## Early Primary Slated Saturday

### School Patrons Give Approval To Bonds in Saturday Election

Hico voters, 448 strong, rushed to the polls last Saturday and put their stamp of approval on the \$98,000 bond issue which had been presented to build a new high school building.

The election, which drew wide interest among local people, carried by almost a 2-1 vote.

The first proposition on the ballot, for maintenance tax, carried by a 277 to 166 margin, while the second proposal on the ballot carried 277-158. The second issue was for the issuance of bonds and the levying of taxes in payment thereof.

Work on the renovation program is expected to begin just as soon as the State Attorney General approves the bonds. The approval is merely a formality before actual construction can begin. Tentative

time for starting the work is the first week in June.

Included in the plans is a complete new auditorium, and a complete remodeling program on the present high school building.

### Annual Methodist Laymen's Barbecue Slated May 13th

The annual Laymen's Barbecue of the Gatesville Methodist District will be held in Gatesville, Friday, May 13th, at 7 p.m.

Speaker for the occasion will be Robert W. (Bob) Murphey, District Attorney, of Nacogdoches. Tickets for the dinner may be secured from Jimmie Ramage, local Methodist Lay Leader.

Saturday, May 7, will find voters going to the polls for the second week in succession to voice their opinion in perhaps the earliest state primary on record for Texas.

The election was set up from the traditional July polling time in order to get Presidential hopeful Lyndon Johnson's name on the state ballot before the National Democratic Convention.

A sprinkling of state-wide races, plus several county and district campaigns, is expected to draw several hundred voters Saturday.

Foremost of the state races is that of Governor, where Jack Cox is making a strong bid to unseat incumbent Price Daniel. Not too much interest has been displayed locally in other state campaigns.

In races which will effect local people, the contest between H. W. (Bill) Allen of Hamilton and Howell E. Cobb of Comanche has drawn the most interest. They are seeking the District Judges' post, which is being vacated by Judge R. B. Cross of Gatesville after more than 25 years on the bench.

Another district race, that of State Representative, has also drawn considerable interest among local voters. Kai Segrist is contesting H. A. Leaverton of Evant for the post, now held by Leaverton.

County-wise, only three offices will be filled which effects Hico voters.

First is the commissioners' race in Precinct 3, where incumbent Fred Rainwater is opposed by Asa Bullard.

Mrs. Pearl Williams and Wesley Jones are contesting for the tax assessor-collector post. Mrs. Williams was a deputy for several years before her appointment late last year to fill the unexpired term of Billy G. Wood upon his resignation. Jones is seeking his first public office.

Four contestants are battling for the office of county sheriff. Woody Young is incumbent, and he is being opposed by former sheriff Houston White, Roy Chumney, and Norman Clark. All are from Hamilton.

Andrew Campbell is unopposed for county attorney, as is Truman Roberts for district attorney.

Regardless of how they vote, people here are urged to voice their preference Saturday.

## South Hico H. D. Club History Given

National Home Demonstration Club Week, the first week of May, is being observed by Home Demonstration Clubs all over the United States and Puerto Rico.

Martha of Biblical time is considered a typical homemaker; and farther back, in the Beginning, Eve sewed fig leaves together to clothe herself and Adam, they had the spirit if not the "where with all" to do with as modern homemakers of today have.

Only in recent years has there been an organization, or demonstrations given by specialists for homemakers.

In 1911 a woman's branch of North Carolina State Farm Convention was organized. Then in 1913 Secretary of Agriculture D. F. Houston wrote letters to 55,000 wives of Crop Correspondents, asking them to suggest ways in which the U. S. Department of Agriculture could render more direct service to farm women. In their replies were mentioned: need of the farm plant, houses and farm planning, labor saving devices, water supply, heating systems, home economics, good health habits, food, relief from drudgery, useless motion and time consuming antiquated methods. Then in 1915 the Smith-Lever Act was passed providing for giving of instruction and practical demonstration in agriculture and home economics.

Now H. D. work is a national organization, divided into State, District, County and community organizations.

South Hico Home Demonstration Club is one of the five community clubs in Hamilton County. The County HD Agent, Miss Helen Ruth Flowers, gives the demonstrations, meeting with each club on given dates.

Hamilton County is in District 8. Miss Lucy Lane is District H. D. Agent.

The H. D. motto is "None Goes His Way Alone; All that We Send into the Lives of Others Comes Back into Our Own." The County Pledge is "To do the best I can with whatever I have wherever I am, for my country."

South Hico Home Demonstration Club was organized Nov. 10, 1949. Mrs. Leonard Weaver, now program chairman, is the only Charter member who is still living in the community. The other members presented her with a Friendship Quilt recently. Mrs. Marie Churchill became a member at the second meeting of the club in 1949, and is the 1960 Club president. Mrs. W. A. Moss is vice-president.

Members are at this time studying "Clothing" and the "Living Room." They have had a course

in re-finishing furniture and are representative in the Queen con-looking forward to upholstering demonstrations. Civil Defense has been studied in the past and the members are trying to keep up to date on the subject. Mrs. Zuella Strother is Civil Defense Chairman.

"How to grow old gracefully" will also be a course of study.

The Club has in past years sewn some for the Crippled Children's Home at Waco, also for the sanitariums at Carlsbad and Kerrville. Clothing and food has been sent to victims of fire and flood. For a number of years gifts were sent special occasions to an adopted girl at the Mexia Home.

This year, 1960, the club has a local elderly lady who has no near relatives whom they will remember with gifts, visits and cards on special days. This is in accord with the recommendations that H. D. Club members help provide more favorable conditions for older people in their homes and in the community.

A number of quilts have been made this year and sold to raise funds.

The South Hico Club always takes part in the Old Settlers Reunion by having a booth and being represented in the parade. They entered Miss Jeanne Brown (Mrs. Betty Blum's daughter) as their

test. Their comical entry in the parade won first place. Their booth was a display of a three-day supply of food, first aid kit and other articles necessary in case of a bomb attack.

To South Hico Club members one of their best achievements this year has been the addition of five new members: Mrs. Della Bell, Mrs. Zuella Strother, Mrs. Lem Weeks, Mrs. J. C. Sikes and Mrs. Herd Seale. There will be a meeting honoring these new members during National Home Demonstration Week.

We believe those within the walls should be taught to work, to play and to have compassion for those less fortunate. ### Local Man Attends Nutrena Feed School

Elk River, Minn.—A week-long look at new developments in animal agriculture was staged at the Cargill-Nutrena research farm here April 18-23 for 12 Nutrena dealers, including G. R. Doc Luckey of Hico.

Highlights of the intensive feed school sessions, headed by Henry R. Patton, Nutrena sales training manager, were inspection tours of various swine housing installations including the "Pigloo" system, beef and dairy cattle barns, and various turkey, poultry and egg producing houses.

The group was briefed on new feed formulas, animal handling systems and Nutrena's prescription calculator, a portable device which enables stockmen to compute gain and cost of production from a wide range of feeding programs.

The group also toured Cargill's central research laboratory and administrative office near Wayzata, and Nutrena general offices and electronic computation quarters in Minneapolis.

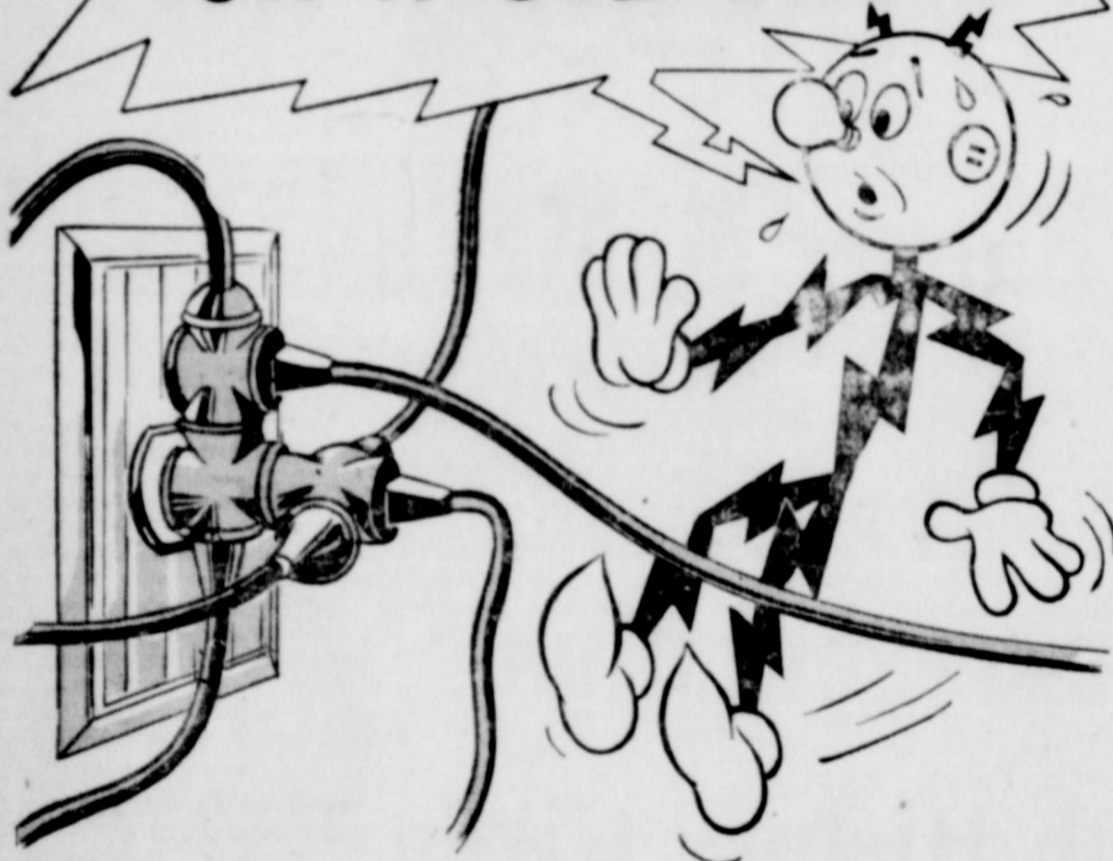

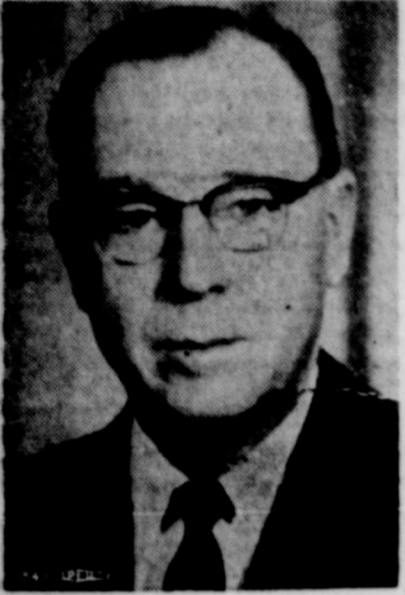

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS By E. R. LAWRENCE

The pecan nut casebearer is the insect that gives us the most trouble on our pecan crop. And right now it looks as though we are going to make a good pecan crop if we can save it.

Trees are setting well and clusters are large. The casebearer passes the winter as a partially grown larva. The larva is attached to a bud and in the spring the larva feeds on the buds then tunnels into the first shoots that appear and remains here until it reaches maturity and emerges as a moth. The shoots die shortly after the larva has entered.

In checking many pecan trees last week over the county, the casebearer was still in the shoots and was just beginning to pupate. This means that it will be some time along about the week of May 15 before it is time to spray. After the larva begin to pupate it takes about ten days for it to do so, and after emerging as a moth about five days pass before eggs are laid. Some three or four days are required for the eggs to hatch. It is at this time, as the eggs are hatching, and for about five days that the insect can be sprayed for control.

After hatching the larva feeds along the stem of the nut cluster, on the buds below and while here is when the kill takes place if it is killed. After feeding here for a few days it eats a hole into the base of the small nut and remains. After entering the nut it is too late to try to kill it.

Right now one can start checking for the pupae that should be in the shoots at this time. The shoot will be dead and will have some frass and webbing around the base if there is larva inside. All last week parasites were working good and most of the larva found were dead.

Keep checking the trees and try to determine when the pupae has emerged as a moth. From this time on check the little pecans, on the tips as a rule, for eggs. The eggs will be white and after a day or so will redden a little just before and as they are hatching.

Have the spray rig ready and about four or five days after the eggs are found, spray. Spray from an angle so the leaves can be knocked back exposing the nut cluster, getting the spray material on the nuts. About a gallon of spray material will be required for each foot of height of the tree.

Malathion is a very good spray material, kills quickly but does have a long killing time. Keep all

livestock off the grass under the trees for seven days after spraying.

To 100 gallons of water add three pounds of 25 per cent wettable malathion and two pounds of zinc sulphate. Every time a spray is put on pecans it is advisable to add the zinc sulphate because of the rosette that is damaging trees. Many pecan trees will be helped

a lot if nothing but the zinc is sprayed on them.

Remember that there is about a five-day period when the casebearer can be controlled and that the control of this insect is one of timing. If you are having a little trouble with pecan scab, to the above spray mixture add two pounds of Zineb.

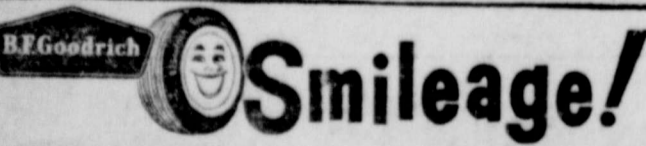

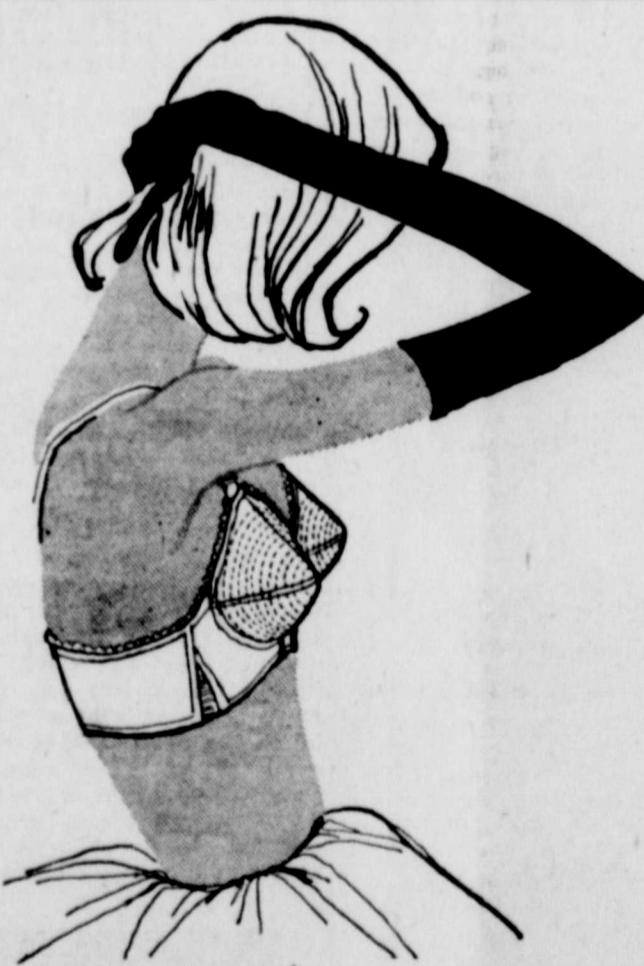
