### Pecan Meeting Slated April 28 At Gentry Mills

Ralph Lawrence, county agent, has announced a pecan meeting to be held Thursday afternoon, April 28, starting at 2 o'clock. The meeting will be held on the Wayne Durham farm, located about two miles east of Gentry Mills just across the river.

Mr. E. G. Hancock, horticulturist from A & M College Extension Service will demonstrate pecan budding, spraying for insect control, and also discuss orchard management, development and pecan varieties.

According to Lawrence, many hundreds of dollars could be added to the income of the county if the pecan bottoms along the rivers and streams were developed and cared for.

Persons with pecan timber on their places are urged to attend the meeting.

## Fairy Track Team Cops District Title Last Week

The Fairy track team took first place in the District 25-B meet held at Clifton on April 12, scoring a total of 133 points. In second place was Flat with 127 points. Oglesby was third with 91; Turnersville fourth with 85 points. Jonesboro did not compete.

Tommy Walker of Fairy was high point individual of the meet with 42 points.

Last November, the State Commission on School Accreditation visited the Hico schools, and their report which follows was the basis used by the local school board in deciding to present the high school building plan, which voters will either approve or disapprove April 30. The Committee's report was favorable in every respect, with the exception of the High School Building.

It was upon the recommendation of this committee that the local board decided to go ahead with plans for renovating the present facilities.

The committee recommended that the Hico Independent School District be advised of the need for correcting the deficiencies described below in order to maintain an accredited school.

The Committee's report:

"Although there were many evidences of excellent teaching the high school, the instructional program was hampered by the conditions or deficiencies described below:

"1. The physical condition of the building was poor. The school building was constructed in 1921 and was in need of repairs. The auditorium, located on the third floor, was poorly heated and inaccessible for school programs and community meetings. The location of the auditorium also presented a fire hazard.

"2. In most rooms, artificial lighting consisted of unshaded incandescent light fixtures. Classrooms and hallways in the building needed repainting. Some classrooms were not equipped with window shades. Classroom floors were generally in poor repair. Restrooms were not adequate for a high school of this size.

"3. The agriculture farm shop was in need of repair and the arrangement of power tools constituted a safety hazard." "Recommendation: It is recommended that the Hico Independent School District be advised of the need for correcting the deficiencies described above in order to maintain an accredited school."

Hico patrons will vote Saturday, April 30 on a \$98,000.00 bond issue for the purpose of renovating the high school plant.

## Fantasies In Daily Life

### Meditations:

Some seventy feet from our southeast window is a clear bush about as tall as I am. As the sun raised his head above the horizon Monday morning I was looking at that bush. Northwestward from the bush extended a dark streak, of the same ground-level diameter as the bush, a hundred feet or more—its shadow. If one were painting a picture of that area he would simply move his brush daubed in black paint from the bush to show the shadow. I examined one of those tiny leaves of the bush and cogitated, "How could so small a leaf cast such a shadow?" By itself, it did not, but joined with the same light-absorbing power as the other million leaflets there was the complete obstruction of the sun's rays. So many tiny leaflets together can make a shadow that will attract attention.

One person may be quite small and insignificant in the affairs of the world, but if united with a million or a hundred and eighty-odd million more an influence can be exerted that will affect the destiny of the world. You are just one, but you, too, count in the matters of this world. Stand up and be counted.

The wild flowers for the most part have their blossoms turned toward the sun when it comes up daily. As the sun moves toward the zenith those flower faces follow the sun. When the sun glides toward the western horizon the flower faces look that way until

the sun no longer shines. But tomorrow morning the flower faces will greet the sun with their faces toward the east. It is the way of the flowers.

You often hear the words, "Face toward the sun." That is sage advice. There is a lot of gloom, dark shadows, in this world. If you face always toward the sun the depressing influence of the shadows will not overwhelm your spirit. What makes the flowers face the sun? God made them that way. So He made us to face the sun and, thus avoid the hindering influences of the dark things of earthly existence.

I sat and gazed toward the river. A buzzard was up there in the sky skimming about in circles, rising higher and higher, and yet without ever moving his wings. As long as I gazed at him he did not flap his wings a single time. Last year about this time I saw a flock of geese, perhaps a hundred in the flock, moving toward the north for their summer nesting. They moved without any movement of their wings. They continually circled, but always they moved on toward the north. What magic force was lifting those birds and carrying them on without effort?

The first time I ever observed that phenomenon was in the year 1890. Along with father we were at the foot of the mountain range that lay to the south of our home. A great number of vultures were up in the sky, just circling, ever

circling. Occasionally one would fold his wings and dive toward the earth and as he made the turn back upward at the bottom of his dive there would be a loud boom as if an explosion had occurred. The buzzard would rise back up to his former level and circle with the rest of the flock.

I said to father, "How can they stay up without moving their wings? and how can they rise back up there when they dive? Father did not have the answer, although I thought he knew everything. It was forty years later that I read the explanation. Men of science had taken note of the phenomenon and had finally discovered how such a miracle could occur. Thermals, they call them, hold up the birds. Thermals are currents of warmer air pushed up by the settling of the colder heavier air. Those thermals move with the general lateral movement of the air. Birds found it out a long time before man discovered the phenomenon.

There are forces in life that one can take advantage of and so rise to high levels of accomplishment. If one gets into those streams of lifting influence he will find success much easier to attain. A discerning boy or girl will soon see the effects of those influences and like the birds will take advantage of them. Some will be too dumb or too involved in the simply terrestrial to ever make the discovery and will slide along from the cradle to the grave without any worthy attainment.

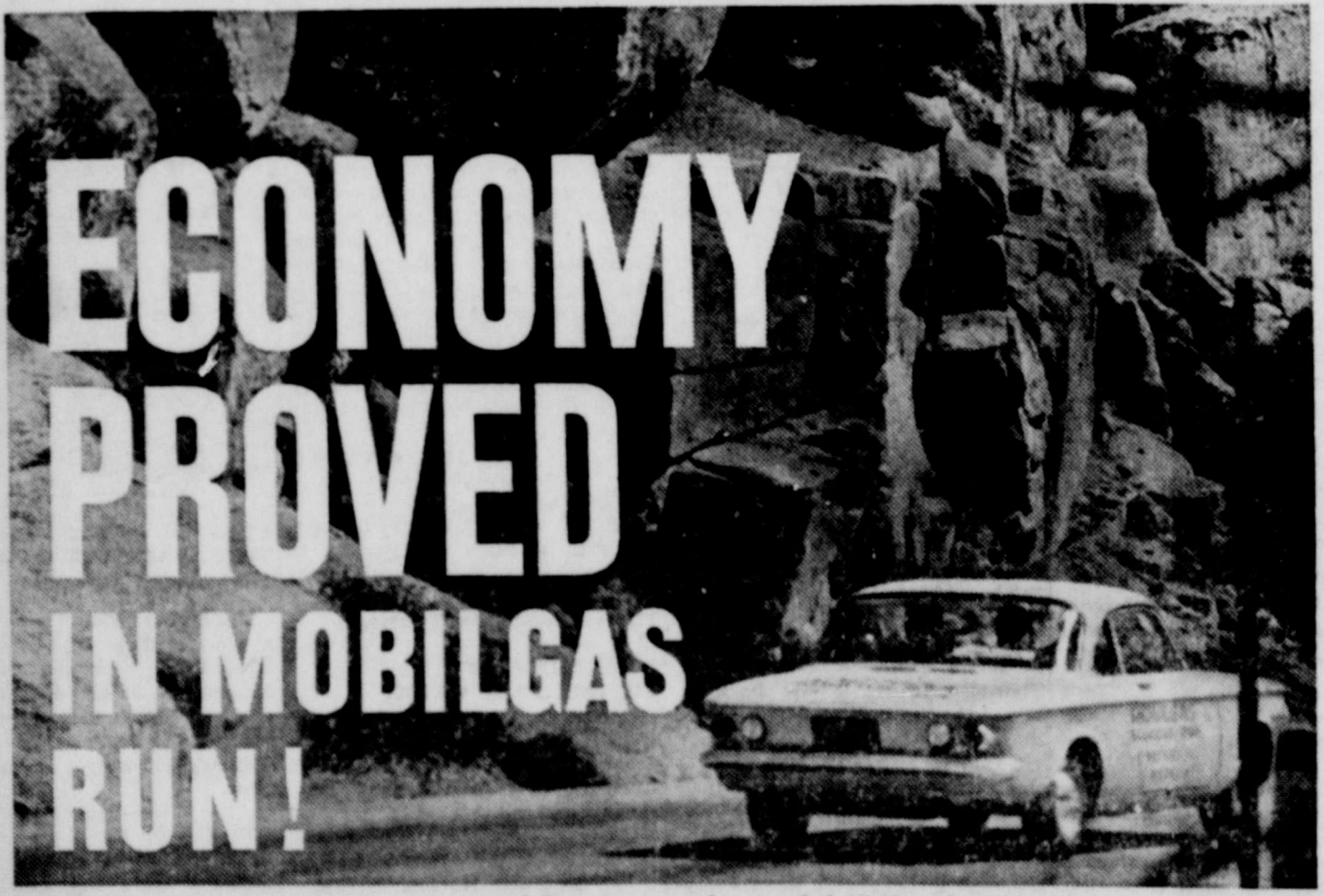

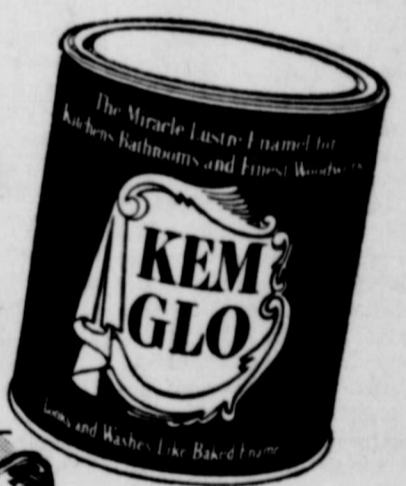

On the Home Range

TIME TO SPRUCE UP YOUR OUTDOOR FURNITURE

With warm weather already starting, this is a good time to get outdoor furniture in condition for summer use.

If you have non-anodized aluminum outdoor furniture that has started to pit, rub with 2-0 steel wool and oil the hinges carefully.

Freshen iron furniture by removing soil with warm soapy water, a brush and cloth.

To repair loose bindings on rattan furniture, soak them in warm water, rewind carefully and tack.

Redwood furniture can also be finished with a tung oil sealer.

The kind designed for outdoor furniture will dry in the presence of moisture, according to the specialists.

Replacements of sail cloth and canvas covers for directors chairs and butterfly chairs can be found ready-made, or you can make them yourself if you are fairly skilled at sewing jobs.

CLEANING UPHOLSTERY ON FOAM RUBBER
Much of the newer furniture is cushioned with foam rubber and upholstered with fabric.

the stain, next the type of fabric, and lastly the effect of the cleaning agent on foam rubber.

Soaps, detergents, glycerin, denatured alcohol, benzene, carbon tetrachloride, sodium hydrosulfite, sodium thiosulphate and a weak solution of ammonia are acceptable cleaning agents as far as the foam rubber is concerned.

Specialists warn that tetrachloride should be used sparingly. It is rubber solvent. Normal rubbing of the outside cornering on right or fixed seats will not harm the foam rubber cushion.

Cleaning agents that do have a harmful effect on foam rubber are of the bleaching and oxidizing types.

If the nature of the stain or the type of the fabric calls for the use of one of the above cleaning agent, specialists suggest that the fabric be removed from the foam rubber and cleaned separately.

OLD AGE PENSIONS

With all their wild spending, our Career Congressmen have overlooked a place where a moderate amount of spending would do a great deal of good.

A person on Old Age Assistance in Texas draws an average of \$52.99 per month, with a maximum of \$67.00 per month. These amounts are inadequate.

Old age assistance in Texas can and should be raised to \$100.00 maximum and \$75.00 average. This can be done without unbalancing the budget.

The reason why this additional payment can be made at such low expense to the government is threefold. First the old age pension rolls are going down rapidly, there being now only 2,300,000 on the rolls as against the peak of 2,700,000 in 1952.

Social Security is entirely different from Old Age Assistance. It is not a government grant, but is an insurance system, the premiums for which are paid by the employer and employee.

The so-called "liberalizing" amendments of the Social Security law are just another tax. Already the rates are going up more rapidly than planned, and the wage base has been greatly increased.

on State and Federal help in connection with a voluntary plan for private insurance. It should not be tied on to Social Security as another tax.

Congress is playing politics with Social Security. The funds, as they come into the treasury, are immediately spent. Instead of investing the funds in government bonds, purchased in the open market, the government issues new bonds and places them in the trust fund, thus adding to the amount of the national debt.

Over the two decades or more since social security became the law of the land, the treasury has collected uncounted billions in social security taxes. In theory, these taxes go into a fund to meet obligations which become due when a man's file application for the benefit payments guaranteed by social security. But there exists no such fund.

When social security was conceived and put into effect the payments made by employers and employees were placed in a special fund. This fund began to grow to huge proportions. It was mighty tempting to the spendthrifts in Washington. They shifted the fund to the general treasury. Then the spenders began using the social security money in the spending orgy that the nation has been suffering from for 25 years.

People who are expecting to benefit from social security payments after they retire had better investigate and find out what these Career Congressmen are doing with their social security payments.

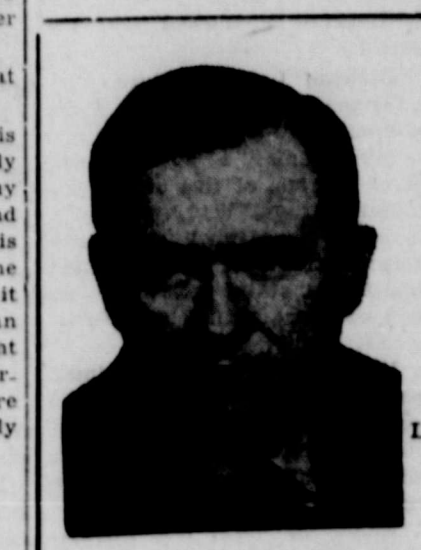

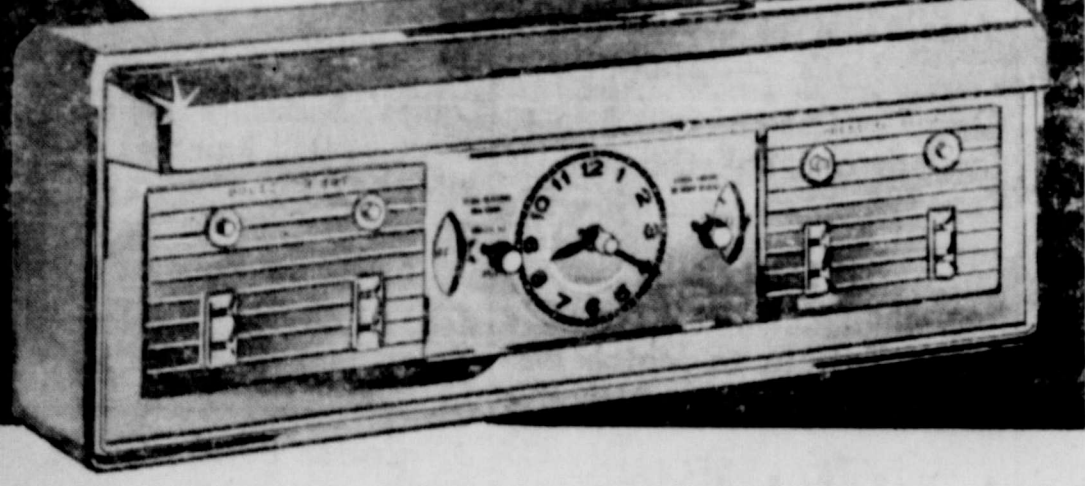

## FARM LEGISLATION FOR 60's

The vague outlines of Washing- ton farm legislation for the 1960's is beginning to appear dimly in patterns of controversy and a bet- ter idea of what to look for next might be gained by glancing at what has happened in the past three decades.

Each of these three decades has been marked by different and dis- tinct attitudes in Washington to- ward the problems of agriculture. Going back to the 1930's, the de- cade of the Great Depression, there was an economic disaster that stifled the entire economy and pushed one out of every four farmers into bankruptcy. The prob- lem then was strictly a dearth of markets instead of excessive pro- duction, and the Washington reme- dy was to plow up crops, kill little pigs and put the government into the cattle-buying business.

The beginning of the 1940's saw the technological revolution in farm production coming to the front, producing what at that time appeared to be huge surpluses. But there was war and post-war recovery that took up these ap- parent surpluses, with high prices encouraging maximum production. Prices went up from 38 per cent of parity in the 1930's to 123 per cent of parity in the 1940's.

But in the 1950's the vast in- creases in production again de- veloped serious surplus problems. Eventually, in 1955, a Democratic Congress gave the Republican Sec- retary of Agriculture the authority to flex price supports between 75 per cent and 90 per cent of parity for basic crops. This was done in the theory that since high sup- ports had encouraged excessive production, lower supports would cause farmers to reduce produc- tion.

The theory, however, has not been borne out by the facts, with total farm production continuing to set new record highs year after year.

This year, the best collective thinking of Democratic farm- minded congressmen perhaps is reflected in the "Family Farm In- come Act of 1960" by Rep. Bob Poage (D-Tex.). The bill is not expected to pass this session of Congress, but it indicates what can be expected next time if the Dem-

ocrats retain control in the House and Senate. It has two fundamen- tal aims: First, to strengthen the income and security of family farms; second to provide farmers with a variety of programs from which to choose. It is based on higher price supports with pro- duction under strict controls.

Last week Elton Samford, about two miles southeast of Cariton, worked his sheep before shearing. He divided them according to length of wool and shrink, making two groups of them. He sold his wool this week and the group with

the longer length or staple and less shring brought him five cents per pound more. Elton does not have a large flock of sheep but an extra nickle per pound is just as much profit on a few pounds as it is on many pounds of wool, when considered on a pound ba- sis.

Seems that we have more twin lambs this spring than we have had in many years. I believe creep feeding the lambs would take some of the strain off the ewes. Too, it should get the lambs to a heavier selling weight. If the lambs are being developed for the breeding flock, oats is a good feed to place in the creep. If the ewes are not too good milkers, then add some cotton seed meal, about 10 per cent.

If the lambs are to all be mar- keted a mixture of 2 parts grain sorghum or cracked corn, two parts coarsely ground or crushed oats and one part cottonseed meal is a good creep ration.

The Triple L poultry farm on the Shive farm to market road, has a new laying house that is quite different from poultry houses over the country.

The house is about 250 feet by 40 and will house 10,000 laying hens. It is divided into some 8 or 10 pens and each pen has a slat floor some two feet off the ground. In this two foot space an automatic cleaner moves the drop- pings to one end of the house and outside.

Automatic fogging fans will cool the house in hot weather. Water- ing and feeding is done automati- cally and in a few weeks an automatic egg collecting devise will be in operation. The house is of complete new design and of such to be a one-man operation.

I would again like to remind all of you that the bulletins in my office are for anyone who would like to have them. I always

leave the office open so that should you come in for a bulletin and I'm not in, you may help yourself. There is a new bulletin out on stomach worms in sheep and goats and it is a good one. Tells what to look for in wormy sheep and goats and also what to do for them. Another new one is small grains for forage.

Bill Meide, Aleman, has a field of small grains where he applied some commercial fertilizer that is showing good results.
