Hico voters returned incumbents V. H. Jenkins and E. V. Meador to the Hico School Board in balloting Saturday which saw a total of 146 votes cast.

Meador polled 117 votes, and Jenkins received 104. E. A. Black, only other candidate, received 53, and Donald Hefner polled 10 write-in votes.

J. B. Woodard received 125

votes in the local box for County Trustee from Precinct 3. He also polled sufficient votes in Carlton and Fairy to be elected. He had no opposition.

Lagree West, unopposed candidate for County Trustee at Large, polled 119 votes locally, and J. B. Wooton of Hico received three write-in votes for the post.

Fairy voters elected Vernon Knapp and O. I. Garner Jr. to serve on that board. Both are new members.

Carlton voters elected Claudeann Carroll and Tull Thompson.

YOU CAN CONQUER—DISCOURAGEMENT

"Why art thou cast down, O my soul?" Psalm 42:5.

All men are subject to discouragement. According to an old legend an angel once appeared to the devil and told him that every temptation but one was to be taken from him. Satan quickly asked which temptation was he permitted to keep and to use against mankind. When the angel told him it was discouragement, he exclaimed, "Good! If that is left me, it includes all others." There is much truth in this legend for Satan can enter the heart of the strongest Christian with discouragement and work miracles for himself. Discouragement weakens a man on every side of his nature and throws open the door that transgression and sin may enter.

Men who studied the doctrine of God in the middle ages made much of what they called the Seven Deadly Sins. These were Pride, Envy, Anger, Avarice (greed of gain), Gluttony, Sensuality (lust), and Discouragement. It surprises us to see discouragement thought of as a sin. We have come to regard it as simply a misfortune or an affliction. On what grounds did these early theologians regard it as a sin? Discouragement is the result of the lack of faith in God and His providence.

What are the causes for discouragement? Wrong opinions at the time of physical distress may cause discouragement. Unfriendliness, and unkind criticism may bring on discouragement. Still another reason for discouragement is loneliness and disappointment. Some have stood in the bright lights of success in their youth to awaken one morning to find that they are no longer young and active.

The cure for discouragement is an unshakable faith in the Son of God. In preparing the disciples for His death, Jesus said "In the world ye shall have tribulation; but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world."

God grant that discouragement may flee and faith abound!

Most of the pastures over the county have just plain old barbed or net or a combination of both around them. And generally speak-ing there is nothing attractive about a fence of this kind. Of course, one does enjoy seeing a new fence.

Grover McAnelly, out on the Pottsville farm to market road, has just an average wire fence around his place, pastures, home, etc. But he made an addition to that part of the fence around his home that certainly does set his homestead off and makes it look most attractive. And all he did was paint the posts white, cap-ping of the top six or eight inches with red paint.

Drive out by Grovers some time —it's very nice and pleasing to see.

Oscar Buffe, Indian Gap, has a very attractive entrance to his home. At the cattle guard he has constructed two open-centered posts and the centers are filled with dirt in which is growing cactus plants. The posts are about four feet high and some three feet square, made of concrete blocks. The cactus plants are plants that don't take much water and are not much trouble to care for.

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
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
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
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THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Austinites Mark June 14 for State Democratic Convention

Austin.—Texas Democrats have marked June 14 on their calendars. Austinites have circled it in red. June 14 is the day some 5,000 Texas Democrats will converge on the Capitol City for their state convention.

It's expected to be many big days rolled into one. It will be the first time in recent memory that the huge colorful gathering has come to Austin. A large new city auditorium and convention center makes it possible. It's the day that comes only once every four years when Tex-

ans name delegates to a national presidential nominating convention. But most excitement centers on the fact that Texas Democrats will be assuming what is usually a once-in-a-lifetime role—that of sponsoring a major contender for the presidential nomination. Work is underway in every part of the state to insure that the delegates to Austin will give rousing support to Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson for favorite son nominee and chairman of the Texas delegation to Los Angeles. Senator Johnson's chances of becoming president were re-emphasized by Gov. Price Daniel and cheered by the State Democratic

Committee when the party leaders met to plan the June convention. Committee members selected Dallas for the second state Democratic convention on September 20. Their meeting also was made an occasion for honoring Mrs. Hilda Weinert of Seguin for a quarter-century of loyal service to the Texas Democratic party.

Court Rejects Vote Hassle
Texas Supreme Court refused to consider a direct appeal from the City of Austin that it order a complete recount of votes in a hotly contested urban renewal election.

Issue has had Austinites in a stew for months. It was originally announced after the election in December that urban renewal had carried by a 52-vote margin. Eight property owners contested the election results on grounds that ballots were cast by persons not qualified to vote.

After 9 of 18 contested boxes had been opened, District Judge James K. Evetts of Belton declared the election void. He said there were so many disqualified voters and improperly marked ballots that it was impossible to determine the election outcome.

Austin's city attorney petitioned the Supreme Court for a writ of mandamus to compel Judge Evetts to open and examine all the boxes. He contended the qualified voters had a right to have their votes counted.

Having lost out on a direct plea to the Supreme Court, City Attorney Doren Eskew said he would go through the usual appeal route, going first to the Third Court of Civil Appeals.

College Home Delayed.
Governor Daniel's office and the Legislative Budget Board are to make a "full review" before plans to proceed to build an \$87,000 home for the president of Sam Houston State Teachers College.

A number of legislators hit the ceiling last session over similarly costly homes built for presidents of Southwest Texas State College and Stephen F. Austin College. Restrictions were written into the current appropriations bill aimed at preventing further expenditures on such a scale.

Rep. James M. Cotten member of the House committee on saving taxes, wrote the governor to protest what he called a "tremendous waste."

Governor Daniel said he had been assured by the chairman of the Board of Regents for State Teachers Colleges that no action would be taken until everyone interested had had his say. He pointed out, however, that the home was to be built from constitutionally allocated funds to which the legislative appropriation restrictions "have been held not to apply."

More Judges Suggested.
Larger metropolitan areas such as Houston, Dallas and San Antonio may soon need larger Courts of Civil Appeals. This observation was made by Associate Justice James R. Norvell of the Texas Supreme Court and others in a study made for the Texas Civil Judicial Council. Judge Norvell suggested that five judges, rather than three, may

be needed soon for the courts in the city areas.

Supreme Court, the study also noted, may also soon need some further restrictions on cases it will handle to prevent too heavy dockets. Civil Appeals Courts were created to keep everything from going to the Supreme Court, but the high court is flooded with appeals from these courts.

Judge Norvell suggested limiting the Supreme Court to constitutional issues and cases where there is a conflict in judicial decisions.

Tighter Driving Law.
Legislation that would crack down on the driver who does not even have a drivers license has been proposed for the next session.

Rep. Ben Lewis of Dallas said that under present law a person who drives without a license can only be hauled before a city court and fined about \$10.

By contrast, he said, a license holder who gets three tickets and has had his license suspended can, if he drives during the suspension, be put in jail and fined as much as \$500.

Lewis said he would propose a series of stiffer penalties for the people who cannot pass driver tests but drive anyway.

5. When you were elected to Congress there was no foreign import oil problem. Now, after being elected to Congress 7 terms, the oil business is in bad shape from excessive imports of oil. Why have you been so ineffective in representing your oil producing constituents?
6. Isn't it true that on February 17, 1955, you voted for a Closed Rule that prevented the Congressmen from the oil producing states from offering an amendment to cut imports to 10 per cent of the domestic demand?
7. Your votes for the Pork Barrel bills indicate that you think the government has plenty of money. If so, why has the Old Age Assistance payments been kept so low? Wouldn't it be better for YOUR district to raise the Old Age Assistance payments instead of building more power and irrigation dams and other wasteful and extravagant public works?
8. Why has the income of the farmer dropped to the lowest in fifteen years? Why does the government have nearly \$9,000,000,000.00 worth of farm products in storage? Why does it cost \$1,262,000,000.00 each year for storing, transporting and financing the surplus? What have you done to solve the farm problem?
9. Pakistan is our faithful ally, located near both Russia and Red China. Why did you vote against giving them surplus wheat, when they had famine resulting from two years of drought?
10. Since you have been so ineffective in 7 terms, why do you ask for an 8th term?

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
