\$12,700 in Improvements Will Be Made on Fairy Farm Road

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$12,700 for improvements on farm to market roads in Hamilton County during 1960, Thomas C. Collier, District Engineer at Waco, has announced. This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program.

The State Highway Commission, at its November meeting, approved this appropriation of \$12,700 to improve already existing farm to market roads in this county. A total of \$20 million was allotted to Texas counties for farm road improvements during the year. This \$20 million will be spent for shouldering, widening, seal coat jobs, additional surfacing, and for widening of structures and roads.

The project in Hamilton County will be under the supervision of the local highway district personnel.

"We should have this program moving by spring," District Engineer Collier said. "We believe the money spent in this county will go a long way toward bringing these roads up to date."

Funds allotted for Hamilton County will be spent on the following project:

FM 1602 from Fairy to US 281 at Hico, a distance of approximately 9.6 miles, level up and seal coat at an estimated cost of \$12,700.

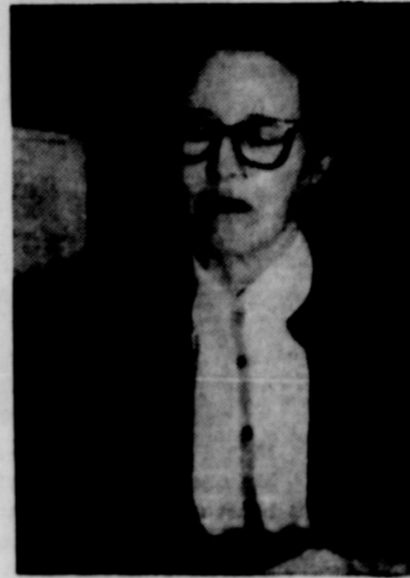

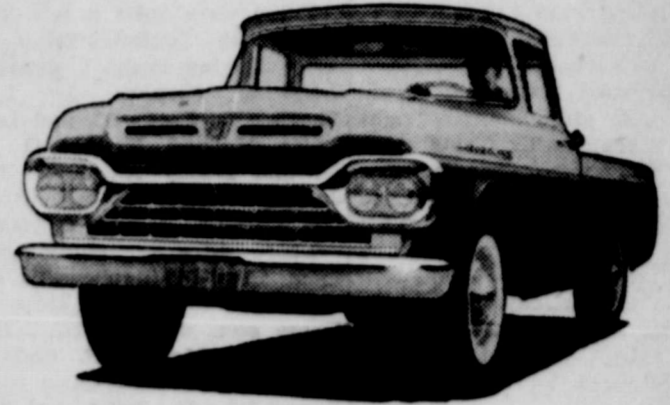

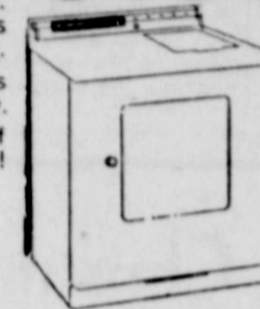

IT HAPPENED . . .

HERE OR NEAR

A good story is a good story, whoever wrote it, or what his nationality, or his period of activity. Well, here is a bit about a good story by an English author that appeared in the 4th volume of Reader's Digest Condensed Books for this year of 1953. The title of the story is "The Miracle of Merriford." The fact that the story mentions a newspaper published at Pottsville, Texas, adds a bit of interest to it and perhaps to all Hamilton County folks. For that Pottsville paper mentioned had an article in it that aroused a gener-

ous and sympathetic soul to send a check to Merriford, England, that performed the miracle about which the author Reginald Arkell tells in the story.

To be more explicit about it we have to tell of a very old community in England made up of old-fashioned people, and everything in the community was of the character of its citizenry. We meet an old Vicar of the Merriford Church who had spent all his life in that community ministering to the people of the church. Things moved slowly always in the ways of the

past until some time after World War II when Uncle Sam was allowed to put an air base in that very community with a three-mile runway for its jet planes. The local people resented the intrusion, and the Americans who worked on the project were scorned by the local people and a lot of complaints were made, the old Vicar himself much out of humour about what he thought was a tragic situation.

The ancient church, dating from the middle ages, over which the Vicar presided, had a bell that was much loved by the populace, and one Sunday morning it failed to ring. Everybody was appalled. What could be the matter? The news soon spread that the jet planes that used the long runway and broke the sound barrier followed by the terrific blasts that made all ears tingle, had damaged the belfry of the old church to an extent that the bell could no longer be rung. When the Vicar got figures on the cost of repair the estimate was so high that there was no prospect of ever being able to repair the belfry and get the bell ringing once more. Gloom settled over the whole local populace. It was such a dire situation that the old Vicar decided he would have to give up his pastorate and acknowledge that he was an old man no longer able to lead the church.

Now the Vicar was a bachelor and kept a young girl as housekeeper. And though all the community was bitterly against the Americans, one American airman had met the Vicar's housekeeper and he liked her, and she was in like temper toward him. That airman felt mighty bad about the enmity stirred up in the church membership and in the Vicar, and talked about it a good deal to the other Americans, as they would spare the time to listen.

A public relations man of the airfield got wind of the matter and decided he would send out a news item about the situation. The airman who was seeing the Vicar's housekeeper repeated some things about the church in its long past and the public relations man a bit carelessly got some things in the news story that were somewhat off center. One was about a black death epidemic that had come to the community in the middle ages and almost decimated the parish; he made it sound as if recent. Then the news story was sent out by a news agency to most American newspapers.

The editor of the Pottsville, Texas, weekly was looking for something sensational for his front page and ran across the story. He

ordered his compositor to put a big headline on it and run it on the front page. That worthy did just that and now the miracle happened.

A good woman of charitable disposition of the Pottsville community read the story and her sympathy was aroused for the Merriford church, and her loyal American heart moved her to sit down and write a check for ten thousand dollars and send to the old Vicar to repair the bell tower and get the bell ringing again, and said she hoped the enmity toward the American boys would in some degree be reduced.

Well, the check reached the old Vicar and he got work started on the belfry repair and in due time the bell was ringing again, and the spirit of the whole community was changed to one of warm friendliness toward the Americans and they were invited to all the services of the ancient church and their money giving and presence revitalized the whole community.

Now I would have to spoil my story by my investigations! I went to Pottsville and inquired about the newspaper there. I interviewed several folks and they all shook their heads. "Ain't never been no newspaper here that we ever heard of," they said in each case.

But anyhow it's a good story and I read it with pleasure.
