



Cotton root rot takes a big bite out of many cotton farmer's profits, says Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist. He also states that the average loss has been estimated for all growers of the Central Blackland area at 25 per cent.

Although root rot cannot be eliminated, it can be reduced.

This past cotton season, root rot caused much trouble over the county, and generally, damage can be looked for when there are summer showers. According to Smith, now is a good time for cotton growers to make plans against this disease.

Smith gives these pointers toward reducing root rot: Deep plow badly infested areas; Grow resistant crops in rotation; Turn under large tonnages of organic matter; Produce early cotton; Avoid excessive planting rates.

The pathologist also states that a combination of these practices carried on for a number of years is necessary for best results. Too, where recommended practices have been carried out over a period of years, root rot damage has been reduced from 75 to 5 per cent or

The winter grain mite is showing up in some fields of small grains. Generally, this insect does not show up in fields that are in a crop rotation. They are chiefly found where grain is sowed following grain. Their presence is first indicated by a silvery appearance of the leaves. Later the tips of the leaves turn brown. The insect is not too easy to find on the small grain plants as it drops to the ground quickly when the plants are lightly disturbed.

When checking for the mite get down on hands and knees, close to the grain, gently lay the small plants over with the hand and look for the mite near the base of the plants, on the stems and on the ground.

These insects can be controlled by spraying with Malathion or Parathion. Both these insecticides should be used according to the directions on the containers. Malathion emulsifiable concentrate (5 pounds per gallon) at the rate of one and a fourth pints per acre. Parathion emulsifiable concentrate (2 pounds per gallon) at the rate of one pint per acre. Do not graze for 15 days after spraying.

When the temperature drops be low 40 degrees, the mite stops feeding and goes into the ground. or above they stop feeding and go down off the plants to the ground. This means that sprays should be applied when the temperature is between 40 and 75 degrees for best

From one to two pints of Parathion spray per acre is also a good control for the green bug.

Parathion is highly toxic to man and animal and should be handled with extreme caution.




