## Tigers Gun for Fourth Win of Season Tonight

### Will Host Early High of Brownwood

The local Tiger football team, who has amazed even the boldest of speculators with three consecutive wins, will have their work cut out for them tonight, Friday, if they expect to stay in the win column.

Their opponent, Early High School of Brownwood, defeated the locals last year 28-0, and are reported to have another team of district championship caliber. They have been district champs for the past two years, winning regional honors two years ago.

In play thus far this year the Longhorns show a record of two wins and a tie. The tie was played with May in the first game of the season for both teams. That score was 12-12.

Since the opening contest Early has swept by two opponents, winning from Gorman 34-6, and clobbering Rising Star last week 48-6.

Last year the Longhorns were a quick-hitting unit which used the long scoring play to out-gun opponents. In the game with Gorman they used a 65-yard pass play to break a 6-6 tie, and from there lightning struck. J. B. Forest, fullback, and Charles White, halfback, are the big guns in the Early attack.

Hico coaches Jack Barnett and Ross Hall have pronounced the Tigers at full strength for the first time this year, and will probably go with the same backfield combination which they have used in the three previous contests. Alan Hedges will be at quarterback, Bobby Boone at full, and Neil Ellis and Doyle Crews at the half-back slots. In the line it will probably be Shelly Hooper and Mike Lackey at ends, Lee Blue and Fieldon Haley at tackles, Royce Samford and Mitchell Mayfield at guards, and James Jordan at center.

In previous games, Hico's backs have evenly distributed scoring honors for the year. Neil Ellis leads the point-makers with 14, Hedges has notched 12, Boone and Crews have each made 8. Mike Lackey has contributed 6, and Shelly Hooper has made two.

Hedges was named to the Waco News-Tribune's honorable mention list as back of the week for his two-touchdown performance last Friday, and Doyle Crews was named on the honorable list two weeks ago for his play against Boyd.

Game time will be 8 o'clock tonight, and a large crowd is expected to witness the game. The Tigers will hit the road next week for the first time since the season opener when they travel to Gorman.

### Abilene Man Named To Direct Farm Census in Area

Appointment of Max V. Moss, holder of Abilene as a field assistant for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced this week by the Bureau of Census, Department of Commerce.

Mr. Mossholder will direct a force of 22 crew leaders and 301 census takers in 38 counties in North Central Texas. Listed among the 38 counties is Hamilton county.

The 1959 Census of Agriculture will collect information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities, selected farm expenditures, farm values, and mortgage debt. Information will be published for counties, states, and the nation.

## Tigers Fold Blanket 14-6 For Third Win of Year

A twin brother rivalry erupted last Friday night at Tiger Stadium, and after the firing had ceased, Mike Lackey emerged as the Tiger "most likely to succeed."

The little man (maybe a 130 pounds with a sack of nails thrown in) proved to be the visiting Blanket Tigers' undoing as he intercepted two passes, and recovered a fumble which chilled the hopes of a win by the visitors.

One of the interceptions led to Hico's second touchdown which clinched the game, while the other and the fumble recovery stopped Blanket drives.

The game marked the first time in a six-game series with the Brown County team that Hico has been victorious. It gave the locals a 3-0 record for the year, which is also the first time in several years that a Hico team has compiled three consecutive wins this early in the season.

The rivalry mentioned is between twins Pat and Mike Lackey. First one and then the other of the two have come up with big plays in the three Tiger victories.

A packed stadium of Hico fans saw a thinly-manned Tiger eleven take to the field with much fire, and hit and hit and hit until the final gun sounded. The game was strictly defense on the part of the locals, with Lackey, Royce Samford, Lee Blue and Fieldon Haley leading the assault along the forward wall. Heads-up defensive play by the backs also contributed to the victory.

Samford played his finest game of the season, bringing back memories of his slashing defensive play last year. He consistently knifed through with bristling tackles and blocks which proved the undoing of the visitors.

Buzz Hedges, senior quarterback for the Tigers, ripped the Blanket line for Hico's two touchdowns,

both being made on one-yard plunges. Bobby Boone raced around right end for the two-point conversion after the second TD which insured at least a tie in the game. Blanket's only counter came in the third period when Jim Edgar, the brightest of Blanket stars, scampered five yards into paydirt.

Hico led the visitors in every department in the statistical column, except by passing. The locals were never able to complete a pass on the four times attempted, while Blanket connected on six of 13 attempts for 60 yards. Hico out-gained the visitors 178 yards to 45 in the rushing department, and had eight first downs to 4.

Highlight of the game came early in the second period when Neil Ellis unravelled a blistering run of 55 yards to the Blanket nine. Hico went on to the one-foot line where officials ruled that the ball carrier had not scored. On the long-gainer, Ellis broke over right guard, fought away from a pair of tacklers, and was finally overhauled from behind at the nine.

Hico opened up with a stout defense after the opening kickoff, and forced Blanket to punt aft. and three plays. The Tigers put the ball in play at their own 35, and with Ellis, Bobby Boone, and Doyle Crews slashing at the line, worked to the Blanket 17 before losing the ball on downs.

The first scoring chance of the game came midway of the first period when Royce Samford recovered a fumbled punt at the Blanket one-yard line. Ellis placed a beautiful kick deep in Blanket's end full kick deep, and two Hico defenders were on top of the play like a cat after a rat, forcing the fumble. Hedges sneaked the ball into paydirt on the first effort after the recovery. An attempted pass

play for the conversion failed and Hico was in the lead 6-0.

In the opening minutes of the second period, Ellis uncorked the 55-yard gainer to the nine which later went for naught, and was the only scoring threat by either team in that period. The half ended with Hico on top 6-0.

Blanket scored their only TD of the night shortly after the second half kickoff. Hico received, and were penalized to the 11 yard line for clipping on the play. After two plays gained only one yard, Hico elected to kick out, and the punt was blocked. Blanket took possession at the Tiger six yard line.

From the six, Hico held for two

## Junior Tigers Drop Second Game of Season Tuesday Night

The Hico Junior Tigers were defeated Tuesday night 18-14 by Meridian for their second loss in as many starts this year. In their season opener last week, they dropped a 6-0 decision to Glen Rose after outplaying the visitors the entire game.

In the game Tuesday night Meridian scored first in the second quarter and led 6-0 only briefly.

Hico took the following kickoff and marched 60 yards for the tying points, with Alan Solsbery making the final yard in the drive. Solsbery also made most of the yardage in the drive which led to the touchdown.

Meridian went ahead again early in the third period with a 59-yard run for the touchdown. Midway in the final period Meridian intercepted a Hico pass good for another TD to push their lead

to 18-6. Hico took the kickoff and marched 52 yards for their second touchdown of the night, with Frank Phillips carrying over from the five. Bill Rutledge ran for the extra points which brought the score to 18-14 ending the game.

The Junior Tigers play three more games this year, going to Cranfills Gap next Tuesday, visiting Meridian for a return game the following week, and entertaining the Gap here in the final game.

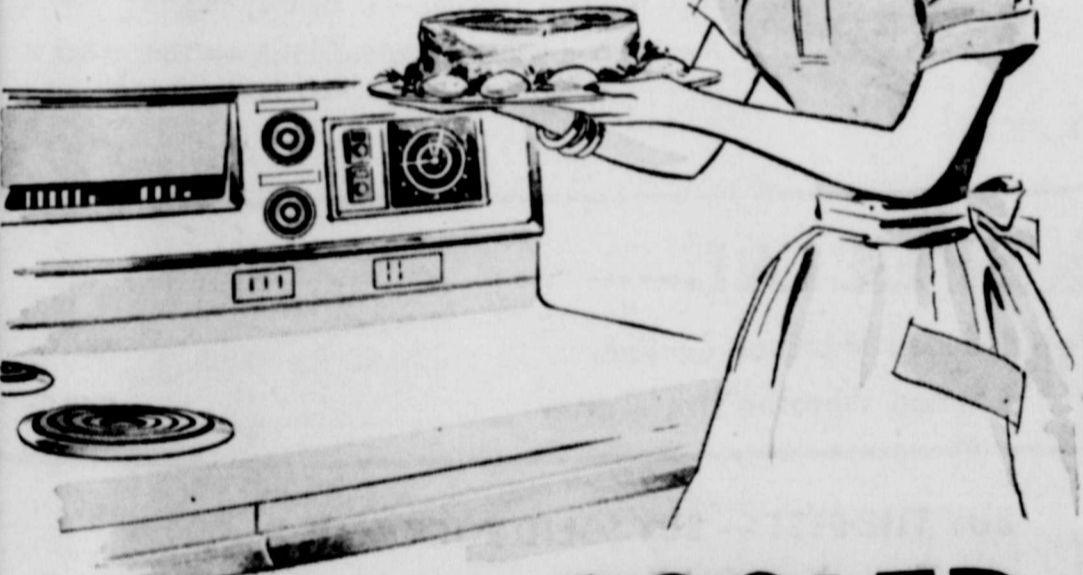

# Denomination Unimportant When Helping Others

Just off the press is a book that has come to me that is indeed one of the most dramatic stories that I have read in many a day. It is "Light In The Jungle" by Leo B. Halliwell and tells of the author's experiences in Brazil for almost forty years. Most of that period was spent on the Amazon River and its tributaries, which he traversed in a motor boat with his wife and children, ministering to the people, spiritually and medically.

Mr. Halliwell was born near the time that I was, in the state of Nebraska. His was a farm family, his father having come to that area in the early 1880's when the Sioux Indians were very much in evidence in all that part of the west. Mrs. Halliwell was about the same age as Mr. Halliwell and she, too, was a native of the same farming area of Nebraska as Mr. Halliwell. They met as young people one night at a barn dance where Leo was fiddling for the dancers. They seemed destined for each other from that first night's meeting and were eventually married.

Leo Halliwell, having finished high school, determined to go to the University of Nebraska and study electrical engineering. At the end of his first year there he came home and discovered that his sweetheart had become attached to a religious group that had come into the state, the Seventh Day Adventists. Leo went with her to the meetings and soon became a convert to that faith and joined the local church with Jesse. When Leo went back to the University in the fall, Jesse also went to Lincoln and entered a hospital to train as a nurse. When Leo got his degree from the University, Jesse got her diploma as a registered nurse.

At that time they both were committed to a life of mission service and soon offered themselves for any foreign field the church wanted to send them to. In due time came their commission to go to Brazil for a life of mission service. They were at first assigned to the district of Bahia, which is in the south part of that big state, that is larger than the U. S. A few years later they were ordered to go to Belem, a city at the mouth of the Amazon, and work from there along the river for its full length, its tributaries and the country lying along each side of the river, which for more than a thousand miles in dense jungle, but inhabited by natives and Portuguese and a lot of half breeds. It was the biggest task ever given a human pair.

For more than thirty years the Halliwells moved up and down that great river ministering to the people. Mrs. Halliwell, who came to be known as Dona Jessie, delivered thousands of babies and ministered to the mothers and children, while Mr. Halliwell helped with the medical service and learned to do a lot of services, even to operations, and with great success. In all those journeys up and down the stream that is much like an inland sea, they travelled in a motor boat that he built with

his own hands. His electrical engineering knowledge helped him continually during all that time.

Mr. Halliwell tells of some of the principles that govern the work of missionaries of his faith. Now I am no Seventh Day Adventist, and know so little of that faith and have had no contacts with its people, but one cannot help but approve of the logic behind the mission service, as exemplified by Mr. Halliwell and his wife. He says that his religious group does not undertake to carry the American way of life to the people it works among, nor does it seek to indoctrinate the people with whom it deals with the church's doctrines. But first the missionaries undertake to serve the people in the realms that they need help, and eventually out of gratitude for the service rendered,

those helped want to be a part of the group that has helped. Now that makes sense. And this man and his wife had great numbers of people, even native Indians, and many who had lived all their lives in the Roman Catholic faith, to join their churches which they started.

This writer is ready to always approve any group of people that make helping others the main thing in their lives and seek to lead them by example to become Christian believers. Certainly I have no condemnation to heap upon any people who follow the convictions of their souls and stand up for those convictions. And I am none the less loyal to my own faith by such attitude. I pray God's blessings upon all who put their faith in Our Father in heaven and rely upon the Savior Christ for salvation.

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

For the past several years, farm and ranch operators have been working toward more production at less cost per unit produced. Many are adding machinery that increases the efficiency of the operator.

This is also true of the egg producer. Derel Fillingim of Hico the most mechanized poultry house I know of in the county. It has automatic feeders, automatic waterers and automatic egg gathering devices. Derel has three houses on his place. One is the regular floor type house that so many have, one is a two-row colony cage house, and the third one is a four-row cage deal. This is the house that has all the automatic equipment in it.

The house is about 20 feet wide and some 300 feet long. The house has four rows of cages running the long way of the house, but they are built so that two rows are more or less together high results in two double rows of cages. Each cage is about 4 feet by six, and houses around 25 laying hens. The rows are constructed so that the eggs roll out the bottom of the cages onto a belt that brings the eggs from two rows to a collecting point outside the house. Just above the egg belt is the automatic feeder and the feeder feeds two rows of cages as it moves down through the house. Water fountains are along the outside of the cages.

With this set-up Derel doesn't have to go through the house except on inspection trips or when he has to remove the droppings.

Derel's automatic equipment is very simple, cheap initial cost and cheap operating costs. Feeding and egg gathering time is saved and this frees him to put this time to other productive work. It is said that laying hens do not lay as many eggs in colony houses as they do in other types, but that there is actually more profit made per dozen eggs over a year's time. It is not easy to describe a house like Derel's, so if you are interested in his operations, drop by and look it over.

D. O. Chew, grade A dairyman at Hico, has just about completed a large hay shed on his place. Chew's new shed is about 40 by 80 feet and will protect many tons of roughage. Too, he has it just about full of hay for the coming winter.

Robert Goodman, another grade A producer, has his new hay shed about completed. Robert's shed is something like 50 by 60 feet. He has a little bit more roofing to add then it will be finished. He too, has already moved in a good supply of roughage.

Alvin Perry, in the Blue Ridge community, has purchased the Rudolph Eisen dairy and is in operation now. Willie Perry, son of Alvin, plans to take over the dairy operations when he finishes high school this coming spring.

Eggs are considered a complete food, according to information received from Marshall Miller, extension poultry marketing specialist. Two eggs in the daily diet will supply the following percentages of needed food elements: vitamin A, 22; thiamine or B1, 7; riboflavin or B2, 16; vitamin D, 24; protein, 17; iron 22; phosphorous 13; calcium 5; and for good measure, the old hen adds some vitamin B12.

Many of you have leather accessories which you plan to wear with your fall and winter clothes. Here are some helpful suggestions for keeping those leather goods:

Leather accessories are expensive items in the clothing budget these days. Fall and winter costumes call for more leather belts, bags, gloves and shoes.

You can preserve the beauty and lengthen the life of leather articles by proper care, according to clothing specialists.

Shoes especially receive hard wear. An economical plan is to have two pairs for alternate daily wear, allowing each pair a rest or dry out between wearings. Perspiration weakens leather, and causes shoes to crack and rip. Use a good shoe cream frequently to protect the leather. Preserve the shape of your shoes by using shoe trees or paper pads in toe and heel.

On belts, bags and gloves, use cream or wax polishes to protect the leather and keep it pliable and soft.

To remove spots from leather articles clean with benzene or gasoline, air well and re-polish. Saddle soap can also be used to remove dirt and grease from leather articles between polishings.

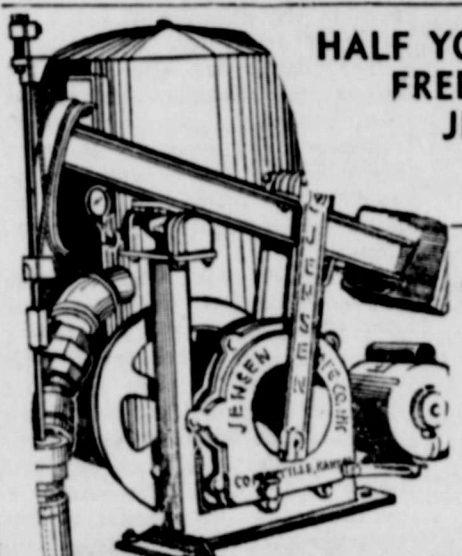

# Iredell Homecoming Slated October 3, History Given

The annual homecoming of Iredell ex-students will be held Saturday, October 3, beginning at 1:30 p.m.

According to historians, sometime between the years 1877-1880 a two-story building was built on the south side of the Bosque River at Iredell for the purpose of school, church and Masonic Lodge functions. This building stood where the present football field is now located.

About the year 1910 a building of stone was erected to take the place of the first one. In the year 1933 the building of the present school system was begun. Consolidation of surrounding schools made Iredell one of the biggest and best rural high schools.

It was in honor of these schools that the P-TA decided to sponsor a homecoming for all ex-teachers, students and visitors who wanted to take part in this celebration.

On Saturday afternoon, Nov. 14, 1933, the first registration was begun. The first to register was the late W. B. Phillips of Fort Worth, who attended classes in the year 1896. It was estimated that six or seven hundred were present for this occasion. The oldest class represented was that of 1882, and the largest class represented was that of 1938. 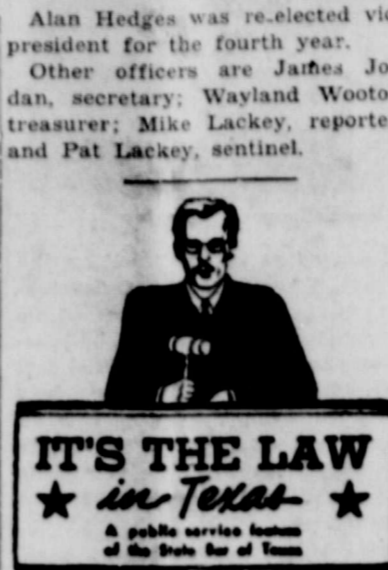
After the initiation we had barbecue chicken for supper which Floyd Drake and Wayland Wooton prepared.

## CONSTITUTION WEEK SIGNIFICANT EVENT

The week of September 17-23 has been designated as "Constitution Week." Each year an observance is scheduled throughout the nation in recognition of the importance of the federal constitution, which forms the basis of our national government. It insures a stable balance of powers between the legislative, executive and judicial branches of government by providing curbs upon the authority of each.

For instance, mighty as our Congress is, the Constitution does not give it certain powers:

1. Neither Congress nor any body else can suspend the writ of habeas corpus (unless the public safety demands it during rebellion or invasion). All officers or others must obey a court and bring in anyone in their custody to see whether he is held lawfully.

2. Congress cannot pass "bills of attainder," special acts to punish someone. Congress cannot by-pass the courts.

3. Congress cannot pass an ex post facto law—a law which makes an act a crime which was not one when done, or which punishes the offender more than called for when done.

4. Congress cannot tax exports from any state nor by regulation favor one state's ports over another, nor make one state's vessels clear or pay duties to another state in order to enter.

Besides these denials from within, the constitution curbs Congress and the executive and judiciary in the amendments, especially the first ten.

# Game Warden Reports

Fishing for the past week end has improved considerably with several good catches of crappie and sand bass being reported in the lake area.

Dove hunting has been just like it started out in this area with not too much hunting and very few doves being bagged. But this week I have noticed a few more dove along the roads, so it might mean that the long-awaited Kansas dove has started drifting into the area.

Last week I quoted the Hamilton County deer law, and mentioned the season would be from Nov. 16 through Dec. 5, and that the bag limit would be one buck deer and one antlerless deer or two antlerless deer, which is the way that the season is set up. But what I failed to mention was that the taking of antlerless deer is left up to the Game & Fish Commission and the landowners. Since the deer are just now making a come-back in Hamilton County, it will not be necessary to have an antlerless hunt this year. I was not trying to confuse anyone but just trying to bring to your attention that it would be lawful to take antlerless deer if it was deemed necessary in the future.

So to make it clear—the season will be from Nov. 16 through Dec. 5, both days inclusive, with the bag limit of one buck only with hardened antlers protruding through the hide.

The quail that have been planted in the lake are doing as well as can be expected with few casualties being brought about by a few so-called sportsmen who can't resist the temptation to put a few on the ground. And also a few have been run over by cars, but outside of this they are doing nicely.

Huntsville (Sp). — Inmate contestants, plus a host of the nation's topflight television and recording stars will be the bill of fare for the 28th annual Texas Prison Rodeo here in the prison's \$1,000,000 stadium each Sunday in October.

Big name stars such as James Arness of the TV series "Gunsmoke," along with Johnny Cash, popular country-style singer, open the 1959 series on October 4.

Dale Robertson of "Tales of Wells Fargo," and Tommy Sands, sensational singing idol of the teenage crowd, appear on Oct. 11, while Steve McQueen of "Wanted—Dead or Alive," teams with Singer Johnny Horton of "The Battle of New Orleans" fame on Oct. 18.

For the October 25 performance, prison officials say they will produce two additional nationally-known stars for the closing of the 1959 series.

In addition, there will be other outside acts, rodeo clowns, inmate entertainment, groups and mounting quadrilles from Pasadena and Bellville. The Houston Range Riders also will appear and for the first time the rodeo will feature a girl's barrel race event.

H. H. Coffield, Rockdale businessman, who serves as chairman of the Texas Board of Corrections and its rodeo committee, said, "We are doing everything possible to present the best entertainment feature found anywhere."

"We are of the opinion that a well-rounded show will attract more people to this unusual rodeo which benefits around 12,000 inmates of the Texas Department of Corrections."

Coffield explained that net proceeds from rodeo ticket sales are placed in the prisoners' welfare fund which is used to supply rehabilitative services not furnished by the Texas Legislature.
