Dr. B. L. Trotter of Comanche was named this week as new associate at Hico Clinic and Hico

City Hospital. Dr. Trotter will assume his duties July 15th. He will become a permanent member of the staff, according to Dr. H. V. Hedges and Dr. W. F. Hafer, local staff members.

Dr. Trotter will be here each Tuesday and Friday until July 15.

The new doctor will replace Dr. Bob Herrin, who has resigned effective July 10. Dr. Herrin will go to San Antonio for a one-year surgical residency at Robert B. Green Hospital. He has been associated with the local institution since 1956.

Dr. Trotter, who has practiced at Comanche the past year, was graduated from Baylor University Medical School in 1955, and interned at Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth. He also did a residency at Veteran's Hospital in Houston before going to Comanche.

An Air Force veteran, the new doctor is a native of San Saba. His family includes his wife, Patsy Ruth, and daughter, Laura Lee, age 2½, and Alan Leslie, age 2 weeks.

Dr. Trotter is coming to Hico since hospital facilities are not available in Comanche.

He and his family will reside in the home now occupied by Dr. Herrin.

Odis Petsick is local general chairman for the 1960 drive, and has named businessmen to solicit the business district this week.

Mrs. Ellis Randsalis, fund drive chairman, stated at mid-week that the annual drive would be conducted

in the residential section with a porchlight theme. The drive will begin at 7:30 p.m. next Thursday night. Captains and their workers have been contacted, and a complete list will be submitted next week.

April is the official month for the Cancer Crusade, but due to community conflicts the local drive was postponed until this month. Hico has been assigned a quota of \$260.00.

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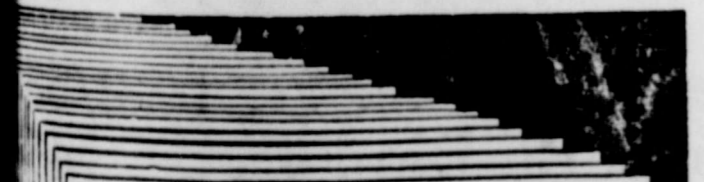
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# IT HAPPENED . . .

HERE OR NEAR

On January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln gave forth the Emancipation Proclamation. It became effective on June 19 of that memorable year. It is in the Calendar as Emancipation Day. In the South for almost a century the negroes called it "June Steenth." Southern whites called it "Nigger Day," and many do to this day. For me it has a new name: Tarantula Day.

It happened thus: Sunday morning, June 19, as I walked into the bathroom there approached me a huge tarantula, easily as big as my clinched fist. I kicked at the monster with my bare foot and missed. Whereupon he crawled over the top of my right foot. I got a flashlight and routed him from the clothes closet into which he had disappeared after my clash

with him, and got him out into the open where I smothered him with a sock that I had in my hand. I picked him up and took him to where my wife was to show her. She covered her face and shouted, "Ugh! Take that awful thing out of here!"

About noon that day my foot began to itch something awful. The more I scratched it the more it itched. By mid-afternoon it had swelled up quite a bit and began to be very painful. By bedtime it was giving me fits. Daughter Ruth put a poultice on it that mitigated the pain somewhat, but it pained me all night. When I had a look at it Monday morning it was swelled to nearly twice its normal size and vividly red and still dreadfully painful. Thus it continued for most of the week, while I went

about in houseshoes, which caused me some more pain by reason of the low heels that strained some leg ligaments and made me limp like a cripple.

As a child I was told that if a tarantula touched human flesh it poisoned it and the victim would suffer great pains. I did not believe it, thinking it was just another of the folk tales one hears over and anon. When down at the Clinic Tuesday I asked Dr. Hedges about it, and he verified the old saying. Now I know the old saying is true. Experience makes believers. A week has passed, but still there is a bit of swelling and patches of red on my foot.

So much for the tarantula story. One morning during the week my devotional reading was about an event in the life of Jesus. Mothers brought their children to Jesus that He might touch them. A bunch of folks scolded the mothers for cluttering up the place with kids, but Jesus in turn reproved critical folks and said to bring the children to Him. And He put His hands on them, and blessings came upon them.

It is easy to visualize a mother bringing her sickly little girl, Sarah, that day to the Master, that He might touch the dear child, tortured as she was by pains and distortions of parts of her body, feverish and under-weight. Then He took her upon His lap and kissed her on the forehead and felt her little shrunken arms and her knobby, wobbly knees and the bony calves. Little Sarah looked up in His face and began to smile. When the mother led her away she seemed like a new child and from that day began to grow toward a child normal for her age. The cackle of her laughter could be heard, and she romped with the other children in high spirits. It started when Jesus touched her. A strain from the song often heard came to my mind as I read the story and stopped to meditate a bit on it:

"Oh, the touch of His hand on mine."
