## W. W. Young Is Re-Elected Co. Sheriff

W. W. (Woody) Young was re-elected for a four-year term as County Sheriff in balloting last Saturday in the second primary election.

Young defeated Houston White by a 298-vote margin to retain the office. The two had won out over two other opponents in the first primary.

A total of 2074 votes were polled in the county, with Young receiving 1186, and White receiving 888.

At Hico Young swamped his opponent 178 to 39.

In the only other race on the ticket, W. T. McDonald received 121 votes in the local box, as compared to 65 for Loyd W. Davidson for Judge, State Court of Criminal Appeals.

Methods of applying various chemicals, mixing the chemicals, and methods of eradicating prickly pear will be demonstrated. Chemicals other than 2,4,5-T and 2,4-D will be used in the demonstration.

More and More people are enjoying the fine sport and the great fun of fishing in Texas—and savoring their delicious catches at their dinner tables.

Texas' Gulf Coast is a fabulous "dream come true" for anglers. Many return home with ice chests full of such tasty salt water fish as speckled trout, red snapper, flounder, and many, many others. The big ones are there too! Fact of the matter is the world's record catch of a giant sea bass was made in Galveston Bay. It weighed a mighty 551 pounds.

Everyone, young and old, has read about "Old Rip." He has traveled as a dignitary all over the USA and even visited Pres. Calvin Coolidge in the White House. (Which, incidentally, is pretty good for a little old "Honry Toad.") What made Old Rip famous? This little horned frog slept for 31 years in a dehydrated state in a little tin box in the cornerstone of the courthouse in Eastland. You can see him today in his plush casket at the Eastland Courthouse and read his famous story again.

In the days of the old west, you were a big man if you were quick on the draw with your Colt single-six. Men died with their boots on and were buried the same way at the famous Boothill Cemetery in Tascosa, Texas.

To relive the old west, visit Tascosa, some 25 miles northwest of Amarillo and present site of Cal Farley's Boys Ranch.

An old railroad touring car belonging to Jay Gould, the railroad magnate, now stands as a museum in Jefferson, Texas, in the north-

east corner of the State. When the town council refused him a right-of-way for his railroad through the city in the mid-1900's, Gould noted in the hotel register, "This is the end of Jefferson."

But Jefferson still stands, and so does the railroad car!

Northeast of Crowell, at the cradle of the Panhandle, is the Pease River Battlefield. It is best known as the spot where a band of Texas Rangers recaptured Cynthia Ann Parker twenty five years after she was kidnapped by the Comanche Indians in 1836.

Holland Coffee's Trading Post was established in 1837 to barter with the Indians. One of the frequent items the Indians brought in to trade was a white man cap.

The site of this early-day trading post is just 12 miles northwest of Denison, near the Red River and the Texas-Oklahoma border.

A huge, sprawling oak tree stands proudly in the middle of a street in Columbus, Texas, west of Houston. It was beneath this tree that Judge Robert M. Williamson (Three-Legged Willie) held court in the Third Judicial District of the Republic of Texas in 1837.

It is related that on one occasion an irate lawyer, who was commanded by Judge Willie to "produce the law," imbedded his dagger in the Judge's table saying, "Here's the law!"

Judge Willie is reported to have laid his pistol calmly on the table with this retort: "Here's the Constitution which overrules the law."

Ragsdale, Range Specialist at A & M, will conduct the demonstration. The Cathey place is located south of Hamilton on Highway 281, just across the Cowhouse. Everyone is invited to attend.

O. H. Brummett, Route 3, Hico, had the Reserve Champion Pen of Hereford steers at the feeder steer show and sale last week in Fort Worth.

Th steers were bred on the Brummett Ranch near Fairy, and sold for \$30.40. The show and sale was sponsored by the Texas Hereford Association and the Texas Angus Association in cooperation with the new auction division of the Fort Worth Stockyards Co.

Ed Black, Hico dairyman, has purchased a new electric arc welding machine. He is using this machine to a good advantage and says it is saving him many trips to a welding shop to have small jobs done.

Welding machines are showing up more and more on farms over the county. There is hardly a farm that does not have several small welding jobs that could be done by the farmer or rancher if he only had the equipment. Ed says it is not too hard to learn to do odd welding jobs.

Earl Kavanaugh, Route 3 Hamilton, and his dad, Lawrence, are cleaning up some of their pastures of mesquite this summer. They are using a mixture of 2.4.5.T and diesel oil. Several acres have been killed, and they are to continue work through the summer.

Herman Rea, Pottville, has been using 2.4.5.T and diesel on his place to control mesquite and pear. He reported good success with this.

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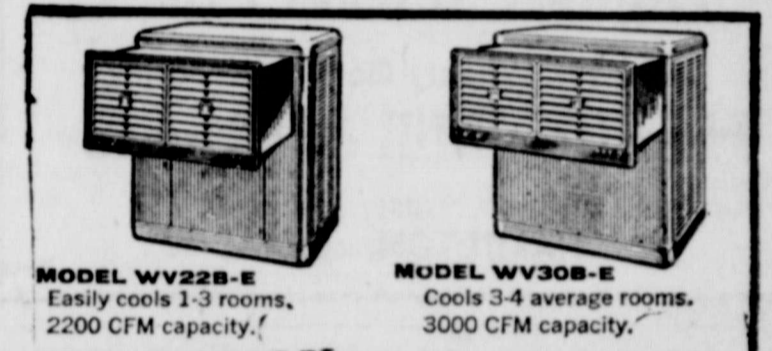

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THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

There's Good News Tonight—Texas Does Own Tidelands

Austin.—In a period of deep gloom about state finances, Texans had to pinch themselves to believe the good news.

U. S. Supreme Court ruled that Texas does indeed own its tidelands for ten and a half miles out—just as Texans have been claiming for 115 years.

Financially, it's a long-range gain at best. But as a moral victory for Texas principles, it's the biggest thing since the Battle of San Jacinto.

Revenue from the publicly owned land will go into the permanent school fund. Problem of Texas' bankrupt general fund is unchanged.

How much money comes to the school fund will depend on how much oil is under the submerged lands and how good is the market. Money going into the permanent school fund—from mineral leases, royalties, bonuses, etc.—is invested, and only the income from these investments may be used for current school spending.

Thus far, the oil yield from Texas tidelands has been far from spectacular. There have been only 24 producing oil wells and 47 gas wells in 22 years.

But if conditions are promising, oil men undoubtedly will keep trying. As an immediate effect, the state will get some \$29,000,000 in mineral payments that accumulated while the issue of state or federal ownership was being thrashed out.

Politicking Vacation.

Gov. Price Daniel will spend his vacation politicking for U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson.

First stop will be the National Governors Conference in Montana June 26-29. After that, said the governor, he'll vacation and visit around with other governors where he feels he can do the Texas favorite son's sauce the most good.

And after that, he will go on to the National Democratic Convention in Los Angeles July 11.

Daniel predicted Johnson would lead on the first ballot at the convention.

Anti-Income Taxers.

Voters who oppose the federal income tax and the United Nations will find a haven in the Constitution Party.

Like the Republicans and Democrats, the Constitution Party will hold a state convention June 14 to name delegates to a national convention.

At a preliminary meeting in Austin, delegates were selected and instructed to work for a ticket headed by J. Edgar Hoover for president and Tom J. Anderson of Nashville, Tenn., for vice president.

Constitution Party also nominated candidates for all statewide offices except governor. Gubernatorial nominee was omitted, because if he should receive 200,000 or more votes in the general election, state law would require the party to go the expensive primary nominating route next election year.

Hospital Needs Grow.

Deficit or no deficit, the State Hospital Board says the hospital system has increased money needs that must be reckoned with.

Board has voted to ask the Legislature for a \$107,000,000 appropriation for the 1961-63 period.

This would be \$34,000,000 more than the present allocation.

Part of the extra funds, about \$2,000,000 a year, would go to hire could change from the present 44 extra people so present staffers hour week to a 40-hour week. Board has recommended this change to put hospital employees on equal footing with those of other state agencies.

But the main problem, says the Board, is that the hospital system is getting more and more patients and needs more money to take care of them. In addition, it has the problem of caring for many oldsters who are not really mentally ill.

Youth Needs Cited.

Another state agency with a story of urgent need for more state support is the Texas Youth Council.

Youth Council has the responsibility for trying to stem the tide of rising juvenile delinquency and also to provide homes for children who have none of their own.

For this task in 1961-63 the Council is asking for a \$13,695,636 appropriation—up by \$3,500,000 from the present.

Some of this would be used for new construction at the Gatesville Training School for Boys, Gainesville Training School for Girls, a state home for orphaned Negro children and for additions to the Waco and Corsicana State Homes for orphans.

It also would enable the Council to set up a parole supervision staff to follow up on the rehabilitation of youngsters released from training schools.

Short Snorts.

E. W. Killian has been named by the State Hospital Board to be superintendent of a new state school at Denton which will care for 1,050 mentally retarded patients. Killian has been superintendent of the Austin State School.

Rep. Frank McGregor of Waco withdrew from the race of Speaker of the House with a prediction that Rep. Wade Spilman of McAllen would win. McGregor said his poll indicates Spilman has 67 pledges with good prospects to get the nine more needed to win.

IT'S THE LAW—

Contingencies Take Care Of 'What Ifs' Of Life

In this unpredictable life of ours it is the law's business to take a long look into the future and say what would "happen if."

For in your contracts, leases, wills, insurance policies, escrows, and the like you had better say what would "happen if" some of your best laid plans go awry. Such events the law calls "contingencies."

Who gets the "earnest money" you put down if you cannot go through with buying that house? What if you want to pay up that loan and save interest? What happens if a partnership goes sour, or a partner gets sick or dies? What happens if the people you name in your will should die before you do, or, if you all perish in a common catastrophe like a car smashup?

The law is wise but it cannot do your thinking for you. It settles such questions—but not always to your liking. If you don't make a will, the law says who shall get your property. If you leave certain things out of a contract, the law assumes that you meant to put some certain things in. But

how much better it would be in the first place to put them in the way you want them, by asking "what if?"

Take your will now: Your first desire, of course, is to take care of your wife and children—those nearest you. But it won't hurt anything to put "contingent beneficiaries" in your will in case something happens to thwart your first intentions.

Review your will every year or so to see if it meets the new things that have come up, or arrange with your lawyer to write in "contingent beneficiaries"—those who will receive your property if your first beneficiaries should die before you do.

You may long ago have had your son provided for in your will, but what about those lovely grandchildren he and his wife have presented to you since you wrote the will? What would happen to them if things go wrong and your son should die before you?

Or take your widowed sister and her children now. Suppose you and your immediate family should be wiped out: Would you want your property to go equally to her and to your well-heeled bachelor brother? Or would you prefer to
