ation-Wide Jack, Dick Popularity Poll to Be Taken Tuesday

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Local voters will join millions of fellow. Americans next Tuesday, November 8, in a poll to determine the most popular man in the United States, politically speaking.

For Tuesday is the day many have awaited anxiously for, and while some will not vote for a specific person, they will vote against the person that they think is most unpopular.

Sen. John F. Kennedy and Vice-President Richard M. Nixon are the contestants in the poil, and both are more than confident that he is the most popular. Only the people can decide.

For the voters-in Texas this means a person who has a poll tax receipt in possession-this is the one day out of each four-year period when they can vote "yea" or "nay" in a political race which could control the future of their lives, and which all the world's attention is focused on.

In Hico, voters usually turn out in record numbers to voice their opinion, and their opinion is important even in its small way, to determine the next President counted. of the United States.

The past two presidential election years, 1952 and 1956, have found local voters yearing away from their traditional Democratic beliefs and voting a Republican ticket. However, most voters are quick to tell you that they were voting for the man-not

the party in those past two elections. The 1960 election will perhaps go the same way -that is local people will more than likely vote for the man rather than the party.

The blanket-size ballot will also carry several other important propositions for local voters to approve. Other than certifying state and county officials, four Constitutional Amendments will be either approved or disapproved.

And voters may vote for one man twice or scratch his name twice on the same ballot. Sen. Lyndon Johnson's name appears on the ballot as a candidate for Vice-President under the Democratic banner, and ap. pears again for re-election to the post of United States Senator. Some people will perhaps vote for Johnson for Vice-President thus eliminating the need for selecting him as Senator, while others will vote against him for the vice-presidency and vote for him for U. S. Senator. Confusing as it may seem, Senator Johnson is most likely to have a job when the final votes have been

In county affairs, all candidates who were approved in the early May Primary must be certified for office in the Tuesday election. Likewise in state races.

The Constitutional Amendments, in brief, are:

Number One on the Ballot-Authorizes

the Legislature to create hospital districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, and sets forth certain powers, duties and limitations.

Number Two on the Ballot-Increases the maximum permissable interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veteran's Land Board to three and one-half per cent.

Number Three on the Ballot-This bill is what is known as the "Annual Salary Bill" for legislators. It provides for an annual salary of not to exceed \$4,800 for each legislator, and a per diem allowance of not to exceed \$12 a day for the first 120 days of each regular session and for 30 days of each special session as maximum compensation for members of the Legislature. Also it limits the regular session to 140 days.

Number Four on the Ballot-Authorizes the Legislature to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest; provides that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; provides for the right of appeal and trial de nova in the event of cancellation or refusal to grant any permit.


