Mayor Bulloch pointed out that there was always an accumulation of trash about the premises of residences throughout town, and it takes constant effort to maintain sanitary conditions and control the hords of mosquitoes which will soon be making their appear-

City officials are urging everyone to cut weeds in ditches, gath. er up old tin cans, empty trash barrels, and do anything else that will help the appearance of premises during this special week of cleaning.

City officials are especially stressing the need to gather up all old tin cans, and any type container which might be holding stagnant water. Weeds and other vegetation around premises are growng rapidly this spring, and should be cleaned away.

The mayor emphasized the neces. sity of placing all trash in containers to speed the clean-up program. All containers should be placed as near a curb as possible to be more accessible to the haul-

Trash barrels, garbage cans, and other metal containers should have holes punched in the bottom to allow excess water to drain.




