Gorman Invades Tiger Den for Home Opener

Packed Stadium Expected for Game

The 1960 edition of the Hico Tigers will perform before the home folks Friday night for the first time this year, after having hit the road for the first four games.

The locals, who have posted only one win in the four outings, will be back in their own class tonight when they entertain the Gorman Panthers. After winning their first game with Tolar, the Tigers have met and been defeated by a Class AA team, a Class A and a better than average Class B team.

Gorman has had the same luck as the locals in getting in the win column this year, having played a similar schedule and faring the same as the locals with one win and three losses. Their win was over the same Tolar team that Hico defeated in the first game of the year. Gorman pounced on Tolar 14-0, while Hico whalloped the Rattlers 30-0 in the season opener.

The game tonight should see two evenly matched teams go at it, and fans are due to see an exciting battle when the two teams meet. Last year Hico defeated the Panthers 22-0 at Gorman.

Both teams report minor injuries for the game, with the foremost for Hico being Fieldon Haley, stout defensive hand for the locals. Haley missed the game last week at Early due to an infected tooth, and reportedly will not be ready this week.

Other than Haley, no major casualties have been reported by the Hico coaching staff, but a rash of colds have hampered drills this week.

A good game is promised for the home opener, and a large crowd is expected to witness the 8 p.m. contest.

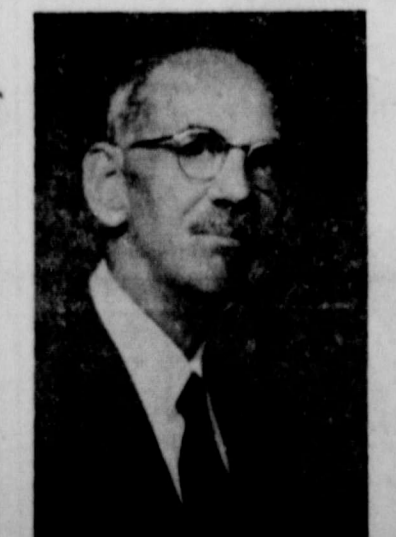

Rev. D. L. Barnes, pastor of the Hico First Methodist Church, has announced beginning date for the annual Fall revival to be conducted. The revival will begin Sunday, October 9. Rev. Barnes would not give a concluding date.

Rev. Ralph E. Johnson of Jackson, Tenn., will be the evangelist. He will be assisted by Miss Roberta Hall.

Rev. Johnson will hold a service each morning at 7 o'clock and each afternoon at 4:30 for the children, a service at 6:30 for the young people, and the regular evangelistic services each evening at 7:30. A morning coffee period will be held at 6:30 a.m. at the church.

"When you attend one of these night services you really know you have been in a revival," Rev. Barnes stated. "He preaches some hardhitting messages in a very forceful way. He is a profound thinker and his messages reflect this deepness of thought."

Crowds throng Ralph Johnson's meetings. In the afternoon the children coming home from school are entertained with magic, games and a concise talk on religion. The same is true of the young people's services.

Miss Roberta Hall accompanies the evangelist. "It is truly amazing to see Miss Hall in action in a revival," Rev. Barnes continued.

The Hico Tigers threw a scare in the supposedly superior Early High Longhorns last Friday night before finally bowing 16-8 to the home team before a large homecoming crowd.

The game was the best effort of the year for the Tigers, with all hands playing heads-up ball the entire game.

A strong defense and a field made slippery by a heavy down-pour before game time contained the highly touted break-away threats of the Longhorns, allowing their speedsters only one touchdown via the long-distance route.

Early halfback C. A. Milam scored the first Longhorn TD with a 35-yard sprint, and Charles White

got the other on a three-yard blast. A pass and run were good for both conversion attempts.

Early went ahead in the ball game on Milam's 35-yard scamper in the first quarter. Point try was good and the Longhorns led 8-0. The second quarter went scoreless.

After the intermission, Hico received the kickoff, and on the first play from scrimmage, Neil Ellis, who was hampered to some extent by a knee injury, slipped around the Longhorn flank behind good blocking and raced 69 yards for the touchdown. Point try was good and Hico had tied the ball game 8-8.

Early came back in the same period with the go-ahead TD, and the remainder of the game was played on even terms.

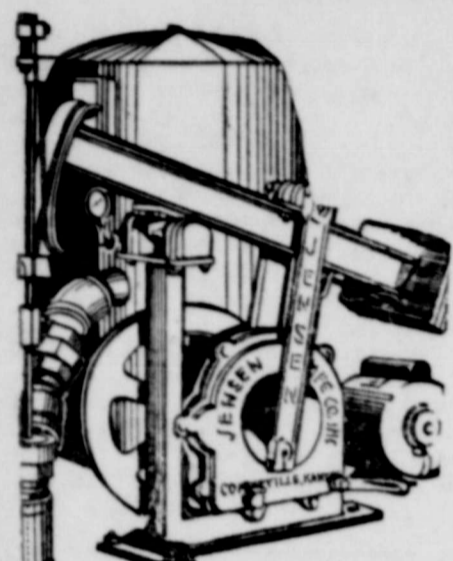

FARM PRODUCTION EXCELS

In spite of being caught in one of the most drastic cost-price squeezes in history—lower prices for what they sell, higher prices for what they buy—American farmers have increased their production efficiency at a rate far ahead of workers in industry.

One hour of farm labor in 1960 produces four times as much food and fiber as it did in 1920. Crop production is 56 per cent higher per acre. The output per breeding animal is 81 per cent greater.

Productivity of the American farmer is now increasing at a rate more than twice as high as the productivity of workers in industry. Since 1950, the output per man-hour in non-agricultural industry has risen two per cent per year. In agriculture the increase has been at the rate of five per cent per year.

In Russia, one agricultural worker produces for four or five people. More than 40 per cent of the total labor force of the Soviet Union works in agriculture and forestry.

If American farmers were no more efficient than those of the Soviet Union, 22,500,000 Americans who now work in manufacturing, construction, mining, the trades,

transportation and other non-farm business would be required to produce the essential needs in food, clothing and forest products.

In spite of all this efficiency, the average per capita income of the farm population is still less than half the income of non-farm population.

The average income per capita of those who live on farms in the United States in 1959 was \$965 for the year—\$644 from farming plus \$321 from non-farm sources such as outside employment. At the same time, the per capita income of the non-farm population was \$2,216.

The net income for one hour of farm work in 1959 was \$1.29. One hour of work in a factory averaged \$2.22. Hourly earnings of food marketing workers, those engaged in food processing, wholesale trade and retail food stores, averaged \$2.10.

Farm incomes have continued to go down steadily during most of the period since World War II, while non-farm workers have had an almost steady increase in income. Since 1945, the farm value of food has risen only 16 per cent, but the marketing margin—after processing, packaging and distribution—has increased by 93 per cent.

As the feed comes through it drops on a container which stands on a set of scales. As the feed comes out each cow's ration is weighed and then taken from the scales and put in the feed trough. Jimmy weighs the milk from each cow once a month and feeds each cow according to her production.

Using this method he tries not to over-feed a cow and at the same time not under-feed.

Hugo Busch, Raymond Krueger and Alfred Seider and V. V. Livingston, all of Aleman, bought cotton strippers this year for cotton harvest. Seider and Livingston bought their stripper together. With the

cost of pulling what it is this fall, it doesn't take too many acres of cotton to pay for a stripper in a short while.

IT HAPPENED . . .

HERE OR NEAR

Probably everybody has had one or more close calls in life when it was very near something fatal. I have not had many close shaves with disaster, but there was one in the year 1930 that stands out above all others.

Wife, Ruth and I were en route to Sanderson where I had an engagement at an associational meeting. The day, early October, began with glorious sunshine. Later in the day, clouds began to boil up in the region where we traveled, and by mid-afternoon a heavy rain moved toward us as we went through Sheffield, just west of the Pecos River. The rain came down violently and speedily. Just south of Sheffield the land slopes downward rapidly and numerous ravines had to be crossed. When we got to one of them, it was flooded, and not knowing the road we stopped for the water to go down. Presently a rancher with Mexican cowboys came along and boldly went into the raging water. It was not very deep, so we followed.

Some miles farther on we came to a larger stream, some fifty yards across, and it was flooded. Knowing nothing of the road through the water we stopped and for six or seven hours waited for the water to recede. Some time after midnight a car appeared on the opposite bank and after some waiting it entered the flood and with a lot of effort and pushing got across. The man in the car offered to help us across. We started at midstream the car stalled and Ruth took over the wheel while I got out and the man and I began pushing with all our might. Suddenly a new head rise came down on us and killed the car. I took wife on my back and the man carried Ruth and we headed for the west bank. Every second the water got deeper and more violent. We made the shore, thoroughly wet.

We huddled on the bank and it seemed that we would freeze. I never carry matches, and if I had had any in my pockets they would have been too wet to strike. That

was about two o'clock a. m. I walked south on the road hoping to find a house where we could get shelter. There was none for a ten-mile distance we learned when we finally got, started the next afternoon. In the meantime it was important that we kept from freezing.

It occurred to me all at once that in my grip I had a pistol. Maybe I could start a fire. I shaved some cedar sticks with my knife to get sufficient kindling. Then I took a shell out of the pistol and removed the powder from the shell and poured it on the kindling. Then removed the bullet from the another shell and fired directly into the powder on the kindling. There was a flare of the exploding powder, but the kindling did not catch. Wife and Ruth were horrified at the failure. I made more fine shavings, and this time poured the powder of two shells on the kindling, and having removed the bullet from another shell fired it into the mass. There was a flare, the kindling caught and we soon had a roaring camp fire to warm our chilled bodies. From then until daylight we kept busy warming first one side, then the other.

We had had no supper, and now had no breakfast. There was no house anywhere near. But we could see one down the other side of what had been a roaring torrent the night before. We waded across and made it down to the house and the good housewife served us a meal that sustained us until we got a midnight meal at Sanderson, when the Sanderson garage man pulled us in there almost dead with weariness and suffering. I still shudder as I remember the awful suspense and suffering of that awful night.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday, Sept. 28, in the Iredell Baptist Church for Marion H. Benson, 55. Rev. James Draper officiated, with burial in the New Iredell Cemetery under the direction of Barrow Rutledge Funeral Home.

Mr. Benson died at his home in Fort Worth Tuesday morning after suffering a heart attack. He was a native of Cleburne and had lived in Fort Worth the past four years. He was a building engineer. Survivors include his widow; one son, Marion Benson Jr. of Port Neches; one sister, Mrs. Thaba Bass of Graham; one brother, J. W. Benson of Pecos; and four grandchildren.

Do you ever get into a rut in preparing the same refreshments for that certain club, or study group? How about serving a new bread from our "Quick Break" bulletin? Let's try—

APRICOT BREAD

Two-thirds cup sugar One-third cup soft shortening 2 eggs 3 tablespoons sour milk or buttermilk 1 cup cooked apricots 2 cups flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon soda 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup shopped nuts

Blend sugar and shortening until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Stir in the milk and apricots. Sift flour, baking powder, soda, and salt together, and add to sugar and egg mixture. Add nuts. Stir only enough to moisten dry ingredients.

Pour into well-greased 9 in. by 5 in. by 3 in. loaf pan. Let stand 20 minutes. Bake at 350 degrees F. 60 minutes.

If you need extra copies of this recipe, or would like other quick bread recipes, just ask for the bulletin "Quick Breads" from the county home demonstration agent's office. This is just delicious served by itself, or slice thin and make sandwiches by spreading soft butter or cream cheese between two slices. This recipe, like others, may be frozen after baking and kept for future use.
