Vote 'Yes' Saturday

For the past several weeks, the News Review has attempted to explain the need for the present building program proposed by the board of trustees. In most cases, we have succeeded. However, many questions have been asked of board members and other school officials, some of which have been answered and others which have not.

The foremost of these questions appears to be this: "What will prevent the school board from raising the tax rate back to the present \$1.40 per \$100.00 evaluation after the bonds are paid?"

The most logical answer to that question is this: Put a faith in the integrity of your elected officials! As a member of the board, we anticipate no tax increase for several years, perhaps never. People must realize that schools are no different from any other business. As costs rise in an average business establishment, so do costs of educating your children. Why to what you might have heard, taxes WILL NOT increase until such a time as absolutely necessary. Hico operated their schools as efficiently and economically as any other school in the past, and will continue to do so in the future.

Such has also been said in past weeks about the State Accreditation Committee and its action against the local schools. Clarify a point there, and further point out the need for building, let's look at the penalties which the local school board should the bonds fail to be voted and it loses its accreditation:

Community Pride. (You might scoff at this at first, but under other people and other schools will look upon our school facilities, and most of all, our community if we don't have enough pride to meet state requirements for our children). Recognition by other schools. No child, regardless of age, will move to another school and enter classes without first passing an entrance examination. This also applies to our graduating seniors who attempt to further their education in college.

The state would no longer pay for administration costs at the school. Neither will the state pay for the vocational teacher. Locally the vocational phase of teaching includes Vocational Agriculture and Homemaking. In other words, the local school would have to take over the expense of administration, vocational teachers, which would be a total cash outlay of approximately \$16,000.00. Imagine what your taxes would be if the district had to pay these extra salaries!

The availability of teachers to a school which is not accredited is almost nil. No instructors worth their salt would accept a position in such a school!

In the year just past, the Hico Independent School District levied taxes in the amount of approximately \$22,000.00. Of that amount approximately one-third went for retiring present indebtedness, and the remainder was used for local maintenance. Two teachers were also paid full salaries out of the levied amount. The state contributed more than \$72,000.00, making the total monies spent locally to near \$100,000.00. Schools are very definitely big business and must be operated as such.

We feel that most people in the Hico district are well aware of the need for the proposed improvements, and in most instances, want them. But, some of the people who are opposed to the issue so strongly are opposed to the tax increase. Others are simply not for progress in any shape, form or fashion. Hico is not an exception. Any and all districts must have money to maintain proper school facilities. What would happen if Hico had a tax rate of, say, \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation, and were collecting taxes on 50, to 100-per cent of actual property value? Don't scoff at this, either, for there are many such districts.

As a businessman, we realize the importance of this issue. It is of such vital importance that there isn't a single business in Hico that can survive for very long if we fail to meet requirements of the state within the next two years. If our schools are not progressive, then our town is dead!

We, along with other progressive businessmen in Hico, urge every qualified voter in this district to go to the polls Saturday and VOTE YES to both propositions appearing on the ballot. We've said it before—and we'll say it again—Schools are the basic foundation upon which the community is built!

Patrons of Hico Independent School District will trek to the polls tomorrow, Saturday, and voice their approval or disapproval of a \$98,000 bond issue for the purpose of renovating the present high school building and erecting a new auditorium.

Opposition to the bond has cropped up in some quarters, with a few people working daily in an effort to defeat the issue. On the other hand supporters of the program point to the need of passing the bonds, and are urging all per-

sons in the district to vote their approval.

Persons working against the issue appear to be more opposed to the tax increase than they are to the actual building project. Most of them realize the necessity of the new building.

Plans for the program call for complete remodeling of the present structure, including the removal of the top floor now housing the auditorium. Other features will include new windows throughout, new masonry, plumbing, new light fixtures, and a complete reworking of the front entrance. Also included in the plans is a new auditorium which will be built directly north of the present structure.

The building program was presented to the patrons after a visit by the State Accreditation Committee last fall. The committee, in their report to the school board, advised of the need of the building to maintain an accredited school. Upon their advice the board felt that the need was realistic, so the proposition is being presented for the people's approval.

Supporters of the program are urging each and every qualified voter in the district to voice their opinion in the Saturday election.

Elsewhere in this issue a sample ballot may be found, and also a list of penalties which the local school would suffer should the building program not be undertaken in the near future.

IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

Given A 'Break' In Life

A short time ago the story appeared in the columns of this paper that one of our local children, less couples had adopted a daughter. My heart sang when I read the story. During a rather long term of years I have been taking note of childless couples adopting homeless children. And in my humble opinion there is no greater or nobler service that can be performed.

Let me recount some stories of actual happenings that have come under my observation.

In an adjoining county was Juanita, the daughter of Jim and Sue, two noble souls who lived on a farm. Juanita started teaching school soon after her college graduation, and in course of time was associated with Sidney. The two fell in love and one night in the farm home I performed the ceremony that made them man and wife. Shortly afterward World War II started, and Sidney went to an officer's training school and soon got his commission. He was moved about a while and then sent to Europe. Juanita followed so as to be with him. The years passed and they remained childless though both yearned for children. While in Europe they adopted a little refugee girl. They named her Linda, and when they returned to the states that sweet child, some five years old, came with them. She had to learn a new language and was thrust into circumstances wholly foreign to her. Though a quiet and retiring child, she learned rapidly, and has been a source of great joy to Sidney and Juanita. She now has a good chance in life, whereas there was no prospect for her until those hearts opened up and received her as daughter.

Then there is Geneva. I knew her from her childhood. After her marriage she and her husband remained childless though great lovers of children. Then they found a small boy and a smaller girl, both

crippled with a childhood disease. Geneva outfitted them in all the needed equipment for walking and recovery. They got well and strong and have been a source of continual joy to Geneva and her husband. Had the dear young woman not had pity on them the children were doomed to lives of privation and helplessness. What a service to humanity and to America.

Then there were Doug and Fernetta. Their hungry hearts cried out for the children that did not come to them. They determined to find some homeless little ones. They succeeded after a considerable time and costly effort. Now they have a son and a little daughter to love and cherish and train and give a life chance to. Both were children of unwedded mothers. But for the compassion of Doug and Fernetta those two helpless little ones would have been adrift in life without a chance. I thank God every day for the noble and sacrificial act in taking the little ones.

Chester and Melba had no children and every hope of having one of their own faded as they dreamed of such a joy. Then they bestirred themselves and found a son now growing rapidly into manhood, David Alan. Noble act indeed.

Then there is another David whom I know and am cheered every time I see him, fine young fellow who now has a good chance in life. Jewel and Dock did a gracious Christian act when they spread their love to shelter a small

homeless and helpless little one. Thank God for their kindly act.

And so the story could go on. I sincerely hope that the day comes when children, for any reason whatsoever, who have no home and no parental affection and care, shall appeal so to the childless couples that homes may be provided for them. To that end I pray continually.

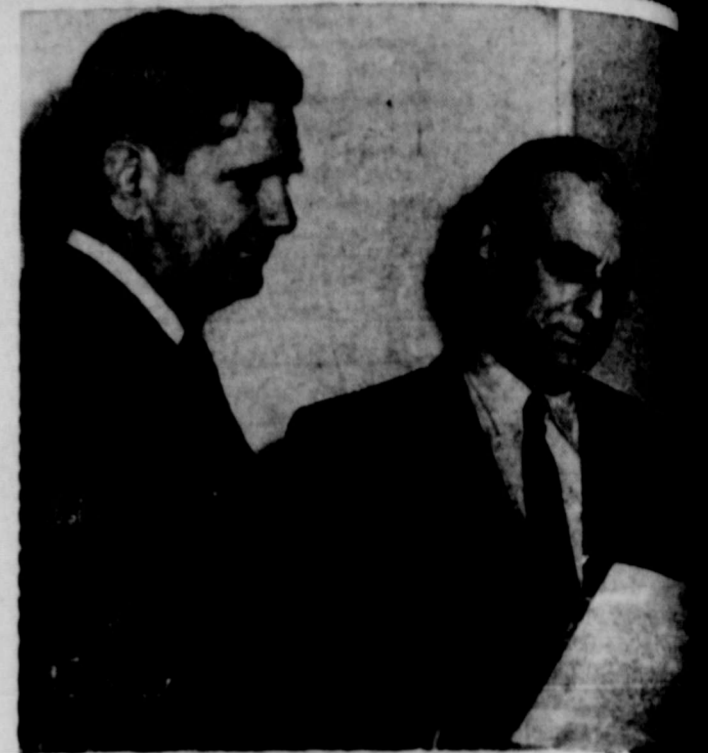

JUNIOR-SENIOR CLASSES MAKE ANNUAL TRIP

INFLATION

An unbalanced federal budget is the primary and almost the sole cause of inflation. The constant rise in the cost of living is caused by the failure of Congress to balance the budget. This is the second most important problem before the American people, (a strong national defense being the first.)

"In the face of such a situation, Congress has given lip service to economy, but spends money like a drunken sailor in an attempt to curry public favor by the old pork barrel route—something 'free' for everybody.

"The voters have no chance to register their approval or disapproval of these actions of the Congress, as they have in some states through initiative and referendum petitions. The only recourse they have against spend-thrift public servants is to remember their names and replace them when opportunity offers at elections.

"The people must take a hand in checking waste and extravagance by legislative bodies, both state and national. If they fail to do so, taxes, debt and inflation will destroy their life savings and displace freedom with socialism."
