Citizens Offered Free Haul-Off of Trash May 25 & 27

The third week in May, from Monday, May 16 through Friday May 21, has been proclaimed by Mayor D. E. Bulloch as Annual Clean-Up Week in Hico.

Trash placed in containers and set at the curb will be hauled off free of charge by the city, the mayor announced, on two separate days following the actual week of cleaning. Haul off days are Wednesday, May 25, and Friday, May 27.

The mayor has called upon every citizen to render all the aid and cooperation possible, pledging the cooperation of city officials in perpetuating Hico's record for sightliness and healthful conditions.

Mayor Bulloch pointed out that there was always an accumulation of trash about the premises of residences throughout town, and it takes constant effort to maintain sanitary conditions and control the hordes of mosquitoes which will soon be making their appearance.

City officials are urging everyone to cut weeds in ditches, gather up old tin cans, empty trash barrels, and do anything else that will help the appearance of premises during this special week of cleaning.

City officials are especially stressing the need to gather up all old tin cans, and any type container which might be holding stagnant water. Weeds and other vegetation around premises are growing rapidly this spring, and should be cleaned away.

The mayor emphasized the necessity of placing all trash in containers to speed the clean-up program. All containers should be placed as near a curb as possible to be more accessible to the haulers.

Trash barrels, garbage cans, and other metal containers should have holes punched in the bottom to allow excess water to drain.

404 Votes Cast in Primary; One Run-Off Slated in Co.

A comparatively small number of local voters turned out last Saturday to voice an opinion in the traditional first Primary election. Only 404 votes were cast here, which usually finds in excess of 500 people casting their ballots.

The light vote was attributed mainly to lack of state-wide candidates.

County-wide interest was about normal with something over 2500 votes being cast.

Only one run-off at a local level will face voters in the second primary, to be held the first Saturday in June. Sheriff incumbent Woody Young will face Houston White in a contested race for that office. All other offices were filled in the first primary, with the exception of perhaps two state races. Young received 1,367 votes and White polled 948.

Congressman Omar Burleson swamped two opponents in the Congressional race, much to the

surprise of voters in some quarters. Most people had expected a run-off between Burleson and R. M. Wagstaff.

In the local box, only three candidates whose names appeared on the ballot received all 404 votes, none of which were contested for their respective offices. Andrew Campbell, who campaigned for Hamilton County Attorney even though he had no opponent, received every vote cast locally, as did Bradford Corrigan, County Democratic Chairman, and A. A. Brown, Chairman of Precinct 3.

Winners in races which directly effect local people were: H. W. (Bill) Allen, District Judge; H. A. Leaverton, State Representative; Mrs. Pearl B. Williams, County Tax Assessor-Collector; and Fred Rainwater, Commissioner of Precinct 3.

SCS MOVES AHEAD

While talk of too many of our multi-million dollar water conservation projects in Texas never gets far beyond the talking stage, the Soil Conservation Service of the USDA goes quietly on about its business of retarding excessive run-offs and erosion from our creeks and tributaries.

Basically, the SCS does its work through and with the cooperation of State-sponsored soil conservation districts. There are now 177 of these districts, and they cover 98 per cent of the area of Texas.

It is the chief objective of every soil conservation district to formulate a thoroughly applied conservation plan on every farm and ranch, with every acre of land used within its capacity for production of food and fiber. At the same time, the conservation treatment needed is supplied to make

the land continually useful.

Some 200,000 of these carefully worked-out plans are now being applied in Texas, and they cover more than 100,200,000 acres of farm and ranch land. The farmers and ranchers using these principles of soil and water conservation in their day-to-day enterprises are finding them economically sound.

The work of the SCS is directed toward efficient management of water, as it begins on the land where the raindrop falls, and as it continues down the tributary watersheds of our major streams. This is of fundamental importance to both the present and the future of Texas farming and ranching.

Perhaps even more impressive are the accomplishments of the SCS in setting up systems of small floodwater retarding structures in two major Texas watersheds, covering more than 8,000,000 acres of the Upper Trinity River Watershed and some 4,000,000 acres of the Middle Colorado River Watershed. This has resulted, as of Jan. 1, 1960, in the building of 246 flood control retarding structures in sub-watersheds of the Upper Trinity and 70 such structures in sub-watersheds of the Middle Colorado.

Conservation use of irrigation waters is another important function of the SCS. In irrigated areas, reduction of water losses and more efficient use of supplies is adding up to a vast saving in water needed for growing of crops and other beneficial uses.

All in all, the work of the SCS is aimed right where it is needed in Texas—right down at the grass roots.

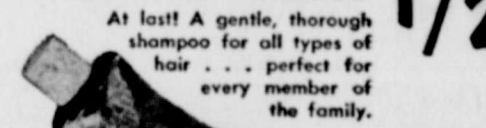
