd conservatively estimated at 10,000 jammed Hico City Park Saturday night for the final evening of the 73rd Annual Old Settlers Reunion.

Parking facilities were at a premium, with all available space in City Park, both Boy Scout parking lots, and all area along the road outside of the park filled to capacity. At one time during the peak of the crowd cars were stacked up to the railroad, and further out to the farm to market highway south of the park. Old timers say that the crowd was the largest in history of the event.

Reunion Manager Harold Walker reported that all four nights of the celebration topped previous years, with Thursday night being the lightest.

The parade, which kicked off the annual affair, was also attended by one of the largest crowds in history, with people lining both sides of main street from the upper end to the railroad tracks. Entries in the parade were unusually large, with more decorated floats than in previous years. Donald Hefner served as marshal for the second consecutive year, which added greatly to the smoothness in which the parade was formed and dispensed.

During first night activities which were climaxed by the crowning of Miss Reunion of 1959, the appearance of "Governor Long" caused much comment, and proved to be an interesting sidelight to the beauty pageant. The Governor, who brought along his own candidate for the Miss Reunion title, was escorted into City Park amid

a blaze of sirens, furnished by the Karem Temple Motor Patrol of Waco. He made an unsuccessful attempt to bribe judges with boots, which drew laughter from the audience.



A record-breaking basketball star at Converse High School and Louisiana Tech 10-15 years ago, George (Red) Latham is serving as manager of the Converse team that has been at or near the top of Sabine-Red River Valley area.

tear baseball league standings all summer. Latham, who played Army and professional basketball following his graduation from the Ruston college, pitches and plays in the outfield for the Converse nine.

The big carrot-topped athlete played with R. C. Looney and Huey Cranford—head basketball coach at Northwestern State College—on Converse cage teams that are still rated with the best in Sabine Parish history.

Latham was a four-year starter two-year All-Stater and captain of the 1945 Converse team that won 61 consecutive games en route to a 72-2 record and the state championship.

Sabine Parish basketball enthusiasts have had plenty of opportunities to watch championship teams in recent years, as such stars as Dick Brown, Jimmy (Red) Leach, Jerry Callens, Phil Haley and Larry Skinner have produced state champions at Florien and Belmont, along with runners-up at Oak Grove and Pleasant Hill, but they still regard the 1945 Converse five with plenty of respect.

Outdoor Court Used. The reason might be that the Latham-captained quintet held its

practice sessions and played all of its home games on an outdoor dirt court.


Latham was a three-time All-Conference selection at Tech, serving as captain of the Bulldogs during his senior campaign and receiving the "Most Valuable Player" award upon graduation. His greatest thrill in basketball, however, came much earlier in his career at the Ruston college.

"Northwestern (then Louisiana Normal) had clobbered us 54-19 in our first game of the 1946 season," he recalls, "but we beat them three straight times to earn a trip to the small-college tournament in Kansas City."

Since Converse High did not field a team in that sport, Latham did not play organized baseball until he joined Tech Coach Berry Hinton's Ruston Vols in the Big Eight League. He later played for Homer, another Big Eight entry, and spent part of one season with Abbeville in the old Evangeline League.

Following graduation from college he played Army basketball in Japan one year and played pro ball with the Anderson, Ind., Packers during the latter part of the 1951 season. He has coached all four major sports at Gueydan, Florien, and Carlton, Texas.

Currently working on his master's degree during the summer session at Northwestern State, Latham owns a basketball coaching record of 78 victories and 46 losses.

## IT'S THE LAW—

### Suppose Blow Blew — Who'd be Holding the Bag?

You can give some of your rights to other people, for example, the right to collect a bill; but it's a different thing with your duties. You need your creditor's OK firmly to assign your debts to another.

You can sell what you own, all right, but you can't shake a debt merely by getting somebody else to promise to pay it for you. Your creditor—who is a party to your contract—has something to say about who takes over your obligation.

Thus, your cousin, say, borrows from you and promises to pay the money back. He can't get out of it by getting his neighbor to say he will pay you for him unless you agree—and this takes a written contract.

Suppose you bought Abel's house on time for \$15,000 and had paid off \$5,000. Then, with \$10,000 left to pay, you get Joe Blow to buy the place.

How could Blow pay for it? Well, for Blow it would be just dandy for you to let him take over the \$10,000 debt, pay you back your \$5,000 equity, and then pay off Abel the rest of your \$10,000 debt. Blow would save the cost of a new loan—if his credit was good enough to get one in the first place. So you set it up that way.

One day Blow blew; and you, yes you, hold the bag. True, you could turn over your equity to Blow with Abel's consent.

But your agreement to Blow to pay the balance is not binding on Abel. He can hold you to your original deal. Pay up \$10,000.

Don't let someone "assume" your loan unless you protect yourself by an agreement with your lender, or unless you are willing to risk holding the sack.







## CATTLE MARKING STILL THE LAW

The practice of branding live- stock was brought to America by the Spaniards over 400 years ago.

The Spanish government grant- ed and recorded brands which guaranteed the exclusive owner- ship of such marks to certain in- dividuals. This system was adopt- ed in Texas by the early settlers, and brand records were kept in the courthouses as they are today under present State laws.

The purpose for branding live- stock is to establish proof of own- ership. Tattoos and ear marks have been used alone and with brands, but brands have proved to be the most effective means of identification.

Brands and marks were design- ed to discourage theft of livestock by providing a ready method of identification. Today Texas brand inspectors have estimated that on- ly about 25 per cent of all cattle now going to market are branded.

As early as 1848, Texas cattle- men realized that a brand inspec- tor was needed to cover movement and marketing operations to pre- vent theft of cattle. The state enac-

ted legislation which authorized such an inspector to operate in each county. The Texas and South- western Cattle Raisers Association and other livestock associations hired their own brand inspectors to protect the herds of their mem- bers. These men today do most of the brand inspecting, since the number of county inspectors has declined.

In 1943, a statute was enacted to bring about a current record of all legally used brands and marks. Therefore, at the present, all marks and brands recorded since the first day of October 1943 are the only legally used brands and marks in the state.

The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association provides inspections for livestock belonging to their members before departure from farms, ranches or shipping points. The field inspectors carry special commissions as Texas Rangers, which gives them full authority for law enforcement.

They search for strayed or stolen animals, check shipping points and try to locate thieves when theft is reported. They are present at the loading of cattle moving out of

their areas. And they inspect brands to determine whether the shipper has title to all cattle of- fered for shipment.

In order for the country dealer to legally take possession of the livestock he has bought, he must have a written transfer or bill of sale. The bill of sale requires that the brands and marks be listed and recorded in the county clerk's office. The seller and the country dealer or trader must inspect the animal's exchanged to obtain all the marks of identification for this required record.

Although some of the brand laws in Texas are obsolete and the en- forcement machinery in most cases is inadequate, the wise stock rais- er would do well to brand or mark his stock to prevent any future question of doubt as to ownership.







## IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

Review Given on Book,  
'Jake Bell, Range Rider'

"Jake Bell, Range Rider" is a book by Upton Barnard, who now resides at Stephenville. The book was published in the year 1954, four years previous to Mr. Barnard's "Livery Stable Days." It is a whole book of ranch and farm stories beginning in the 1880's and continuing down to a recent past. One gets a lot of laughs reading the stories told by the author.

Jake Bell, the range rider, whose story comprises the book, was born about the year 1880 in Limestone County, son of Tom Bell and Jane Bently Bell, one of three children. His father died when he was under ten, and his mother married a man named Buck Truett, a really good man of the range. Jake had a real love for Mr. Truett, and he and the stepfather always got along well. But one night an assassin crept up to the porch and called for Mr. Truett, and as he went out on the front porch the man shot him dead without a word, and fled in the dark. Efforts to catch the murderer on the part of the sheriff and Rangers were without success.

Then after a rather brief period men began to court Mrs. Truett, and a neighbor named Davis Biggers, a champion cotton grower, was the winner this time. He and Jake did not get along at all. Biggers seemed to have just one purpose: raise cotton and use his family as the slaves to do the work of raising and harvesting. Evidently he had no real love for the widow he married and none at all for Jake. Jake stood it as long as he could and then ran away as a solution of the situation.

One of the good stories of the book was an event that took place at his home before he ran away from his fussy stepfather. Biggers traded with some immigrants from Tennessee for a mule, Old Beck. One morning the next spring Old Beck failed to come up with the rest of the stock in the early morning. His stepfather said to Jake after breakfast, "You are a poor cotton-picker. See if you can hunt a mule, and don't come back

with a lot of excuses. If you have to miss your dinner, look until you find her." So Jake saddled his black pony and started east, asking every person he saw about a white-nosed, red sorrel mule. He soon got on her trail, always moving eastward. He came to the Sabine river at Logansport, swam that stream and headed on east. That Tennessee mule was headed toward the place she had spent most of her life. He came to the Red River and crossed it, always getting word that the mule was headed east. He later came to the Ouachita River and crossed it, still bound east. Finally he came to the Mississippi River, and there he came upon the mule. People there said they had seen her try to swim the river several times, but the water was too swift for her and she had to turn back.

Jake put a rope on Old Beck and started back home a lot more than to hundred miles. He had three slick nickels as he began the homeward journey. Near the end of the day he stopped at a country store and bought cheese and crackers and ate them like a starved wolf, for he had not

eaten in a whole day. Now so far away from home and no money and with a boy's appetite. What was he to do? One time he was so hungry he stopped at a negro shack and ordered the negro woman to get back in the house and get him a meal. She threatening did, and Jake ate sow belly and cane syrup and grease gravy and corn pone and at least was full. He made it home at last. His mean stepfather said no word of commendation of his great exploit.

After some wanderings and various jobs, Jake wound up at the Lazy S Ranch, just west of Coleman. There he remained for a considerable time, often making a trip to Buffalo Gap to see a girl he fell in love with. But he and the girl failed to make a match at that time, and appealed to by his younger brother to devote himself to the capture of the man who killed Buck Truett, Jake went west all the time looking for the murderer. Getting on a warm trail in the Alpine-Marfa area, he got a ranger's commission and went into Mexico across from Presidio and after some exciting experiences located the murderer, now a cattle rustler operating across the Rio Grande. He trapped the murderer and the culprit paid for his crime in due season. It is a hair-raising story, that capture.

Jake could not forget the farm girl at Buffalo Gap, so back there he went. She was still unwed, and had longingly looked for Jake to come. They got married. That's how a good story ought to end.

Editor Buck has a number of copies of the book and you might hornswoggle him out of a copy for a few quarters. It will be a good investment in Texas tales of yesterday, if you like good healthy stories.

## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE—

Religious Group Asks to Be  
Freed From Government Aid

Washington, D. C.—One of the strangest lobbies appeared in Washington this week. The representative of this lobby have periodically visited the Capitol for the past several years.

They are a group of Amish bishops and ministers who ask help from Congressmen to be freed from Federal Old Age and Survivors' Insurance and Social Security.

The Amish, a group of the Mennonite religious faith, are opposed to participation in the program because of their beliefs. In their habits and mode of conduct they remain much as they were in the 17th Century.

It is a paradox that two hours of driving from the hustle and bustle of the Nation's Capitol will bring one to great communities of these people. Along the roads leading through the area where they live are signs posted, "Slow—Watch for Horse-drawn Vehicles."

When an agent of the FBI before the war, it was my privilege to know some of these folks in Indiana and Ohio. Visiting them, the first thing noticed were the fine barns, good stock, immaculate premises, and well-built houses.

Although few conveniences—no rugs on the floors, no telephone or radio, and, today, no television aerials on the house—everything was always spotlessly clean, always the best of substantial food.

Their clothing is severe—dark clothes, some homespun; low-crowned, broad-brimmed black hats for the men—long black dresses, gray or black bonnets for the women.

In some of the smaller towns and villages no one drives his automobile on the town square on Saturday afternoon for fear of scaring the horses, even if there is a parking place.

The long-bearded men are serious but friendly. They are a patient, hard-working and independent people, but they want no part of child welfare, old age assistance, social security, or any other Government assistance. They are protesting for having been brought under the law's provisions.

They have their own matchless social security system through family unity and community self-sufficiency.

It is strange that two hours away from the Pentagon where is discussed daily intercontinental missiles, nuclear powered submarines, airplanes, and trips to the moon, one may again see the 17th Century.

The striking contrast may perhaps suggest an analogy in that these independent and self-sufficient people, whom we call backward, are so near the progressiveness of all the new things which have come about in these recent years, including numerous types of Government aid to people.

While most of us struggle for the better things of life, called "a higher standard of living," which


