Have you ever sent items of news to the NR, only to find that in the paper was published the news had not appeared at all? Well, if you have, chances are we never received the items. Her deposit books still didn't reflect that we had ever cashed the check, so a stop-payment was put on the first check and another was written.

In the middle of May we received the original check, which had a post mark of January 15. Apparently this letter had been mailed the same place that the other had, and simply had been put in the mail until convenient to bring to the post office, some four months later.

We're not exactly peeved at anything, but we are a little put out by the embarrassment caused us by people who receive others' mail and only place the mail back in the post office when they discover a mistake, then such embarrassment would not be caused.

## Some Improvements Recommended by Visiting Committee

Hico schools were given a clean slate early this month after the State Accreditation Committee of the Texas Education Agency made a return visit.

The committee had visited the local school plant in November 1959 and advised of the need for correcting building deficiencies.

On the strength of their visit, the local district voted bonds in a sufficient amount to completely remodel the old high school plant and build a new auditorium.

Portions of the committee's report follows:

Major improvements have been made in this (Hico) school system since the 1959 accreditation visit. All deficiencies pointed out in the report of the previous visit has been either partially or completely corrected. A bond issue of \$98,000 approved in May 1960 made possible many improvements in school facilities, including the following:

1. The high school building was completely renovated and equipped with new electrical wiring, plumbing, new furniture for all rooms (including the library), new light fixtures, and new ceilings and floors throughout. Several rooms were enlarged. The science laboratories were equipped with new and modern furniture, including good quality laboratory tables, which provides sufficient pupil stations for the number enrolled in science classes. The third floor of the old high school building was removed, and a modern addition constructed as a part of the high school building. The addition contains a new auditorium with a seating capacity of 414, administrative offices, and a conference room.
2. A new metal bus barn has been constructed to provide space for nine buses. A concrete slab, two bus stalls wide, provides a mechanical repair area. Special gasoline and water lines make it possible to wash or service each bus in its own stall.
3. Double sliding doors were installed in the farm shop building. School officials, staff members, and people of the community deserve commendation for their efforts to provide better educational opportunities for their children. In order to meet the needs of pupils fully, however, it is necessary that the following areas be improved:

1. The room provided for instrumental music is not suited to the requirements of this type of instruction.
2. Provision should be made for centralization of the vocational agriculture instructional areas for additional improvements in the farm shop.
3. The library program, though greatly improved, needs further development. The program is hindered by use of the library for study hall groups each period of the day, and by the fact that the librarian has only one period per day for library duties.
4. Lack of secretarial assistance makes it necessary for school administrators to attend to clerical details that take up time which could be better used for leadership and instructional planning.

Recommendation: Because of the many improvements completed, and of plans for further constructive steps, it is recommended that the Hico Independent School District be fully accredited.

# Some Changes Necessary to Put New Life in Organizations

The directors of the First National Bank sauntered into the bank building's director room on the morning of January 1, in the city of Goforth. As long as the bank had existed it was the habit of its directors to meet on the first day of the new year and elect officers for the incoming year and determine its policies for that year, as is the custom of most banks over the country.

On this particular year, as the directors met they were not very jaunty; a cloud of depression seemed to involve all of the business men who came as a matter of duty. Word had got around that things were not in a very hopeful state and that something radical had to be done to right the situation. Under the leadership of Mr. Allgood while he was president things had gone in reverse. It was not because Mr. Allgood was not a good man, entirely honest, reliable in all that he did. He was not an aggressive business man and somewhat forgetful.

Every man present shook hands heartily with the new president and he got the feeling that all these men would cooperate with him in reviving a dying institution. There was a pledge in every handshake.

When the directors met the next January first it was a cheery group, for the fortunes of the bank had been reclaimed. Steve Works made a very brief speech: "Fellow directors, our resolution of last January paid off in a most satisfactory way. You can see by the report as of yesterday we are back on our feet and headed for a new day of prosperity. Our resolution has paid off." There was hearty clapping as he sat down. Every man approved.

The Ladies Aid met on the afternoon of January 1. They were an unhappy bunch of housewives. The Lord, Mrs. Goodwin had been president and things had deteriorated dreadfully. Every woman there had a deep affection for Mrs. Goodwin, but she was one of those dear souls who expects things to get done in a sort of automatic fashion without determination and effort. After the devotional, Mrs. Arrowsmith reluctantly rose to her feet. "Dear Sisters, we must make up our minds today to put new life in our La-

dies Aid or give up. We have almost reached the bottom and we all feel mighty gloomy. I have risen to nominate Mrs. Hope as president. She is so full of pep and determination I feel that through her leadership we can come back to full bloom as we were formerly." The vote was unanimous and Mrs. Hope took over with every woman pledging her most earnest and steadfast support of the organization. When the year ended all were so happy, for the work had gone forward with such vigor that all the church felt new life and enthusiasm.

The bank recovered and made progress because the men responsible made up their minds to do something essential. The Ladies Aid had a new experience of blessing and well-being because they stood up on their hind feet and resolved to do something they were organized to do. Resolution, determination, paid off, in both cases, just as it always does when honest men and women make up their minds and pledge each other and heaven that they will go forward.

It is the beginning of a New Year. You will find some folks who smile as if they know all that can be known and they feel a bit of commiseration for the dumb folks who return to the old-fashioned way of resolving to do better and go forward. But any sensible soul knows, when he considers soberly, that every step of progress in human history is the result of resolution, determination to do better and make things better. Let's make some real resolutions as we start 1961.
