Loan Law Sought.

House Banking Committee ngaged in one of the sess for the small loan industry.

A constitutional amendment voted by the people last November removed the blanket prohibition against interest of more than 10 per cent and gave the Legislature authority to set interest rates and! regulate the loan industry.

Five bills are under study. In general, they provide for a maximum charge of 3 per cent per month on loans under \$100, less for larger loans. Whether credit insurance should be included in maximum charges allowed is one of the questions at issue.

New Insurance Rate Bill.

As a new approach to auto insurance rates, Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo has introduced a bill to require legislative approval of State Board of Insurance

Hazlewood said his first ap. proach, a bill directing the board to make certain changes in the present auto rate plan, had been "bottled up."

On the other side of the Capitol, the House Insurance Committee voted out favorably a "flexible rating" bill that would take away from the Insurance Board; the authority to set auto rates.

A few days earlier, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson issued an opinion that under present law, only the State Board, not the companies, can set these rates.

Prior to his resignation as chairman of the State Insurance Board. Penn J. Jackson had suggested letting individual companies set up their own merit rating plans on an optional basis. Mouthful

When you place the colors in a room, choose the color for the largest areas first-floor covering, walls, and large upholstered pieces. In most cases, these should be your most livable colors, or colors that are greyed in intensity. Next, choose colors for small upholstery and the window treatment. This treatment may be a blend of the room colors, or match or contrast etc. Usually this accent color is the brightest color.

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



The first of these propositions is not in sight, and the second one is far from a reality.

Some leaders in Latin America would like to see the United States take action to oust Castro, but as politicians, many of them know it would be their own death knell to openly support us in such a venture.

There has just been concluded in Mexico City a Communist meeting which had as its principal theme the abuse, denunciation and outright insults toward this Nation.

As is true in most other parts of the world, we probably have less support in Latin America today than we have had since efforts have been made towards friendly relations.

The essence of good government is the ability to foresee. Hindsight is usually pretty good, but it does not promote economic development, national security or estab-

lish peace. No rational person believes that the United States can afford to build a fence around our Country and live in splendid isolation. The fact remains that after spending approximately \$70 billion since 1945, there is greater nationalism around the world than ever before in history. These expenditures and our help to other nations was sunposed to have made us cooperative friends who would stand with us against the expansion and avowed domination by the Soviet Union. Such has not been the case, but seemingly our Government refuses to recognize the fact.

The fact that we have deluded ourselves into believing that we can treat other nations as children, which has led them to believe that our resources are end-

During the last session of Congress the sum of \$500,000,000 was authorized to be spent in Latin America. No comprehensive plan or blueprint was furnished-just a half billion dollars to help the economy and improve the standard of living. Our State Department officials are now coming before the Appropriations Commit-tee for this sum. In response to the question as to whether additional funds will be requested, our State Department people assume that more money would be needed after this year.

They now indicate that the mo iey will go for education, housing, well drilling and water supply, sanitation and numerous other projects. Presumably it will be done on a government to govern-


ment basis, which means that the recipient government will actually spend the money. It is doubtful whether the people who supposedly benefit will know who their benefactor really is.
