The average spendable income per farmer in 1959 was \$2,364, being figured on the basis of what the farmer has left after paying all production expenses.

The 16 per cent decline in total farm income showed a total of \$11 billion in 1959, compared with \$13.1 billion in 1958. The USDA attributed the drop to lower cash receipts and higher production problem to most Texas farmers.

Cash receipts went down in 32 states, including Texas, and crops hogs, eggs, wheat, broilers and soybeans. In contrast, production expenses were higher in 43 states. also including Texas. Most of the increase in production expenses cost of repairs and operations, at Smith's Magnolia Sta., Hico livestock purchases, fertilizer, hiring labor and taxes.

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
