Yeggs Hit Hico During String Of Robberies Last Thursday

A wave of burglaries, which started last Wednesday night at Walnut Springs and Morgan, culminated Thursday night with the break-in of five businesses at Iredell and the Polar Bear in Hico.

A small amount of loot was reported missing from all places, with the Polar Bear suffering the heaviest loss. Some \$80.00 was taken from the cash register, marble machine, gum machine, cigarette machine and juke box. The culprits gained entrance by forcing the front door, which was the same pattern used in the Iredell robberies.

At Iredell, the bank, post office, Montgomery cafe, John McCoy service station, and Helm hardware were hit. This was the second time in the past year that the Iredell bank had been broken into.

On May 15 last year the bank was hit for several hundred dollars. The culprit was later apprehended. The bank and post office, which are located next to each other, reported the smallest loss. At the bank only eleven cents was missing, and the post office lost only a flashlight. Bank President Ray Hastings said that no effort was made to gain entrance to the vault.

Helm Hardware lost a small amount of cash, plus a number of knives. Their full loss had not been determined last Friday. Across the street at Montgomery Cafe, the juke box and cigarette machine was forced, and the same machines were broken into at McCoy's station, McCoy reported a loss of approximately \$20.

Junior Fire Marshals Aid in Annual Clean-Up Drive

Junior Fire Marshals are joining the city-wide clean-up this week. Local residents may find a tag attached to their front door, calling for their aid. The tag will be signed by one of the City's Junior Fire Marshals, asking for aid in the annual Spring Clean-Up.

The tag lists six timely suggestions for making clean-up time a fire safety check-up time. Residents are urged "to help the Junior Fire Marshals, and help yourself."

Junior Fire Marshal members are fourth grade students, under the supervision of Mrs. O. C. Cook. Petsiek Insurance, local agent for Hartford Insurance Co., which sponsors the public service program for elementary schools in thousands of U. S. communities, is encouraging the door tagging activity in cooperation with the clean-up drive, sponsored by the City of Hico.

According to figures cited by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, more than 36,000 fires in the United States each year are attributed to accumulation of trash and waste material. Dollar loss from these fires alone is estimated at \$58,000,000.

CPS Moving Glove Test Center

O. L. Davis, Frankie Williams and Andrew McFadden, local Community Public Service Company employees, are moving and installing the rubber glove and rubber blanket testing station of CPS from Hico to Clifton this week.

For the past several years the Hico property has tested all rubber gloves for the company properties located in Texas, and all of the rubber blankets for New Mexico properties.

To establish the safety of a rubber glove, the company requires all gloves worn by employees be tested every 60 days. They are subjected to a 10,000 volt test for one minute, and if they do not break down they are returned for use.

Mr. McFadden, who has been in charge of this work here, will be transferred to Clifton. He and his daughter, Faye, and his mother, Mrs. Ida McFadden, plan to move to Clifton around the first of June.

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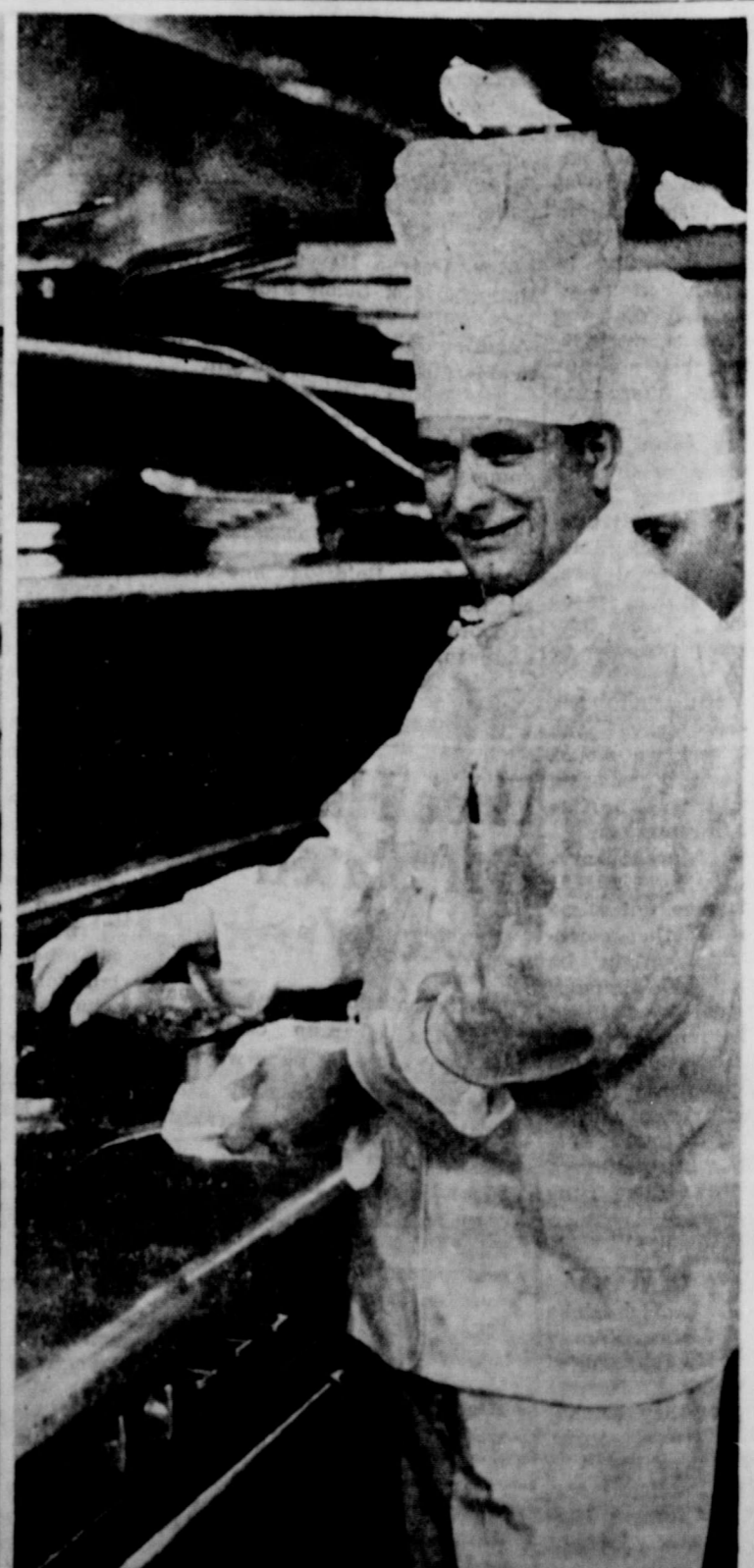

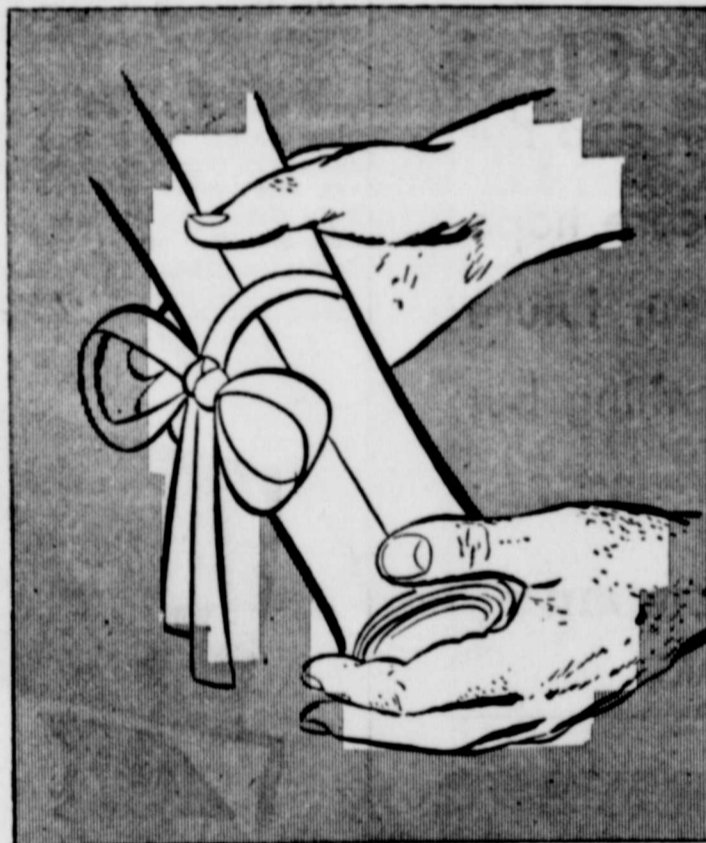

DR. WILLIS G. HEWATT VISITS CARLTON SCHOOLS

Dr. Willis G. Hewatt, chairman of the Department of Biology and Geology, Texas Christian University, gave a very interesting program on "Sea Shells and their Stories." His discussion was based on work which he had done in Oyster Biology and a Survey of Oyster Reefs off the Florida Coast for an oil company. He answered student's questions after the lecture and talked to several students privately later.

Since the National Science Foundation gave a grant to the Texas Academy of Science to support this program, the visiting science program services are made available to public schools which qualify at no cost to the school. However, the Academy is limited in the number of visits which can be arranged by the amount of funds provided, and will visit only those schools which offer a satisfactory program of science.

The scientists whose services are available for this program have been selected, not only for their competence in a given science field, but also for their willingness to help the science teacher in any way they can in the dissemination of accurate and up-to-date scientific knowledge which is so fundamental for today's citizens. Their principal role is one of providing scientific information. These visiting scientists serve as speaker, demonstrator, panel discussion, or special lecturer for a science program. The program is designed to improve the status of science and mathematic education in the state.

According to Supt. A. J. Barron, Carlton High School will probably qualify for both the science and mathematics programs in the school year 1960-61.

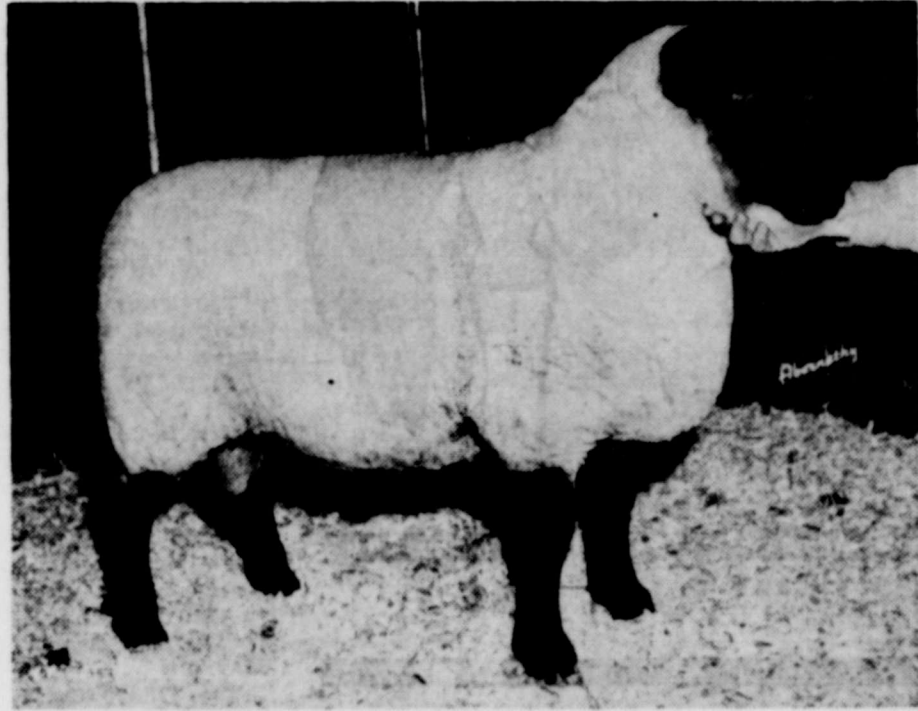

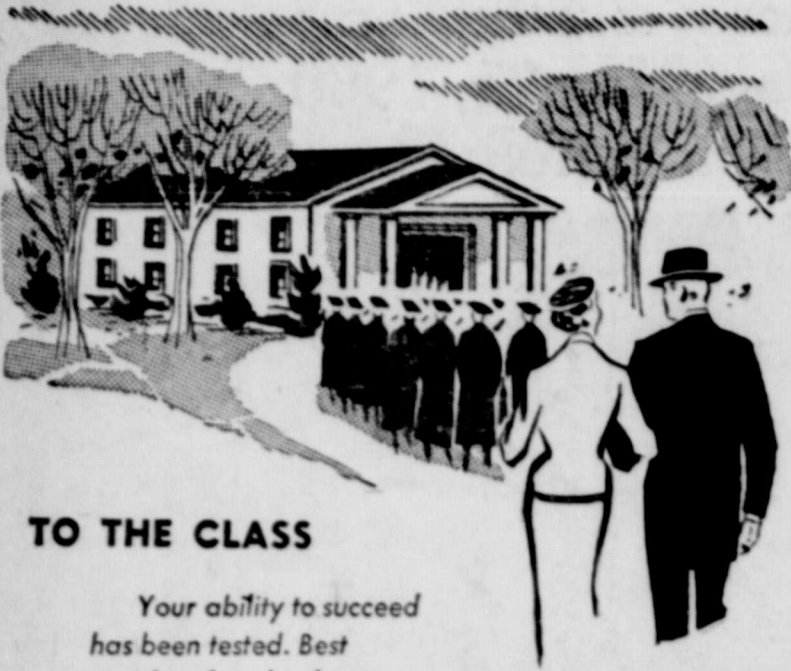

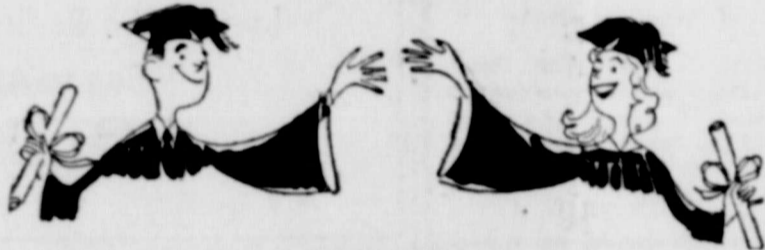
