It insures a stable balance of powers between the legislative, executive and judicial branches of government by providing curbs upon the authority of each.

For instance, mighty as our Congress is, the Constitution does not give it certain powers:

1. Neither Congress nor any. body else can suspend the writ of habeas corpus (unless the public safety demands it during rebellion or invasion). All officers or others must obey a court and bring in anyone in their custody to see whether he is held lawfully.

2. Congress cannot pass "bills of attainder," special acts to punish someone. Congress cannot by-pass the courts. 3. Congress cannot pass an ex

post facto law-a law which makes tion. an act a crime which was not one offender more than called for when

4. Congress cannot tax exports from any state nor by regulation favor one state's ports over anothers, nor make one state's vessels clear or pay duties to another


