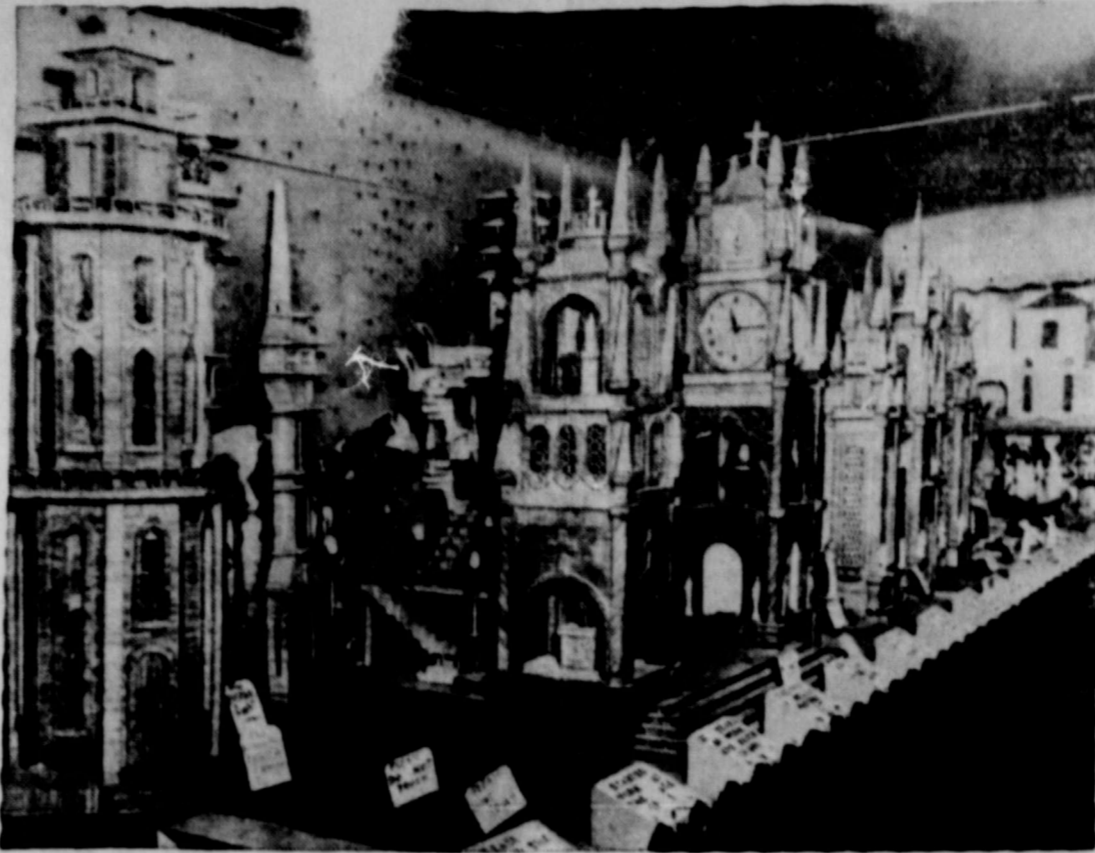

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Truman Pearson, Grade A dairyman at Hico, about two miles out on the Hico-Carlton farm to market road, is making some fine additions to his present daily operations. Guess I better add his wife, Mrs. Pearson to this too, because she is a pretty big part in the business. She keeps all records of production, feed consumption, costs, etc., which is a pretty big job in itself.

Anyhow, the Pearsons are just about through adding a new milking parlor. It is of what is called the pit type—the operators work from a pit between two rows of stanchions. The stanchions hold six cows at a time, three to a side. A new pipeline will also be added and with this and the extra stanchions, the Pearsons will be able to care for quite a number more cows at milking time. I expect that they will add a few more cows as soon as they can.

Arvard Abernathy of Route 1, Hamilton, on the Leon, has put some of his good feed crop up as silage this week. Arvard is planning to hold this in reserve for a short year, and I hope that it will be many years before he has to fall back on it.

Tommy Thompson, on the river north of Hamilton, has set out a new pecan grove on his bottom field. The grove is just to the left of the highway as you come to the river bridge. Give this a few years and he should have a fine grove.

Last month the application for classing cotton that is ginned in the county this season was made to the Marketing Service office in Austin. The application was accepted and all who gin cotton at the gins in the county will get their cotton graded and staple length checked free. Cards showing grade and staple will come to the local ginners and will be available to growers on request.

Have you checked your cotton field for leaf worms? They are here and it might be a good idea to walk through the field at least once a week so you can determine if controls should be applied.

The present price outlook for hogs does not warrant the dispersal of commercial breeding herds as has been done in the past by many Texas producers when similar price situations have been faced. But it does mean, says extension specialists at Texas A & M College, that every practice which will increase efficiency of production must be put to use.

Dr. Murray A. Brown, assistant professor of dairy science at Texas A & M College, says that in most cases, teat cups left on a cow more than 3 or 4 minutes are doing more harm than good. Most cows can be milked out in 3 or 4 minutes and unless a cow is a "slow milker" her udder becomes internally irritated by the action of the machine when it is left on over 4 minutes.

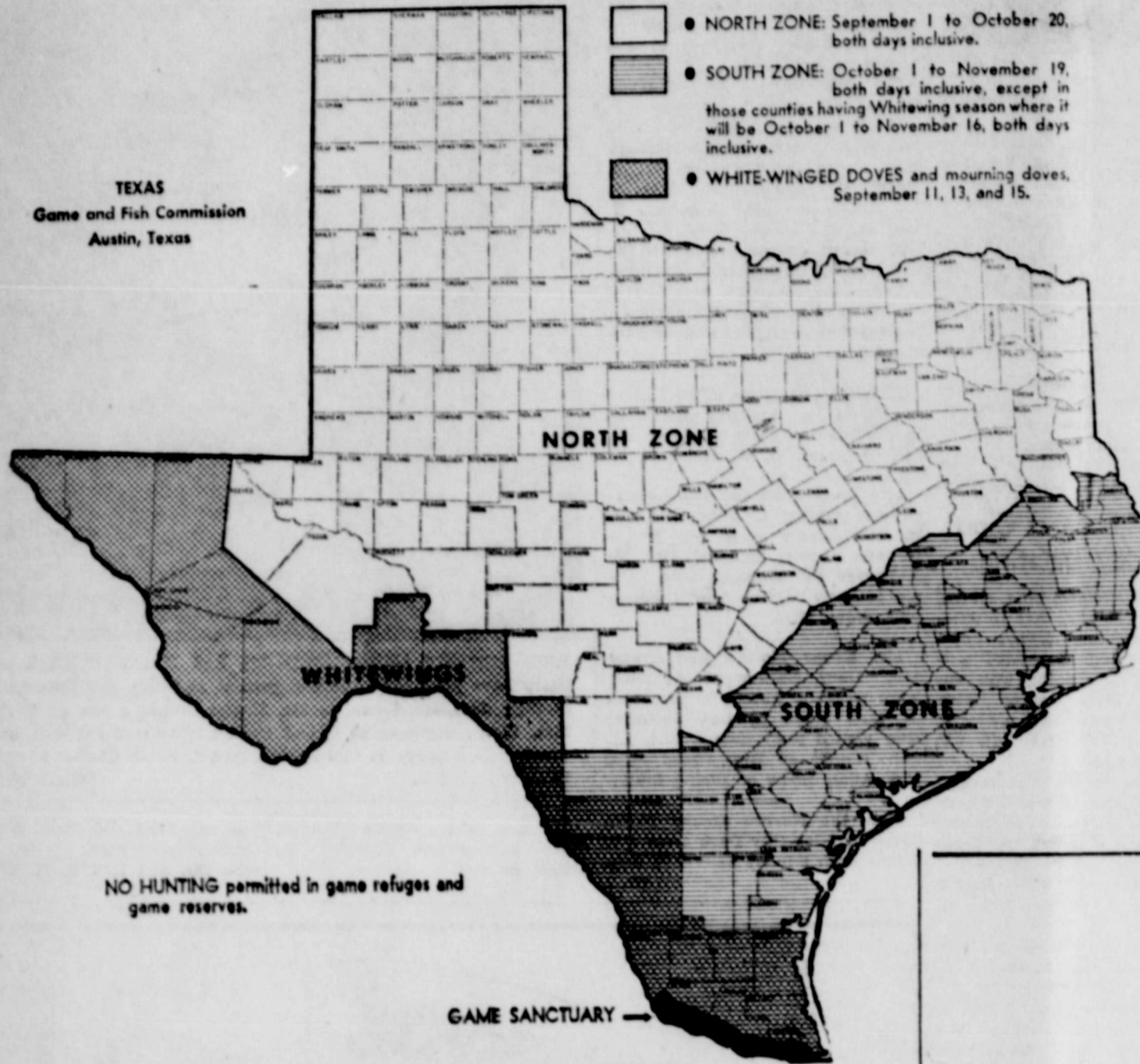

**Allergy Sufferers Can Have Cause Removed**

In an issue of Look Magazine, Dr. S. M. Feinberg, professor at Northwestern University Medical School, defined an allergy as "the abnormal reaction to substances which are harmless or even beneficial to most people." He wrote that "the basic reason that makes some people allergic while others are not is still a mystery." Dr. Feinberg repeated that "the allergic person reacts abnormally."

Therein lies the indication that points out the cause, if we're not looking so hard in the wrong direction that we miss it. The one and only factor within the body that causes the body to react abnormally is the nervous system which controls all function of all tissues and all organs. When there is an interference to normal transmission of nerve impulses within the body, the body will react abnormally. An allergy may become the major symptom, or it may be one of many symptoms from the same cause. A proper correction of this interference to nerves will permit normal reaction and the allergy and other symptoms will vanish.

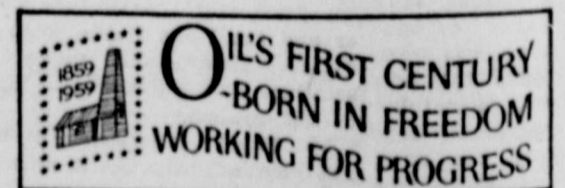

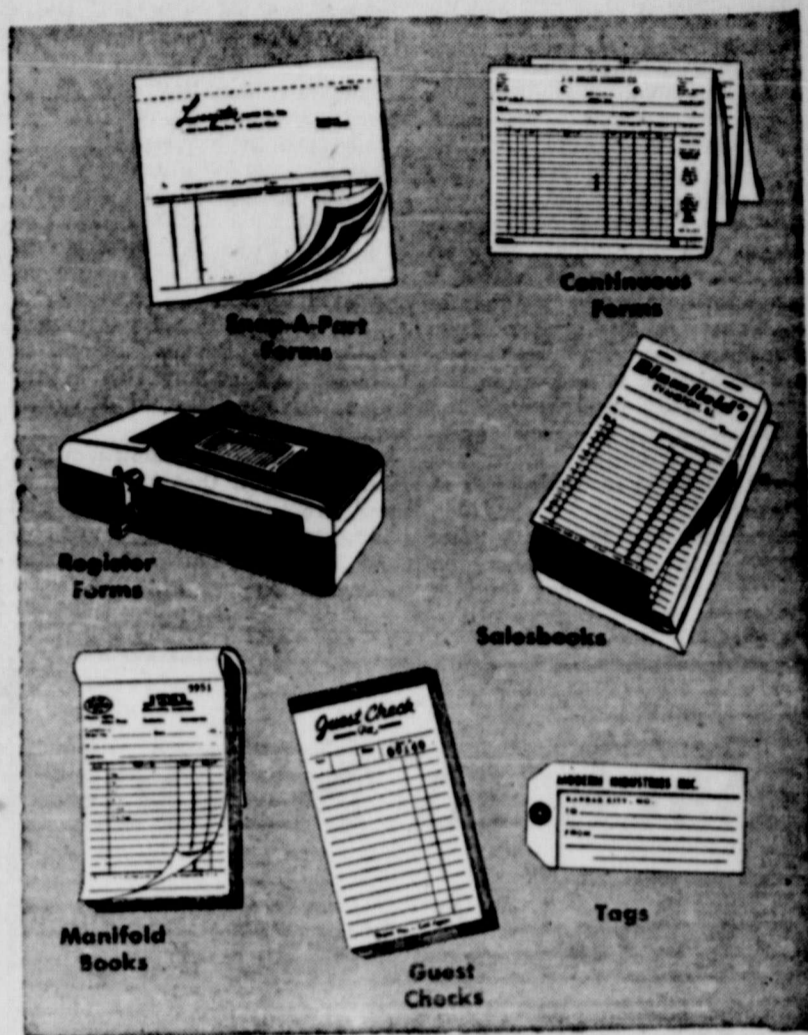

### New Game & Fish Laws Proposed at Hamilton Meet

Approximately 15 landowners and 10 interested sportsmen were present last Thursday night at Hamilton when members of the Texas Game & Fish Commission met with area people to discuss and recommend new laws and regulations for hunting and fishing in Hamilton County.

Local Game Warden Swede Johnson presided at the meeting. Joe Stevens, area wildlife biologist, and Leonard Lamb, fish biologist, explained the present game laws for the county, and the proposed new laws.

After explanations, the landowners and sportsmen voted on recommendations for new game and fish laws. Here are some of the proposals which will be submitted for approval:

Stevens explained the present deer season, which runs from Nov. 16 through December 5, and landowners voted to allow a full Nov. 16-Dec. 31 season. In the proposal the new law would allow the shooting of any buck deer with hardened antlers protruding through the head, which would make it legal to kill spike deer if the proposal passes in Austin. Also those present voted to allow the shooting of doe deer, if and when the population ever increases to the necessary extent. A special archery (bow and arrow) season was opposed by those in attendance at the meeting.

Under the new proposals there would be no closed season on squirrels, but a daily bag limit of

10 and a possession limit of 20 would be enforced.

The season on fur-bearing animals would run from Dec. 1 to Jan. 31 for the taking of pelts, but the animals could be killed any time of the year as long as pelts were not removed.

The proposal for quail season is December 1 through January 16, and the limit would be 12 birds per day with a possession limit of 36 under the new law.

The season on migratory birds, which includes doves and ducks, is regulated by the Federal Commission, and state officials do not have regulatory powers over these.

Some changes have been proposed in fishing laws, foremost of these being the following:

There will be no closed fishing season, except in wildlife sanctuaries.

The daily bass limit will be 15, with possession of 30. The size limit was completely removed.

Crappie and White Bass, daily limit 25, possession 50 any size.

Channel, Blue and Flathead Catfish, daily limit 25, possession 50.

All other species of fish are not regulated to limit or size.

One new proposal, if passed, would outlaw the use of gill or trammel nets of any size in any waters in the Possum Kingdom Regulatory District.

Sportsmen and landowners are reminded again that these regulations are only proposals, and should they pass they would become law 10 days after the hearing in Austin August 28.

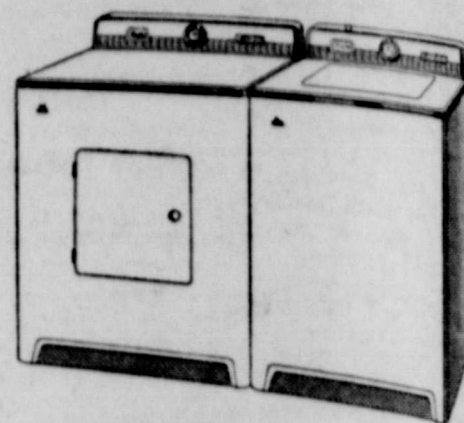

## Congress Reports

Washington, D. C.—The mere passage of a law does not always cure the evils against which the law operates.

The law itself can be perfect, but it requires two things to make it effective. The first is the proper administration. The second is to enforce penalties for violations.

Human nature being what it is, any law which regulates human conduct must provide a penalty for its violation.

In writing laws it is impossible to spell out every detail for its administration and, therefore, under our system of government, power to administer is placed in the hands of the Executive Branch of government. Because every detail can not be spelled out in the law itself to meet every circumstance, the administrator, director or other designated head of a branch of the Executive Department is given the responsibility of interpretation and for promulgating rules and regulations in applying the law.

Generally speaking, the enforcement of the law is the duty of the Justice Department and its enforcement agencies. The next step in our governmental system is the

determination by the courts as to whether the law is constitutional or whether the proper interpretation has been put upon its enforcement.

The new labor bill passed by the House of Representatives proposes to close the loopholes through which labor racketeers have been escaping.

Murder, arson, theft, extortion and blackmail are against the law anywhere, committed by anybody. Why then have the flagrant violations recently revealed not been stopped by prosecution?

From the standpoint of the Federal Government, the problem of State lines is a handicap for attaining jurisdiction. At the same time, the Justice Department is attempting new approaches under old laws to prosecute offenders. The success of such efforts has not yet to be proved.

Why then are not the gangsters, racketeers and thieves prosecuted under local laws of the jurisdiction where they occur?

The only conclusion is that in the areas where these crimes have gone unpunished, the influence of the racketeers is greater than law enforcement. In other words, those responsible for the administration of justice and the enforcement of the law must be beholden to the strong-arm groups.

It is difficult for us in our part of the Country to conceive of such a thing being permitted as the overturning of milk trucks at the city limits of New York City, the complete taking over of a plant in Detroit, or the destruction of coal mines in Kentucky by imported outsiders. But it has happened.

This is the sort of thing which present legislation proposes to stop. In addition, it proposes to give the honest union member, who, if he makes a living for his family must belong to the organization, the right to control the ac-

tions of leaders who would involve him in such conduct.

One might say that if a community or State permits such action, they presumably desire it and wish no change. The fact that it seriously affects the national economy, the character of the nation and everyone in it, is the reason for the necessity of national laws against it.

The present hope for adjournment of the Congress is September 5. Next week will close this column for the year unless a called Session of the Congress should occur, which is not now anticipated.
