Tigers-Training School Tangle Here Friday Night

After getting back to their winning ways last week with Gorman in the first home game of the year, the Hico Tigers will host a big Gatesville Training School team tonight, Friday, at the local stadium in an 8 p.m. encounter.

The Gatesville team will be the largest met thus far by the Tigers, and the team and coaches alike are expecting anything but a romp when they take the field. The Tigers will be without the services of starting guard Fieldon Haley in the game. Haley received a dislocated ankle in the Gorman game last week, and won't suit out tonight. The fine lineman should be ready to play when district warfare starts next week, but will be slowed considerably by the painful injury. He was injured on the kickoff starting the second half last week.

Other than the Haley injury, the remainder of the team has been pronounced sound by Coach Barnett. The Tigers, who have posted a 2-3 season record, will be favored to balance the books against the Gatesville team. The two squads have not played a common foe this year, and no basis for comparison is available. However, Hico should have too much speed for the visitors which should produce their third win. The game tonight will be the final outing before conference warfare begins next Friday night when the Meridian Yellowjackets will invade the Tiger Den.

Services Held Monday For 18-Month-Old Girl, Rebecca Sue Wilkins

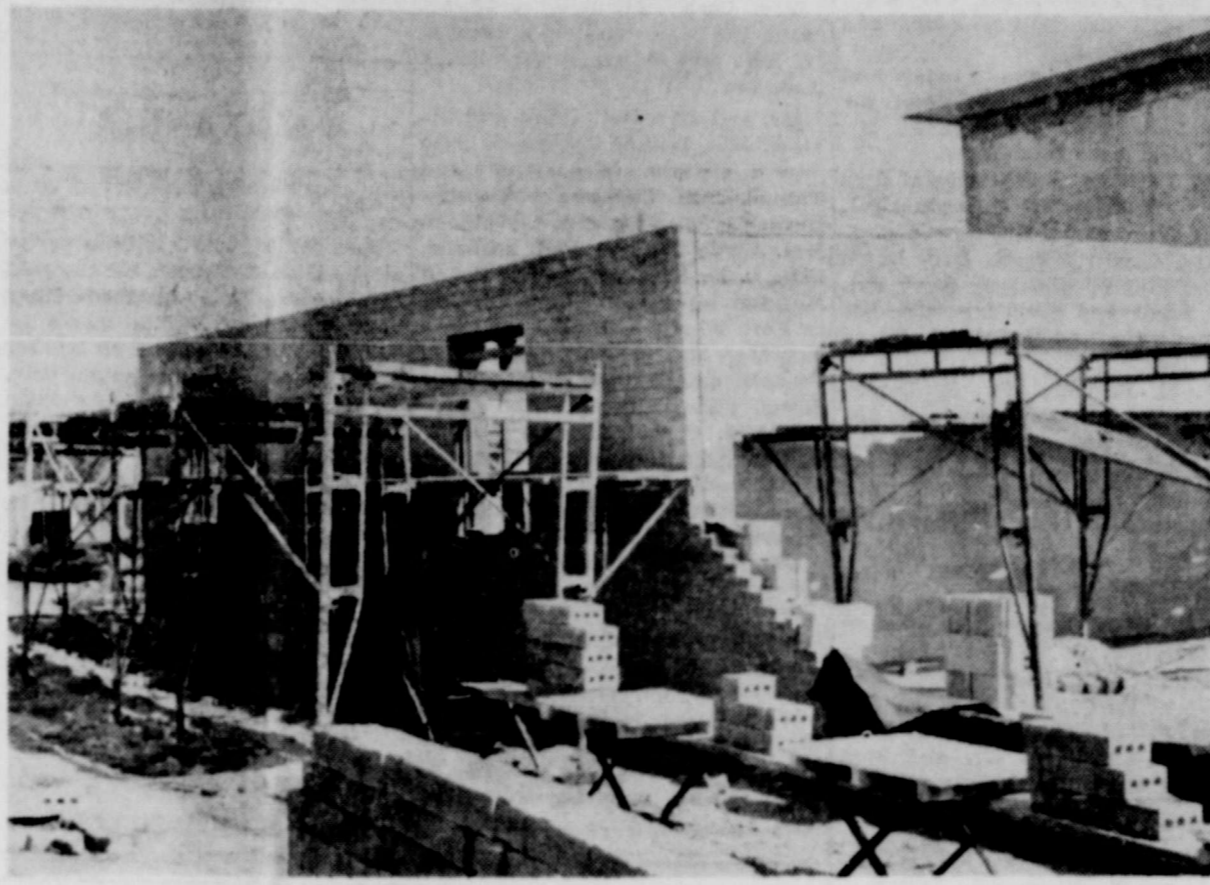

Tigers Blossom In 52-8 Rout of Gorman

Neil Ellis, bouncing Senior Tiger halfback, produced a six-touchdown barrage to lead the locals over Gorman's outmanned Panthers last Friday night in the first game of the season before the home fans. "Mr. Outside" accounted for 36 of Hico's 52 points, and "Mr. Inside," Bobby Boone, added another 14 points on one touchdown and four conversion attempts. Harold Hathcock made the other two points on a conversion.

The 52 points were the most scored by any Hico team in several years, and the six touchdowns was a career high for Ellis. His previous high was five in a game last year against Gatesville State School.

Gorman scored their lone marker early in the final period with Joe Harrison logging over from the eight yard line. Harrison also converted.

The game marked the first time this year that the Tiger offense had lived up to pre-season expectations, and for the most part, the blocking was nothing less than terrific. Both linemen and backs poured a steady rhythm of killer blocks on every play.

Mark McElroy, who started slow this year, again waited until the Gorman game to blossom. He was a consistent tackler and blocker, and recovered two Panther fumbles. Robert Reed, Mitchell May-

field, Butch Knudson, Lee Blue, Fieldon Haley, Larry Erick and the rest of the Tiger line played their best game of the year. Late in the contest when Coach Barnett had his reserves in, Knudson was credited with at least four unsisted tackles to lead that defensive unit.

The real killer play of the game came in the first quarter with Hico owning an 8-point lead. On the first play following a Panther punt, Bobby Boone dis- played fine power in blasting up the middle for 42 yards and a touchdown. Boone literally ran over a greater part of the Panther defense in scoring, and after that the Panthers could never regain their composure. The TD also added confidence to the Tigers.

Hico rolled to victory with 14 points in the first quarter, 24 in the second period, and 14 in the third stanza. They owned a 38-0 lead at halftime.

The Tigers cranked up their offense early, taking the opening kickoff and marching 66 yards to score, with Ellis making the last 12 steps on an off-tackle power play. Bobby Boone smashed in for the two-point conversion and Hico owned an 8-0 lead.

Gorman was unable to penetrate the Tiger defense after the kickoff, punting out to their own 42 yard line. On the first play after the

kick Boone bulled 42 yards right through the middle for the back- breaker TD that put the locals ahead 14-0.

Following the kickoff, Gorman was again unable to make sufficient yardage for a first down and was forced to punt. Harold Hathcock fielded the punt on his own 25, handed off to Ellis, who streaked down the sidelines for 30 yards to the Panther 45. After a three-yard pickup and an incomplete pass, Hathcock threw to Mitchell Mayfield, who had worked his way clear at the 30. Mayfield legged on down to the one yard line before being pulled down from behind. On the next play Hathcock was stopped for no gain, and then Ellis took it in for the score. Boone converted and the Tigers owned a 22-0 lead early in the second quarter.

Don Jernigan set up Hico's fourth counter of the night by intercepting a deflected Panther pass on the Gorman 24 yard line. On the first play after the interception, Ellis skirted left end for 24 yards and the TD. Boone again converted.

Mark McElroy started the Tigers toward their fifth TD of the night by falling on a Panther fumble on his own 30. Boone made 10, Hathcock passed to Mayfield for 30 yards to the Panther 30. Ellis lost 7 yards, and then on

the next play apologized for the loss by racing 37 yards for the TD. Ellis then passed to Hathcock for the two-point conversion.

A 15-yard punt return to the Panther 35 by Hathcock set up the sixth touchdown. The 35-yard drive was climaxed with a 7-yard pass from Hathcock to Ellis for the score.

The next two Tiger touchdowns were nullified by rules infractions. The first was a 22-yard run by Ellis which was called back for illegal use of hands on offense, and the second was a Hathcock to Mayfield pass good for 18 yards, which was again nullified by a 15-yard penalty.

The final Tiger tally of the evening came late in the third period on a pass-run play which covered 61 yards. Don Jernigan passed 10 yards to Ellis, who took off down the right sideline for the TD.

Following the touchdown Coach Barnett emptied the bench, and the reserves played all the final period. Gorman scored their only TD of the night on an 8-yard run by Joe Harrison, capping a 64-yard march. Harrison converted for two points to make the final score 52-8. Harold Rodgers of the Panthers had a 20-yard touchdown run called back late in the game by a rules infraction.

Gene Snider was the best defensive hand for the Panthers.

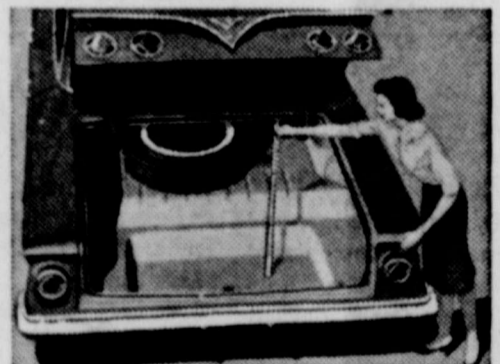

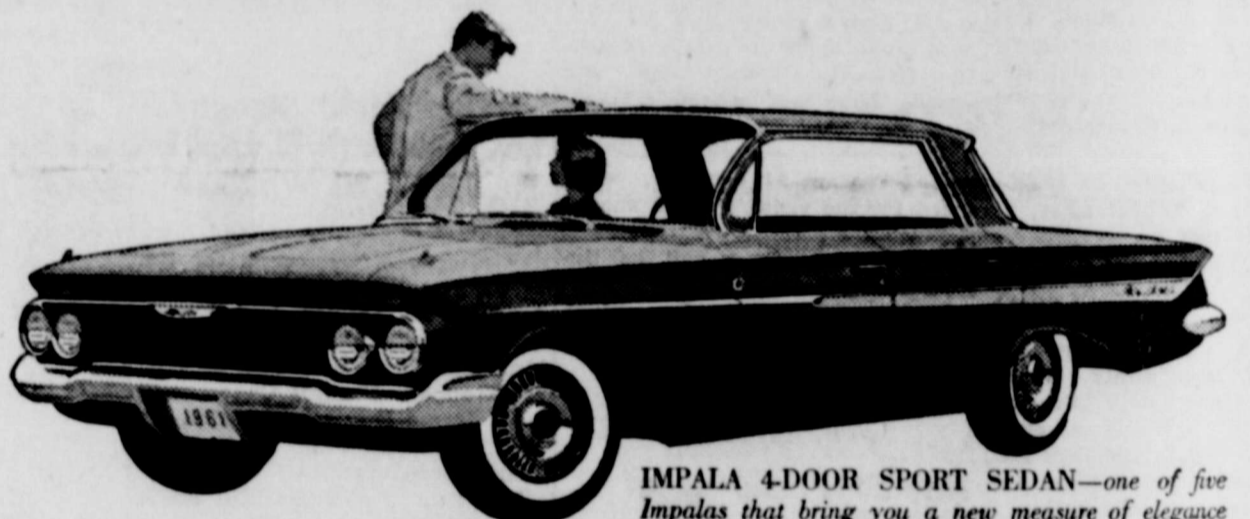

Medical Society Receives Recognition for Contribution

The Erath, Hood, Somervell counties Medical Society received national recognition last week in Austin for their 100 per cent participation in the American Medical Education Foundation's fund raising campaign last year. Nathan Cedars of Stephenville, president of the society, received the special citation from Herbert A. Bailey, M.D. of Dallas, a member of the Texas Medical Association's Committee for the American Medical Education Foundation.

The American Medical Association established the Education Foundation in 1951. It is a non-profit corporation which solicits and distributes funds to the nation's 85 medical schools. These funds act as a supplement to limited operating budgets and help in keeping the schools free from the need of federal aid. Since formation, AMEF has raised

approximately \$9 million through the activities of state and county medical societies, and the medical society woman's auxiliary. The American Medical Association assumes all of the operating costs of the Foundation, and every dollar contributed is given to the schools.

The Foundation distributed grants totaling \$37,919.67 to the three medical schools in Texas during the 1954-55 school year alone. Physicians who contribute may give to the individual school of their choice, or leave the distribution of funds up to the Foundation.

The Aycocks watched as the horse with its rider struggled through the water, and finally made the opposite bank.

Mr. Aycock said it was not so bad, and as the day was waning he determined to make the crossing too. He had Mrs. Aycock get upon the back of the seat with her feet on the cushion, and he likewise perched himself up there. Into the water the unwilling horse was forced by the driver. The high water came so near pushing the buggy and horse and driver and passenger off the bridge that Mrs. Aycock held her breath and prayer. The water ran into the buggy and even up level with the cushion on which the riders' feet were resting. The horse maintained his footing with extreme effort, and horse and buggy crawled at such a slow pace that it seemed an eternity to Mrs. Aycock. At long last they reached the far shore and the exhausted horse made the climb up

the muddy bank to safety.
