

NOW IN USE-The bridge which spans Grubbs Branch in the western part of Hico was in use again this week after city workers partially completed the new span. The bridge was put out of use when a heavily-loaded truck crashed through the structure more than two months ago. However, restriction of load limits of less than 5,000 pounds has been put into effect until the bridge is completed. Due to the unusual wet conditions, workers have been unable to place piers beneath the structure, and until this is done, the load limit will remain in effect. Meanwhile trucks will have to use the crossing directly below the bridge. City officials stated that the piers would be poured just as soon as the ground is dry.



P-TA Endorses Session.

Some 85 per cent of local P-TA leaders in Texas favor a special session to raise teachers' salaries, according to a report made to Gov.

Mrs. T. W. Whaley of Kosse. president of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, told the governor that executive committee members of 563 local P-TA units were polled. She said 8,155 favored a special

session, 847 were undecided and 563 were against it. There were no sugestions as to how to pay the

Poll Tax Assailed.

Next Texas Legislature may be called upon to vote on whether the S. Constitution should be amended to outlaw the poll tax.

U. S. Senate has voted out a proposed amendment to void the tax. It goes next to the House, which has passed such a measure five times before.

If the House passes it, it will then have to be ratified within seven years by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states.

Texas is one of five states which still have a poll tax. Others are Virginia, Mississippi, Alabama and Arkansas.

State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer predicts that nearly 5,000,-000 cars will be registered this year. This adds up to some long lines April 1 unless a lot of people buy early.

Greer emphasized the importance of each vehicle owner's registering his car or truck in his home county. When he goes to register, each owner should take his certificate of title and last year registration receipt.

It will be remembered by many that Mr. Hendrix and his daughter, Malinda, age 31, both were drowned at Blue Hole near the present Honey Creek crossing. This was on May 25, 1903. Though only a small child we can remember hearing our parents and others talk of the tragedy and remember seeing their team of horses lying dea i beside the road after they had been removed from the hole of water. Mr. Hendrix, who was about 64, and his daughter had been to Hico for a load of feed and supplies. On their return home they stopped at the crossing for the team to drink. This dangerous hole was just at the crossing's edge. The team got too far to one side and all went down in that dangerous 20-feet deep hole together. Sacks of feed were said to have fell on Mr. Hendrix and daughter. The grief-stricken mother, Mrs. D. C. Hendrix, passed away in November of the follow-

Then exactly 36 years and one day, this same dangerous hole of water took the life of our dear son, James Dudley Richardson on June 25, 1939. His death still remains a partial mystery. We can also remember back around 1900 or maybe a year or two later when our parents and family were on their way to Moody, Texas to visit relatives, in the covered wagon days. Our dad also stopped for the team to drink. As they kept inching along as they drank, dad noticed the right hand wheels of the wagon seemed to be sinking. 



may render decisions, thus making it possible that five judges, all of whom may be from foreign countries, and even from Communist nations, could render decisions for or against America.

The Secretary of State, testifying before the Senate Committee, said that we should not be misapprehensive that repeal of the Connally Amendment would threaten the control of the United States over its own domestic matters. He says that domestic issues are "clearly beyond" the Court's jurisdiction.

It is true that domestic matters are beyond the Court's jurisdiction, but with the repeal of the Connally Amendment, it would be up to the World Court as to whether it had jurisdiction or not.

The Secretary of State also said that such matters as immigration, tariffs, and the Panama Canal should come under the International Court's jurisdiction. That is exactly what might happen should the Connally Amendment be repealed.

Attorney General Rogers said that repeal would "greatly enhance the prestige" of the United States. It should seem clear to anyone that the surrender of national sovereignty to possibly five individuals who may be from Communist nations is a terrible price to pay for "prestige."

If this nation does not have prestige by this time, by reason of all it has done for the world since World War II, 't is not likely to buy it with capitulations of this

Since, under the Constitution, only the United States Senate ratifies treaties and agreements of this nature, the matter will not come to the House of Representatives. Every citizen should hope that our Senate will not repeal the Connally Amendment.
